### BOATS STOLEN

Three youthful mariners of Vancouver Island, who set off from Canoe Cove in a stolen 15 foot runabout last Sunday, ran into all sorts of trouble and kept the local R.C.M.P. boat out at sea most of the night. It seems the boys' stolen boat hit a rock at Moresby Island and had to be abandoned. After wandering around on Moresby they found the 30 foot pleasure craft, "Maroka" tied up at a wharf and made off with that to continue their journey to the mainland. The lads finally made the mainland but not in the way they planned to. The government ferry, "Tsawwassen" spotted a distress signal about 9:30 that night from the cruiser, when the propeller became fouled on the stern line, and lowered a boat and brought the three frustrated mariners aboard. ### AN OPEN LETTER TO THE HON. EARLE C. WESTWOOD

Dear Sir: In case you have forgotten, Salt Spring Island is still in the Gulf Islands and still in your constituency. It is possible, with the pressures of your office as Minister of Recreation and Conservation, that you have little time for this small part of your constituency. Somehow, we get the feeling that we are only remembered around election time. In the five months or so since election, the only thing we have heard is increased ferry fares, increased gasoline taxes and vague promises of a "Winter Works Programme" that hasn't materialized.

The promise of a winter work programme is the saddest of all, for many able-bodied men of Salt Spring Island have based their hopes, their lives, on those vague promises. Better to have told them then that they could not and should not have depended upon the Government for a source of employment. If they had been faced with the hard reality that the Government had no intention of helping the unemployment situation on Salt Spring, they could have done all sorts of desperate things to make their lives better. Some of them could have dug up their roots and transplanted to another clime.

Once, at the beginning of winter, a delegation of our unemployed met with you. According to them, you intimated that work would start momentarily on the park site at Ganges. You gave them further hope by the hint of road work and other work that was in the offing. It is now the middle of February and still there has been no winter work. The Salt Spring Is. Chamber of Commerce have met with you several times; they have written you letters concerning the unemployment problem on Salt Spring. The local post of the Canadian Legion has written you. Our Parks Committee Chairman has written you; has travelled to Victoria twice at his own expense to plead the case of unemployment on Salt Spring. And both times he came back with vague promises and always with the hint of hope.

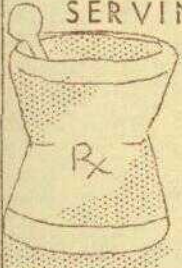
Once, all your excuses, your reasons of why things couldn't be done and your procrastinations seemed logical, but now, that winter is nearly over, these people have come to realize there was no hope. In your letter to our Parks Committee Chairman, dated Feb. 7th, you wrote that you were sorry to say that since the improvement of the park site could not be anticipated during the preparation of your estimates for the current fiscal year, funds for this purpose are not available at this time. And you go on to say that you are not in a position to offer employment until after the first of April. Why now the truth?

To heighten our feeling of being forgotten, we read in the newspapers of projects, either in process or promised to start this year. Projects in many parts of B.C., but not one for your constituency. We read of 50 unit campsites, of picnic sites, of things being done at Long Beach, at Prince George, at Revelstoke, at many places, but no where do we read of this sort of thing for the "Riviera" of B.C. or the "Hawaii" of B.C. We read last week of work in Duncan that has started. Of work that will put \$13,000 in the pockets of the unemployed.

Winter is now nearly over. Those who were led to hope for action from their government now have only the hope (CONT'D ON P.2)

If someone seems to offer you something for nothing, beware! This is the advice of the Better Business Bureau. It is especially true here on Salt Spring Island. At certain times of the year, we seem to get an influx of off-island salesmen, who high pressure the people into buying things, of poor quality, at a higher price than the local business man. One scheme that is worked by some of these off-island salesmen is to offer you, at what seems a ridiculously low price, fancy siding, roofing, insulation or something else in the home improvement field. They say they will do this, so they can use your house as a "sample" to show your neighbours. Unfortunately, the dishonest ones will sell

the same deal to your neighbours. Then, several days later, an installation crew comes over, does a fast job on all the "sample" houses, and then takes off. If the material is shoddy, and the workmanship poor, it will be difficult for you to get corrections.

There are four things to do, if you are approached by an off-island salesman. (1) Ask him for his Trade License. He must obtain one from "Buzz" Brown's office. (2) Never sign a contract until you have had time to read it. Preferably don't sign the contract while the salesman is there. Tell

him to come back the next day, after you have studied the contract fully. (3) Check with your local businessman. You may find that he can do a better job at a lower price. And you know your local man will do a good job. He has to do a good job to stay in business. If anything goes wrong, he is here to make it right. That is very important. (4) If you have doubts at all, write or phone the Better Business Bureau at Vancouver. A \$1.00 phone call might save you hundreds of dollars and a lot of grief.

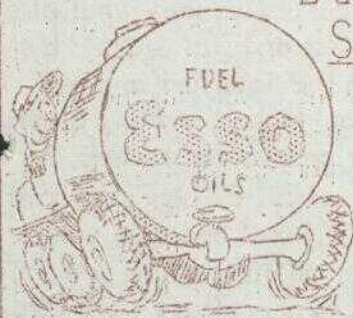

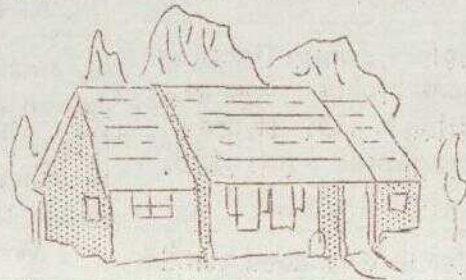

Continuing news item from the Victoria Daily Times of Oct. 29, 1894, concerning Elijah Pollard well-known Pender Island man.....

The siwashas would frequently camp and go up into the mountains to hunt goats. They killed seven on the way down, about 50 miles.

October 17th - Reached Bella Coola, where we were most kindly and hospitably entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Clayton, after Mr. Clayton had got over the idea that we were a couple of siwashas on the warpath. October 18th - Left Mr. Clayton's hospitable roof and travelled 75 miles by canoe to Bella Bella, Mrs. Clayton having very kindly provided us with food for the journey. October 19th - Reached Bella Bella, where we were kindly entertained by Mr. Grandhouse, who manages the store for Mr. Clayton. For five days we stayed with Mr. Grandhouse, waiting for the steamer Danube, and also spent several very pleasant evenings with Mr. and Mrs. Beavis (the missionary and his wife), who kindly asked us to visit them as often as we pleased. October 25th - Embarked on the Danube, and on Saturday, the 27th, reached Victoria, after a very pleasant though somewhat rough trip through the mountains of British Columbia."

Mr. Stanford claims that the survey of 1890 is altogether misleading and inaccurate. He also claims that the Palmer trail is obliterated and impassable. Speaking of the game, he states there is practically none. He also is unable to see where the eighty Norwegian settlers are going to secure 160 acres of land apiece, since there does not appear to be over a thousand acres of available land around Bella Coola.
