### GOVERNMENT BUYS FERRY COMPANY

Gulf Islands Ferry Co., Ltd., formed 10 years ago to provide better service to the Gulf Islands, will be no more come Sept. 1. The B.C. Toll Highways and Bridges Authority will be in charge of our ferries after that date.

The takeover of our three ferries, the Motor Princess, the Cy Peck, and the Geo. S. Pearson, was suggested to the Cabinet meeting, held on Salt Spring Island last summer, by the joint Chambers of Commerce of the Gulf Islands. At that Cabinet meeting, Highways Minister P. A. Gaglardi said he wouldn't buy any 40 year old ferries. If the Government took over, he said it would be on an up-to-date basis with new ships.

The Hon. Earle C. Westwood was quoted as saying last week, that he didn't expect new ferries to be built immediately, but they would be built progressively. Mr. Westwood and Mr. Ron Worley, Assistant Manager of B. C. Ferries were on the Island last night to address a special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Executive on this development.

The Gulf Island Ferry Co., Ltd. was formed in 1951 by a group of Islanders headed by Gavin C. Mouat, Des. Crofton, Capt. Geo. Maude and Joe Lautman. The new company purchased the "Cy Peck" from the Matson family of Victoria, who had been running it for several years. The "Motor Princess" was not purchased from the C.P.R. until 1955. It was completely renovated and new engines were installed. A year later, the Company purchased the "Geo. S. Pearson" for the Vesuvius-Crofton run.

Traffic to and from the Islands have steadily increased through the years and with the advent of the Government Swartz Bay-Tsawwassen ferry service, traffic leaped drastically. Last Sunday was the biggest day in the history of the company.

### AMALGAMATION MOTION RESCINDED

The controversial motion to amalgamate the So. S. S. I. voting district with the rest of S. S. I. was rescinded at last Thursday's meeting of the School Board after bitter exchanges of angry words and shouts of "islander".

A letter, from a meeting of 30 electors, asked the School Board to rescind the motion for amalgamation and to allow the voters of So. S. S. I. to vote on the issue at the next annual meeting.

Mr. J.M. Campbell (Saturna) immediately placed a motion re-affirming the Board's stand on having the 5 trustees of S.S.I. elected at large. Speaking to the motion, Mr. C. Harrison (S.S.I.) said it appears the Board had the right (CONT'D ON P. 2)

The fund for purchasing the Golf Course property has now reached \$15,550, a gain of \$1250 from last week. 140 people have contributed.

