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### GRAY ASHES OR GREEN WOODS? by Bea Hamilton

"Keep the forests green" we hear that slogan repeated constantly, yet time and again, some careless person in the woods forgets for a moment to think, and through a thoughtless match or cigarette, he starts destroying not only the woods for acres around, but he destroys his own peace of mind - for life. And all through perhaps one little itty-bitty smoke that he MUST have because he is miserable without it - and he so enjoys his puffing that he forgets that burning spark - or hot match - and he goes on sublimely unaware that he has started something he cannot stop - anymore than he can stop smoking - a raging forest fire. And last week, history repeated itself, at least in part, when a fire was started through the carelessness of some hunter or visitor - according to reports - and once again flames raged up and over Mt. Tuam, burning acres of brush and timber land, - and over thirty years ago, a similar fire started at the same place - Cape Keppel, and at that time it raged up, over and around Mt. Tuam, swept down towards Fulford waterfront, almost to the back door of homes - residents had to get out and back-fire to keep it at bay. Old rail fences and stumps still tell the black story with their charred posts and blackened covering where the flames had licked and smouldered.

Small children and old timers will recall the roar and crackle and hot fragments falling, and the dense smoke. . . and at night - tall fir trees went up like torches until their tops broke and fell, hitting a tree farther away and so on, until tree after tree caught fire and the sky was lurid with red flames and light - and men (CONTD ON P. 2)

Now that we have given our advice to the leaders, we will pretend that we are a know-it-all big paper and tell you why the rulers of the two big powers cannot hear our plea.



Some were ruthless, some were benevolent, some were dictators and some were saints, but all had these beliefs in common.

What happens when two powers, diametrically opposed, collide in spreading their ideology? Conflict, of course. Neither power can see the other power's ideology or philosophy, for each knows that his is the only way. He will scheme,

Bruce, and across the hills in Burgoyne Valley it was a blazing inferno and a terrifying sight. And it could have happened again last week, but for the men and equipment, and a favourable wind - as it was, it burned over 800 acres, and caused enough damage. And the after-math is almost worse. Some of us can remember the burned out woods of 1928 or 1930 - one walked between black ghosts of trees and felt the warm ash underfoot and in some parts it was still hot!

For one, carried lunches to fighters - and had to jump over the hot spots, duck quickly under burning branches and walk through a dead, silent world, (except for the sound now and then of a tired, baked tree falling - or a branch crashing) - ashes and black snags - what a nightmare! Tuam - it will be much the same - Old Bald Face, as the mountain side has been called, will be accompanied by other bald places now - and for some years, the mountain will be anything but lovely to look at.

Hunters would do well to remember that they are literally guardians of the forests when they enter the woods - and for the sake of bird, animal - and maybe lives, it is well to keep the woods green - a tree takes perhaps hundreds of years to grow - why destroy such beauty by a few minutes carelessness? There is a report that animals are starving on the island - in that case, a fire certainly won't help matters - so a little clear thought might be in order.

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fight or die, always believing that right is on his side.

Where ever two ideologies have collided, the weaker one is defeated. Down through history; Greeks vs. Romans, Romans vs. Christianity, Hitler vs. Allies, or any other conflict, bloody or not, one of the ideologies has survived at the expense of the other. Both systems, Communism and Democracy; both leaders cannot and will not listen to the plea of the common man, "Boys, don't do it".

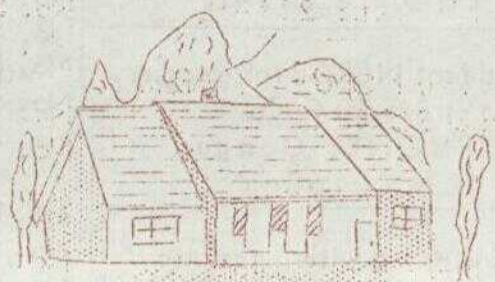
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### DID YOU KNOW ?

At a meeting of Civil Defense Wardens, held at Legion Hall last Monday evening, the problems of civil defense, as it effects Salt Spring Island, were discussed. S.S.I., which was a Mutual Aid Area (Evacuation area), under the able leadership of Mr. C.H. Ker-Cooper and Group Capt. M.S. Layard, has been quietly organizing to take care of our share of the evacuees from the Victoria Area. However, it was learned, prior to the meeting, that S.S.I. has now been declared part of the Victoria Target Area. While it is not known at this time if this means any difference in the S.S.I. organization, the Civil Defense of S.S.I. is being carried out as previously planned.

The Island has been divided into 30 sectors and Wardens have been appointed for most of them. (The Warden in your area is listed on page 6 of this issue.) Sub-Wardens will be appointed by the Wardens.

The evacuation plans call for a maximum of 4500 people to be evacuated from Victoria by the use of ferries. However, the number will probably be a great deal less, since this figure is based on 100% evacuation. Evacuation is a voluntary thing and many people will (CONT'D PAGE 8)
