### RECREATION MEETING

A group of citizens, concerned about the limited recreational facilities on Salt Spring Island, have called a public meeting to be held at 8:00 P.M. on Wed., January 18th, at Fulford Hall, to discuss the possibility of Salt Spring Island taking advantage of the Community Recreational Programme of the B. C. Government. Mr. G.J. Pynn of Victoria, Recreational Consultant of the program, will be the main speaker and will show films.

This program not only embraces sports and physical fitness courses for the young, but also provides a great variety of hobby crafts for the adults such as art, archery, ceramics, language classes, woodworking, needlecraft, etc. It covers all phases of sports from team sports such as soccer, rugby, and basketball to gymnastics and dancing for all age groups. The Provincial Government provides substantial financial grants and assists in an advisory capacity.

A co-ordinated program such as this is desperately needed on Salt Spring Island. Not only for the youth, but for the adults. Everyone is urged to attend and learn the far-reaching possibilities of this program.

While on the subject of sports and recreation, but especially sports, it is sad to read about the top-notch soccer teams of yesterday. To read of the once-famous Salt Spring Tennis tournaments and other sports so actively supported by the community in years gone by. It is sad to read and to compare.

A few dedicated men, such as Harry Nichols, Gavin Reynolds, Jim Wickens and others, and a couple of organizations such as the Canadian Legion, are trying and trying hard to provide something for the youth. But their hardest job is fighting the apathy of the public. (CONT'D ON P. 2)

### DINNER MEETING

The Hon. W.F. Matthews, M.P. from this riding gave the major address at a dinner meeting of the Chamber of Commerce held at Harbour House last Friday night. He spoke briefly on the proposed Ganges Boat Basin and appealed to the people to write to him their views on this subject. The major portion of his speech was devoted to relating his experiences at the Inter-Parliamentary meeting held last year at Tokyo, Japan. Representatives from many countries were there and Mr. Matthews was one of the Canadian delegates. He spoke of the rudeness of the Communist delegates and how they had no respect for parliamentary procedures. He spoke of his impressions of Japan and gave us his opinion that the Canadian people can do anything the industrious Japanese can do, if we, as a nation, are willing to work.

After the speech, Mr. C. Horel, thanked Mr. Matthews and the Chamber passed two resolutions. One was to send a "Get Well" telegram to Mr. Gavin C. Mouat who is in the Veteran's Hospital in Victoria. The other resolution was that the Chamber of Commerce went on record protesting the proposed hike in the ferry fares, unless ferry fares were raised on all ferries in B.C.

### PRESIDENT PROTESTS

A decrease in travel will follow any increase in fares in the Gulf Islands Ferry service, Gavin C. Mouat, president, Gulf Islands Ferry Co. (1951) said Monday.

He appealed to Premier Bennett to stop the proposed 25 per cent fare increase designed to place the ferry service on a better economic footing. Ferries, he said, are "extension of the highway system" and as such (CONT'D P. 3)

model "T" Ford and should be retired as a museum piece. It would seem that a community of 2500 people and a school system that spends \$250,000 per year could provide a decent modern gym. Many communities of B.C., smaller than Salt Spring, have done it. Why can't we?

The kids can't get very enthusiastic when most of the adults couldn't care less.

Salt Spring Island has two soccer teams, one of them playing here every Sunday afternoon and they draw a crowd of about one-tenth of what attends the dog obedience trials. The public would rather see dogs perform. If as much enthusiasm was generated for our kids as there is for the dogs, this would be a better place to live.

The Division 4 soccer team, coached by Harry Nichols, for boys under the age of 14, plays here next Sunday afternoon at the High School field, kick-off at 1:00 p.m. weather permitting. They are playing the top team in the league, the Oak Bay Optimists. Our boys haven't won a game all year, but you know, if a crowd of two or three hundred people showed up to cheer the boys on, they just might surprise everyone, including the Oak Bay team. Our Division 4 team is sponsored by the Legion. Our Division 3 team for older boys, sponsored by Harbour House, coached by Jim Wickens, plays here the following Sunday, while the younger boys are playing on Vancouver Island. These boys, these men and organizations need your support. And Salt Spring Island needs them.

The boxing club, the Sea Scouts, Cubs, the Junior Shooting Programme of the Roa & Gun Club, and others are fine examples of a few people trying to do something for our youth. But they, like the soccer teams, get little support from the general public and are continually fighting to keep their programs alive. They struggle for financial support and they struggle for moral support. They keep trying and these few people are to be commended.

