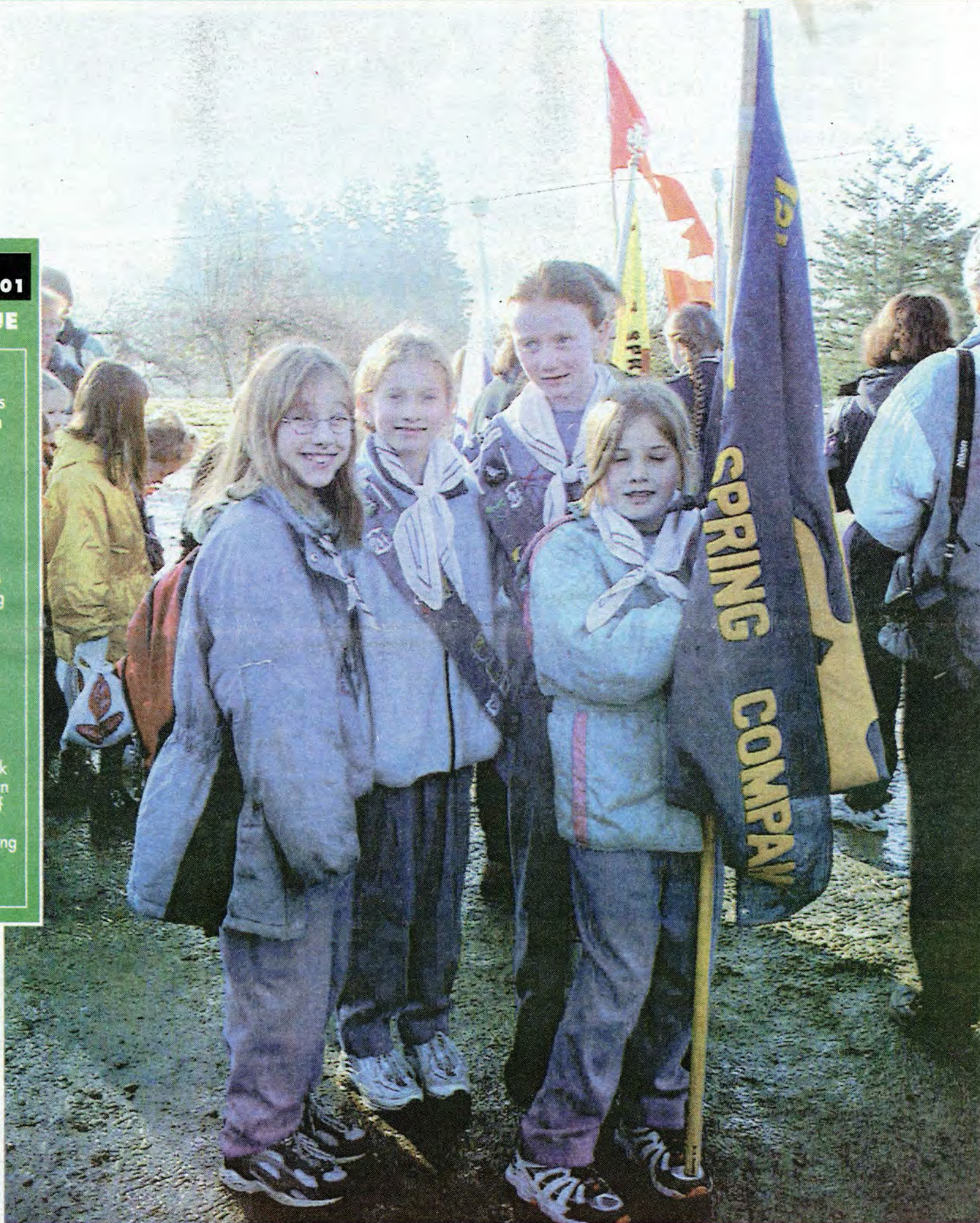

Rally opens Victoria court date

Seventy-five supporters of environmental protestors, mostly Salt Spring Island residents, attended the first day of a possible two-week trial in Victoria on Monday. Charges against 11 protestors had been laid by Texada Land Corporation and Dorman Timber. Nine defendants, ranging in age from 17 to 88, appeared in court. Two protestors, Eric Plourde and Angela Hughes, did not attend; there is a warrant for their arrest.

Lawyers Robert Moore-Stewart, Catherine Tyhurst, Andrew Gage, and John Davies represented the defendants, most of whom are Salt Spring residents. Judge Lowry presided. RCMP officers Sergeant Darbyshire, Constable Hewitt, Sergeant Belanger, Corporal Seymour, and Constable Tretiak will testify, as will Tim Dorman of Dorman Timber. John Davies described the Salt Spring community's concern regarding logging activity to the court. He brought up the code of principles produced at town hall meetings and the impressive fundraising activity. The concerns regarding the breakdown of drinking water from the Mount Maxwell watershed and land purchases were detailed. Davies expressed his hope for a win-win situation. "We've lost the mountains, but maybe we can save the valleys," he said.

Texada resorted to litigation, Davies continued. Discussions arose regarding the matter of criminal versus civil action with individual defendants and clarification of other issues was established.

Brent Kapler, operations manager and officer for Texada, took the stand describing logging activity and interference to logging with blockades

from early January, 2000. He claimed six to eight working days were lost and described the peace camp activity.

Kapler described publicity surrounding the situation in the *Barnacle*, the *Driftwood*, major newspapers, TV and radio. Videos of blockade activity were produced and viewed by the court.

Bea's statement

Bea Nevill plans to read the following statement in court.

When the highest offices of the law publicly proclaim that foremost of the basic rights accorded to all citizens is the availability of pure unadulterated water, we are prone to believe them.

We trust them to keep their promise, for are they not honourable men? But then, how can we be assured when logging is allowed right in the middle of the watershed?

Upon investigation we find to our dismay and chagrin that the lumber companies' interests take precedent over all considerations. We, the people, have NO rights whatsoever. We can protest ad infinitum but to no avail. Deaf ears are encountered at every turn.

They have the unmitigated gall to tell us that there is no proof that this whole-

sale indiscriminate logging pollutes the water. We must watch until the damage is done, and then PROVE it. Then the remedy is to sue the logging companies for damages done to our water source, and it's irreversible. We don't have far to look. There are two important water sources on our Island which are now in dire straits because of human activity in their watersheds. Maxwell Lake that supplies a large area on Salt Spring Island is the only pristine water source left. Safe, unless it is threatened with destruction. Which is imminent unless there is a suspension of operations.

Can we stand idly by and let this happen?

Let our voices be heard!!!
Let us be heard all over this land!!
We are not the only ones.
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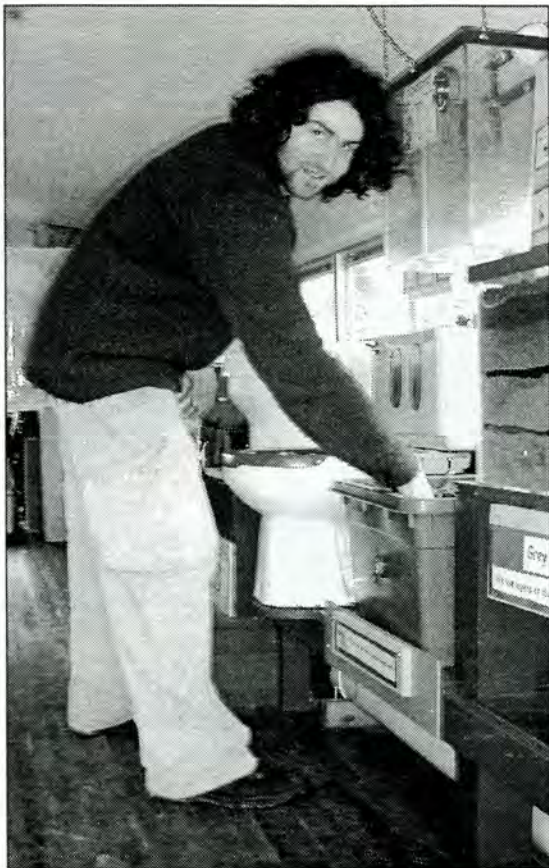

Eco-options displayed in bus

Middle school students had the opportunity to learn something about sustainable living on Monday when the Sustainable Living Bus rolled into town. As part of the Gaia Project, a joint venture between the Sierra Club of British Columbia and the El Salvadoran Centre for Appropriate Technology, the bus serves to educate B.C.'s population about the advantages of treading lightly on the environment.

