EASTER, observed annually throughout Christendom in commemoration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, is the most joyous of the Christian festivals. There are many interesting facts about its origin and customs.

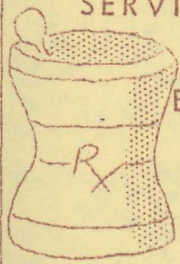
Since the last days of Christ coincided with the Passover feast of the Jews and his death fell upon the day of the feast of the Passover, on the 14th day of the month of Nisan, it was natural that the early Christians should associate the sacrifice of the true Lamb of God and the joyful promise of his resurrection with the traditional Passover observances, adding to the older festival the new idea of Christ as the sacrificial Lamb, and should celebrate the old and the new feasts at the same time. The close association of Easter with the Jewish Passover, or Pesach, is indicated by the fact that among non-Teutonic peoples the name for this holy day is derived from the same root as the Hebrew word "Pesach" (Latin, "Festa Paschalia"; French, "Paques").

The English word "Easter", however, corresponding to the German "Oster", reveals Christianity's indebtedness to the Teutonic tribes of central Europe. Christianity, when it reached the Teutons, incorporated in its celebration of the great Christian feast day many of the heathen rites and customs which accompanied their observance of the spring festival. That the festival of the resurrection occurred in the spring, that it celebrated the triumph of life over death, made it easy for the church to identify with this occasion the most joyous festival of the Teutons, held in honour of the death of winter, the birth of a new year and the return of the sun.

"Eostur-monath", or Easter month, corresponding to our month of April dedicated to Eostre, or Ostara, goddess of the spring, gave its name to the Christian holy day.

**ASPARAGUS
PROPAGATION**

During the past few weeks I have had several calls regarding the growing of Asparagus so thought it advisable to give as much information as possible on the subject at this time.

Raising plants for transplanting: Asparagus is propagated by seed which is sown 1/2 - 1 inch deep in rows 1 1/2 feet apart in a seed-bed or nursery, where the seedlings are grown for a year before being transplanted to a permanent location. It should be sown thinly in the temporary rows, 5 - 8 seeds per foot of row. If it is sown thickly, the plants develop small roots which become intertwined, making separation difficult when they are dug.

The rate of germination depends on soil moisture and temperature, usually being 4 - 6 weeks when the Asparagus seed is sown in early spring. A little radish or turnip seed which germinates quickly, may be planted with the Asparagus seed to mark the rows so that cultivation may begin between the rows, before the weeds get ahead of the small Asparagus seedlings. VARIETIES TO PLANT: MARY WASHING-

TON, VIKING. During the first year while your young plants are growing in the nursery it is advisable to pick your site and soil for the permanent Asparagus plantings. Because Asparagus is a long-lived crop it is desirable to select a site that will be suitable over a period of years. Sandy loams and other light types of soils that warm readily result in an early crop, and in general are best for heavy yields for a short time, but the plants are not quite so long-lived as on heavier, deep, rich soils.

The soil should be loose and friable enough to allow the spears to grow straight upward. Soil preparation should start a year prior to transplanting the seedlings. Further information will be given on Asparagus growing at a later date.

"Dear Sir: (Reply to "A Sentinel") The latest translation of the Bible, required about eighteen years by Dr. Luther A. Weigle and twenty-two assistants, four of whom were Canadians.

They discovered mistakes, deliberate substitutions and additions, as well as words which changed meaning. In the James version, which is non-Protestant, the word "Teacher" was changed to "Master" thirteen times.

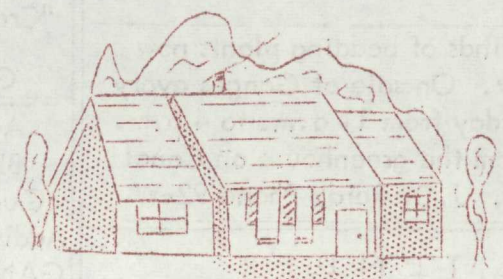

I hope that the members of the staff of this firm will now feel like working much harder and with great pride in their achievements, knowing that all these years their services were not really necessary, just a kind gift because they are incapable, handicapped, or just poor. (Signed) Mrs. Mary Wilson."

