**YOUNG PEOPLE  
FIGHT BACK**

An informal panel of 8 young people Monday night at the School discussed the topic, 'How We Should be Treated', before a group of about 50 parents and teenagers.

Sponsored by the P.T.A., the panel was made up of two students from each of grades 9 to 12. Included were Daryl Byron, Brian Rogers, Janet Haigh, Lorelei Nitsch, Gail Slingsby, Theresa Mollett, Ed Gilman and Jim Campbell.

Jim got the discussion underway by allegorically comparing treatment of young people to the repair kind of treatment you give a broken leg or the preservative type such as is done in keeping fruits edible.

He read the DRIFTWOOD editorial of November 14th, which he labelled biased. The panel proceeded to comment in detail on various issues in the article.

Though there was not total agreement among the panellists on many aspects of the discussion, they all seemed to agree with Gail when she stated that it is true that parents and teen-agers don't talk to each other. Asking why they can't talk, the young people answered their own question. They get a 'blank wall' treatment or are greeted with the comment, "What's happening to teen-agers these days?" They suggested that often they are not treated as people. Adults were accused of not listening to their opinions, often contradicting without really hearing. They classified parents as outside their world and acknowledged they prefer to discuss problems with their own age group.

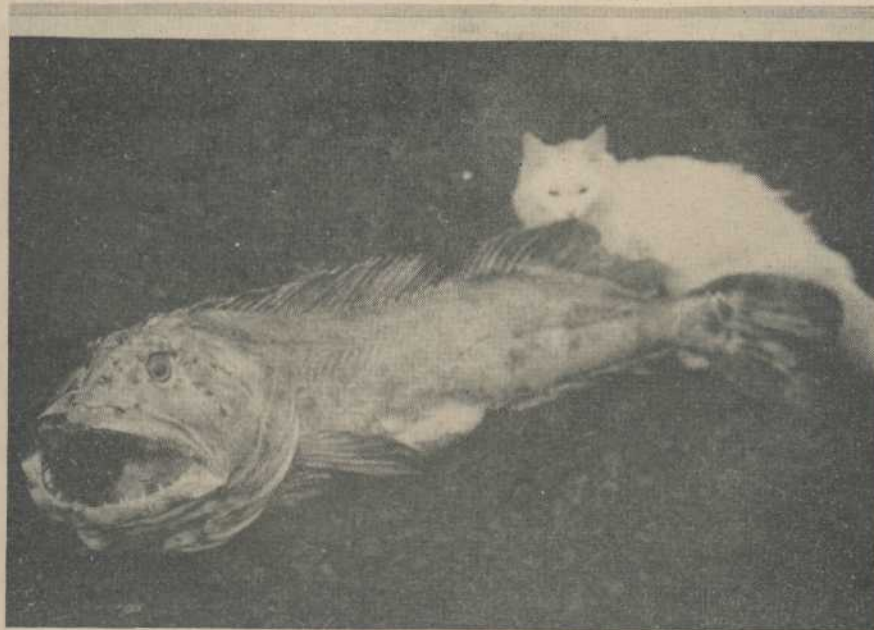

areas where young people and adults should be able to communicate. Topics involving extreme differences of opinion be avoided. Adults should talk to teen agers as if they are of the same age group.

A split of opinion developed when fad fashions were introduced to the discussion. Some panellists felt these signify a healthy expression of rebellion against authority. Others thought fads brand young people as idiots who can only follow the herd. When accused of wearing plus fours and zoot suits in their youth, the parents raised a storm of protest that plus fours were stylish before their teen years.

With good natured banter between audience and panel, the students brought out that some apparently rude acts on their part, come out of con-

sideration for the old folks—such as closing doors to cut down noise and trying to be responsible for the welfare and entertainment of their own guests.

Parents took a slap on the wrist when told that they often leave the TV on when young visitors arrive.

One pertinent fact the panel seemed to agree on was that they so often hear the phrase, "In my day - -"; as "In my day I walked 10 miles to school". Following this remark, if the young person wants to stroll in the rain he is asked, "Why? Where Are you going?" They seemed to infer inconsistency between what parents say, and how they act.

They reported that adults don't want them around and tend to go off and whisper in corners when they are present.

**REAL ESTATE SALES BRISK**

Sale of property on Salt Spring Island has maintained a constant and gradual growth over the past 5 years, says C.R. Horel, Salt Spring Lands. Direct ferry service to the mainland did not cause a boom in real estate, although sales for 1963 are up appreciably over last year.

Careful development has been the long term policy of local real estate firms. The steady but stable expansion of the Island had shown that their policy is a good one.

1963 has shown the best net volume of real estate sales since 1959, and is expected to exceed 1959 sales by a small margin.

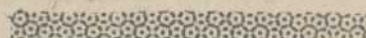

Dear Sir: " Enclosed is a cutting from the Vancouver Sun showing questions and answers.

Any local gardeners who may be interested can see an example of 'Mossy Rose Gall' on a rose-bush on the road side opposite the building partly occupied by Alec's Meat Market. This bush is a mass of globular balls somewhere between a golf ball and a tennis ball in size.

