BEAVER POINT FLOAT WINS

The Beaver Point Pioneer float won the perpetual shield at the annual May Day celebrations last Monday at Ganges. This annual celebration, sponsored by the Fulford Hall Association and held in Ganges for the first time, entertained the huge crowd with a parade, sports events, a midway, and the crowning of a May Queen. The Parade, under the direction of Rand Young, assembled at the Ganges Wharf, wound itself through the business district, and ended at the school yard. R.C.M.P. Constable H. Bonner, dressed in his scarlet tunic, lead the parade. He was followed by eight cadets of the Duncan Canadian-Scottish Regiment, two of which were pipers. Then came: two cars of Brownies, the fire department's two trucks and crew, the Boxing Club float featuring live action between boxers, the Shell Service wrecker, the Canadian Legion #92 float with "Bill and Alfie" in the trenches, the Chamber of Commerce car, the Credit Union Car, the Farmer's Institute float featuring farm animals, Island Garage's new Falcon, Mouat Bros.

MILL RATE DROPS FOR HOSPITAL

At the Annual Meeting of The Lady Minto Hospital and Gulf Island Hospital Improvement District # 9, last Wednesday night at Mahon Hall, it was reported that the mill rate would drop to only one mill for 1960, in comparison to the 1.15 mill rate for 1959. This is only about one third of the original estimate of three mills made before the hospital was built. The Chairman's report, delivered by Mr. H.C. Gergerich also reported an operating deficit of \$1195.78, according to the B.C.H.I.S. figures. However, the non-operating revenue was enough to just about cancel the operating deficit and the hospital broke about even. The report covering the ambulance revealed that the hospital association has been investigating the possibility of turning the ambulance over to the Salt Spring Fire Protection District. 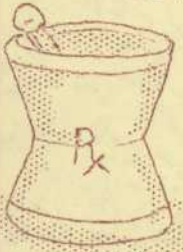

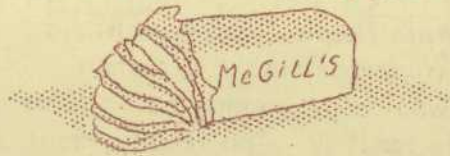

"An offer of marriage with an heiress to one of the first fortunes in the kingdom, has been made to Mr. Charles Fox, on condition of his engaging never to lose more than 100 lbs. in any one bett, or any one sitting; and, it is said, Lord H--- has agreed once more to pay off all his annuities, and other debts, on the same conditions."

"Monday at the quarter sessions at Guildhall, a remarkable indictment came on, wherein a City Officer was tried for knocking a Church Warden into a dripping-pan, during the time of divine service; but it appeared to the court and jury, that the Church warden gave such gross provocation to the constable, that he was in a great measure justified in what he did; the Court therefore fined him one shilling, on promise he would never baste the same Church warden any more."

"Last Tuesday a French dancing master had the address to carry off a young lady from her mother's house not far from Soho-square, whose fortune at her disposal is near 24000 pounds."