"Dear Sir: Informing the public that I do not understand the local situation, you indicate that the firm now in the limelight, is operated upon a philosophy of philanthropy; in other words, it does not pay wages but dispenses charity in the guise of pay for unnecessary jobs and hand-outs to deserving unfortunates. Thus the serfs have no right to protest the inadequacy of the dole. Poppycock! Here are facts: my own wife was for a time employed in this emporium. No job was "created" for her, nor was she engaged as a "deserving person". For the special skills required of a machine book-keeper, she received 75% of the wage rate for a charlady or a ferry waitress, or about 45% of the rate she drew in regular employment over 14 years ago. One of the ladies dismissed because of her "grandiose illusions of her worth" was introduced to the store by my wife, who was requested to suggest someone to fill a "NECESSARY post. This lady was not even a resident of Salt Spring. Those who have the honour to know Mrs. Dickens, will well realize that she does not lend herself to introducing people who are "malcontents, immodest, dishonest, untruthful, lacking in courage and indecent". Does it not occur to you as very queer that it took management a great many years in some of the cases, to discover these undesirable traits in their employees? Indeed it was only when their requests for better remuneration offered to affect profits that these employees were dubbed malcontents and the rest of the opprobrious terms you used, applied to them.

The clear fact is that for far too long, advantage has been taken of the economic situation here, where work is scarce, to depress wages. No amount of sanctimonious hypocrisy about aiding unfortunates can gloss over that fact. A few people may have been helped, but that is no justification for underpaying an entire staff. In fact, the net result belies the professed altruism. Nor has the fact that wages (Cont'd to Page 7)

Those employees now remaining cannot but wonder "am I filling an unnecessary post, or receiving a hand out as a deserving person"? Only one or the other can account for my low wages. The balance sheet would provide the answer.

Since many of your correspondents delight in Biblical quotes, lets try this one. "Is not the labourer worthy of his hire"? Well we all now know one answer to that one. Your dissertation on hate, leaves me frankly non-plussed. If you intend to convey that I hate the head or heads of the firm under discussion, why, I don't even know them. I suggest you do a little clear and long thinking upon that question of doing FOR someone. You certainly tried your beastly best to DO FOR the characters of the five employees who were dismissed. These four ladies and one gentleman, respected members of the community, you quite obviously did not know, and certainly were not in any position to judge of their capacities for work. 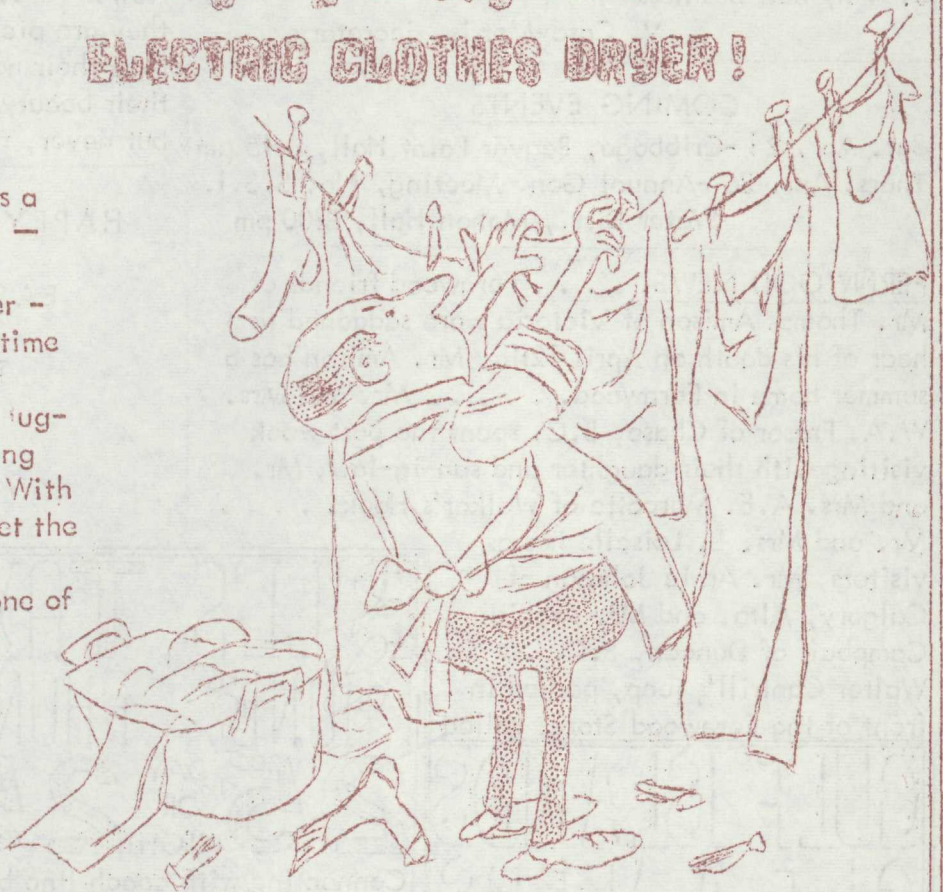
