LEGION 30th ANNIVERSARY DINNER

The local post of the Canadian Legion celebrated their 30th anniversary Saturday, March 18, with a dinner held at the Mahon Hall. 150 guests attended with Lt.-Governor, Gen. George S. Pearkes, V.C. and Mrs. Pearkes as guests of honour. A cocktail party held at Harbour House for the guests and executive of the Legion and Ladies Auxiliary, preceded the dinner.

The colourful ceremonies started with the parading of the colours, led by piper Major Frank Knight of the Canadian-Scottish Regiment of Victoria, followed by a short period of silence for fallen comrades.

Mr. John Sturdy, president of the Legion, spoke of the wonderful service record of Salt Spring Island and he doubted if the record was equaled by any other community in Canada. During the first war 151 men out of only 260 families saw service to their country. The Legion was first founded in 1931 and seven charter members were present to join in the festivities. They were F.L. Crofton, H. Loosmore, H. Noon, H. Robinson, F. Speed, V. Case-Morris, and E. Springford. Four past presidents were introduced: Immediate Past Pres. Ben Greenhough, Geo. M. Heinekey, Des. Crofton and A. R. Laird.

Before the major address of the evening by Gen. Pearkes, "Old Bill & Alf", famous cartoon characters of the first war came to life. "Old Bill" was portrayed by B. Eagles and "Alf" was H. Nichols.

Gen. Pearkes cut the birthday cake with a bayonet of World War I vintage.

COUGAR HUNT ON S.S.

Bob Akerman and his son, Ted discovered cougar tracks in the Mt. Bruce area a week ago last Wednesday. This was verified by Jimmy Dewar, the government cougar hunter. Mr. Dewar brought over his dogs and the hunt has been continuing the past week and will continue until the cougar is caught or known not to be on the island. Two sets of tracks were discovered, one in snow near the lake on Mt. Bruce and one in the mud on the floor of an abandoned cabin. Apparently, lambs had gone into the derelict building for shelter and the cougar went in after them. Two killed lambs were found inside the building and one dead lamb was on the porch.

The dogs of Jimmy Dewar have picked up the scent on occasion, but with the tracks being several days old, they are having difficulty in bringing the animal to bay. The hunters have discovered at least ten dead sheep and deer that can be attributed to the cougar.

Mr. Dewar, who is staying at the Akerman's home, asks that anyone who sees a cougar or finds a fresh kill, to please phone 16-M immediately.

Mr. Dewar, Canada's champion mountain lion killer, has plodded through the tangled undergrowth of Vancouver Island at the heels of his dogs, following cougar tracks, for nearly 20 years. His total bag in those years has been so great that he will not even try to estimate it.

This is the first authentic cougar report in over ten years. Ten years ago three came to the island at one time. Two were shot and one was run over by a truck at St. Mary's Lake.

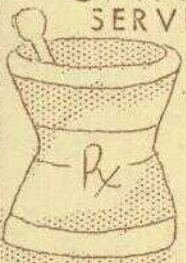
FACTS, FABLES, & FOIBLES & FIRST BIRTHDAY

The ladies of the Auxiliary discovered that Mrs. Pearkes was celebrating her birthday on that night and presented her with a cake.

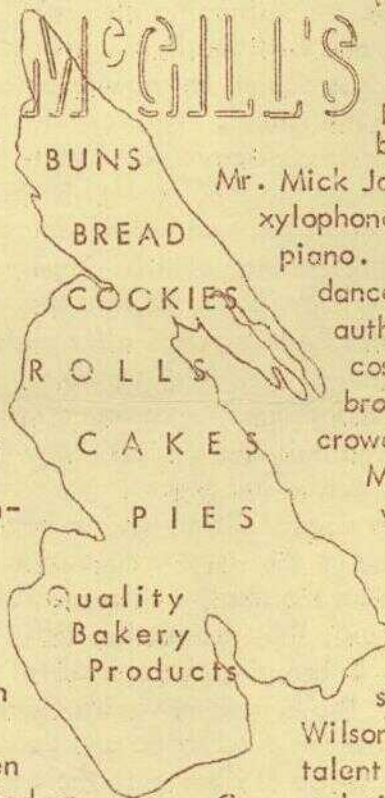

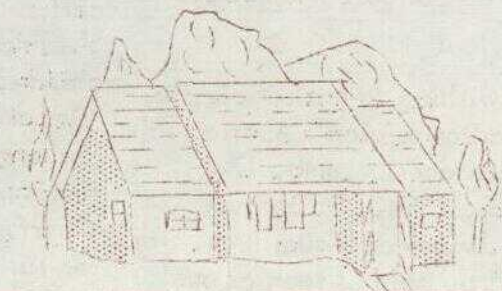
HER LAST VOYAGE... by Bea Hamilton... Mrs. William (Mary) Lumley was nearly 97 years old when she passed away on Tuesday morning, March 21st, 1961, at her youngest daughter's home on Cook St., Victoria, B.C. Mrs. Mary Hall had looked after her mother for many years, and now one of our oldest pioneers has taken her last long voyage home. She was such an old, old lady-but she will be missed. Everyone knew her-and she had the respect of all. Mrs. Lumley Sr. was born in the San Juan Islands in 1864, and came to Isabella Point, on Salt Spring in 1871, where she lived for many years. Her late husband was a member of the Provincial Police over 50 years ago. They had 14 children. Two sons, Robert Henry and John Richard, were killed during the first world war. William, the eldest son, is in Victoria, and Dan, at Richmond, Lulu Island, and Eddy at Ganges. Three daughters, Alice Sparrow, the eldest, Sarah and Mary in Victoria also. There are 25 grandchildren, 34 great-grandchildren and 7 great-great-grandchildren. Her children must have been some of the first to attend the Isabella Point School, which was built in 1904. Her funeral will be on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in Victoria. Her pallbearers will be her grandsons and great-grandsons. Sand's Funeral Parlor is in charge.

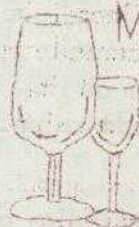

A successful meeting of the P.T.A. was held on Monday, Mar. 20th with 45 people present. The constitution and by-laws of the S.S.I. P.T.A. were read and approved and will now be sent to the provincial federation for approval. One point of general interest is that any adult in the community is welcome to become a member of the P.T.A. and further that any non-member is welcome to attend P.T.A. meetings - although not permitted to vote. Our secretary will represent S.S.I. at the Provincial Conference and the resolutions to be presented were read and discussed. Ideas on uniforms, protests against improper advertising practices, and the teaching of driving proved to be controversial.

M.J. Wickens gave an outline of the improved physical education program to be introduced in September. Greater stress will be placed on physical participation than in the past; this being the outcome of the nation-wide realization that Canadian youth lacks the physical skills and stamina of European children.
