S.S.I.-MAINLAND FERRY LINK?

According to an official of the B.C. Toll Ferry Authority, the Toll Authority has taken a 90-day option on a piece of property on Long Harbour for the possible building of ferry docking facilities. It is understood the Government Ferry Company is seriously considering the Long Harbour property for the Gulf Islands' terminal of a direct, no-stop, S.S.I. to Tsawwassen ferry run, using the new boat that was promised for the Gulf Islands.

Our theory about how the Toll Authority would use Beaver Point was not too far off base. We only had the wrong piece of real estate.

If the proposed Long Harbour terminus comes into being, we predict and not with our tongue in cheek as some thought, the Other Islands will be shuttled into Long Harbour, where they may catch the direct boat to the Mainland or drive to Isabella Point (Yap, Isabella Point) to catch the ferry to Swartz Bay. Undoubtedly, bus service will be provided for foot passengers.

Now, we don't say there won't be direct service from the Other Island to Swartz Bay. To keep the round trip for the tourists, it is possible one boat a day would leave the Other Islands for Swartz Bay and return.

We think the Long Harbour dock is a very good idea, giving Gulf Islanders a fast service to the Mainland plus more frequent service to Victoria with less time spent on ferries. It certainly solves the problems of the commuters to such Islands as Mayne and Galiano. Traveling time from Montague Harbour, Galiano, via Long Harbour, S.S.I., to Tsawwassen would undoubtedly be something less than two hours. S.S.I. residents would be less than 90 minutes to the mainland.

It is unthinkable that anyone would think our science laboratories are adequate, but if there is such a person, he too should be at the meeting.

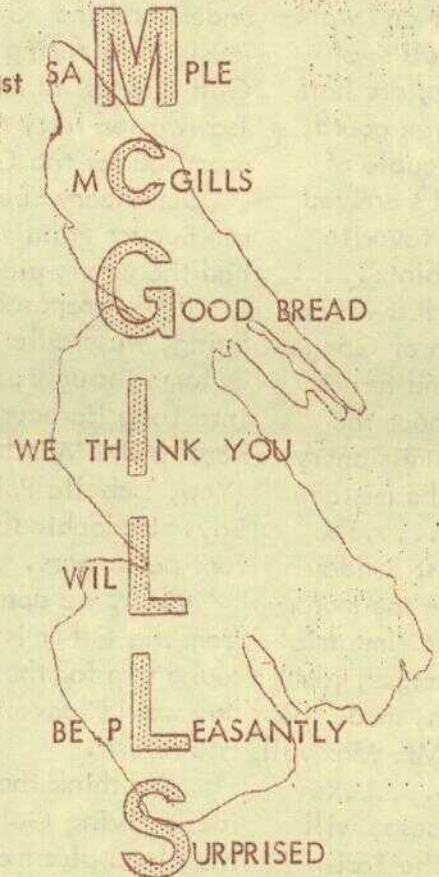
If you think \$18,000 is a lot of money to spend on School Board Offices and a Health centre, come to the meeting and raise your voice.

Farmers Institute and get a speaker like Dr. A.J. Wood who spoke at their Special General Meeting last Friday evening.

Dr. Wood, of the Dept. of Animal Husbandry, UBC, spoke on highly technical subjects, ranging from artificial insemination to complicated experiments in animal nutrition, in such an entertaining manner that he held the attention of everyone there. No one went to sleep and all of them gained a bit of knowledge.

Dr. Wood had this year been chosen by the National Research Council to present a paper at the Annual Conference in Holland. At this conference, 800 scientists representing 40 countries presented the latest scientific research discoveries on animal reproduction. While in Europe, Dr. Wood also visited Prague, Hamburg and parts of Scotland and England, and delighted his audience with amusing and interesting sidelights of his visits. His amusing, thought-provoking impressions of life behind the Iron Curtain, in Prague, was one of the highlights of the evening.

ON UNIVERSITY TEACHING By Dr. R. Bourdillon
 (Last of 5 parts)
Improvements in Curricula

Many of us have smiled at the story of the Scot-
 tish preacher who urged his congregation to fall on
 their knees in prayer as soon as they reached home,
 and to ask the Deity the solemn question: "Am I a
 goat?" But university teachers may well ask them-
 selves a similar question, namely: "Does my teaching
 prevent students from pursuing other studies of great
 or value?"

