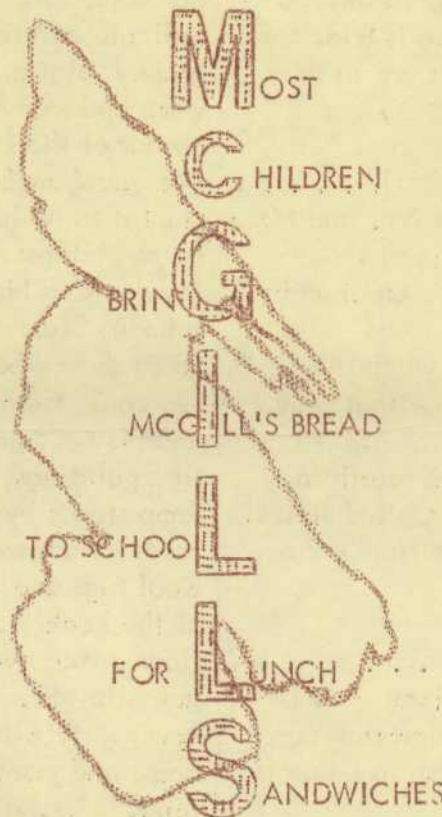
FULFORD NEWS by Bea Hamilton.

LETTERS-TO-THE-EDITOR "Dear Sir: With reference to your editorial, "Who is a Lady?": Perhaps your correspondent has not enjoyed the good fortune of meeting an Indian (or other non-white) lady with that quiet graciousness of speech and manner, and kindly consideration for the feelings of others; that is usually associated with women of good breeding and considered to be the hallmark of a lady.

It may also be, Mr. Editor, that your correspondent has not been subjected to the unpleasantness of meeting that type of white woman, whose personality reveals nothing of the lady inherent in every woman.

If your correspondent has made the acquaintance of these two types, it is hard to understand her attitude. If she has been denied the experience, I suggest, Mr. Editor, that her attitude should be regarded as naive rather than bigoted.

Lord Tennyson, in his poem: "Lady Clara Vere De Vere", wrote some appropriate words on the subject:

"Howe'er it be, it seems to me,
 'Tis only noble to be good;
 Kind hearts are more than coronets,
 And simple faith than Norman blood."


our Canadian Women's Press Club. I have met other Indian ladies - there are many in this country. The appellation "lady" is a title given to women in all walks of life - be they black, brown or white; it is courteous and nice to so do. It may be true that all women are not ladies but they can be if they want to be - and try hard enough. It is a matter of character and up-bringing, of self discipline and graciousness of nature. A real lady, if we must have a definition of the title, is womanly. She would no more think of being rude to another person than she would deliberately burn a finger.

A lady would never call attention to another person's faults, either in manner or speech. She ignores completely another's handicap. A lady is modest, polite, poised. She never lets others feel that she is superior. Putting on airs is "taboo". Being snobbish just isn't done. A lady does not have to tell the world that she is a lady - she is recognized for what she is - even as you and I are recognized for what we are. "I yam what I yam, and that's what I yam," said the ridiculous Popeye cartoon - yet there is more sense in the words

than one would think at first glance. For indeed we are what God made us first, and end up being what we have trained ourselves to be - ladies, women, or both.

Women the whole world over are called ladies. It is a title given courteously and is pleasing. I like what Hannah More wrote in an essay on Thoughts on Conversation - and I quote: (Cont'd to P. 4)

"Dear Sir: The Gulf Islands were for many years concerned in political affairs with North Saanich. It was then known as the North Saanich and Gulf Islands riding. The late Col. Macgregor Macintosh was the last member of this riding to sit in the provincial legislature. Some time during the late 1930's it was considered expedient to the Liberal cause to create certain electoral districts for the purpose of assured seats for those Liberal members running for office therein. North Saanich-Gulf Islands was one of those unfortunate areas which received such doubtful attention. It was divided, North Saanich going into Saanich proper - which seems right. The Gulf Islands part was included with Nanaimo and became

known as the present Nanaimo and Gulf Islands riding. The Gulf Islands should be a separate riding with a member representing them solely in the Legislature. We have adequate population for such. There are ridings in the province with less population. It must be obvious to all residents of the Islands, and to those in the government political body, that as long as we remain attached to a city riding, which is growing fast, we are going to get the short end of the stick as regards money appropriations and attention to the many problems that only pertain to the Islands economically and structurally. The time has come for the residents of these Gulf Islands to give their member instructions so that he may bring argument before the Premier at the next session of the Legislature. (Signed) D.D.
