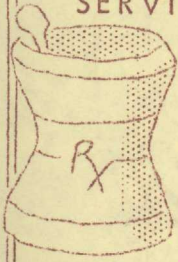

(Cont'd. from p. 1). . . the old razz-matazz, beginning with the platitude, "B.C. Hydro is YOUR company, here to serve you" and ending with the implied, "But don't tell US how to run YOUR company." We, and a lot of people, are still convinced that S.S.I. is getting the good old run-around from an all-powerful Government Corporation that has forgotten they are to serve the people, not dictate to the people.

Rainbow Road is an awfully good example.

At the Annual Meeting of the S.S.I. Recreation Commission, five new members were elected as commissioners. They were Mrs. V. Bishop of Vesuvius, Mrs. L. Proctor of Ganges, Mr. A. McManus and Mr. F. Hollings of Fulford and Mr. T.J. Butt of Beaver Point. Other members of the Commission, not up for re-election this year are: Mrs. A.M. Brown, D. Morrison, B. Lukas and W. Fisher.

The Recreation Commission, organized under the Community Programmes Branch of the Dept. of Education, receives a monthly grant from the Government to promote recreation on the Island. Besides the regular grant, they can receive special grants for certain projects (swimming lessons, etc.), and the Commission has access to various training films.

Any organization that is organized to provide recreation (such as boxing club, soccer club, handcraft clubs, etc.) may apply to the Commission for help, financial or otherwise.

The Recreation Commission was responsible for getting the night school classes started and gave financial help to various clubs in 1961. Recently, the Commission started a Sat. morning art class for children.

In 1962, the Commission hopes to provide more activities, especially for the young

or children and the older adults. At the moment, there are plans to provide a kindergarten School if the School Board cannot find a way to do it themselves.

OUR FEATHERED FRIENDS (And if you're bored, skip this) by Bea Hamilton

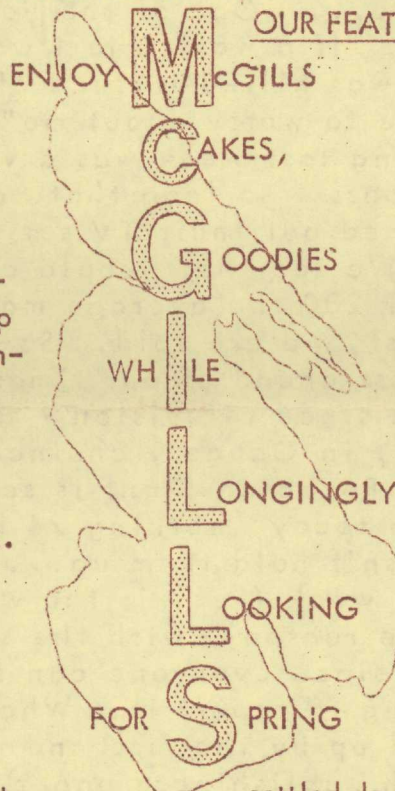

FALSE ALARM by Laurence Williams.

Six miles northeast of Guadalajara, Mexico, lies a geological spectacle comparable to Grand Canyon - called 'La Barranca'. This spectacular gorge drops from the level of the surrounding country 1600 feet into another world. Here along the banks of the Santiago River are tropical fruits and vegetables not grown on higher level.

A cable car takes you to the bottom of the canyon. I asked the operator at what time did they leave for the down trip.



I leapt to one side. Then I saw his target. He hit the vulture and it fluttered to our feet. What a moment of embarrassment for both of us! He said, "Lo siento mucho - I am very sorry - you must have thought I intended you harm." I replied in my very poor Spanish. "It is nothing Senor."

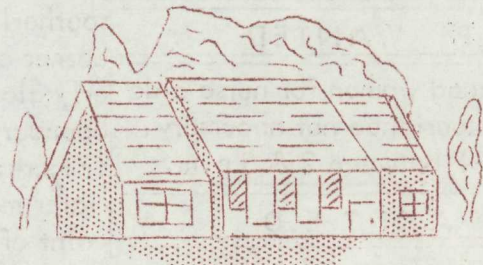

read and seconded by Miss K. Motherwell.

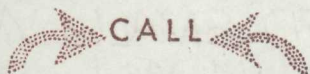