This is a searching question. Can the Chemists
 and the Engineers justify all the hours spent in their
 laboratories and the resultant enforced neglect of

human studies? Can the teaching of
 Latin and Greek as well as French
 and English to 12,000 young Can-
 adians in the East, justify the im-
 mense time thus spent and the en-
 forced neglect of modern studies? The question
 is equally pertinent to the teachers of English.
 Thus the current set books for the compulsory Eng-
 lish (100) at Victoria, include the unpleasant and
 tendentious "Brave new World" of Aldous Huxley,
 and the drama of the pathetically foolish Othello.
 Are these works more worth study than those of
 T.H. Huxley or of Julian Huxley, with their im-
 mensely more valuable content, or than plays in
 which the chief characters are worthy of respect?
 Perhaps teachers have paid too much attention to
 "style", and too little to content, in the literature
 they prescribed. That is certainly suggested on com-
 paring Virgil's Aeneid, which has often been cho-
 sen as a set book, with the much more valuable
 diary of Marcus Aurelius, which was seldom sel-
 ected.

In this rapidly changing world, it is really im-
 portant to avoid wasting the time of students on out-
 worn ideas. The old pretexis for doing so no longer
 sound convincing. Such arguments as: "I teach this
 because there is a demand for it", or "because it is
 valuable", or "because the University pays me to do
 so", do not suffice, unless there is reason to believe
 that the subject concerned is the best possible for the
 students. Continued insistence on ancient studies is
 too reminiscent of Kipling's terrible poem, "The Old
 Men".

"We shall lift up the ropes that constrained our youth
 to bind on our children's hands;
 We shall call to the water below the bridges

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ON UNIVERSITY TEACHING (CONT'D P. 3)

Universities would provide an education better fitted for the coming decades if they were to reserve teaching in the following subjects for post-graduate specialists only:- all dead languages, all history selected to foster nationalism, and all minutely detailed history prior to 1900, all literature that was not at least as valuable for content as for style. The scientific and professional Faculties might well allow 20% of the student's time to be spent on other subjects. This would make it possible for every student to learn something of modern science, of current world affairs of psychology and human nature, and, not least, of the foundations of ethics. Then the desire that a university degree should denote an educated person rather than a technologist, would be more nearly attained.

Spectators are needed at the football games when off-island teams play the local Legion team.

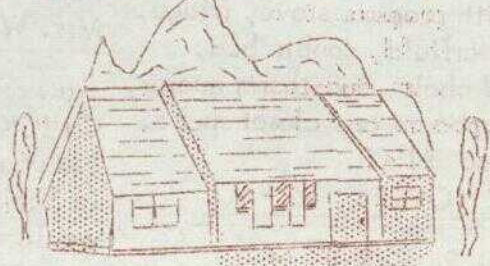

Mrs. Elsie Thacker, Sec. Trea. for 4th term Mr. Milling spoke on the activities of The Island Council O.A.P.O. of which he is also president. There was a good turn out of members. Mrs. B. Krebs was returned as Tea Convenor.

A door prize of photographic equipment donated by a Victoria camera supply firm, will be given away at Gulf Islands Camera Club second annual "Picturama" to be held Nov. 24 and 25th at 8 p.m. in Mahon Hall. Dr. Ted Jansch, president, and Mrs. W. Seymour are spearheading this outstanding event, assisted by every active club member. Tickets limited to 150 each evening, may be obtained from members or at Ganges Pharmacy.

Thanks are due to the Salt Spring Island Rod and Gun Club for encouraging the Ganges Sea Scouts to become Junior Members of that organization. Those who join are eligible to take part in a strictly supervised .22 shoot every Saturday morning, weather permitting. So far, some promising results have been obtained. Seven Scouts have won Dominion Rifle Association Bronze Maple Leaves which require 5 targets of 10 rounds each with a score of 80 or better, now several are on their way to winning the Silver Maple Leaf which requires 10 targets with scores of 93 or better. The Golden Maple Leaf, requiring 10 targets of 98 or better, calls for a fairly accomplished marksman, and only a few of the boys have yet any targets towards this trophy. However, during last week's shoot Patrol Leader Brian Rogers came up with a first class 100 on one of his targets, and three other boys with targets of 98 or better.

Any Sea Scout is eligible for these practices so long as he becomes a Rod and Gun Club Member and is covered by insurance during the shoot. The annual dues are a modest \$1.00 which in addition to the insurance allows the member the use of the Club target rifles and the new range on Scott Road.

Ammunition is supplied at a fraction under cost and there is a small prize awarded each week for the two highest scores on the usual

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2-target shoot. It is hoped that in the near future sufficient competition may become available on the other islands so that some Junior Inter Island shoots may be held.
