LET'S BUY THE GOLF COURSE!

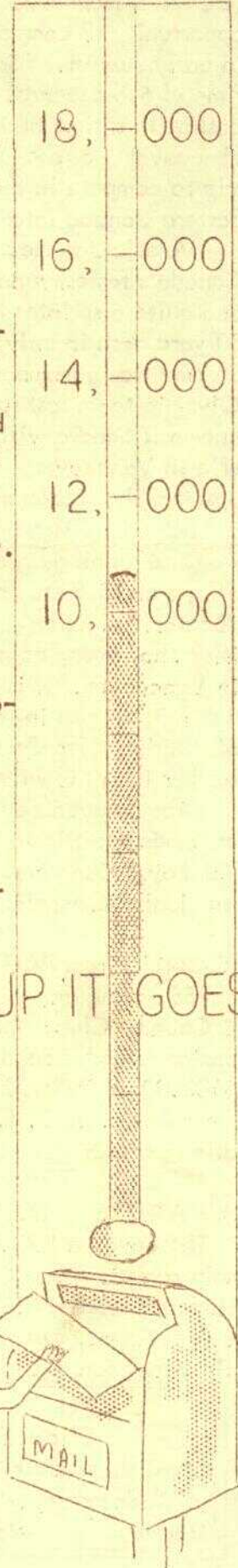
\$20,000

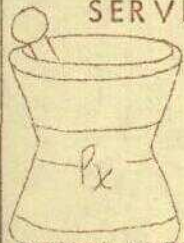
Most people do not realize that they can buy the golf course by putting in a sum of money that would be less than an initiation fee in nearly any other golf course in Canada.

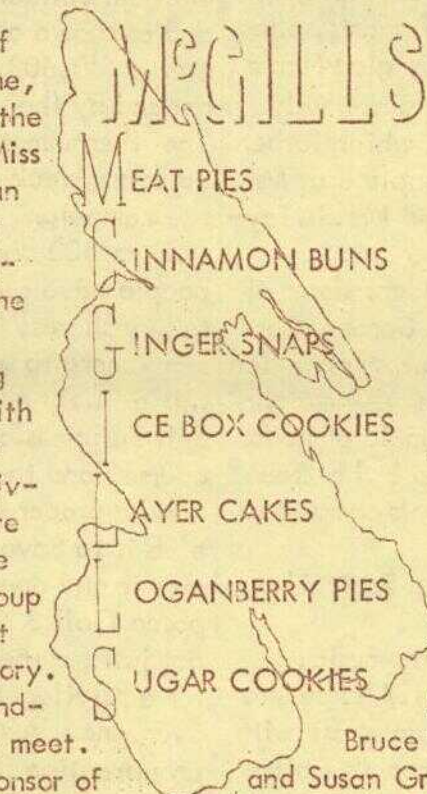

WATERS The so-called sport fisherman is more to be con-

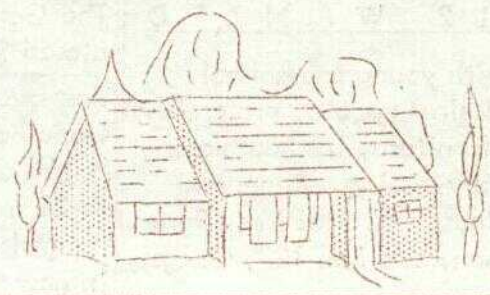

Continuing the Journal of Anthony Tripp, said to have been found with sundry letters in rubbish removed from a derelict farm on Maxwell, Saltspring Island, 1959
 10 of May, 1867

You made me aware my life had been governed for Years by the desire for revenge on a man who did me a wrong, yet when that you foresaw occurred, I forgot not only your words but broke my faith with Mr. Maxwell. In a manner, I betrayed my friends and sinned against God. It weighs heavy on me." My father answered, "Nay, you were subjected to a great Provocation and neither Mr. Maxwell nor myself would blame you for what happened in the heat of the moment. Betwixt God and your self is a Private matter, on which no man may pass Judgement. Nevertheless, I beg you to reflect ... would so great a Creator find you Guilty because of this one lapse from the Goals you feel He set for you? Having admitted your fault to Him and to man, must remorse stay with you? I cannot believe so." Mr. Clancy nodded in agreement and said, "Look, what is done cannot be now amended. Men shall deal unadvisedly some - times, which after hours give leisure to Repent." I opine his comment came from Shakespeare but the sincerity with which it was spoken clinched the reasoning of my father and Mr. Walch was greatly comforted.

Mr. Walch said he would not go back to Van Diemens Land but had in mind to buy a farm on the Hawkesbury River, near Sydney, New South Wales. Mr. Clancy suggested that before returning to Australia, he should take the opportunity of seeing more of America and in particular, the cities of the Eastern seaboard, especially Boston and New York. Mr. Walch reflected a little and then, somewhat to my surprise, told us briefly of the young Boston Lady, his story confirming what had already been told us by Capn. Tamblin. He said that although attracted strongly to her, he had been unable to put the Past out of mind and when after a stupid quarrel he had come to Saltspring, he found the Past had caught up with him. It seemed to him Providence was guiding his footsteps and he longed each day to come face to face with the English man who had eluded him in San Fran-

isco. Observed Mr. Clancy drily, "And having at last come done so, Providence proceeds to resolve the situation in ways utterly unforeseen by any of us. Being incurably romantic myself, I can see nothing for it, Mr. Walch, but you go pot-haste and cap-in-hand to Boston, where I trust you will find the young Lady unattached.!"

I fell asleep greatly Intrigued by the whole strange story.

11 of May, 1867

The morning was so beautiful, our Conversation at breakfast was most lighthearted, Mr. Walch giving us great pleasure after due thought, he had determined to make his way to Boston. When the time came for his departure, he said simply, "I could travel the whole World without finding better company than on Saltspring but to you, Mr. Tripp and to you Mr. Clancy and, of course, to Mr. Maxwell, I owe very much more. 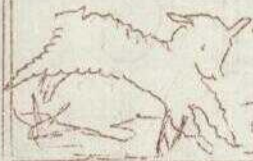

According to the official report of the debate on the estimates of the Public Works Dept., the Hon. W.F. The Department of Public Works has made a survey in connection with a boat basin at Ganges, and I have been advised that the proposal has been placed on the department's advance planning program. Each year hundreds of boats cruise the waters of Salt Spring Island; many of them go to Ganges Harbour but because of the great popularity of Ganges there is not enough mooring space for them. Ganges Harbour lies in the centre of the best cruising waters in the world. Ganges has all the facilities needed to make it the best boating centre on the west coast. They have boat repair yards, a fine hospital, good doctors, stores and shops as required by the boating public.

I ask that the minister give this important matter very serious consideration I believe that now is the time to get on with it as the people of Ganges have waited long enough for something that should have been done long ago."
