PROTEST MEETING

A meeting of about 35 rate-payers of South S.S.I., held last Thursday at Non's Coffee Bar, passed a motion to write a letter to the Minister of Education asking on what authority did the School Board act when they passed a motion to amalgamate the So. S.S.I. Voting District with the rest of S.S.I. The letter was also to indicate the meeting's disapproval of this action by the School Board. Mr. Bob Patterson chaired the meeting and Mrs. J. French was Secretary. Mr. Doug Dane, School Board member from So. S.S.I. was in attendance to give whatever information the meeting desired.

In answering some of the questions from the floor, Mr. Dane read the pertinent sections of the School Act and a portion of the minutes of the last School Board Meeting. Mr. Dane re-iterated his disappointment at the Board for passing this controversial motion while he was not in attendance. He also stated, "that while the Board may be technically right in taking such an action, they were morally wrong."

Much of the discussion was based on the fear that Ganges voters would overwhelm the voters in the So. S.S.I. District because of their greater numerical strength.

While no one voted against the motion to send the letter to the Minister, there were several abstentions. One of the abstainers pointed out to the meeting that under the new voting system that So. S.S.I. would be voting for all five of S.S.I.'s Trustees instead of just one every two years.

THE COUGAR IS DEAD!

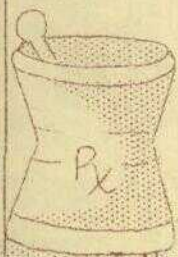
The cougar that has plagued S.S.I. for the past 60 days was finally shot on Prevost Island last Sunday. Mr. H. DeBurgh, owner of Prevost, found a fresh killed lamb near the house, and notified the Government hunter, Mr. "Skate" Hames. Mr. Hames, who was all packed to leave the Island, and his dogs rushed to Prevost by water taxi. The kill was still warm upon their arrival and the dogs immediately took up the scent. The cougar had evidently been walking around the island and criss-crossed his own trail many times as this caused some confusion to the dogs. The younger dog came back, but the older one went on. He evidently found the cougar asleep and immediately "treed" it. His "treeing" bay was heard, the younger dog was off in a flash, and the hunters soon came upon their quarry. The cougar was killed about a quarter of a mile away from his last victim. He measured 7 ft. from tip to tip and weighed about 130 lbs. He was very fat, evidently from all that fine lamb and venison he had been living on during his stay on S.S.I.

It was surmised by the hunter that the cougar probably swam to Prevost from either Nose Point at the extreme end of Long Harbour or from Cusheon Cove to the Channel Islands and then onto Prevost. It is probable that the cougar left S.S.I. at Cusheon Cove, because a lamb was killed on the Pete Stevens' property at Beaver Point three days before the cougar was shot.

The first sign of the cougar being on Salt Spring was on March 14th when his tracks were discovered in snow on Mt. Bruce. Mr. Jimmy Dewar, Government Hunter, was on the scene the next day and one or two hunters with dogs have been working ever since. (CONT'D P.2)

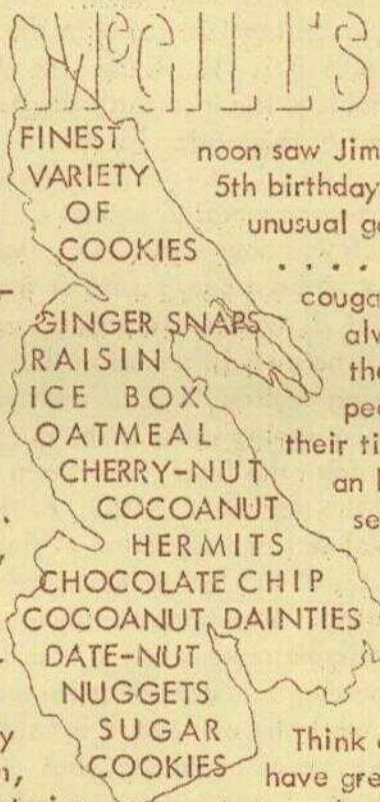

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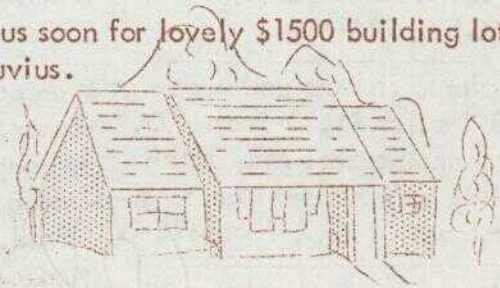
SALT SPRING LANDS

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DID YOU KNOW?

