### SHALE PLANT TO RE-OPEN

#### IT'S BEEN RAINING

According to the records of H. Carlin, Ganges weather observer, it has been raining. (In case you didn't know). Since the first of the year, his gauges have measured 8.54 inches of rain. If this had been snow it would have been 7 ft. high. Last Saturday and Sunday the rainfall totaled 2.62 inches. The 8.54 inches for the first 17 days of this January compares to the 8.32 inches for the entire month of January, 1960. Overnight, on Jan. 28, 1960, we had 3.67 inches of rain.

#### FACTS, FABLES & FOIBLES.....

There is some scientific proof of what some of the people on the other Gulf Islands have been saying; that they have less rainfall than Salt Spring. According to the weather station on Orcas Island in the San Juan group in the U.S.A., the rainfall was 27.48 inches last year. This compares with the 37.09 inches recorded in Ganges. Their average annual rainfall is 28.12, ten inches less than ours. Saturna Island, which is as close to Orcas as it is to Ganges, probably comes somewhere between the Orcas average and Ganges'.....Dredging operations have begun at the Ganges Boat Yard and Luke Harrison, No. 1 raconteur of the Pub, is doing the job. If the story rated a headline, it would read "Luke Scoops"..... #### PUBLIC MEETING

A public meeting of great importance to Salt Spring Island has been called for Saturday, January 28th at 8:00 p.m. at Mahon Hall. This meeting is called to hear the recommendations of the Special Committee appointed at the last public meeting held in December to discuss the golf course problems. Everyone, who is interested in golfing, or a country club, or just interested in his community, is urged to attend.

#### HEINEKEY RE-ELECTED

George Heinekey was re-elected as Chairman of the School Board at the regular monthly meeting held on Jan. 12th. Mr. J.M. Campbell of Saturna Island, while in favour of the re-election of Mr. Heinekey, voiced the opinion that the chair should be rotated in the future. Mr. A.D. Jones, School Inspector, suggested the use of a Vice-chairman, not only for relieving the Chairman when the Chairman was not available, but also with the thought of the Vice-chairman becoming the next Chairman. The board decided to elect a Vice-chairman at the Febr. meeting. Four committees were appointed by Mr. Heinekey; Finance, Mr. G.H. Humphreys, Chairman, Mr. Campbell and Mr. C. Harrison; Transportation, Mr. D. Dane, Chairman, Mr. Harrison & Mr. J.G. From the facts available at press time, it has been indicated to DRIFTWOOD that the shale plant at Welbury Bay on Salt Spring Island will be re-opened shortly. According to reports, the plant has been sold to Holdfast Natural Resources, Ltd. of Pt. Alberni. This company has vast holdings of pozzolan deposits, a substance found in certain types of shale, in the Pt. Alberni area. It is reported that the new company plans to barge the pozzolan rock from Pt. Alberni to the plant on Salt Spring Island for processing. From all indications, they will not be processing the local shale deposits. Pozzolan is used as an additive to concrete to make a superior concrete. It is a disposal agent and makes the concrete more dense which helps to keep out water, preventing cracks, etc.


At this time, it is not known when the new owners will begin modifying the local plant for processing pozzolan. However, it is understood that modification will start sometime soon. It seems that several major building additions and other improvements are necessary before actual processing can begin. Processing probably will not start for several months. It has been estimated that the plant, when in operation, will give employment for 16 people with an annual pay-roll of about \$60,000.

Any announcement concerning application for employment will appear in DRIFTWOOD in ample time to give all interested parties a chance to apply.

In apropos of industry on the island, DRIFTWOOD has learned that the proposed gas line from the mainland to V.I. has rec'd a yr's extension & the project is delayed.

