ON UNIVERSITY EDUCATION by

Dr. R.B. Bourdillon

(Third of Five Parts)

The "Humanities" or "Liberal Arts".

The numerous subjects taught at different Universities may be classified in three major groups:- The "Humanities", the Sciences and Mathematics, and the Professional Courses. The "Social Sciences" may be regarded as "Humanities", or as "Sciences", or as forming a fourth group.

The term "Humanities" or "Liberal Arts" is ill-defined, but usually includes as chief subjects, the Classics, History, Literature and Languages, and Philosophy.

These subjects share certain merits in common. Thus in all of them a first class teacher can impart much sound knowledge of psychology and of ethical principles, as well as a lively interest in former times. Also the teachers of these subjects are often better men than the average science teacher, from having been allowed more time at the University to talk and to think, and also because the abler scientists tend to prefer research to teaching. Further these subjects can be, and sometimes are, used to give training in clear expression both in speech and writing. Added to these merits is a fairly extensive knowledge of how human beings have behaved in past times. Hence it is not surprising that these subjects are widely held to provide a "good" education, or that some Directors of business firms looking for non-technical executives (e.g. in life insurance), prefer to select candidates from these studies, rather than from some over-specialised science courses.

Both History and Modern Languages have the dubious merit of attracting many students because their study is, initially, less exacting than that of most of the Sciences.

However these subjects have also serious drawbacks. Thus they provide


QUEER SHIP SAILS FOR MEXICO

A home-made, home-designed catamaran type of sailing craft pulled into Ganges Harbour last Sunday on her way to Mexico from Vancouver. The unseaworthy-looking craft has two pontoon-type hulls with a flat deck in between. There is no cabin and the only shelter for the crew of four will be a small tent pitched on the deck. The four young men, three "new" Canadians from Germany and one Torontonion, hope to make the trip in four or five months. It was the studied opinion of many of our dockside "admirals", that the authorities will never let the queer craft leave Canadian waters.

Mr. Art Young reported last Wednesday to the Chamber of Commerce on a survey made by the health department concerning sewage disposal in Ganges. He presented a comprehensive plan of a sewage disposal system that called for the expenditure of about \$85,000, to be amortized in 20 years. The Chamber did not endorse the plan at the meeting, but in the interest of health they passed a motion to ask the health authorities to rigidly enforce the laws concerning septic tanks in the Ganges area.

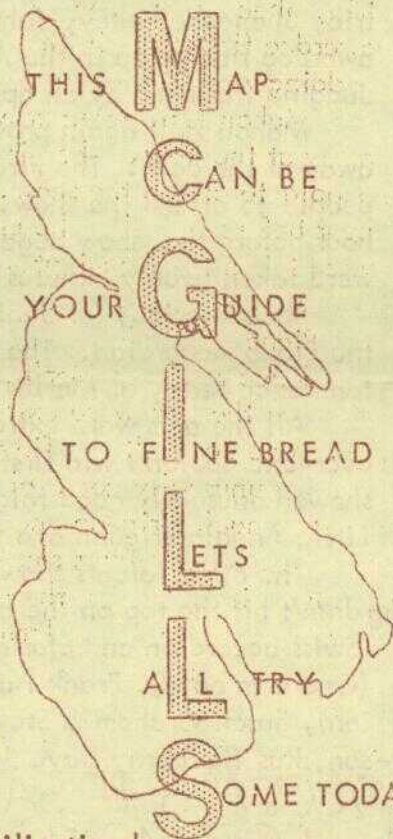

little direct training for future employment, except in teaching. Further they have the major drawback of looking backwards to the past, instead of studying the present with a view to forecasting the future. Education should prepare students for wise conduct and sound judgement in the decades following graduation. It is a fallacy to think that events prior to 1900 form the best guide for this, because technology has since produced tremendous changes, which need modern knowledge for their comprehension.

To plan for the future by studying the past resembles driving a motor vehicle forwards by looking in the rear mirror only, - with no view forwards. It can be done - slowly - as long as the road is straight and free of obstructions, i.e. as long as the course followed in the past continues to be applicable. But on reaching any corner or obstruction needing a change of course, great difficulties occur, and violent clashes become probable.

A third drawback to an education based on the remote past is the tendency to pessimism so often seen in classical and literary graduates. Their studies have emphasised the more inspiring features of past history, but have left them ignorant of many of the best features of modern times. Hence many doubt if our civilization has made any real progress since Roman times. Such doubts are held by few who know the immense reduction in human suffering caused by our progress in medicine and the sciences.

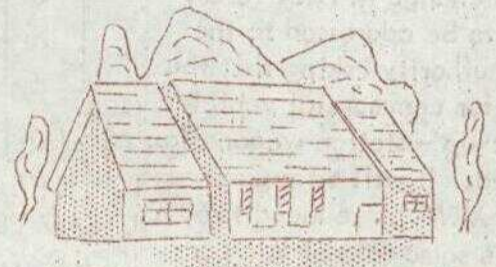

W.H. "Hart" Bradley, of McGill's Bakery Ltd., wishes to thank the Hallowe'en prankster who turned off the water supply to the bakery on Hallowe'en night. It saved him a good chunk of "dough". When the baker Fred Perry, arrived early the next morning--no water. By the time he got Hart and Peter Cartwright out of bed to find the trouble, the electricity was off, due to the Wednesday morning storm. If the water had been on, 500 loaves of bread would have been in the oven when the electricity went out. This would have spoiled the baking, and the bread would have been a total loss.

A special meeting of the Directors of the Islands Farmers Institute was held on November 2nd at the home of Mr. E.T. Gear. Mr. G.M. Heinekey presided. The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the change in ferry fares. A letter is to be addressed to the B.C. Toll Authority asking that the ferry fares for commercial vehicles in the pick-up - station wagon class be reviewed. It will be suggested that the G.V.W. be reduced to 6000 lbs., at the same rate of 20¢ per 1000 lbs. This will result in a decrease in fare of 60¢ per trip. The letter will also inquire about vehicles with "A" plates. No mention of fares for these vehicles was made in the list published in the Driftwood of November 2nd.