That the predecessor of the North Salt Spring Island Water Works was a small system which linked springs on Ganges Hill with the old creamery. Then in 1914 a concerted effort was made and a four inch wooden pipe line was laid back to Maxwell Lake. The entire pipe line was dug in by hand and half the crew left the operations to join the army when war broke out, but the line was completed. Today, the system has approximately ten miles of 4 and 6 inch concrete main line pipe.

The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce is planning to install approximately 240 feet of flower boxes along the edge of the beach-side of the causeway between the Barber Shop and the I.O.D.E. bench as soon as the causeway widening project is completed by the Highways Dept. Mr. Dixon of the Dept. of Transport has agreed to pay for the lighting facilities at Ganges Wharf. Mr. George Heinekey has been invited to the next meeting, to discuss the new school taxation as it effects Gulf Island landowners.

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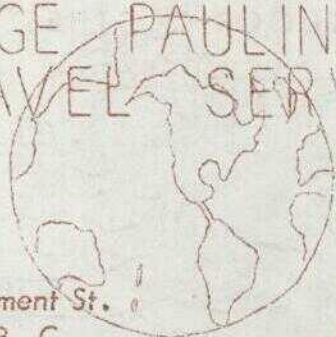
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LETTER-TO-THE-EDITOR....."Dear Sir: I would like to clarify the position of the Salt Spring Island Volunteer Fire Department and reasons for fund raising such as the Firmen's Ball.

The Saltspring Island Fire Protection District was set up to furnish, through taxation fire protection and fire fighting equipment for the saving of lives and prevention of fire. In order to do this and yet keep the operating costs to a minimum it was necessary to organize a Volunteer Fire Department.

Last year over 1,450 man hours were put in in training and over 170 hours attending fires, all done without any compensation to the Firemen for his time or expenses.

With the exception of a \$75.00 per month W.C.B. insurance paid for by the Fire Protection District, there is, as yet, no other protection set up in the event a Fireman gets hurt during the course of a fire or training session, nor is there any provisions made (nor do the Firemen expect them to be made) to supply from public funds such things as easy chairs, a radio or even a T.V. set in the proposed room where the Firemen can go to have a cup of coffee (we even hope to buy our own coffee pot) and warm up after a fire or practice. Towards this end is the reason for staging fund raising drives such as the Firemen's Ball.

I would like to point out that through the very good co-operation of the B.C. Telephone staff there is a Fireman on standby 24 hrs. a day.

Federal, Provincial and Municipal levels under conditions of Nuclear War the action of the exercise was such that, had it been the real thing, residents of Salt Spring Island would have found themselves in peril. A nuclear weapon detonated over Brothie Ledge off Victoria and, for the purposes of the exercise, the "fallout" pattern was in such direction that the whole of this island lay in the predicted zone of heavy 'fallout'. In view of the fact that, as far as is known, few, if any, houses on the island have shelters the Civil Defence Officer, Grp. Capt. Layard, had no option but to report that he anticipated 80% of the population would become radiation casualties. The Civil Defence Officer emphasises that the exercise was

in this respect quite realistic. A near miss resulting in a water burst - which is particularly bad as regards 'fallout' - is not at all improbable if Victoria should be attacked. Further, although the prevailing 'fallout' pattern would lie rather more to the eastward, there are occasions when it would envelope this island and for so long as the people are (CONT'D P.8)

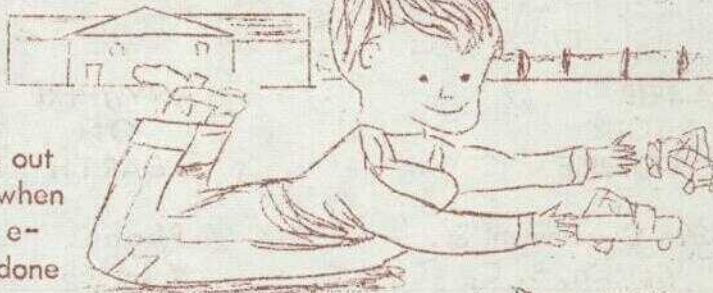

(CONT'D FROM P.7) CIVIL DEFENCE: without proper protection a high casualty rate must result. Salt Spring Island is not likely to experience the "blast" effects of a nuclear weapon but it is not immune for 'fallout'. Protection against this can be achieved comparatively easily and fairly cheaply and the following C.D. booklets dealing with the matter will be available shortly free of charge.

- (1) Basement 'fallout' shelter. (available now)
 - (2) 'Fallout' shelter where no basement.
 - (3) Eleven Steps to Survival.
 - (4) Civil Defence Disaster Instructions for those living outside Vancouver and Victoria. (available now).