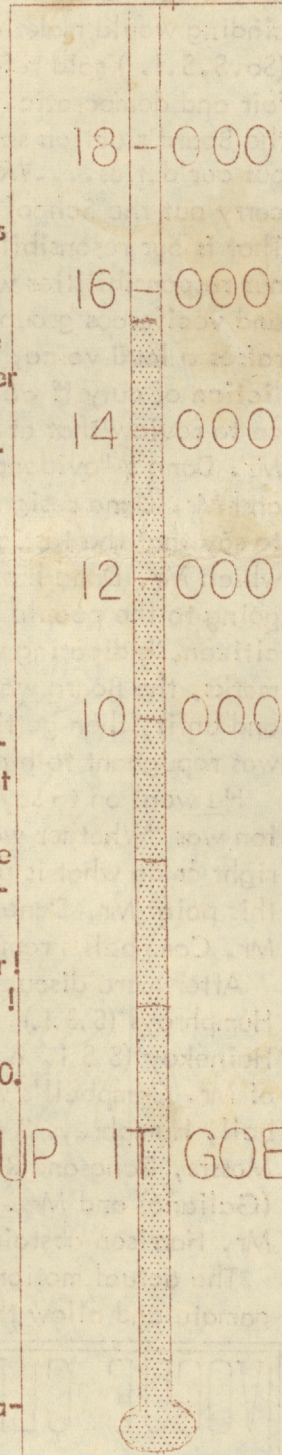

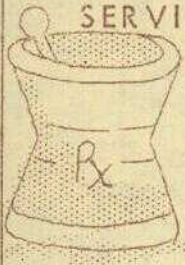

to amalgamate, but if some people in So.S.S.I. felt they should make the decision, he wondered if rescinding would make any difference. Doug Dane (So.S.S.I.) said referring it to the electors was fair and democratic. Mr. Campbell, in defence of the Board's action said, "We are expected to carry out our duties... We are here to carry out the School Act as we see it. That is our responsibility. We can dodge our responsibilities whenever a vocal and vociferous group or individual raises a loud voice, but it is a dereliction of duty if we do so." He went on to review that at the last meeting Mr. Dane's "evidence" was rejected and Mr. Dane resigned. He went on to say that the tactics of resigning, which Mr. Dane has done twice, then going to the people as an ordinary citizen, indicating with certain remarks, the Board was undemocratic and unfit, then getting re-elected was repugnant to him.

He went on to say the only question was "Whether we do what is right or do what is popular." It was at this point Mr. Dane stated that some of Mr. Campbell's remarks were slanderous.

After mere discussion in which Mr. Harrison, G.S. Humphreys (S.S.I.), J.G.Reid (S.S.I.) and Geo. Heinekey (S.S.I. & Chairman) spoke, the motion of Mr. Campbell's was defeated 4-3, Messrs. Campbell, Humphreys & Heinekey voted for the motion. Messrs. Dane and Reid and Mrs. H. Barner (Galiano) and Mrs. H. Prior (Pender) voted against. Mr. Harrison abstained.

The actual motion to rescind the motion to amalgamate and allow the voters of So. S.S.I. to make

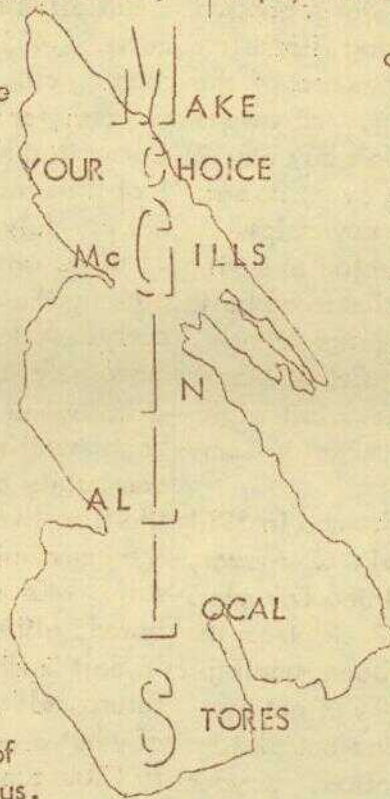
the decision at the annual meeting in November was made later in the evening by Mr. Reid. Mr. Campbell tried to amend the motion to allow the voters of So.S.S.I. to vote upon amalgamation in early September before the annual meeting. The amendment was defeated and the motion as first read was passed by a 4-2 vote with the same alignment of Trustees as on previous balloting except that Mr. Heinekey abstained.

The highly inflammable issue of teacher increments was brought out into the open when Mr. Reid proposed the motion that the increments added by the Arbitration Board last year be paid retroactive to January 1st. Mr. Reid said, "A situation has developed we all know is not amicable. We lost one good teacher and the School Board is noted for trouble-making." He stated that the intent of the Arbitration Board was for the Board to pay the added increment as of Jan. 1st. Mr.

Humphreys countered by saying the contract with the teachers states that no increments are to be paid except on Sept. 1st. Mr. Campbell stated that the Board has expressed an opinion of the words of the Arbitration ruling and teachers have challenged this opinion and they have the right to appeal to a 3rd. independent arbitrator to settle the matter and that the teachers had all the resources of the B.C. Teachers association to back them in appealing the Board's decision. Mr. Harrison asked the Chair if the teachers are taking any action. The Chair indicated the teachers have dropped any further action & that indicated they didn't have a case. Mr. Campbell stated that this year our teacher replacement programme was filled with qualified teachers earlier than any other year and this indicated to him that the Board's contract with the teachers is

very good and one of the best agreements in B.C. The voting on the motion was a 4-4 deadlock with Mr. Harrison & Mr. Heinekey joining Mr. Campbell & Mr. Humphreys in voting against the motion. Since all motions that end in a tie are decided in the negative, the motion to pay the added teacher increments retroactive to Jan. 1st. was defeated.