The bus is a miniature Science World: hands-on stations fill the space from floor to ceiling. Through dynamic displays and visual aids, students learned about composting toilets, appropriate technology, water conservation, eco-shelters, green workplaces, and low-impact recreation. They also learned how to shop for food and other essentials with sustainability in mind and how to grow vegetables in the most ecologically healthy manner.

Stationed in Victoria, the bus will soon trek over to schools in Vancouver and the lower mainland; during the summer months it can be found at community events. The Sustainable Living Bus is just one part of the Gaia Project, though; along with educating the public through the bus and the teaching games that go along with it, the project includes works on development issues in El Salvador.

Bylaw up for first reading

If all goes according to plan, the Local Trust Committee will consider first reading of the new Land Use Bylaw at its public meeting on February 22. Given a request from the North Salt Spring Water Works District to remove home-based business uses from the St. Mary Lake watershed, it may be useful to consider some of the following information as the LUB takes its next step toward completion.

First of all, this community took a decision some years ago that we were not in favour of downzoning. Much of the history of the Islands Trust, since it came into being in 1974, has therefore been occupied with accommodating the zoning it inherited. This is where Mike Larmour's problems with overdevelopment in the watershed come from. Removing future uses such as B&B's (which is actually technically possible) would seem to run counter to our local ideas of fairness toward people who have already invested in their land under the existing rules. Buying resorts does not seem a likely solution, given the large number of tax dollars which would be required.

Still, the new LUB does increase the home-based business potential slightly, including more floor area for B&B's. The increased

size, however, does not allow for more bedrooms, and therefore will not increase waste water production. In any case, we have begun to wonder if one class of users should be singled out as the culprit. B&B's contribute their share of excess nutrients to St. Mary Lake, but farming and fertilizers are also major sources. Other home-based business, such as crafts and offices, do not seem to present water issues. Limited auto repair appears as a home based business in the new bylaw, but not in the watersheds.

So, what is being done?

First, the Trust obtained provincial money for a study on water supply in the NSSWWD, which is now underway. Water supply is not the same issue as water quality, except in the important sense that whatever water NSSWWD delivers to its customers, a comparable amount reappears as waste water. The study will therefore devote some effort to defining the legal powers available to NSSWWD regarding controls on supply, and, therefore, its ability to have some affect on the volume of effluent from septic systems and gardens. In this context, it is known that some large B&B's abuse supply. It is also fair to ask if Islanders want St. Mary Lake water used for lawns, especially if they are fertilized, or if they would want the water district to have controls on such water uses.

Second, the Trust requires 60 metre setbacks for new septic installations around lakes. The Capital Health Region requires 30 metres, and they so far refuse to recognize our rules. Our reason for the larger setback is precisely to deal with the nutrient issue, for which the CHR so far declines to regulate. We regard their attitude as extremely shortsighted. We have the Environment Ministry on our side, to say nothing of NSSWWD, and will be pushing hard to get the CHR to conform to our community's standards.

Third, the provincial government is promising drinking water legislation at the upcoming session of the legislature, which may help to protect our lakes. However, there seems room to doubt that legislation can be passed in the short time remaining before an election.

Finally, we feel that solutions for St. Mary Lake involve a range of management, education, and technical measures. One device, for example, would be to require additional sewage treatment to remove nutrients as well as pathogens from waste water generated in watersheds. The technology is available, but implementation would require time to activate new management tools (now available under the Local Government Act), and the co-operation of the Capital Health Region.

First reading of the LUB

means that it must be referred to the various agencies of Regional and Provincial Government for comment. Major changes to the bylaw after public hearing would require that it be withdrawn and reintroduced, but changes to detail can still be made after public hearing.

It will be interesting to learn the views of islanders about water and other issues as the document works its way toward public hearing. That should happen in late spring.

Local property donated to Trinity Western University

An anonymous donor recently leased 72.6 acres on Salt Spring for a minimal amount to Trinity Western University (TWU) for five years, with the long-term goal to gift the property to the Langley-based school. The property will provide science students with the opportunity for field experience, studying the local habitat and working with Island residents on conservation projects.

Last fall a group of TWU faculty visited Salt Spring to view the property. During the visit, the group met nearby neighbours and members of the Salt Spring Island Conservancy (SSIC). Ann Richards, SSIC board member, joined the group on a walk through the property. "It's a fabulous piece of land. It's got lots of trees and plants... It's just a very wonderful place," she said.

The visitors from TWU discussed their plans to use the site as a research station, said Richards. "We offered our services. We said we'd be glad to help if we could. I think it would be good for this community, especially if we can participate in their projects."

Doris Olafsen, Executive Director of Development at TWU, said the donor was intrigued by the university's activities and vision for the future, and wanted to do something for the school. She added, "We're excited to work with the people on Salt Spring Island to preserve the sanctity of their land."

Located close to Fulford, the property consists of coniferous forest, streams, slopes and open areas with diverse habitat. Along with a

Douglas fir tree estimated to be more than 500 years old, the most significant feature of the property is a community of Garry oak trees, an endangered species.

Karen Steensma, Director of TWU's Environmental Studies Programme, said that one of these trees on a piece of property would be a significant find. "But there are hundreds of Garry oak on this property. Associated with this is a whole community of rare species of wild flowers, small plants, animals and butterflies."

Since the visit last fall, a student from TWU returned to Salt Spring to take an inventory of the Garry oak on the property. Also more recently, the SSIC has provided TWU with information about some of the Conservancy's species lists.

For the past 13 years,

Steensma has been taking students to study marine and plant ecology on Seattle Pacific University's site on Blakely Island, one of the San Juan Islands. Offering the same climate and study conditions, Salt Spring Island will now replace the Blakely Island site.

The new location will alleviate scheduling strains put on Seattle Pacific University and provide students with easier access through ferry service. With a fresh water lake bordering the Salt Spring property and the ocean nearby, students will be able to carry out fresh water studies, salt water studies and forest botany, all at the same location.

Steensma said, "It's an absolutely astounding biological site. I'm still overwhelmed with what we've been given."

Texada logs in area of interest

Texada Land Corp. is proceeding to log in Lot 57, in the Fulford Valley down Lee's Hill, which the CRD had last spring earmarked as an area of interest for parkland. Texada principal Rob Macdonald said he does not know if the CRD is still interested in the property.

Macdonald said he met with Bill Turner, Executive Director of the Land Conservancy of B.C., last week on Salt Spring. "We've told

Bill Turner, with whom we're dealing, that we'll stop logging there any time if someone wants to sit down and make a deal. It's really not up to Bill Turner...it's up to the CRD."

It was Macdonald's understanding that CRD representatives would be attending last week's meeting, he said, but the CRD did not attend. "So maybe they're not interested. So we've left it with Bill," Macdonald said.

Texada's Code of Principles

states, "We will respect the forested view-scapes in visually sensitive areas of Burgoyne Bay and the Fulford Valley through measures such as selective harvesting and managing the size and shape of forest openings."

Macdonald did not comment on how the logging on Lot 57 would conform to the code except to say he hadn't decided yet what percentage of the trees would be logged. In the meantime, the logging will continue on Lot 57, Macdonald said.

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Money comes in for Nichola

Close to \$4,000 has been raised for Nichola Howard in the past few weeks, according to Nichola Howard Fund Director Gord Hollingsworth. Ticket sales for the raffle have hit the \$2,500 mark, while the Ganges Village Market save-a-tape programme has brought in \$600, the bowl-a-thon at Kings Lane Recreation made \$800, and other cheques that have come brought up the total.

Generally, money donated to Nichola for her medical costs goes into a bank account where all of it is then given to her family within a short time. The bowling alley gave the money directly to the Howards.

Pot fire investigated

The Salt Spring RCMP say they are still investigating a marijuana growing operation that came to light last week when the Salt Spring Fire Department was called to put out a chimney fire at a house on Broadwell Road.

According to Fire Chief Dave Enfield, the fire began as a chimney fire, but worked itself up to the top floors after the occupant of the house opened the wall above and let in oxygen. "It looked like the fellow tried to put the fire out himself," said Enfield.

When the fire department arrived, Enfield was one of the first fire fighters to enter the building. The man insisted that he didn't want to leave the house, Enfield said. "He was adamant that one hose would do it, and that he could put the fire out himself."

Enfield said that the man persisted in making it difficult for the firefighters to do their job. "I had a hard time keeping him out of the building. I told him I'd call the RCMP and have him arrested for obstructing. He was getting in the way. He was running around the house with no shoes. He was being a hindrance."

