## SCHOOL DANCERS ARE TOPS.



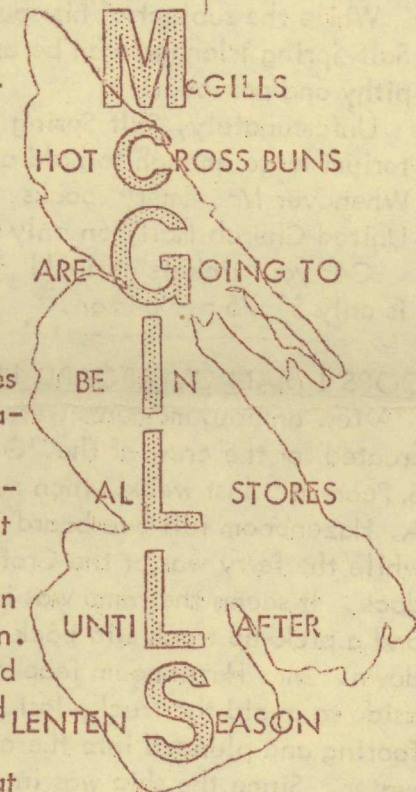
With the announcement by Mouat Bros., Limited, (see page 3) that beginning April 2nd, their modernized grocery department will go to cash and carry only, another old-fashion business practice has given away to modern merchandising methods. In our opinion this step was inevitable. Times have changed and the slow, pleasant, easy-going methods of grocery merchandising of a few years ago is not satisfactory to a great number of people.

Right or wrong, the tremendous influence of the super-markets of the cities has changed the buying habits of the majority of the population. While much can be said for the old way of doing business, the influx of "new" people to Salt Spring Island, people educated to city ways, makes demands on our businessmen they cannot fulfill without going modern.

It is our belief that Salt Spring Island is in a very important transitional period at this time. We are on the threshold of a great leap into modernity, with boat basins, better highways and faster ferry service, but we are reluctant to step over that threshold for we must leave behind, forever, the "good old days". There is a strong nostalgic pull to keep from changing.

However, as each one of us succumbs to another service, to another step-saver, to another modern convenience, the nostalgic pull becomes less and the desire for the modern way of life increases.

This is not a thing unique to Salt Spring Island. It has happened to most places: The modern, up-to-date, progressive, growing towns and hamlets have changed with the times. The sleepy, backward, passed-by undesirable wide places in the road fell victim to a nostalgic pull and their life, liveliness and livelihood was sacrificed to a false idol, "the good old days."

SUCCESS WITH  
 FINE SEEDS

Very fine seeds, such as Petunias, Lobelias, Portulaca, Alyssum, Ageratum, Balsam, Celosia, and all small flower and vegetable seeds must be given special care in starting if success is to be attained in growing seedlings.

First prepare a good mixture of soil for your flats by using the John Innes Compost, two parts loam, one part peat moss and one part sand by bulk, to each bushel of mixture and add 1 1/2 ounces of superphosphate of lime and 1/2 ounce of chalk. When you are making up your compost be sure to have all your containers clean. Wash them out with boiling water, only use clean boards to mix your soil on. Cleanliness is of utmost importance to prevent fungus diseases. By starting your seeds under poor conditions you will never obtain good plants. If you are not fortunate enough to have a greenhouse to start your seedlings, construct a hotbed or coldframe. This is a good investment for the average gardener and enables him to produce plants earlier and to grow crops which could not be matured without their aid. A hotbed is a plot of earth enclosed by a wooden frame, covered with glass sash and provided with some sort of artificial heat.

The most common and most easily constructed type of hotbed is that in which fermenting horse manure is used as a source of heat. Failing this, use the electric hotbed cable which can be bought at most garden supply stores. A coldframe is constructed in the same way as a hotbed except there is no source of heat. The principal uses of the cold frame are to harden off the early plants grown in the hotbed.

The subject for next week will be on the treatment of vegetable seed before planting to assist in destroying fungus. Also the control in damping off of seedlings grown under glass.

At the Recreation Commission meeting, held last Thursday, it was decided to buy archery equipment to provide yet another recreational facility on Salt Spring Island.

Archery, a sport that can be enjoyed by all age groups from the young to the old, is one of the fastest-growing activities on the North American continent. Not only is it for an individual, but whole families enjoy the competition, skill and fun that can be had on an archery range.

The archery programme for S.S.I. will be handled under the auspices of the Rod & Gun Club, using a portion of their shooting range on Scott Rd. for the archery range. The Rod & Gun club will furnish an instructor. The instructor, beginning this month, will hold instructions for children every Saturday morning at Mahon Hall. Instruction for older groups should start in the very near future. The outdoor range probably will not be used until warmer weather.

To facilitate the organization of archery classes and competition, the Recreation Commission felt that the Rod & Gun Club is the best organization for

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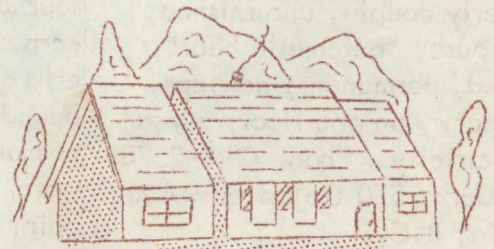

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FROM THE BACK SEAT. . . . .

After much careful thought we have come to the conclusion that it is time someone did something to help the Back Seat Driver.

Why not? People write articles on how to do this and that, but nobody ever seems to think of those poor old Back Seat Drivers who have to bash along on their own, unhelped and unappreciated.

Personally we think it is really tough on them having to think out new ways of harassing a driver--the front driver, that is--without the usual little Book of Rules.

We have therefore decided to jot down a few little things which may be found useful.

First: It is better to start off from scratch. You don't need any qualifications and it isn't even necessary to be able to drive.

But--you must get plenty of practice. That's the main thing. Practice!

Never miss an opportunity of having a go.
