Those who have a feeling of falling in high places appreciate the new railing put up last fall. Those who enjoy picnicking have an ideal spot with all the amenities including slab tables and cook spots.

B.C. Ferry Authority will be glad to hear that at least one Galiano resident is completely happy with the new "Queen of the Islands" service. He said, "I never go to Victoria, anyway".

CROWDS MISSING THE BOAT

The new ferry "Queen of the Islands" is unable to cope with the traffic between the Gulf Islands and the mainland. The two week-ends she has been in service have seen overloads at both terminals on Saturdays and Sundays.

Last Sunday evening only 25 cars were accepted aboard from Long Harbour, leaving several persons to make the 12 mile journey back to Fulford Harbour to return via Swartz Bay. With the new schedule in effect, this means a 40 minute wait for the main land ferry.

Cars waiting at Galiano and Mayne Island exceeded the 15 spaces left so that they have an even more complicated journey to get back to the mainland.

The "Queen of the Islands" remains in Long Harbour between 11:50 a.m. and 4:55 p.m. each day., sufficient time to make an extra run to accommodate the increased traffic.

ACCURATE FERRY INFORMATION NEEDED

Many people recently have encountered lack of information or wrong information from various terminals and employees.

It is understandable that some of the employees will not have schedule information at their fingertips. But every ferry employee should be able to refer customers to a place where accurate information may be had.

Some Islanders were left waiting for two hours at Swartz Bay on recent Friday evenings when the "Pender Queen" was re-scheduled because of repairs to Village Bay dock. In most cases, these people were aware that the "Pender Queen" would be late, but enquiring on the "Salt Spring Queen" on the way to Vansle, they were informed that there would be a ferry at 11:45. There wasn't.

There was the Vancouver couple who wanted to travel to Nanaimo and on to Salt Spring Island via the Crofton ferry, only to get the wrong information, this time from the Tsawwassen terminal, that

they knew of no ferry between Crofton and Vesuvius Bay. So the couple, greatly irritated, made the trip via Swartz Bay. Their irritation mounted considerably when they found out they had been right about the ferry from Crofton and the official informant, wrong.

There have been cases when prospective visitors from Victoria have phoned the Swartz Bay terminal for information on m

mation on ferries to the Islands. On the basis of such information, they have driven to Swartz Bay & then returned home rather than waiting a couple of hours until the actual time of departure.

Then we hear of an alleged case where a traveller phoned to Tsawwassen to find out about the sailings of the "Queen of the Islands" (he had heard the radio - TV advertising) and was advised that he might get the information from the Bus Lines. On phoning the bus depot, he was advised to call Tsawwassen. When he told them that the terminal had told him they would have the information for him, the bus

EDITORIAL

Last week's issue carried an enthusiastic account of recent developments on the community sports scene at Fulford. Mothers and sons got together to demonstrate their prowess at baseball. It seems to us that this same Fulford Community Group is demonstrating something even more important than baseball - a recognition that their kids need and want their participation in games and social activity - a realization which is becoming almost extinct in our day. Our hats go off to these people who seem well aware of some of the long term values to be gained from a sprained finger or bruised shin playing with the youngsters.

If you are a parent, or even mildly interested in the modern teen ager, you may have noticed the disturbing atmosphere of secrecy and aloofness when a group of young people are in the presence of adults. It becomes at times painfully obvious both are embarrassed, shy, suspicious or at least extremely uncomfortable. The situation too often ends with the youngsters retreating to a safe distance where normal comfortable chatter resumes.

If you have experienced this situation as an adult, have you ever wondered why? Have you ever recognized it for what it is; simply that we have lost the art of socializing with young people and we have little if anything to say to one another. And so we give in to our frustration and often hurt feelings, throw up our hands and look for something or someone to vent our feelings upon - usually these same young people.

Normal, happy social experiences come out of shared interests and goals. How can we expect to reach the modern teen ager when we as adults demonstrate in a thousand different ways, our disinterest in and even derision for teen age ideas and tastes? Rock'n'Roll, the Twist, duck-tail haircuts, the current football idol, and custom sports cars may be pretty thin conversation pieces for most adults but they aren't really so very different from the Charleston, the Big Apple, Bell Bottom pants, and Joe Louis of our day, and they can provide a valuable bridge to conversation and common interest in other areas.