Enfield said the marijuana grow operation was obvious. When the firefighters

tried to locate the panel to shut off the electricity, that room was all locked up. "We recognized the marijuana grow operation and we contacted the RCMP and BC Hydro," he said.

The Harbour Authority is bearing most of the estimated \$20,000 upgrade cost, but thanks to a provincial Beautification Programme, the two utilities are helping out by subsidizing one third of their trenching and line access bill.

Editorial

Selfish destruction

It would be very easy to say simply: "Get off your butt and do some walking", but we recognize that it's not going to be quite that easy.

A recently released report, compiled by some 400 scientists, states that the world's climate is changing faster than expected and that drought, violent storms, and rising sea levels are going to become facts of life over the next century. The report points to the increase of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere as the leading cause of the climatic change.

Another report released a few weeks ago puts the blame for North American's obesity squarely on the doorstep of civic planners. The design of sprawling suburbs which discourage walking—many don't even have sidewalks—is, according to this report, why so many of us are fat. We don't walk; we drive everywhere; the most walking too many of us do is from the house to the car.

Yet another report shows how a combination of pesticides—not one particular chemical, which had undoubtedly been thoroughly tested, but a combination of two of them—can cause Parkinson's disease. One of these chemicals is regularly used on potatoes, the other on corn.

Most of us know the solution to these problems, recognizing their roots in the North American lifestyle, our much vaunted "high standard of living."

We consume at a prodigious rate—not just food, although the variety, quantity, and quality available to us is certainly vast, but also cosmetics, soaps and cleaners, clothes, furniture, travel, entertainment, electronics, boats, big houses, and, of course, many, many cars. And all these things we buy demand the consumption of vast amounts of energy and water in their production—production which results in the release of much waste material... including greenhouse gases.

We are the consumer culture. We like it. We crave it. We go to military and economic war over it, rallying under the battle cry of protecting our standard of living.

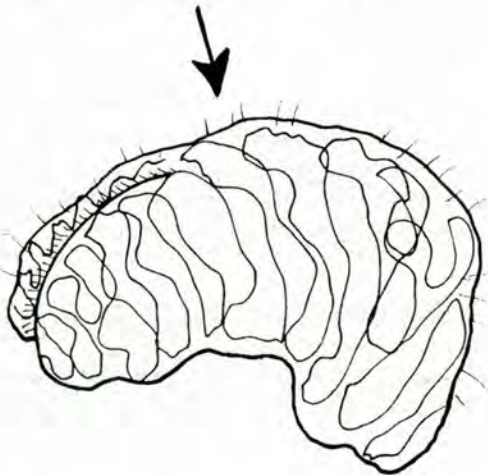
Most of us recognize that it is destroying us personally and destroying the world. But we don't want to give it up. We want to go places, to not ever be hungry, to be clean and warm and beautiful and happy. And why shouldn't we—we are creatures and the achievement of these creature comforts is what we have striven for since we dropped out of the trees.

But if we dare to claim that we are more than just creatures, we must recognize that we need to rein ourselves in. We must accept a reduction in our standard of living, we must give up some of our creature comforts so that we and the rest of the creatures have a chance for survival.

Here on Salt Spring we are a little ahead of the pack in this recognition. But it's going to take a generation or two for the momentum of our society to change in any significant way. It starts, of course, with us, teaching and showing our children and grandchildren the way.

Make a few rules for yourself: Shop, if you must, locally. Complain about excessive packaging. Be sure you actually need what you're buying, and if you do buy it, consider walking it home instead of driving.

Time to secure community lands

It has been a long, hard year for Salt Spring Islanders. Our efforts towards securing the 10 per cent of south Salt Spring that was bought by Texada Land Corporation is about to come to various conclusions—all by around the end of March. If we have the will, this land could form the beginnings of a sustainable Salt Spring.

It has been a challenge for all of us to participate and watch as our community has faced the consequences of industrial logging in an area which has really only seen selective logging from a generation or so ago. It is painful to witness the loss of some of our beautiful second growth Douglas fir forest, which is now so rare that it is considered an endangered ecosystem. Even more important to many local businesses, it is the background and playground in which millions of visitors travel each year as they bring us their holiday bustle and business, which, as recently reported in both papers, is the basis of over 37 per cent of our Island's economy.

But it's not just tourism dollars that this land offers, it is the basis of clean and abundant water to drink, the opportunity to have sustainable Community Forestry and Community

Agriculture. And you may have heard about the federal/provincial biodiversity package. This \$110 million fund is aimed at protecting significant and rare areas of Canada. Salt Spring's Garry oak woodlands, the largest in Canada, is one of them. All these community treasures are currently on the negotiating table and need your help to succeed.

What can you do? Well, you have about four or five different choices. First, you could contribute by loaning larger funds which would help secure more lands sooner and which could later be repaid. Or you can donate outright. You can also designate which area you wish to have your contribution earmarked for.

To secure the secondary watershed catchment areas up on Mt. Maxwell, contact the Water Preservation Society, 537-9281, or Salt Spring Conservancy, 538-0318, or Andrea Collins, 653-4940. To help secure Community Forest or Agricultural Lands, you can contact Elizabeth White, 537-2616, or send your donation to The Land Conservancy of British Columbia, 5793 Old West Saanich Road, Victoria, V8X 3X3. If you want to help protect Burgoyne Bay and the Garry oaks, you can also send your

contribution to the Land Conservancy of B.C. Or alternatively, you can help to purchase possible covenants on the old growth along Burgoyne Bay Road by contacting Nina Raginsky, 537-4515. Donations to the Land Conservancy are tax deductible.

If you need to view maps or other information, or want to purchase calendars, bumper stickers, etc., visit the Land Trust Alliance of B.C. office, above the Golden Island Restaurant.

Another important way that you can help is to donate toward the legal costs of the 11 individuals who risked more than a year's work and freedom in order to bring the importance of unsustainable logging practices to our attention. Donations to the "Salt Spring Star" account at Island Savings will go directly toward helping defend these people in court.

This time we really can make a difference! An amazing number of individuals have been working behind the scenes, creating scenes, and contributing to scenes. Let's all do something now while we still can - to help Salt Spring become more sustainable for ourselves and the next generation.

Saving Lot 57

Good things are happening regarding our hard work to save the Texada Lands this past year: We bought Lot 9, the primary watershed of Lake Maxwell. The Nature Trust of B.C. just bought Lot 3, 80 acres of Gary oak meadow on the North shore of Burgoyne Bay, and they are negotiating the rest of the North Shore. Texada has agreed to stop logging in Burgoyne Bay until March 30, giving us time to purchase it for the Biodiversity Package. This is fantastic!

However, Lot 57 will continue to be logged. This is our gorgeous view-scape in Fulford Valley, which you see as you drive down Lee's Hill. Currently, it looks like a moth-eaten bit of cloth with giant holes of clearcut. The cut branches are green now, but come July, they will turn brown. Texada plans to continue logging this steep slope, in spite of their promise to our community to respect our view-scapes. This was clearly stated in their Code of Principles, which they proudly gave to our community a year ago.

Salt Spring Island thrives on tourism. Who, honestly, will feel great coming to an Island ravaged by industrial logging?

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Temporary Closure

Long Harbour Terminal

BC Ferries' Salt Spring Island terminal at Long Harbour will be closed between Tuesday, February 20 and Thursday, March 15, 2001 (inclusive) so that aging dock structures can be replaced.

Passengers travelling between Tsawwassen and Salt Spring Island should plan to use the throughfare option via Swartz Bay and Fulford Harbour, or use a combination of the Tsawwassen-Duke Point and Crofton-Vesuvius routes.

Passengers travelling between the Outer Gulf Islands and Salt Spring Island should plan to sail via the Gulf Island-Swartz Bay and Swartz Bay-Fulford Harbour routes. The regular Inter-Island fare will cover both trips.

Long Harbour is expected to reopen March 16, 2001, in time for the Spring Break holiday.

Note that service between Tsawwassen, Galiano Island, Saturna Island, Mayne Island and the Pender Islands will continue on the regular winter schedule during the Long Harbour closure period.

Also note that, for the duration of the project, the 6:20 a.m. sailing from Fulford Harbour will leave at 5:50 a.m. to accommodate passengers who intend to connect with the 7:00 a.m. vessel from Swartz Bay to Tsawwassen.

Beware the ferries

BC Ferries has just cost me nearly \$600.

