### A LAKE BOAT FOR THE GULF ISLANDS?

From a very reliable source, DRIFTWOOD has learned that the B.C. Toll Ferry Authority is planning to move a ferry from Okanagan Lake at Kelowna to use in the Gulf Islands for an interim service until the new ship is ready in 1963.

While the officials of the Toll Authority have made no comment on this latest development, we have every reason to believe this action will be taken shortly. The Okanagan Lake ferry, similar, but a little larger than the "Delta Princess", will be dismantled in Kelowna for shipment to this area. The process of dismantling, shipping and re-assembling will take about two months; not in time for the summer traffic.

It is not known how and where the lake ferry will be used. Presumably the reason for this ferry is to relieve the hardship created by the loss of direct connections to the Mainland from the Gulf Islands. Whether the lake ferry will cross the Gulf or replace another ship's run so the latter can cross the Gulf, is not known at this time.

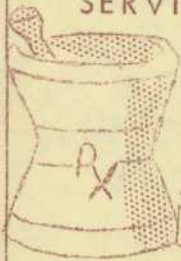

**SCOTT-MORRIS FINAL**

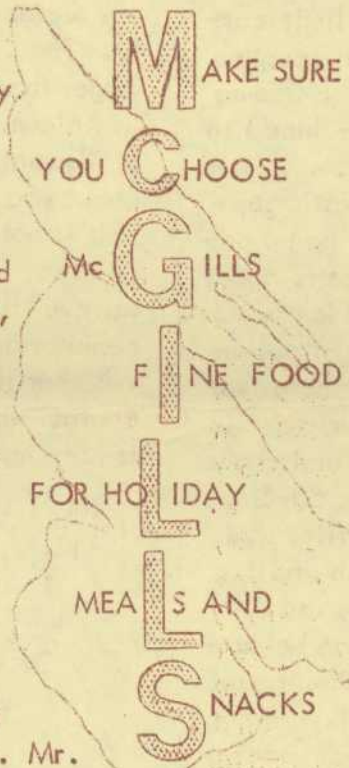
As predicted, Jack Scott and Fred Morris, con-

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A special meeting of the Victoria Presbytery was held in Ganges United Church on Friday, June 22nd.

It began with a luncheon in the Church Basement at noon. Mr. J. Catto welcomed the guests, numbering about 60 laymen and ministers. Archdeacon G.H. Holmes brought greetings from the Anglican Church, and Mr. C. Horel represented the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. W.M. Mouat gave a short talk on the history of the Salt Spring Island Church since the first missionaries came here 100 years ago.

At 1:30 p.m. a Communion Service was held in the Church after which followed the official meeting of Presbytery. Rev. A. Calder of Oak Bay and President of Presbytery was chairman of the meeting. At the close of the meeting, Rev. C. Whitmore was installed as the new chairman of Presbytery.

This is the first time the Presbytery has ever met on Salt Spring Island.

The Public Works Dept. of the Federal Government has announced that all building projects, where actual contracts have not been let, will be cancelled. And that probably means the end to the proposed Ganges Boat Basin.

When C.R. Horel, President of the Chamber of Commerce, was asked to comment on this latest development, he said, "Naturally, we are disappointed at this set back, particularly as we believe the proposed boat basin would be of assistance in bringing foreign exchange into the country. We will regard this government move as a temporary measure only, and will continue to press for completion."

Work has begun on the new School Board and Health Centre to be erected on the school grounds. Mr. Grant Cruickshank was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$17,955. T.N. Vodden was second low bidder (\$19,140) and third was Mihe Sober.

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The Cowichan Valley Summer School, sponsored by School Districts 64 (Gulf Islands), 65, 66 and 67, will be held July 9 to August 10, Monday through Friday from 8:30 to 12:30 p. m. at Mount Prevost Junior Secondary School, Duncan. Credit courses will be given in English Language 10, 20, 30, 40; English Literature 10, 20, 30, 40; Social Studies 10 and 20; Science 10 and 20; Commerce 10 and 20 (first and second year typing); Commerce 24 (business fundamentals); Commerce 34 (bookkeeping); Mathematics 10, 20, 30, 91 (University entrance Mathematics); French 10, 20, 91, 92.

The above courses are offered subject to enrolment. Other Commercial courses may be offered if there is any demand. Classes are designed to help students who have failed to earn credit in a course during the regular school year. However these courses are open to anyone working toward High School graduation requirements. Students' programmes must be approved by their principals.

Non-credit courses will also be given, subject to enrolment and open only to Secondary School students. They are:  
Art - Students will be fairly free to choose their own projects. Sketching in charcoal, pencil and ink, paper construction, and picture making will be emphasized. Ordinary drawing paper will be supplied but all other material must be bought by the student.

Music - instrumental music, theory of music and some vocal work will be included. Some instruments have been made available by the Cowichan School District but students are asked to bring their own if possible. Fees are: \$35 for one, \$45 for two and \$50 for three courses.

Special courses are also offered in remedial English and remedial Math for students in Grades VII and VIII. These to be held at Alexander Elementary School, Duncan. Fees: Grade VII, VIII group: \$35 for one and \$45 for both courses.

Bus transportation will be provided. Registration forms are available to all Public School students through their Principals or Counsellors. Others should write the Director of Summer School, Box 126, R.R. #1, Cobble Hill before July 4, giving name, postal address, telephone number and course(s) desired.

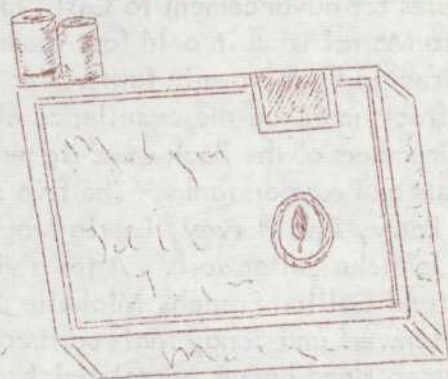

For the first time in 104 years, the St. Joseph's Hospital in Victoria is campaigning for funds from the general public for a very necessary building program. St. Joseph's, which is used by many people from the Gulf Islands, admitted over 14,000 patients in 1961. Such a consistently rising total of patients dictates the need for expansion. Contrary to popular opinion, St. Joseph's is not a parochial institution, but a public general hospital with 84% of its patients non-Catholics. It is dedicated to the service of the people in this area.

The planned expansion will cost \$2,700,000 of which \$350,000 must be raised by public subscription; the remainder being covered by federal, provincial, and municipal grants plus \$400,000 contributed by Sisters of St. Ann. Over \$200,000 of the public subscription has already been raised, leaving a balance of \$150,000 to be raised.

In one instance I taught the Senior Science (including Sen. Matric.) in a twenty-room senior high school, and obtained most satisfactory results in a SINGLE lab.

I hope I shall not be accused of boasting but, as Mr. Bourdillon may or may not know, the lab. records of all pupils writing Departmental Examinations are approved and certified by the District Superintendents, and I have never had a single record turned down whether I taught with a well-equipped lab. or with a makeshift. So much for the supposed increased efficiency of the multiple lab. (Signed) Ex. High School Teacher."