Let's stop ignoring our youth. Let's stop barring them from healthy adult social relationships. Let's get in there and play ball!

In the past we have heard reports of the annoyance of tourists motoring throughout BC about Mr. Gaglardi's habit of tearing up large parts of many important highways in the height of the summer season. They are not a bit mollified at the now familiar and prominently displayed sign of apology for any inconvenience.

One such sign at present marks the increasingly important Scott Road Highway to and from the new ferry. Tourists must be brave as they have no choice but to travel this morass of rocks and mud. We who live here try to offer excuses to our visitors by saying it will be finished soon and it is to be a first class hard surfaced road. We hope our promises come true here soon.

It is much more difficult to explain to their visitors, as we take them on a guided tour of our island, why there is so little difference between the Scott Road and most of the other side roads to many pretty spots. We even find it difficult to explain to ourselves as we see so little of the road grader. It may be around somewhere but evidence of it is lacking.

We can console our... finding them they never need fear... maintenance machinery in their way... altspri...ous.

I am told that out at Vesuvius, there is a state of single blessedness with the scales weighted on the distaff side at a ratio of nearly four to one.

Each one on his or her own are nearly twenty ladies living alone, and three or more couples of two at a home.

Some twenty five per cent of that number of males also live alone, what a waste of house room. Yet there seems to be little chance of romantic alliances as about half of the males and possibly some ladies are octogenarians or approaching that age. I suppose one reason is that each likes his or her own way as to what, when, how and if they eat, sleep and have their being.

Some assist at the library, hospital, Auxiliary, and many are gardeners.

The ladies main get together is the Vesuvius church circle, which include some married contemporaries. They tell me the ladies know all of the men, but some men wonder who the lady was who called him by name.

The newspapers recently said that Canadians spoke more on the telephone than others, and there are a few out there could be included. W.J.M.

WHAT'S COOKING ON SALT SPRING?

A simple, prize-winning recipe for rich Loganberry Wine come to hand from Mr. N. A. Howland, North End. Following is Mr. Howland's recipe:

Use only FULLY RIPE berries. Crush fruit from the mash. Skim off the mash into a moistened cotton sack. Allow 3 lbs. sugar and 1/2 gallon of water to each gallon of juice. Agitate the sack of mash in the water, press and drain. Warm this berry-flavoured water and dissolve the sugar in it. When syrup is cool add to the juice; cover, and keep in a cool even temperature. Taste from time to time and add more sugar if needed, depending on choice of dry or sweet wine. Bottle at end of three months. The wine will be ready for use by Christmas but is not at its best until a year old.

Mr. Howland said he has taken two firsts and one second prize for three successive years at S.S.I. fairs with loganberry wine made by the above process. Blackberries or raspberries may be used following this recipe. The former makes a stronger wine and the latter produces a light-flavoured beverage.



SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 64 (GULF ISLANDS)
Attention is drawn to Section 66 of the Public Schools Act. "The following persons only are qualified to have their names entered on the list of electors of a rural school district or rural area of any school district, that is to say, (a) as owner-electors, British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years who and corporations which are owners of real property within the rural school district or rural area; (b) as resident-electors, British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years who are resident and who have resided continuously for not less than six months within the rural school district or rural area immediately prior to the submission of the declaration provided for in section 69, and whose names are not entered on the list as owner-electors; (c) as tenant-electors, British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years who and corporations which are and have been continuously, for not less than six months immediately prior to the submission of the declaration provided for in section 69, tenants in occupation of real property within the rural school district or rural area, and whose names or the names of which are not entered on the list as owner-electors or resident electors. 1958 c.42, s.66" also Section 77 of the above Act. "(1) Subject to and in accordance with the provisions of this Act, an owner-elector, a tenant-elector, or a resident elector is entitled to vote at an election of trustees or representatives. (2) Only owner-electors shall be entitled to vote on any question or by-law providing for the borrowing of money. 1958, c.42, s.77." Declarations may be secured from all post offices in the Gulf Islands, and must be in the School Board Office before five (5) o'clock on August 31st, 1963. Those persons who have already made declarations and whose names are on prior lists of electors will be circularized, and a letter of confirmation enclosed which should be returned to the School Board Office before five (5) o'clock on the thirty-first of August, 1963.