Yes, I know, we all pay the usual exorbitant fares to ride the ferries, and no doubt they equal upwards of \$600 in the course of a few months of regular car-and-driver riding, but the incident I'm referring to cost me all of it in one fell swoop.

On the afternoon of January 21, my friend and I were heading to his home in Sidney from Saturna Island. Of course, the trip had to run via Village Bay on Mayne Island. Upon reaching Mayne Island, the Mayne Queen docked at Berth 2, the smaller of Village Bay's two berths.

A large crane truck was waved off ahead of me. The up incline was steep, but the ferry workers (three of them) standing around nearby did not seem concerned, and in fact seemed impatient, so I allowed the car to roll ahead.

Suddenly, a large hand seemed to reach up from beneath and grab the underside of the car, yanking it to a very abrupt and unexpected halt. The crunching sound was atrocious! I thought the

truck behind me had hit me. Again, though, the ferry workers seemed unconcerned: as I searched their faces for some sign of what the horrible sound had been, they only stared back at me, apparently wondering why I wasn't getting the heck of their boat. The car rolled ahead very slowly, and the grinding noise that followed me brought tears to my eyes. It was my catalytic converter, along with three-quarters of the rest of my exhaust system, dragging on the ground.

It seemed the ferry workers did not seem in the least alert, as I was driving off, to watch the inordinately high hinge point to make sure of my ground clearance. They found a large bolt and spring laying on the deck, apparently the lynchpin of my car's underside, which had been completely sheared clean off by the force. We limped the car to Sidney, where it now STILL sits, as of February 7. The damage repair bill has come to almost \$600, and being a full-time student and only working two days a week, I simply can't afford to pay for it.

Can you see the end of this story yet? BC Ferries has not been forthcoming in any way, shape, or form with any assistance, not even an admittance of potential 50 per cent fault in this accident. ICBC was about as helpful. No one is working for me, and it's now about to cost me a lot of money I didn't have to spend.

This isn't just a complainer letter. I almost half expected this sort of treatment from our intrepid Crown Corpo-

rations. I guess it's really just a warning...to all my fellow Island residents, and anyone who has to unfortunately depend on the ferry to get to and from work or school.

Beware, ferry travelers. If you think that dock looks just a little too steep, get out of your car and check your ground clearance. Because believe me, those \$30-per-hour ferry dockworkers, who seem to only be there to wave cars to lane 1 or 2, won't be watching out for YOU.

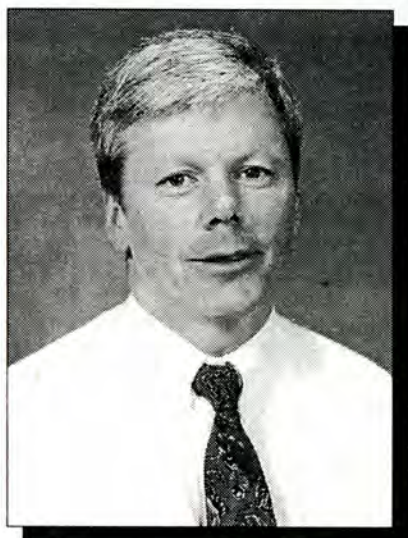

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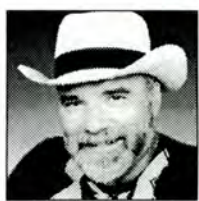
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Things go weirder with Coke

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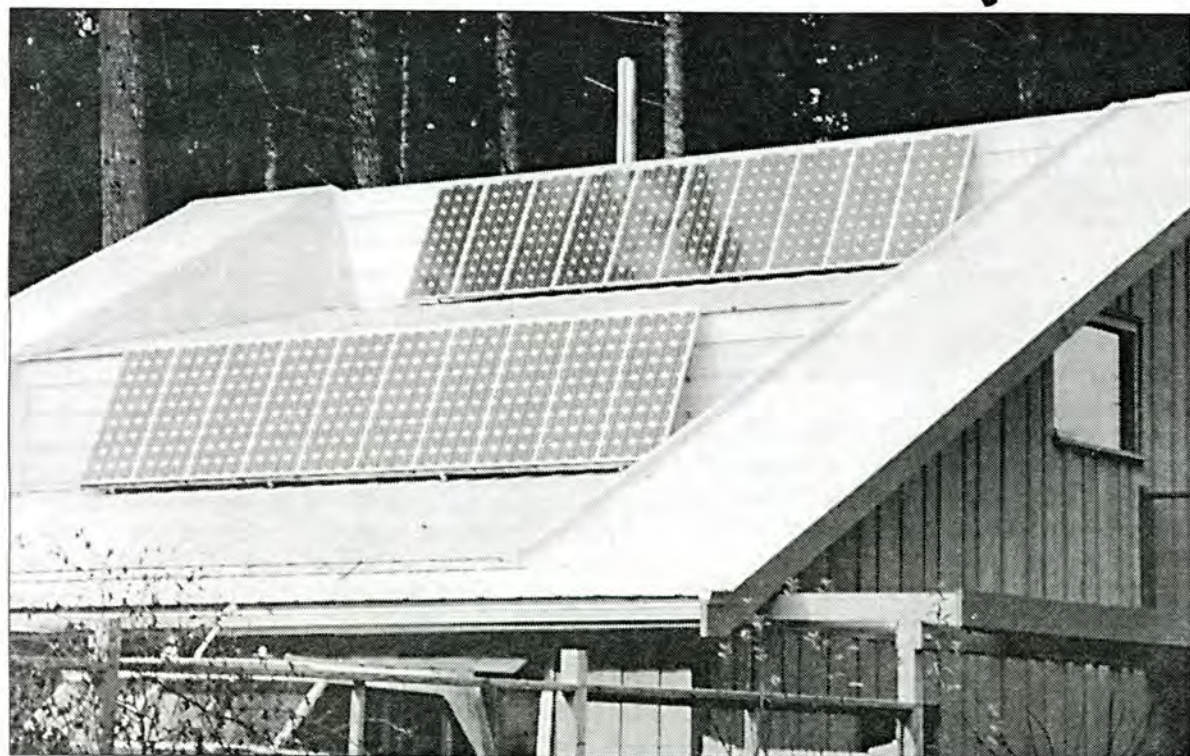

Alternative sources power Island homes

Rolling blackouts in California; soaring electricity prices following deregulation; greenhouse gases that contribute to global warming; there are many compelling reasons to look at alternative sources of energy.

Right now electrical power in British Columbia is relatively inexpensive. Most of the energy is provided through hydroelectric dams which, aside from environmental damage caused in creating them, are a clean and renewable source. However, as demand continues to increase at an estimated two per cent annually because of a growing population and increased use of power per household, B.C. Hydro is searching for new sources of energy to meet its needs beyond 2007.

Knowing that British Columbians are demanding alternative, greener sources of power generation in the future, BC Hydro has "committed to meeting up to 10 per cent of its load growth with green energy resources over the next several years."

To meet this goal, Hydro is working with several independent producers such as Miller Creek Power, a small run-of-river hydroelectric project near Pemberton. Another possibility is Lytton Power Inc. which uses woodwaste, or biomass products, to generate electricity. Other renewable sources that offer hope for the future include wind turbines, hydrogen fueling, solar panels, tidal power, and geothermal energy.

On a much smaller scale, most of these technologies are already being used right here on Salt Spring Island. Over the next several weeks, *the Barnacle* will take a closer look at alternative energy sources and how they can be applied in residential and commercial settings. A perfect spot to begin is at Ray's Place.

Part 1:

Living off the grid at Ray's Place

The first thing you notice, near St. Mary Lake, is the sky blue sign with a bright yellow sun painted on it. "Ray's Place" it announces proudly, and with good reason.

When Ray Hill built his house in 1997, he opted to stay off the electrical grid. His aim was not to save money; at an estimated \$30,000, Ray doesn't expect to recover the cost in his lifetime. Rather, his goal was to "see if I could live a comfortable life without BC Hydro." Even in building the house, he used electricity from solar panels to run his power tools. And still does.

Ray and partner, Donnie MacKenzie, now live in a clean, energy-efficient and most of all, comfortable home that takes little from the environment. Even a casual visitor could not miss the 20 solar panels stepped neatly

into a white roof above the work shop. The light roof not only increases reflected light to the panels, but is the most energy efficient roof colour.

