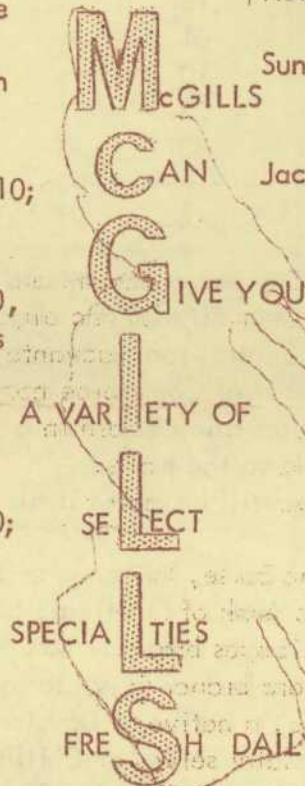
Second round matches will be completed by next Sunday evening.

**POTATO PRODUCTION**

Cool weather during the growing season is necessary for successful production. In warm sections, early crops can be produced by planting in good time and harvesting before the hot weather arrives. In midsummer, as a result of hot weather, plants may produce heavy vines but set few tubers. The optimum temperature for tuber yield is about 63 F. At 85 F no tubers form. The reduction in the carbohydrates available for translocation that results from increased respiration at the higher temperatures roughly corresponds to the reduction in tuber growth. The rate of tuber growth is a function of the available carbohydrate. Deficiency of carbohydrate arising from excessive respiration is a limiting factor in plant growth at temperatures above the optimum.

Usually, as soon as the weather turns cooler, tubers will form, and the excessively large vine growth may result in an extra heavy crop, providing that frost holds off.

Potatoes, though heavy feeders, leave the soil in good condition for the succeeding crop. They should be produced in a rotation, otherwise certain disease-producing organisms may accumulate in the soil. The early crop is usually grown on light soils, which warm up first in spring. Sandy soils permit a free development of the root system. Most late crops are grown on soils ranging from a sandy loam to a silt or clay loam. Muck or peat soil will grow high yields of high-quality potatoes if it is well-supplied with potash and phosphorus. Good drain-

age is essential.

A soil P.H. of 4.8-5.5 is excellent for a potato crop. If too much or too deep cultivation is resorted to, there will be more harm from damage to the roots than benefit from the tillage.

**SALT SPRING SAGA** by Eric A. Roberts  
 Published by Driftwood - \$1.95

Islands nurture legends.

Islanders treasure legends, cherish them, cultivate them by re-telling, fatten them and strengthen them to challenge dull facts.

A recognition of this, and a sensible understanding that the debunker is often, unnecessarily, a spoil sport, appears to have guided Eric A. Roberts in writing his just published **SALT SPRING SAGA** (Driftwood, Ganges BC). Mr. Roberts honestly and modestly explains that his little book is entertainment, not a serious historical study.

This book is a Salt Spring project. It was written by an Islander at the inspiration of our island publisher. It is well printed and illustrated. It more than fulfills its modest promises.

Buy a copy of this book; do not open it until you find a sunny beach, where you can put your back against an ancient log of salt-washed cedar and dig your heels into the clam shell. Then, with the scent of sun-baked bracken and broom alternating with the breeze from the chuck, let Mr. Roberts lead you gently over the hard facts to the inviting delights of well nourished legend.

You will read that at "The Battle of Ganges Harbour", eight Indians were slaughtered by other Indians ---factually a messy enough business to make the few settlers worry; but lift your eyes to the islet-dotted harbour and let your imagination ride the legend. Thousands of warriors cutting through the blue water in their giant war canoes; the clash of battle, blood of braves staining the sea, high-prowed canoes slicing through enemy craft.

Mr. Roberts honestly gives the facts; wisely, he does not spoil the legend.

If in your nest in the clam-shell you doze off after finishing

this fascinating book you may dream that ghosts of those sturdy, stubborn ancients still walk the bush trails, still hack away at the giant trees and duck away from the window for fear of an Indian sniper. You may meet that persistent Scot John Copland, the man whose insistence and persistence established the first settlers on the island. You may be presented with a broom and told to clean your boots before entering the Balmoral Store of Jon. Begg, an aggressive merchant who was ready to take orders "for gentlemen's pantaloons" just arrived in Victoria -- to you, pants.

Those were the days when bears, cougars and wolves were a menace to settlers and their animals. In your dreams you might meet angler McKenzie, who would put out from Vesuvius in any kind of weather but always, in addition to his fishing tackle, with the following: 2 rifles, 2 pistols, 1 axe, 1 naval cutlass to repel boarders, 1 small keg of rum to stimulate the spirits in case of Indian attack.

Stop for a moment in beautiful Burgoyne Valley and imagine cattle rustlers (Indians led by a white man) spying from Mount Maxwell (then Baynes Peak) on the herds of John Maxwell in the lush pastures below. Maxwell was a long-suffering man who hated to take the law into his own hands but finally he and his neighbors turned on the rustlers in a fashion that would have delighted a TV script hack.

Your reviewer has neither the knowledge nor the desire to nose out historical inaccuracies, if there are any, in this book. He finished the story with a feeling that his island had a history as exciting as it is interesting, and was thankful to Mr. Roberts for giving us a good story, for presenting hard-won facts, but mostly for capturing the real spirit of the island and its pioneers.

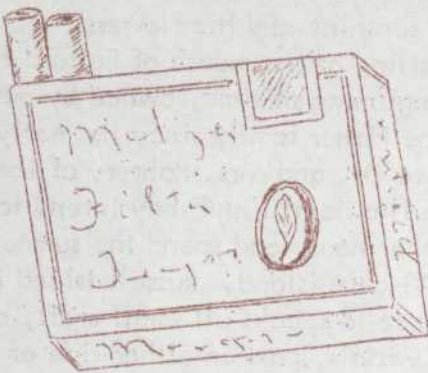

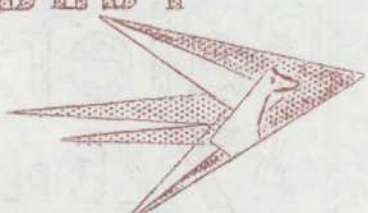