With regard to the wild gooseberry no doubt any old-timer can advise the locality of one or more of these bushes. In fifty-eight years partly on the S.C. mainland and partly on Vancouver Island I have never come across this gooseberry before and, as it is apparently unknown to the Vancouver Sun's gardener, possibly it is native only on Salt Spring Island or the Gulf Islands." (E.H. Smith sent a cutting to the Vancouver Sun gardener showing the parasitic growth on a rose bush and asked about a wild gooseberry with blooms similar to fuschias. He received the reply that the cutting was a perfect example of what is termed Mossy Rose Gall. The globular mass of moss-like filaments protects a cluster of hard cells each of which contains one larva. These galls show up first in June or July and the larvae remain in the cells until next spring. All this comes about from the reproductive ways of the gall wasp. Normally the trouble is a minor one and this is fortunate since there is no proven control except to cut away the infested portions and burn them.

The gardener asks for a sample of the bloom next year of the unusual flower of the wild gooseberry. He may be able to give further information then.)

**NEWS OF THE BLIND**

"Every day of the year six people lose their sight," said W.A. Tymchuk, Victoria CNIB official, in a recent address to the local chapter. About half the cases are caused by carelessness or through preventable causes, he said.

Mr. Tymchuk, who is himself sightless, gave the following definition of blindness as accepted in Canada, Great Britain and U.S.A.: "A blind person is one who must come within 20 feet or less to see what normal vision can see at 200 feet."

Only one-third of Canada's blind population is in receipt of the \$65 government monthly pension, granted only after stringent means test, said the speaker, noting that about half the blind people of Canada are over 65 years of age.

The most popular of CNIB services - all of which are free - is the library, which includes books in Braille and talking books. There is presently a changeover taking place from disc records to tape recordings, Mr. Tymchuk said, adding that this is the greatest advance in communication with the blind since Braille came into use.

The speaker said that of the 260 blind persons in Victoria, only 50 are under 60 years of age, but there is always a good turnout to CNIB meetings and recreational gatherings.

In answer to a question concerning the Eye Bank of Canada, Mr. Tymchuk said that donor cards are available for persons desiring to will their eyes to others threatened with blindness. Only 2% of blind people can benefit from a cornea transplant, which must be done within 12 hours of death, but there is a definite need of such donations, he said.

The speaker was warmly thanked by Mrs. V.C. Best, IODE regent.

### WHAT'S COOKING ON SALT SPRING?

by Elsie Worthington

A month from today we will be in the midst of final preparations for Christmas festivities. Why not make your cookies well in advance and get that much of your baking out of the way? Cookies made from the two recipes below—Kindly passed along by DRIFTWOOD readers—will be much enjoyed at the Christmas season; or indeed, at any time of the year. These cookies may be placed in the freezer after baking but will keep nicely for several weeks if stored in an airtight container.

Mrs. John Inglin, Beddis Rd. gave us the recipe for rich CHERRY SNOWBALLS: 1 cup butter; 1/4 cup icing sugar; 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour; 1 cup finely chopped almonds; 1/4 teas. salt; 1 teas. almond flavouring (or vanilla if preferred); 1/2 lb. candied cherries. Method: cream butter and sugar until fluffy; add remaining ingredients except cherries mixing well with hands; flatten small amount of dough for each cookie in palm of hand; place whole cherry in circle of dough; cover cherry by pinching dough up and around it; smooth the ball between hands. Bake at 325 degrees for about 35 minutes. While still hot roll in fine granulated sugar.

From Mrs. Joyce Roper (our typist) comes this recipe for delicious SANDWICH COOKIES: 3/4 cup butter or shortening (or part of each); 1 1/4 cups sugar; 2 eggs; 3 cups flour; 1 1/2 teas. salt; 2 teas. baking powder; 1 teas. vanilla. Method: Cream butter, sugar, eggs and vanilla together until light. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together and add to first mixture. Chill for one hour. Roll to 1/4 inch thickness on slightly floured board. Cut with round cutter or glass. The size of the glass governs the size of the cookie. (Mrs. Roper uses a small glass for tea cookies and medium size for children's parties or lunches). Bake in 350 degrees oven for 12 to 15 minutes. Cool. Put together with your favourite jam (raspberry or strawberry is Mrs. Roper's choice). Ice with white butter icing—1 cup of icing sugar is enough for this recipe. Decorate with a piece of candied cherry in the centre.

As you know, pocket books do not last for ever, and by the time they have been read by five or six men they are a bit part-worn, and likely to drop to pieces, so your replacements are more than welcome."

"I have told everyone how generous you have been over the years, and a letter of thanks for your many parcels of books was sent to the I.O.D.E. Headquarters in Toronto by the Adjutant-General, Major General W.A.B. Anderson, OBE, CD. I do so hope that you received that

message, as he was much impressed by all that I told him of your generosity and your thought for the Canadian soldiers over here in Germany."

"Please continue to think of them, and send us all the books you can spare, and I will acknowledge them with many thanks."

Shipments of books have been mailed regularly to Germany by Mrs. St. Denis who reports that the supply is now exhausted.

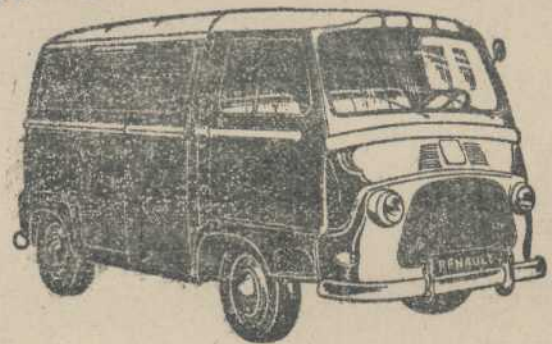