Once inside, it's easy to forget the house does not run on conventional electricity. Solar panels gather the sun's energy by day and charge a bank of batteries. Two inverters convert DC power from the batteries into AC power needed to run tools, lights, fridge, TV, stereo, washing machine and even a freezer. During winter, when the light is low, Ray needs to run his diesel generator more often, but year round, he figures, it averages only about 45 minutes a day.

However, learning to live "off grid" is more than a matter of switching from BC Hydro to solar panels. As Ronan White of Energy Options Ltd. in Ganges points out, it involves a change in lifestyle. You learn to do your laundry on a

sunny day and you buy energy-efficient appliances.

Ray and Donnie have adapted amazingly well. Their refrigerator was a special purchase, built in California, and is super energy-efficient. They use only compact fluorescent lights, which are expensive but use very little power and seem to last forever. And the couple never leaves lights on if they aren't using them. The freezer is a sore point, something Donnie insisted on but which Ray complains "uses up half the power." It needs to be better insulated, a problem Ray will likely take care of soon.

Anything that produces heat is a big user of electricity, so Ray and Donnie have a large woodstove in the kitchen. It heats the house, doubles as a cookstove, and provides hot water by means of a water jacket. And a clothes dryer? A small woodstove in the basement and long racks for hanging laundry works perfectly. Donnie does miss having an iron and may buy a propane one, in the meantime she puts up with a few wrinkles.

Ray and Donnie's commitment to the environment does not stop there. Water conservation is also high on the list. Donnie proudly demonstrates her Maytag washing machine, a model she says is common in Europe but not promoted in North America. Donnie washes kitchen linens first, flushes out the water to a large bin, and then can reuse the soapy

water for towels, and following that, items of clothing.

Another huge water saver is the composting toilet, which works on the principle of decomposition and evaporation. Odor free, it uses oxygen, moisture, heat, and organic matter to break down waste material into a safe compost. A large unit in the basement handles waste and evaporation in separate compartments. Oxygenation is achieved easily by rotating the drum and Ray cleans out the eventual byproduct two or three times a year.

Ray and Donnie relish their independence. And yet, with all they have learned living in their "green" house, Ray still believes that if they hooked up to Hydro as a backup instead of using the diesel generator, they would soon start to slip. They would leave lights on in empty rooms, neglect to turn off a radio or television, and soon be wasting electricity again. It would be too easy.

By remaining "off grid" they are still dependent on the diesel generator but even there they are looking to greater independence. Ray is experimenting with using recycled deep fat fryer oil to make his own diesel fuel. He quickly discovered there is an adequate

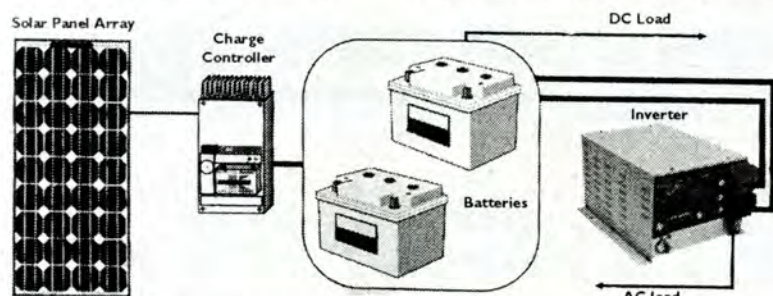
supply when he inquired at a local restaurant and they showed up at his door that very day with buckets of oil. This process, when perfected, leaves a soapy residue which Donnie thinks might be useful in making soap.

With people like Donnie and Ray proving it can be done, the future of power production in this province begins to look much brighter.

Of course, solar panels alone are not the answer for everyone. Next time we'll look at systems that integrate solar, wind, and water power to supply a reliable source of energy.



A typical solar electrical power setup starts with solar panels which convert light energy into electrical energy. The electricity is fed into a charge controller which ensures that the batteries do not overcharge. Devices which handle DC current can feed directly off the batteries, while standard household appliances, which require AC current, draw off the inverter which converts DC to AC.

Trio needs refinement

The stage—stark, decorated by a mere backdrop—was occupied by three musicians clad in swallow-tailed coats. The string trio Triskelion is composed of three of our nation's leading musicians—Martin Beaver, violin; David Harding, viola; and Brian Epperson, cello, and they performed last week as part of Art-Spring's Great Performers series.

The first half of the programme opened with a work by Hungarian Erno Dohnanyi, a romantic composer profoundly influenced by Johannes Brahms. In five parts, *Serenade in C major, Opus 10* is gentle and amicable, extroverted in spirit. The accomplished musicians interpreted the *Serenade* with humour, sensitivity and virtuosity.

Dohnanyi's *Serenade* was followed by a contemporary Canadian composition. Forty-six year old Gary Kulesha, a native Torontonian, is one of Canada's prominent musicians. Principally a composer (whose works are regularly performed in England and Europe), he is also an active pianist, conductor, and teacher. His *Celebration Overture* is one of the most performed orchestral pieces in Canada.

Introducing the four-part *Trio for violin, viola and violoncello*, Martin Beaver described the first and third movements as "ferocious." This textured work was reminiscent of the varied Canadian landscape and evocative of aspects of our national character.

Detached, introspective, Kulesha's work contrasted Dohnanyi's eager, gregarious composition. The counterpoint, the setting of the *Serenade* against the *Trio* prepared a delighted audience for the Mozart divertimento which was to be the second half of the evening.

Though not mentioned in the evening's programme, Mozart appended to the title *Divertimento in E flat* the parenthetical definer (after Bach).

As counterpoint (the adding of one part to an existing one with which it is in counterpoint) developed out of the theory of discant, Western music moved through polyphony (many-sounding) leading toward the high point of contrapuntal writing in the music of J. S. Bach. Bach's music was often criticized by his contemporaries as too involved and lacking in immediate melodic appeal. Not so for Mozart. Mozart was a master of counterpoint, fugue, and other traditional compositional devices of his day. More than this, he was perhaps the greatest melody writer the world has ever known.

The *Divertimento in E flat* is known by string players who privately revel in its charming melodies and subtle counterpoint. Triskelion's enjoyment of the piece was evident. Each musician was up to his task musically and creatively. Yet somehow the effect was unsatisfying. There is still too much individuality.

The triskelion is an ancient symbolic figure composed of three curved branches radiating from a common centre. The trio are cognizant that the soul of their association will radiate from the melding of the three into one. The three, joining at the centre, will create a new entity from which the music will flow.

A rapport exists between these three but they need more time together. They are going to be recording the string trio works of Mozart for CBC's Musica Viva label. Let us hope that the time spent in rehearsal will bring forth the melding of three into one. If so, we will be enriched by a fine recording.

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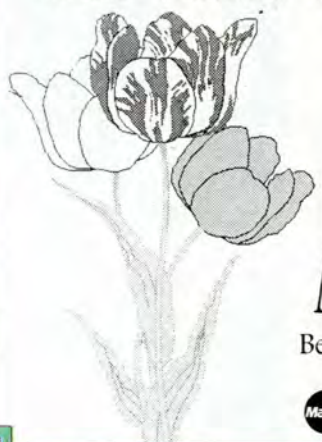

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Gattaca striking

Flick Pick ...

As the human genome project inches to completion, perhaps we should look at one of Hollywood's recent takes on the idea of genetic engineering. In the near future of *Gattaca*, babies are born with their DNA modified to eliminate defects and maximize their potential. Discrimination of those born the regular way is common and easy in that a simple blood test can determine whether you were born to be a scientist or a janitor.

Vincent (Ethan Hawke) was conceived in the back seat of the car, and has a heart defect that will probably kill him at an early age. Despite this handicap, and maybe because of his knowledge of it, he has an unstoppable desire to be a space pilot for the Gattaca corporation. As a flawed human being, Vincent cannot possibly be accepted to the programme and is forced to seek the aid of Jerome (Jude Law). Jerome has the DNA of a perfect specimen but was paralyzed through an accident; he lends Vincent his identity. It seems like a perfect plan until a murder raises suspicions. Despite the odds, Vincent presses on, hoping dearly to reach the stars and escape the prejudices of Earth.

Gattaca's striking, ethereal style makes up for a somewhat weak story line. Michael Nyman's haunting score fits in perfectly with the hopeful but melancholy tone. The future as shown to us is strangely familiar with its electric cars, endless solar panels, pin-striped suits, and cold marble halls, all indicative of a society where material needs have been met but social inequities still abound. As the film progresses, Vincent and Jerome go in opposite spiritual directions, leading to a climax with great emotional punch: Vincent's anticipation of escaping his physical limits contrasts Jerome's pain at learning that potential is always fragile. *Gattaca* may not be a great movie, but it will definitely move you.

