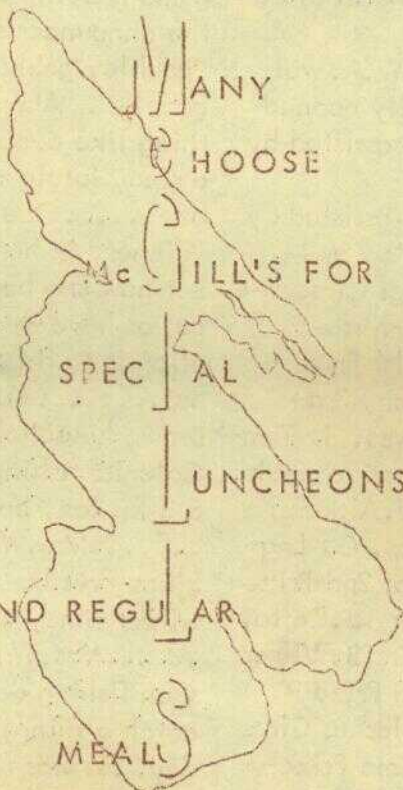



LETTER-TO-THE-EDITOR DEPT....."Dear Sir:

upon the property of the Federal Department concern-
ed. Providing oneself with a private mooring is not

dwell on the waterfront. It involves matters of access,
security in stormy weather, obstruction of waterways,
the legality of putting down permanent moorings and
a few other headaches. In any case the poor old tax-
payer has to foot the bill for the docks, so why snore?

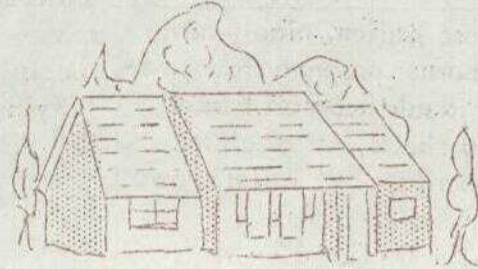

STARTED PULLETS
More and more poultrymen are avoiding the trouble of brooding chicks by buying started pullets. I can supply pullets, any age or amount. All birds are bought day-old from B.C.'s leading hatcheries and raised outdoors in large grassy fields, thus giving them added vigour during the laying period. 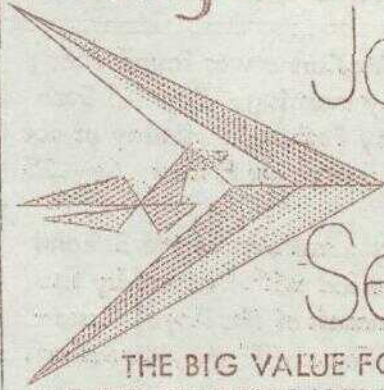


