WATERWORKS MEETING

Twenty-one people turned out for the North Salt Spring Waterworks District Annual Meeting held at Mahon Hall last Thursday evening. Mr. Gavin C. Mouat was in the chair. After the minutes of the last meeting were read and accepted, Mr. Mouat read the Trustee's Report. One of the highlights of the report was the report on moving the 50,000 gallon tank from Vesuvius to Central, where Central now has a storage capacity of 60,000. The report also stated, that during the year, only one break in the mainline was experienced, and that was due to road settlement. The trustees restated their firm belief that the "Transit" pipe now in use on the main lines and laid eight years ago, was a most satisfactory pipe, and they expect it to serve many more years. Salt Spring was one of the first communities in the entire Northwest to use this pipe and now many water districts in this area are following Salt Spring's lead and are using this superior pipe. The Trustee's stated that main line breaks are rare and are due almost entirely to such things as road settlement, road construction and/or abnormally heavy traffic... New extensions during the year included 1000 feet to complete the Simson Subdivision, 2000 feet of 2 inch main line and 360 feet of one inch laterals to serve the Irl Bradley, W. M. Mouat and Mrs. Rourke subdivisions, and 1500 feet of one inch pipe to serve the Snape and Ashley residences. These extensions were carried out at the expense of the owners concerned, at no cost to the water district..... The report noted that the booster pump, north of the Crofton road pumped 4,343,680 gallons during the last year, where in the first year of operation (1952-53) it only pumped 1,331,781 gallons, showing an increase of over 300%. In conclusion, the Trustees thanked

Mr. J.G. Reid, school trustee, attended a meeting last Monday in Duncan as a member of the committee for operation of the Summer School that is being set up for the benefit of mid-Vancouver Island students and students from the Gulf Islands. The committee consists of one trustee from the four school districts involved, two school inspectors and a member from the National Employment Service. The summer school, tentatively called the Cowichan Valley Summer High

School, will hold its first session from July 11 to August 12, at the Cowichan High School. All subjects from Grades 9-12 inclusive, except laboratory work in the advanced science courses, will be offered. Registration will be at the office of the Cowichan School Board, in Duncan, on or before Friday July 1st. Examinations will be during the last three days, except for University Entrance Exams. The school will finish its courses in plenty of time for the students to take their University Entrance exams.

Credit will not be given by the Summer School, but by, and at the discretion of the Principal of the student's own school. Books are to be obtained from the student's own school. Free transportation will be furnished for daily commuting for Salt Spring Is. students. The total fees for the courses are: \$25. for one subject, \$35. for two subjects and \$40. for three subjects. Primarily the school's function is to prevent drop-outs due to failing a subject or two and to allow students to upgrade themselves. Mr. Reid said, "I think it is a wonderful opportunity for a student, who has failed a subject or two, to save themselves an extra year of schooling".