And another thing, while we are still on the subject of sports, is our gymnasium at Mahon Hall. It's too small for a decent basketball game, too low for a good volley ball game, and even the "Bird" of a badminton game gets lost in the light fixtures at times. It has no shower facilities and no room for spectators to watch a game. It is as antiquated as the

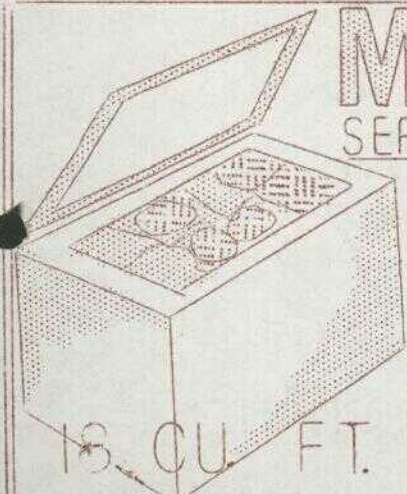

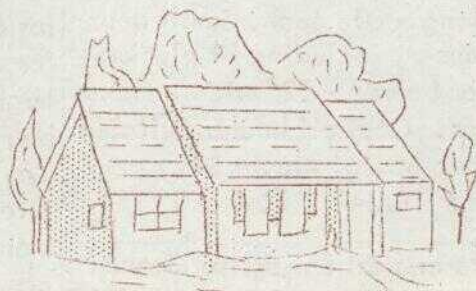

content when up came a group of Settlers, some afoot and some mounted, led by Mr. John Maxwell. There were Mr. James Lunney, Mr. Frederick Foard and

Mr. Thomas Williams of Borgoyne, together with Mr. Will Cowling and Mr. Seth Larkin, Hired Men and from Fulford, Mr. Walch and two fellow Australians. After an exchange of Civilities, they entered our cabin and Mr. Maxwell explained their presence. He spoke quietly but with an unmistakable determination. He said, "Mr. Tripp, I have told your son of my views concerning these Indian Raiders and their White leader. We are faced by a clever Conspiracy engineered by a Renegade and the Authorities make no move to aid us. While Mr. Lunney and myself have been the prime losers, these Gentlemen feel a blow against any one of us a blow against all Salt Spring and we are in common agreement that unless these Raids be stopped, much worse will befall us. Encouraged by the presence of a White and confident no hand will be raised against them in the bush of Baynes Peak, these Indians struggle in a disorderly body from the Bay you use upwards, skirting your Spring and Thence to the Peak, from whence they choose their routes into the Valley. It would be simplicity to Ambush them. We seek your permission to use your cabin as shelter, while two of us watch below for their Canoes. Are you with us?" My father replied fearlessly, "Sir, I sympathise with all my heart but it is not for us to take the Law unto our hands. I will have no part in bloodshed." Said Mr. Maxwell sternly, "I intend no bloodshed. Were this ever in my mind, I could have picked these Raiders off at will, for I am at home in this bush as any Indian. Mr. Tripp, I have endured a great provocation and I am of a firm mind not to be robbed further." Said my father, "Being the first Marksman on this Island, I admire your (CONT'D P8)

(CONT'D FROM P. 7) DIARY.....restraint and I know that your word is your Bond. If you say, Sir, there will be no bloodshed, there will be none. You and these Gentlemen are therefore welcome." And so the Settlers disposed themselves on the floor, while Mr. Maxwell and Mr. Walch set off through the bush to their vantage point. They returned at daybreak, having nothing to report. With the exception of Mr. Walch and the two Australians, all dispersed to their business, vowing to return the next night.

28 of April, 1867

I continue to be puzzled by the Character of my father, so strange a mixture of simplicity and the deep. While Mr. Clancy was talking to the Australians, my father took Mr. Walch for a little stroll and passing near me, he looked hard at the ground and said, "Mr. Walch, I am convinced with all my heart an act of Revenge does no man a whit of good. I beg of you to keep your hands clean of Blood, whatever the temptation. "Mr. Walch was silent a little and then replied, "Have no fears on this point, for we are all agreed to keep Mr. Maxwell's orders...I am astonished by your knowledge of a situation I thought known to my self alone." I was aware suddenly of the complexity of Life, even in Saltspring.

The settlers arrived again at dusk, the watch on the Bay being undertaken by Mr. Lunney and Mr. Williams. Nothing happened. (TO BE CONT'D)

The Headline read, "Alexis Creek to Victoria" and the sub-headline read "An exciting trip made by two young Englishmen via Bella Coola. They ran short of food and had to kill and eat their pack horse". The dispatch begins, "Messrs. Stanford and Pollard are the two young Englishmen who, after an adventurous experience in the mountains, arrived on the Danube on Saturday, and are now guests at the Dominion Hotel. Mr. Stanford kindly supplied the Times with the following brief notes of their trip: "On September 14th we started from Mr. Nightingale's ranch on Alexis creek to make the trip to Victoria via Bella Coola. Left the creek at 11.30 and made fifteen miles. Left camp September 15th at 10.30 and travelled ten miles. Having missed a fork of the trail got slightly out of the direct way and were most hospitably entertained by Messrs. Ross and Henderson. (TO BE CONT'D)