"Dear Sir: The Annual Meeting of the Fulford Community Hall Assn duly advertised in your paper was held at 8 P.M. Wednesday the 11th inst. However a total of only 10 persons attended, five of them being Committee members. The Annual Meeting is called for: 1. President's report. 2. Presentation of the Financial Statement. 3. Election of Officers for the coming year. 4. Other business. There being only five persons present besides the five executive Officers, a motion made by Mr. E. Faure requesting the present executive officers to stay in office until such time the President could give due notice and call another annual general meeting as soon as possible. The general feeling of the meeting was the deplorable lack of interest, and apathy on the part of those who should have a keen sense of value of the part the Fulford Hall can play in their community life. The Fulford Hall was built many years ago by a strong Community, and everything from a nail to labour was donated by people with a wonderful community spirit. Thus the Hall was built, and in the old Minute Book is a record in detail of all those who donated lumber, nails, labour, haulage, and so forth. Have we lost this community spirit? It is the largest Hall on this Island, and unlike the Mahon Hall at Ganges which 100% maintained and operated by the Dept. of Education, plus Janitor; the Fulford Hall is solely dependent on the small revenue they can make by various functions put on at the Hall. The Hall offers wonderful opportunities to clubs and organizations for badminton, basketball, social evenings, movie shows, or any community activity. I am calling the postponed Annual Meeting for Wednesday, Jan. 25th at 8 P.M. Depending on the

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attendance at this meeting will rest the fate of the Hall. Unless the Community show their interest, and attend this meeting, the only alternative left is to notify the Reg-

istrar of Companies we can no longer carry on. I make this urgent appeal to attend and save our pioneer hall of the Island. (Signed,) Alfred D. Dane "

Is it not enough that they receive free food, shelter, clothing and education but that the provider must give up his own free time to prevent the poor dears getting bored? Is that soccer team playing the game for exercise, for sport, for the sake of the old team spirit, or are they out there to show off to the folks? Your article would imply the latter.

Why is it so dreadful that the public would rather watch dogs in a warm hall than to risk its collective health by standing blue nosed and shivering in a wet and windy field watching a bunch of youths venting their spleen on an inflated pigskin? When I played cricket and soccer, my team gave all it had, even if the only spectators were the umpire or referee. We did our best to win, regardless. But then in my day, youth was Prep time for facing the workaday world, not a period of boredom with a plaintive whine of 'nothing to do'. Incidentally, there's nothing to prevent the youngsters going to those dog shows too and HELPING TO ENTERTAIN THE ADULTS. Or is that idea too revolutionary? I am all for the recreational programme for the old folks, but isn't there a moral there, that too many of them haven't learned to entertain themselves? They won't have any time for the programme though if they are to spend it all entertaining the children. Finally, Mr. Editor, the

Participation and competition are the two things most paramount in our fight for a place in the sun. 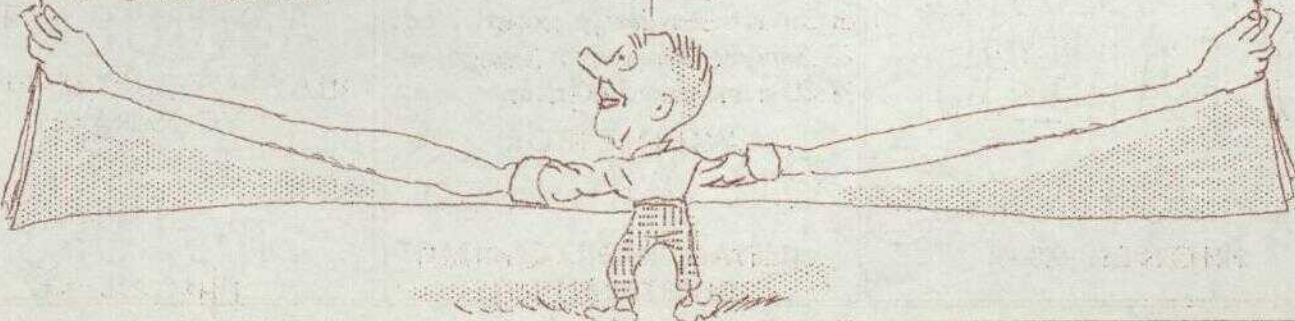