Saturday Market:

Vendors gear up for coming season

Barb Arnett has been a vendor at the Saturday market for 10 years. She describes her craft as funky wood carvings in the folk art tradition. Last Wednesday afternoon she was covered in sawdust while in the midst of making new stock for the coming season. "I'm getting stock together, that's what I'm doing right now," she said.

Although the market doesn't begin until April, seasonal vendors for Market in the Park have only one more week to renew their permits for the Summer of 2001, according to Jennifer Demery, co-ordinator for the Saturday market. As of last week, 38 vendors with seasonal permits had registered for the 65 available spots along the sidewalk at Centennial Park. Seasonal vendors have to reapply before a deadline of February 28.

Vendors with seasonal spots pay an application fee of \$120 for a reserved spot at the Saturday Market, and must comply with certain rules, said Demery. Only two names can be on each seasonal application, and seasonal vendors must personally manage their booths all day, two Saturdays a month.

This rule is designed so that people who visit the market are guaranteed to meet the artists who made the crafts, Demery explained. "The market is growing to the point where the regulations are necessary to keep it in the spirit of the market," she said.

Last year, 268 vendors sold their crafts at the Saturday market, according to a survey conducted by Demery. Of the 268 vendors, there were 59 seasonal vendors, 57 farmers, 14 off-Islanders, seven food vendors, and 131 day vendors.

Day vendors don't apply in advance. They register the first day of the market, which this year, falls on Saturday April 7. Day vendors gain seniority every time they participate in the market. Seasonal vendors rarely give up their spots, but when a seasonal space opens up, the day vendor at the top of the list can apply for the spot.

Last year, only three seasonal spots opened up, said Demery. "We fill the spaces with the day vendors from our seniority list. We won't know until the end of February who is coming back and if there will be any spaces open," she said.

A market veteran, Arnett still works hard to incorporate new ideas into her work after 10 years. "I hope to have a new fresh stand or booth for next year. But just getting the stock together is enough. I've got lots of ideas, and little time," she said.

Allegria Duo humorous, intriguing

It was a seasonably cold night (though dry), which may explain why All Saints' was not quite packed to the gunwales for the Allegria Duo performance on Sunday night, but the fair-sized audience gave the performers a resounding recognition of their artistry.

Two flutes is an unusual combination, which is why Jennifer Moss arranges a deal of it herself. The pair of flautists (with a piccolo for variety) are both accomplished musicians (presently with Vancouver Island Symphony, besides being teachers), and they displayed their talents as duettists and soloists to the excellent

accompaniment of Stephen Shields.

As for the programme, it ranged from folk music (traditional South American and Celtic), through classics like Albinoni and Bach, to moderns like Gades' tango *Jalousie*, very nicely arranged by Christiansen and played by Moss with flair. A very recent piece was Mike Mower's *Opus de Jazz* (two selections), a Jennifer Cluff solo, which was right in the contemporary "serious" music vein, albeit written in that recognizably jazz idiom, with its melodic lines (and leaps), harmonies, and progressions.

I was intrigued by the *Celtic Dance* for two flutes, featuring four tunes, the last being a brisk Irish reel that re-

mains anonymous, the third the haunting *Green Bushes* (or as I call it, from its faster English version, *The Hunting of the Wren*), while the first two, I was delighted to hear, were composed by Jennifer Moss herself.

The last piece of the programme was a humorous battle of the flutes, where each tried to outdo the other in rendering *The Carnival of Venice*, and it brought the house down.

The concert started with a magical performance of Debussy's *Clair de Lune* and ended with an encore in the same delicate and romantic style with the *Flower Duet* from Delibes' *Lakme*. Altogether a great evening; the two Jennifers will be welcome back.

Tremblay's play truly a Pleasure

For the *Pleasure of Seeing Her Again* is playwright Michel Tremblay's powerful tribute to his mother. The one-act drama is directed by Margaret Jardine with Debbi Toole as Nana and Patrick Cassidy as the narrator. Brilliantly written in ordinary language, it is a humorous and poignant drama.

Tremblay vividly presents his mother, the story-teller who learned to dramatize the ordinary details of her small life. She loved books. A woman with extravagant emotions, she learned to cope by using her imagination. Nana, the universal mother, is exasperating, manipulative, and loving.

Director Margaret Jardine took the liberty of setting the stage with two tables and chairs where the author specified a single chair. The table and chair, symbols of sustenance and conversation, embody the substance of the play. Tremblay is saying that what is learned at the kitchen table is as important as what we learn from literature.

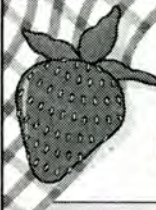
Patrick Cassidy is remarkable as the narrator. From the moment he enters and sheds the jacket of the 50-year-old narrator, he becomes the child. The mother gives advice to her son who is 10, 13, 16, 18 and 20 years old. Cassidy's body language is authentic to each age. As the young Tremblay, he is convincingly nurtured by his mother. A gentle presence, his quiet moments are pregnant with listening. He simply clasps his hands.

Debbi Toole brings her comedic talents to the role of Nana. Portraying the defiant Nana, she forcefully occupies the stage. Dressed in a simple housedress and apron, her body language is as expressive as Tremblay's dialogue. She effuses with her hands, creating imaginary images in the negative spaces.

For the *Pleasure of Seeing Her Again* engages the audience from the moment Cassidy steps forward on stage and delivers a brilliant monologue on the history of theatre. He then introduces the universal mother. "When she speaks in her own words, people who speak differently will understand her, in their own words." The play is ultimately about life and theatre. Tremblay's mother talked to him, she molded him. They both learned about truth.

I experienced a fine evening of theatre. The play took me into my own story. It moved me to laughter and tears.

For the *Pleasure of Seeing Her Again* continues at Art-spring February 22, 23, and 24 at 8 p.m. Tickets are \$14 (\$12 for seniors, students, and groups of 10 or more).

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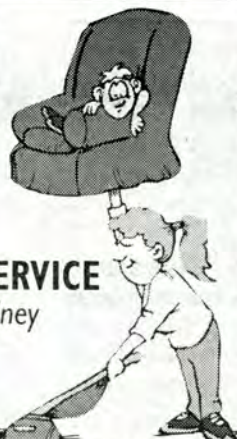

There's a song about an indestructible cat which is fairly well known in folk circles (recorded by Marais and Miranda, among others) to a sly tune in a minor key. This one however, which is certainly a relative, I got in Vancouver many years ago from a friend, who sang it to a jaunty tune in a major key, and I much prefer this one:

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Bee workshop

Next Saturday, February 24, the Salt Spring Island Organic Apple Co-op will present a three-hour hands-on course called *Optimizing Your Fruit/Vegetable Production*, which will focus on Orchard bees (also known as Mason bees or Blue Orchard bees).

Dr. Margriet Dogterom (of Vancouver) and Rex Welland (of Victoria) will teach participants how to optimize pollination by maximizing their knowledge of the Blue Orchard bee and other native bee species. Attendees will learn how to build and use the best nesting boxes (in the right location), how to maximize bee activity for an orchard or garden, how to clean and store the egg masses of mites, and provide the best environment for these native bees.

The workshop runs from 9:00 a.m. to noon at Fulford Hall. It costs \$10 per person to attend. If they have one, each participant should bring a Blue Orchard bee nest (with eggs), which can be cleaned later. The eggs can be used in the spring.

Poultry workshop

Cowboy lived his dream

The article about Sascha ("Island Passions: A Cowboy in the Making", *the Barnacle*, January 2) made me think about my great-uncle Ernest Dufault, who became known as Will James. I wonder if Sascha has heard of him? And if he hasn't, I'm sure he would enjoy my great-uncle's books and illustrations.

This courageous and single-minded man was born in Quebec in 1892. At nine years old he saw Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show in Montreal, and like Sascha, dreamed of becoming a cowboy. Leaving Montreal in 1907 (at 15 years old) with a one-way ticket to Saskatchewan, a bag of cookies from his mom, and \$10, he set out to find his dream.

The courage and persistence he had amazes me! Imagine: moving from an urban setting to a sparsely populated rural environment, and the jolt of transferring from French-speaking Quebec to English-speaking western Canada. And range life had a culture all its own as well. He learnt the ropes of the cowboy trade working at odd jobs throughout Alberta and Saskatchewan, eventually working as a skilled cowboy, wrangler, and top-notch horse-breaker for some of the largest outfits to be had at the time in both the Canadian and

American West. He even worked as a cowboy and stunt man in the Hollywood film industry for a time.

