GALIANO. The regular monthly business meeting of the Gulf Islands Branch #84, Canadian Legion was held on Wed. 27th, at Arbutus Point, home of Mr.& Mrs.Alec Scoones. Members came from Mayne Island & Saturna, Pender Island members remaining away, pending the formation of their own Branch. The urgent need of a Resident Doctor to take over the practice recently vacated by the retirement of Dr.Roberts, was a matter of concern & a letter from Mayne Island was read, drawing attention to the matter. It was decided to send a contribution of \$10 to the Secretary of the Gulf Islands Improvement Bureau, Mr. Larnie of Saturna, to help with the expenses of advertising. The efficacy of this Bureau as Spokesman for the Islands was recently demonstrated in connection with the Telephone Service. For years the confusion resulting from the Islands Exchange being known as "Mayne Island" has been causing trouble to the other Islands. Goods ordered from town by telephone would be sent by freight to Mayne Island because the order seemed to have come from there. People who arranged by phone to visit Galiano for the first time would book to Mayne Island because they thought they had been telephoning to there. Out of thirteen lines on the "Mayne Island" Exchange, only four serve subscribers on Mayne Island, two going to Pender Island, one to Saturna, and six to Galiano. These are being increased shortly. In response to strong representation from the Bureau the Telephone Company called for a vote by all subscribers on the Exchange. They have just released the results. 154 ballots were mailed out, and of these 133 were returned. Of these 133, 100 voted to have the name changed to "Gulf Islands". Effective July 1, the name of the telephone exchange now designated as "Mayne Island" will be changed to "Gulf Islands". The new Princess of Nanaimo made a beautiful and truly modern picture as she

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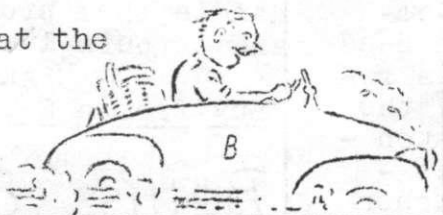

OBITUARY. Mr.Digby Hussey de Burgh of Prevost Island,died at Vancouver on June 11. He was born at Kinsale,Co.Cork in 1870.At an early age he went with his parents to Sidney, Australia,where his father died,& he returned with his mother to Ireland before the age of five. At nineteen he left Ireland for Manitoba where he farmed;from there he went to Alberta where he homesteaded. Later he moved to Montana to visit relatives intending to settle with his uncles in Eastern Washington, but owing to a letter going astray, he changed his plan and instead went in 1892 to Salt Spring Island where he lived at Beaver Point for several years. Mr.de Burgh then returned to Ireland where he farmed the family estate in Co.Limerick. In 1904 he constructed the first silos in Ireland with success. In 1915 largely through his efforts, the Irish Farmer's Union was formed. At this time he wrote several books on ensilage and grass farming. In 1924 he decided to return to British Columbia where he purchased Prevost Island. Here a program of clearing land and laying to grass was carried out. In 1938 Mr.de Burgh went into business in Vancouver which he carried on successfully until the time of his death. Mr.de Burgh will be missed by a wide circle of relatives and friends in all parts of the world. He is survived by his wife,Eileen, in Co.Down,Ireland; one daughter,Mrs.Elizabeth Skrondal of Port Washington, B.C.;three sons,Col.Ulick de Burgh of Co.Limerick,Ireland, Hubert de Burgh and Harlowen de Burgh of Prevost Island and four grandchildren.