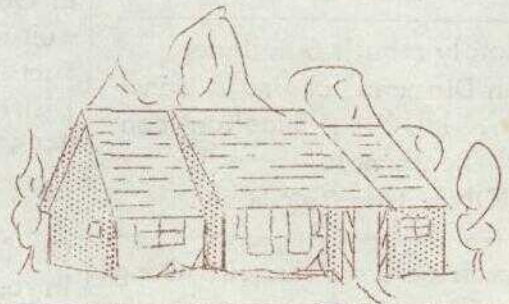

The morning was so beautiful, our Conversation at breakfast was most lighthearted, Mr. Walch giving us great pleasure after due thought, he had determined to make his way to Boston. When the time came for his departure, he said simply. "I could travel the whole world without finding better company than on Salt Spring but to you, Mr. Tripp and to you Mr. Clancy and, of course, to Mr. Maxwell, I owe very much more than I have words to express." He proceeded to hand me two handsome Pistols, which he hoped I would never have occasion to use against my fellows. I asked him what he would do about his roan, Hobart, to which he was much attached and he said he had sold him to Mr. Tanner at a bargain price of some Fifteen Pounds. (Hobart was re-named by Mr. Walch, who bought him as a colt of Capn. Langford's Stables on Vancouver Island.)

When Mr. Walch was mounted, he said, "Tony, this Holding mightily lacks a Lady. Forget the example set by Mr. Will Cowling and myself, for Time passes quickly...go to it with your wooing, lad!" After he had gone, Baynes Peak seemed somehow to have become the empty. Mr. Clancy helped me finish our new room, which considerably enlarges our Cabin. The window Glass is expensive and according to Begg's Store, pays a Duty of Fourteen percent. My father was very stubborn about the purchase, arguing wood Shutters or Old Blankets were better suited to Salt Spring, since no sane person wishes to peer at nothingness during the night and during the day, the apertures admit a healthy Atmosphere. He paid, nevertheless.

12 of May, 1867.

I remarked to Mr. Clancy the great pity of it that men like Mr. Walch and others, who have their Impact on Salt Spring and then leave, shall in all too little a Time be entirely forgot. For a space, he was silent and then he laid aside his hammer and took off his Top-hat to mop his brow, as was his custom when cogitating some Problem. "Well," said he, "I suppose that is the way life is and I know of no way to rectify it. It may be that Salt Spring could do with a Poet and I am reminded of the neat way in which your Alexander Pope summed-up the situation, for he wrote,

"Vain was the chief's and sage's pride;  
They had no Poet, and they died.  
In vain they schemed, in vain they bled:  
They had no Poet, and are dead."

I was vastly tickled over the idea of a Poet for Salt Spring, though it is as unlikely as we shall ever get a Constable. With the present lack of Money, Poet or Constable would have a lean time.

16 of May 1867.

We have been visited by Mr. Maxwell, who was in a state of some Dudgeon. He told us some discontent having been expressed by certain Petty-fogging Settlers over the events of the 30 of April, Mr. Foord, who has aspiration to become a Magistrate and has a taste for Legal niceties, called a Meeting in his new Barn. Mr. Maxwell did not

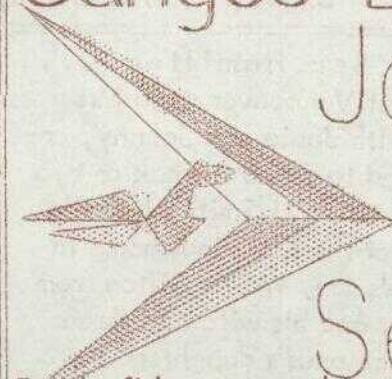

doubt the good Intent of Mr. Foord but the Settlers grumbling were those very men who had shown no willingness to secure the safety of Borgoyne Settlement by aiding in Patrols or any other means. Nevertheless, they had taken Unbrage over the action initiated by Mr. Maxwell, alleging he had usurped the functions of the Magistrate at Chemainus.

When the meeting took place, it was suggested that all matters of Public Interest were best dealt with by a properly appointed Committee of Settlers, the Members of which, acting under the direction of an elected Chairman and other Officers, should decide by discussion and vote the course to be taken regarding Indian Raiders and divers matters affecting the Community. Mr. Foord, to his pleasure, was elected Chairman.