His background and courageous transformation into a cowboy may have been unique, but the truly unique thing about this man is that he was one of the few true cowboys of his day to write down and illustrate his experiences on the range. During the 1920s and 30s, he wrote and illustrated more than 20 books about authen-

tic cowboy life. These are not old, dry, boring books. He wrote these books in the actual language of the cowboys, complete with the slang and rough grammar and lingo of the Wild West.

He wrote of the life of the bunkhouse, details of work around the corrals, the skills needed for wrangling high-spirited horses, or night-herding skittish cattle, and the importance of a good horse. His books transcended the saloon brawls and six guns and shoot-out clichés of the Wild West. Instead, his stories are suffused with a respect and love for the human and animal spirit. They are full of dynamic drawings and paintings of everyday cowboy life. Some of his books are *The Drifting Cowboy* (1925), *Smoky* (1926), *Cow Country* (1927), and *Lone Cowboy* (1930), a semi-fictional autobiography. *Smoky* was so successful it went into 10 printings and was turned into a Hollywood movie in 1934, 1945, and 1966.

There are about two million words in the English language. All can be found, creatively arranged, at your library.

New and noteworthy

The new high-speed internet access connection will facilitate access for volunteers and patrons using the library computers. A library web page, now in the planning stage, will soon allow patrons access to the library catalogue from home computers and provide other useful links, such as the library's new subscription to (EBSCO). This service provides access to thousands of magazines, journals, reports, and other information data bases. The library does provide free internet lessons—just sign up.

When members cannot find a selection in our collection, they can borrow books through the inter-library loan system. The library also loans books to other libraries through this system and receives payment for doing so. Last

year we loaned 763 books to other libraries and borrowed approximately 2,700 items for our members.

On the shelf

The library has over 41,000 items in the collection. Approximately half of the library budget is used to purchase new materials. On a typical day there are up to 4,900 items on loan to some of the 5,255 members. Some new book arrivals on the shelf include: *How Computers Work*, *Millennium Edition* (for the reference department), *The Beatles Anthology*, *Biography of Doris Lessing* by Carole Klein, *The Art of Chocolate*, *The History of the Kelly Gang* by Peter Carey, *To Cut a Long Story Short* by Jeffrey Archer, and *Perfect Recall* by Ann Beattie. Material on CD-ROM will soon be available for loan and in the reference section.

Volunteers

The Library has 155 wonderful volunteers to carry out the many and diverse tasks required for efficient operation. New volunteer applicants

are welcome. Particularly needed now are volunteers for book shelving and for help in the garden. Volunteers are asked to commit to regular three-hour shifts. All volunteers receive training. Applications and job lists are available at the library

Witch hazel adds colour in winter



Life in the garden ... with Joe Clemente

At this time of the year, you may have noticed beautiful shrubs with yellow flowers blooming in some of our Island's gardens. These would have to be *Hamamelis mollis*, or Chinese

amongst our local gardeners. *H. mollis* is a shrub, or even a small tree, native to areas in western China. Not only are they beautiful, but they are exotic as well! There are other named varieties as well, and some produce an almost orange-coloured bloom. Witch hazels are a common garden plant, and can easily be found at local garden centres. They are a deciduous shrub and the flowers bloom long before the foliage appears. These plants also provide yellow fall foliage, which is very attractive. Witch hazels are completely cold-hardy for our zone, and like to grow in full sun or part shade. They prefer ample irrigation in the dry months. Throw in a bit of peat moss at planting time.

Thai pork—wonderful flavours

If you like Thai Food, you'll love this pork recipe.

Pork with coriander, garlic, and pepper

Mince coriander (cilantro) roots to measure 2 Tbsp. Mix with 2 Tbsp. salt, 2 Tbsp. minced garlic, 2 Tbsp. crushed peppercorns, 2 tsp. sugar. Add 1/4 cup olive oil to make a paste. Cut 2-1/2 lb. boneless pork loin crosswise into 1/4" slices. Pound quite thin. Rub garlic paste into medallions. Stand 1 hour. Sauté in a little oil quickly. I use pork tenderloin as an alternative, but I think the boneless loin is the best buy and it's very versatile. I would serve this with stir-fried peppers (four colours) and steamed rice. Use cilantro leaves for garnish. Wonderful flavours.

Take The Plunge on Saturday

Guides, Scouts honour movement founder

Guides and Scouts across Canada and in 150 countries worldwide will take time this week to remember their founders, Lord and Lady Baden-Powell, who started the youth organizations in the early 1900s.

Sunday, on Salt Spring Island, Guides and Scouts started the week with a Hike for Hunger. The participants collected non-perishable items for the local food bank and met at the Salt Spring Island Golf and Country Club. As a symbol of walking with the needy, they carried the food on a hike to the Pentecostal Church where the donations were collected in baskets.

The young people assembled and paraded into the church with flags. Pastor Rick Hill welcomed the youngsters and received the flags. After opening with *O Canada*, the youth and the congregation participated in a service together.

The Guide programme includes four pathways: community, world, home and outdoors. This year, in order to learn more about people in another part of the world, the Guides had a celebration with foods, costumes, games, and souvenirs from India, the home of one of the four World Guiding centres. On Monday the Sparks, Brownies, Guides, and Pathfinders—girls from five to 15—met at All Saints' by-the-Sea for an "Indian Interlude." The older girls, the Pathfinders, decorated the

hall with a 16-foot banner they had made. The girls participated in games that originated from Brownies in India.

The Scouts have scheduled a Baden-Powell banquet for Thursday evening at the Legion, their sponsor. The Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts, including boys and girls who range from five to 16 years old, will be there to talk about Baden-Powell and to receive awards they have earned throughout the year.

Service projects are not unusual for either of these groups. The youngest members learn to lend a hand at home and those who can, participate in numerous activities. These include cleaning up for "Pitch In Canada," marching in the Remembrance Day Parade, helping with the Canada Day celebrations and the Santa Light-up, serving the elderly in many ways, and helping with parking at community events.

The Guide movement accepts only girls in order to create a place where women can be strong role models for young girls. Their activities are well-regulated and span a wide range. Although there is a yearly fluctuation in membership, at this time a shortage of leaders means that no new members can be accepted. All the groups are full.

Scouting accepts both boys and girls. It has a more outdoor-centred programme with fewer restrictions than the Guides.

According to Lisa Rainsford, Service Scout leader, they celebrate the "out" in scouting. They go camping in all seasons and this weekend they experienced snow camping.

This year there are enough leaders for the children aged five to 16 to allow them to accept new members. However, the Venture programme for those from 14 to 18 has temporarily folded because it lacked leaders.

Scouting and Guiding both began with the motto "Be Prepared." Both are preparing children to take care of themselves and to have high ideals.

Electric vehicles:

Clean, green machines

Tired of high gas prices? Want to do your part to promote cleaner air? Then you're in luck. An opportunity to learn more about electric vehicles is offered this Saturday at Gulf Islands Brewery.

According to brewery owner Bob Ellison, the organizer of Saturday's meeting, the main purpose is to find out if enough people on the Island are interested. If they are, then an Electric Vehicle Club will be formed and can soon settle down to learning what the technology is all about.

Ellison points out that Salt Spring is an ideal location for an electric vehicle because range should never be a problem; the average electric car can travel 100 kilometres or more per trip. In line with his policy of making the "least impact possible" on the environment, Ellison is hoping to build an electric delivery vehicle for his brewery.

At the meeting, he hopes to see people ranging in age from high school students to retired folk. Ellison sees a day when some parking spaces in Ganges will offer plug-ins for electric cars. According to Rob Zuk, who owns an electric vehicle himself, such parking spaces already exist in California, where clean air is a major concern and electric vehicle use

is promoted by the government. These parking spaces are reserved for electric cars, much as handicapped spaces are reserved.

Islanders may remember Zuk's little box-like car. Although he's hoping to have it ready for the meeting, the electric car is currently off the road because it needs new batteries, at a cost approximately the same as regular maintenance on a gas vehicle over the years.

Some electric vehicles may be slightly underpowered on hills. Zuk needs to slow down to about 50 kilometres an hour on Lee's Hill and the hill out of Ganges. However, he says that it's a matter of voltage, and "some are built like hot rods." Such cars have a higher voltage and can consistently beat gas cars on the take-off; the trade-off is a shorter range of travel between charges.

