REMEMBRANCE DAY - 1960

Aided by a sudden break in the weather that brought out the sun, the Remembrance Day parade to the Ganges cenotaph last Friday was the most heavily-attended in years, and while the ranks of the older veterans are thinning, somehow it is not as noticeable on Salt Spring as elsewhere. There are not many communities where a 94-year old veteran like Dr. W. T. Lockhart would be on parade.

Making their first appearance, and looking smart in their uniforms, were the Sea Scouts of the 1st Ganges Troop, under the leadership of Scout Master Jack Green. The veterans were led by John R. Sturdy, president of the Salt Spring branch of the Canadian Legion, who laid the first wreath on the cenotaph, followed by those from local organizations: Mrs. Peter Cartwright for the Ladies Auxiliary to the Legion, Mrs. Bishop Wilson for the I.O.D.E., Patrick Wolfe-Milner for the Sea Scouts and George Eng for the Wolf Cubs. There were also sprays from four Brownies, Brenda Bonner, Mary Alice Coels, Janet Haigh, and Carol Burge and individual wreaths.

Services against the backdrop of the sea were conducted by the Ven. Archdeacon G. H. Holmes, and the lesson was read by the Rev. Nora Hughes. Regimental marching music, courtesy of Radio Station CJVI, Victoria, was played over the loudspeaker by Douglas Dane. Parade marshall was Ben Greenhough.

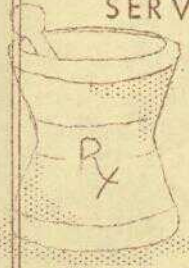

His mother had gone to Victoria for the blessed event.

Friends of Herbert Ashby were saddened to hear of his passing away on November 10th in Victoria. Mr. Ashby, who had been ill for some time, was 71 years old. He was very active in Canadian Legion affairs and was a life member of the Bralorne, B.C. branch and Secretary-Treasurer of the Ganges Branch. He was a member of the 7th battalion, one of the first outfits to go overseas in the first World War. His regimental number was #16858. He has been a resident of Salt Spring Island for the past four years, coming from Bralorne where he lived for thirty years. At Bralorne he served as magistrate and coroner.

He is survived by his loving wife, Ada, of the home, "Harbour View", in Ganges, his only son, Henry Harlan Ashby of Hope, B.C. and a cousin, Mrs. H. Hodgson of Scarborough, England where Mr. Ashby was born.

reach the figure of \$600 monthly. In any case the figures for industry and the professions are based on a 12 month and not a nine month year. The average professional man would be very happy to be assured of a steady salary of \$600 or \$700 per mensem. He would be more than delighted to be able to have two or three months vacation annually, even without pay, if he could be assured that his employment would not be in jeopardy. The suggestion that the principal should receive "supervision" pay is utterly fantastic. This is tantamount to engaging a store manager, then paying him to supervise the store staff. Surely the fundamental duty of any principal is to direct and supervise, else he is merely another teacher. In my own professional career as a civil and

to accidents, during the years I taught at that school I can assure you, Mr. Editor, that the only one which occurred resulted in only very minor damage, due to the promptness of the driver in stopping his bus when his front springs collapsed (quite natural on THOSE roads). So I would suggest, most respectfully, to you, Mr. Editor, that before you go off "half-cocked" on another uninformed criticismspree, you devote your energies and your publication to more helpful and more constructive efforts.

"Dear Sir: In your article on teachers' salaries, you state that "14 teachers are receiving a salary of \$5200 or more per year". I submit that this method of reference creates a completely false impression in the mind of the reader. In view of the fact that teachers' working periods total something like 9 months out of the calendar year, due to the frequent and extensive holidays, it would seem to be more pertinent to refer to their remuneration in terms of monthly earnings. On this basis, that \$5200 per year becomes \$577 per month. Those receiving \$6350 or more actually are drawing down \$705.50 per month. These are far from the starvation wages that most teachers would have us believe they are trying to exist on. It is claimed that industry pays higher salaries. Possibly in a few cases in any organization, it does; but it would be very unusual for the average throughout any organization to

structural engineer, I have held control over some very large staffs. To have suggested that I should have been granted special pay for supervising these staffs, undoubtedly would have raised serious doubts as to my mental stability! I personally wonder whether people holding such greedy ideas are the best we can put in charge of the mental training of our youngsters. There seems already too much of "the world owes me an easy living" philosophy and the student is very apt to ape his teacher; especially in such seductive ideas as these. One argument has been raised that teachers' salaries paid here are not in line with those paid in many other places. That may be true. It is also true that neither is the cost of living as high here as it is in many other places. Those teachers who are not satisfied and therefore by implication are not likely to give their best to their jobs, should be invited to betake themselves to the greener pastures, even if this means dispensing with the entire staff and closing the school until sanity returns to the world. As I have pointed out on a previous occasion, we could lift the educational tax burden by using correspondence instruction. A major advantage of this method would be that those who really wanted to acquire an education would get it, and those who were not interested would be weeded out automatically. No 14 year old could possibly reach a high grade without even knowing how to read! Arbitration on salaries is not the (CONT'D P.5)

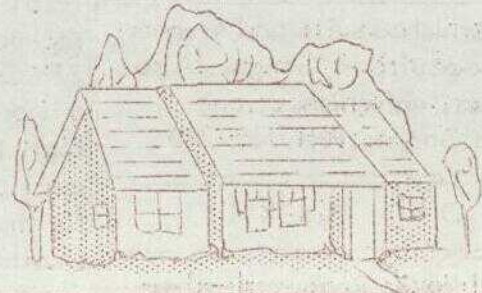

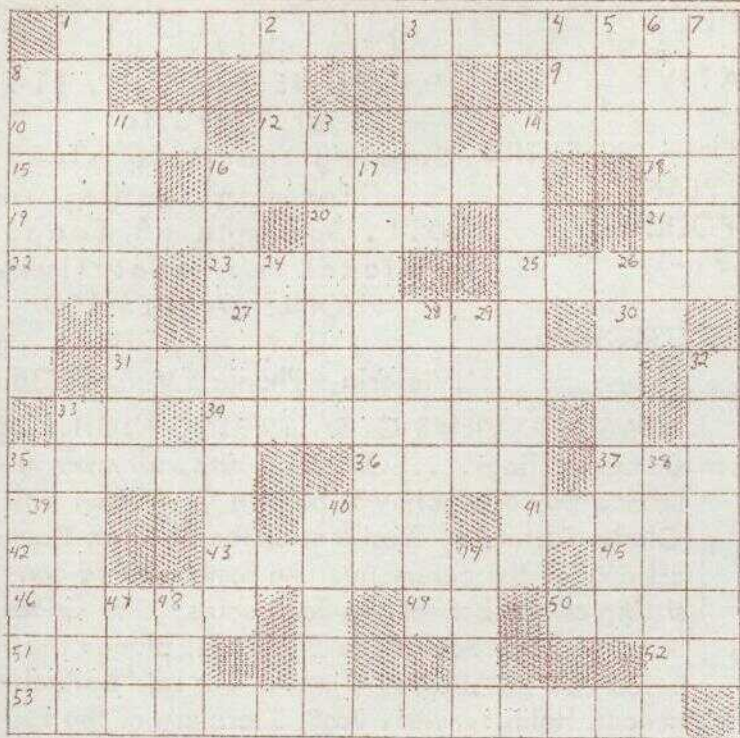


