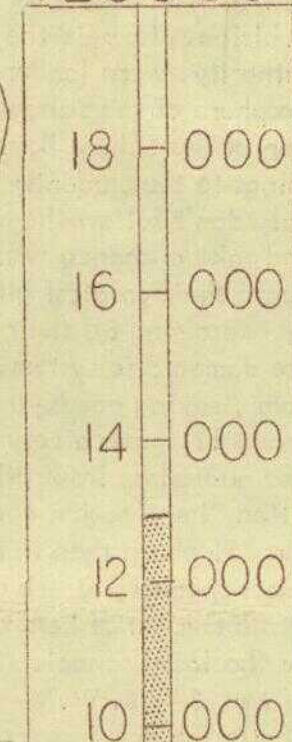

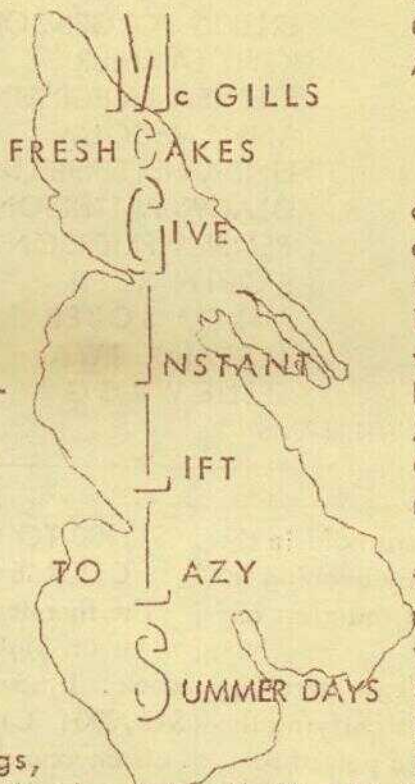

(GRADUATION CONT'D)....for their maturity and ambition. He said they had accepted responsibility and authority, were leaders and set the intellectual atmosphere of the school. Mr. George Heinkey, Chairman of the School Board pointed out two important things to the students; One, that they be an individual, don't follow the common herd and take a chance. And secondly to guard their greatest gift, freedom, by exercising all their rights under the democratic system. Bruce Murakami, saying goodbye on behalf of grade 11, gave a very fine speech and quoted an inspirational poem entitled "Imagination and Enthusiasm". Mrs. Hepburn then introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Ivan Mout who was a student of hers while he attended the local school. Mr. Mout, son of Mr. & Mrs. W.M. Mout, has recently taken a leave of absence from his teaching post in Sooke, to spend two years in the far North teaching the Eskimo children. Mr. Mout spoke about maturity and the adult world the graduates were now entering. He conducted a humorous test asking the students, among other things, to score three points if they now considered teachers, parents and other ancients capable of making some intelligent contributions. He stressed that they have faith in God, Mankind, country and community. He digressed from his prepared speech to pay tribute to Mrs. Hepburn. He was happy to see that she was still providing the energy and drive, coupled with justice and wisdom, to give better schooling to the students. He then went on to compare the present times with the times of his graduation in 1937. He spoke of the challenge of the War that faced his class and the challenge of keeping humanity alive facing the class of 1961. He concluded by quoting the 1939 Christmas message of King George VI. At the conclusion of



the main speech Miss Oulton presented the highly coveted "Citizenship Award" to Charles Butt. The Valedictorian of the Class of 1961, Duncan Hepburn gave a highly commendable and thought-provoking Valedictory. He spoke of the problems facing the world, how the youth of these times are cognizant of these problems, and how these problems, inherited from the elders, will have to be solved on entirely new concepts based on the uniqueness of the new "Space" age we are now entering. He ended by paying tribute to the teachers, the local organizations and the community and saying Goodbye on behalf of the class of 1961.

JAMES BROOKE FARQUHAR
James Brooke Farquhar passed away at Ganges on June 30th, 1961 at the age of 93. Mr. Farquhar, a resident of Ganges for the past 10 months, was born in Aboyno, Aberdeenshire, Scotland. He was the son of Admiral Sir Arthur Farquhar, K.C.B. and Lady Farquhar. Admiral Farquhar was Commander-in-Chief of the Royal Naval Base in Esquimalt in 1863.

James Farquhar came to B.C. at the turn of the Century and spent most of his remaining life in Vancouver. He is survived by his daughters, Mrs. Douglas (Pamela) Wilson of Ganges and Mrs. Peter (Theodora) Knight of Oxford, England. Private grave-side services were held at St. Mark's Cemetery on July 3rd. Archdeacon G.H. Holmes officiated and the arrangements were by Hayward's Funeral Home.

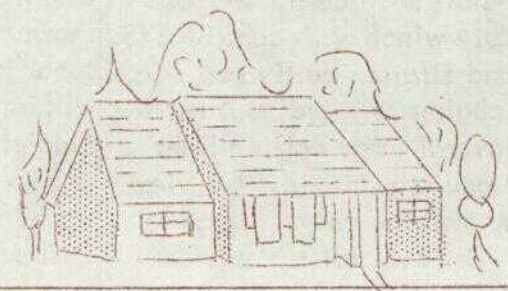

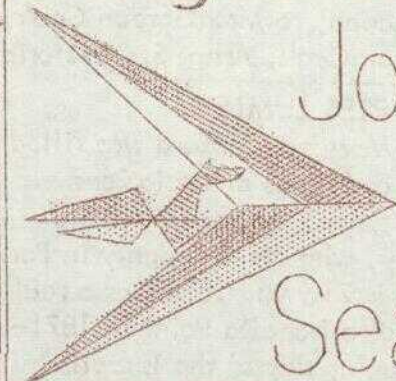

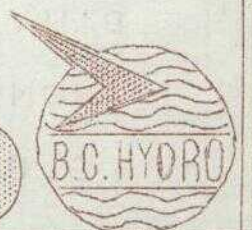