If the Electric Car Club gets up and running, they will plan a trip to Errington (near Parksville) where electric vehicles are being built commercially at Canadian Electric Vehicles. Whether you choose to buy a new vehicle or convert an old one, electric vehicles are surprisingly affordable.

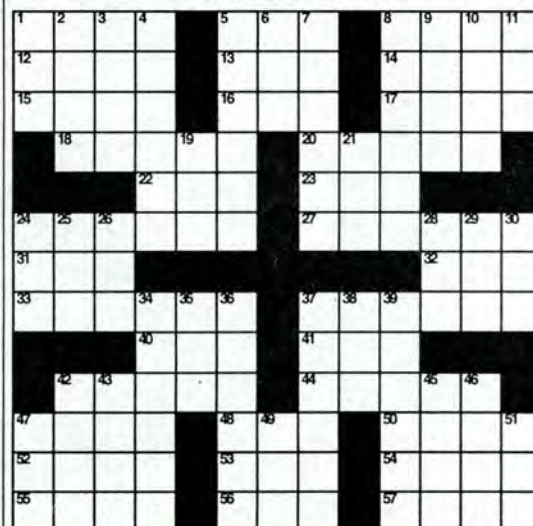

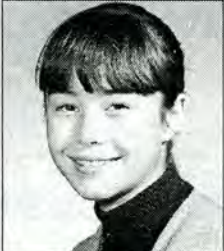

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Islander pushes back



Island Passions ...

The Scotch broom is an extreme threat to our eco-system. And who cares? Stan Wharry cares a lot. Here is a sensitive and dedicated man who has a true passion for saving our forests and protecting humanity. With the focus of a Zen master, Wharry sets about, single-handedly, to eradicate the Scotch broom from Salt Spring Island. The invasive nature of this pioneering species, according to Wharry, is an eco-disaster as serious as clearcuts.

So serious, in fact, that Wharry is making an application for an employment grant to hire 20 people to pull broom plants around the Island and replace them with native trees and plants.

The story goes that Captain Grant of Sooke had only a few seeds, brought from Scotland, which germinated in 1850. Years later, the noxious weed has made a trash heap of our fields and forests, as Wharry puts it. Apparently the broom has no known predators and reproduces at an alarming rate. It's also an allergen that can cause severe respiratory problems.

This menacing plant is an extreme threat to the elegant Douglas fir and the Garry oak eco-systems, including the blue camas, a beautiful and edible perennial that is becoming rare. The worst threat is to the rare coastal alpine manzanita, a large attractive bush with delicate purple flowers, a satiny dark bark and a pleasing scent. Ancient groves of manzanita are becoming diseased and are dying because of the invasive broom.

"Every broom plant should be pulled and replaced with stinging nettle, milkweed thistle, peppermint, and yarrow, which are environmentally friendly," Wharry explains as he thrusts his

broom eradicating tool into the roots of a giant broom plant. "One mature

broom plant puts out 18,000 seeds. That's a lot of plants. They can do more damage than chainsaws."

Wharry goes on to explain that clearcuts provide a perfect habitat for broom since it thrives in open, sunny areas with no competition from indigenous plants.

Wharry spends 20 hours a week pulling broom. "I will eradicate broom for people with joy in my heart," he says, explaining his dream for an agrarian culture where a community is in harmony with earth and nature. "To me, passion means right direction. I get immediate rewards from synchronous events. It's the bell that rings at the moment of truth. When nature strokes me for doing the right thing, I'm super-charged."

The tool Wharry uses to pull broom is on loan from the Salt Spring Conservancy (538-0318) and is one of several they have to lend. The Conservancy also provides a brochure of instructions on how and when to most effectively attack the broom.

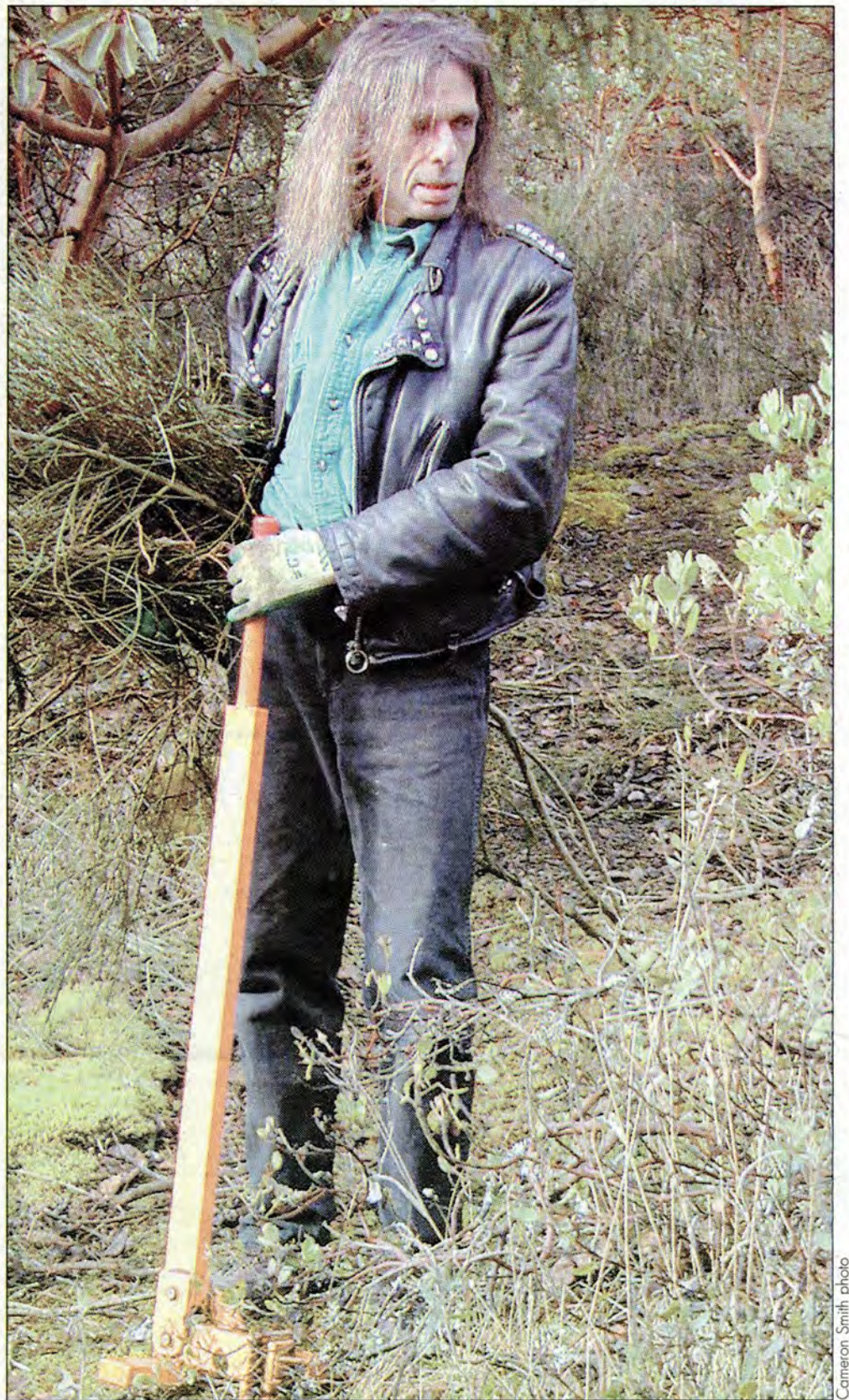
Coming from a family of nine children, Wharry was taught to be a gardener from an early age. He learned a deep respect for the land. "My six-year-old daughter is also a natural born gardener. She is raised on natural organic produce."

Undaunted, Wharry continues on his quest to remove the unacceptable blight of the broom "before it exterminates us."

"I believe that the broom should be banned and penalties imposed that are so severe that no one will clear-cut," he says, dogmatically. "That's my passion."

"I'm doing this for my daughter," he says as he yanks another broom plant from the soil.

"Die, you sucker!"

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St. Mark's Church:

Overwhelmed by Island's generosity

Historic St. Mark's Anglican Church will soon be sporting a new roof and a warmer interior, thanks to the generous response from the community to a recent appeal for additional restoration funds. According to Ken Strike, the restoration committee's financial person, over \$45,000 has now been received in donations which will allow for phase two of the restoration project to be completed, leaving only improvements to the driveway's access to be dealt with at a later date.
