### MY FAVORITE ISLAND by C. MacGregor Grant.

Islands have always appealed to me. They supply the delightful sensation of "getting away from it all" and escaping from the problems and perplexities which bedevil the mainland. Some of my happiest memories are associated with islands. My mind turns back in pleasant retrospect to Cape Breton Island off the coast of Nova Scotia, Grand Manan in the Bay of Fundy, Bermuda, Harbour Island in the Bahamas, Iona in the Hebrides and the Scilly Isles off Cornwall.

But the pick of the lot is Salt Spring. Where, outside the tropics, do roses bloom at Christmas? Where can one eat oysters on the half shell gathered from one's own shore front? Where are salmon to be found in such numbers at one's very door? This is the Shangri La which thousands dream of but never see.

I have lived in six Canadian provinces and visited all the others except Newfoundland, but I have seen nothing comparable to the view from Mount Maxwell. Incidentally, the easterner hears plenty about the Malahat Drive and Grouse Mountain but nothing of Maxwell Mountain which knocks the other two into a cocked hat. No Canadian needs to travel to the fiords of Norway when Sansum Narrows and Burgoyne Bay are right in his back yard.

The gardens of Salt Spring, so lovingly and competently cultivated, provide the visitor with a constant source of interest and pleasure. So many exotic flowers and shrubs grow here which are never seen in other parts of Canada. Even the wild flowers have a beauty and a variety which are not known east of the Rockies. I would like to pin an orchid on the person who conceived the idea of placing the flower boxes on the Ganges water front. This immediately arrests the attention of the visitor and it adds much to the appearance of a most attractive

### INDIAN WAR CANOE RACES TO BE HELD ON S.S.I.

... An afternoon of unusual thrills and excitement await the residents and visitors of Salt Spring Island on Saturday, August 11th., when the famous Indian War Canoe Races will be held at Lakeridge Camp (the Bullock estate). Four of the beautiful, highly-prized, 52-ft. 11-man, racing canoes will be in competition. The race on the 27-acre lake at Lakeridge will be a new experience for the paddlers as well as the audience. Instead of the usual long straight-aways used when racing in the salt chuck, the circular course at Lakeridge will test the Indian's skill in manoeuvring and endurance. The spectators, seated in the natural amphitheatre that surrounds the lake, will have a ringside seat for the entire race.

For the first time in history, white men and women of the audience will be invited to ride in the fragile canoes. Chief Underwood has announced that every other paddle in each canoe will be turned over to anyone desiring to experience the thrill of paddling one of these war canoes.

In addition, some lucky boys and girls, winners of a "Sports Day" that will be held at 1:30 p.m. will be given a ride in the war canoes. And that is not all: Three of the lucky children will be given a free airplane ride over the Gulf Islands.

Another feature of the gala afternoon will be the equally-famed war dances, under the directorship of Chief Hummingbird. Chief Hummingbird and his troupe performed for Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, during her last visit to Canada.

The Indian ladies will also have a busy afternoon smoking salmon over a huge applewood fire. This famous smoked salmon, which has been a feature at canoe races through-out B.C., will be for sale.

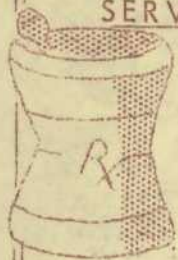
The gates to Lakeridge will be open at 12:00 noon, with the "Sports Day" being the first activity at 1:30 p.m. The people are invited to use the spacious grounds of Lakeridge for picnicing, hiking, etc. There is ample parking for hundreds and hundreds of cars.

The admission for adults is \$1.00; Children 6-12 only 50¢ and children 5 or under are admitted free.

Part of Salt Spring's charm lies in the fact that settled areas are surrounded by unbroken forests abounding in all kinds of wild life. What a thrill for the city dweller to see a mother quail leading her family across a lawn with little evidence of fear. And what a novel experience to have to keep property gates closed to protect one's lettuce from invading deer. In southern Ontario, unspoiled country like this is non-existent. Instead of these stately giants of the forest, we have ugly hydro towers and we are waging a losing battle to preserve the few beauty spots we still possess. It is to be hoped that B.C. will profit by our mistakes.

The most important aspect of a community is the people with whom we rub shoulders and here Salt Spring is particularly fortunate. The English tradition of good manners and gracious speech is evident in the local shops and I have good reason to be grateful for the friendliness and hospitality I have experienced. Obviously, the welcome sign on the ferry dock at Fulford is not just an advertising gimmick but a heart-warming symbol of the kindly spirit which makes the visitor feel very much at home.

Sad to say, my holiday is drawing to a close and soon I will be back in the hot and crowded city. But I will take with me lovely memories of one of the best vacations I have ever enjoyed. The S.S.I. Volunteer Firemen were called out last Friday noon to extinguish an attic fire at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Fred Morris. The fire, discovered by Mr. Fred Ross, is believed to have started by spontaneous combustion. The estimated damage, mostly smoke and water, is \$500.

Again, the volunteer firemen, in their own cars, were hampered by cars not pulling over to the side and allowing them to pass. Most people do pull over when they hear the siren of the fire truck, but immediately after seeing the truck go by, they pull back onto the road and obstruct the progress of some of the volunteers rushing to catch up with the truck. Please pull over and STAY there for a few minutes to allow the volunteers to get to the fire as quickly as possible.

At the Highland Games at Nanaimo on July 14th it took the Canadian Champion, Miss Yvonne Breedon, to beat Salt Spring Island's own, Sandra Smith, in the 100 yard dash. Miss Breedon's time of 11.3 seconds was just .4 of a second faster than Sandra's 11.7.

W. Fisher. Fred Morris and Elmer Bowerman of Pender shot the low games of the day, both shooting 87's.

The 3rd. and final round will be played at Galiano next Sunday, July 29th.

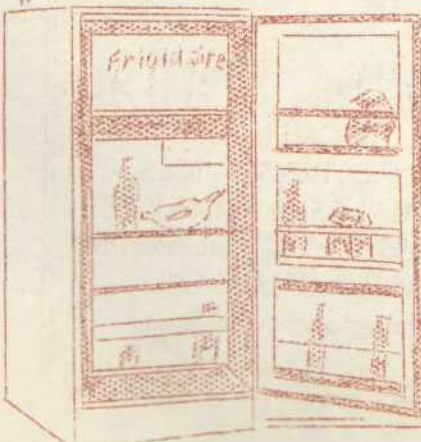
