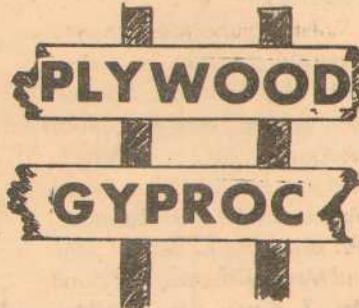

AIR MARSHAL, SIR PHILIP AND LADY LIVINGSTON

Morningside Road sees new residents settling in this month, in the home formerly owned by Oswald Heys, now of Victoria. B.C. The newcomers are Air Marshal Sir Philip and Lady Livingston, K.B.E.; C.B.; A.F.C.; F.R.C.S.; is a noted eye specialist and surgeon, and he is opening an office to start a new practice on Saltspring Island on December, 5th.

Sir Philip is also the author of his autobiography "Fringe of the Clouds." This tells the story of his career and life as an R.A.F. doctor, in a most entertaining and interesting way. Just at the moment there is an upheaval as workmen hurry the job of remodelling the home to suit the new owners.

Sir Philip had to step carefully over pieces of lumber to greet me and Lady Livingston waved her trowel at me - she was very busy sorting plants which she had brought from their garden at Qualicum, so it looks as if

er than his two brothers and three sisters.

He speaks of the old E. and N. railways and the forest fires that awed his childhood memories and he also tells about the poet Robert Service who was a constant visitor to their home, often playing whist with them.

Sir Philip attended the Cowichan Station School travelling by cart, buggy or by boot leather-frequently the latter.

His father, Clermont Livingston, was appointed General Manager of the Tye Copper Mine on Mount Sicker in 1901. After his death in 1907 serious changes came into the life of Sir Philip. He was a student at Skrimshaw School, and he went on from there to study to be a doctor.

Sir Philip was at Cambridge, and he was the first Canadian to row in the Oxford and Cambridge boat race in 1914 and, "we won that race" he said looking pleased. He then in 1915 joined the Royal Navy as a surgeon probationer.

Called the "young docs" these medical students were assigned to duty on board small vessels such as Torpedo destroyers, minesweepers, and merchant cruisers. Later on, they served on the "Q" boats. The first lesson he learned before boarding a ship, says Sir Philip was to never call His Majesty's ships BOATS!

The gloomiest part of Sir Philip's autobiography is where he writes about his battle with the waves - he was very, very sea sick! This fact brought the "young

Sir Philip was enthusiastic about his new home "Fulford Harbour is a very beautiful place, and we chose it for that reason and because it is quiet" he said.

He is writing his second book which will be about "Tofino Road" and expects to get it published in 1966.

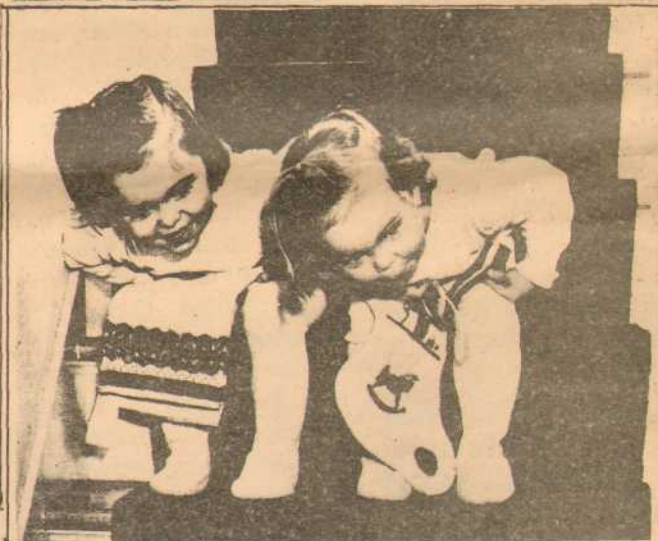

FULFORD-a number of residents of Fulford met at the Fulford Hall on Wednesday evening to decide on a project for the 1967 Centenary. All 17 present would like to see a project for both ends, of Saltspring, to accommodate all peoples.

As this was only a preliminary meeting, it was decided to contact all local clubs, and more of the residents, and to discuss ideas and decide on a definite project at a later meeting. Mrs. M. Gyves, president of the Fulford Hall Committee was in the chair. The Committee will contact other clubs and arrange the next meeting.

Two ideas have been put forward - one is the Indian Reserve as a park but this is thought to be out of the question at present, for many reasons (too difficult to obtain Title and too expensive are two reasons.) The next is more practical and one that is needed - that the project be the new entrance to the Fulford Hall. "People from all over the Island come to the sports events here and sometimes there isn't room to handle all the young people on roller skating nights," said Bob Akerman, one of the key men on the Hall Activities.

Major M. H. Holmes, Secretary of the S. S. I. Centennial Committee, spoke of the work of the committee and answered questions.

The Federal and Provincial Governments each put up \$1 per capita, and this is matched by each resident, in the district, who put up \$1.40 each. With about 500 people in the Fulford Area those present thought that money should be spent in the area. "\$1,000 would go a long way towards getting the entrance built," Mr. Akerman said. This idea will be put to the people if they turn out to the next meeting. (the .40¢ out of the \$1.40 goes on adminis-

COMMUNITIES IN B.C.
RECEIVING CENTENNIAL
GRANTS NOW**

The first application for Provincial Centennial grant for administration and programming was received from the Rossland Centennial Committee and was quickly followed by five others from Committees in Oyama, Nelson, Malaspina, McConnell Creek and Alberni, reports Deputy Provincial Secretary, L.J. Wallace, who is also General Chairman of British Columbia's Canadian Confederation Centennial Committee.

The Provincial government is contributing 40 cents per capita for administration and programming, of which 10 cents is payable now; 10 cents in November, 1965 and 20 cents in November, 1966. These payments are in addition to Federal and Provincial grants that will be made for acceptable centennial projects.

Mr. Wallace reports that there are 230 Centennial Committees organized in B.C. and each of these can apply for the administration grants.

In planning centennial projects, the Committees have a great deal of latitude, but there are some limitations. The purchase of equipment, such as ambulances, fire engines, etc., an acceptable project in the 1958 Centennial will not be approved for the 1967 Celebrations.

Additions to existing structures may be accepted but, in general, improvements of existing facilities is not likely to be approved.

Mr. Wallace also stressed that careful planning for centennial programming for 1966 and 1967 must be underway now.

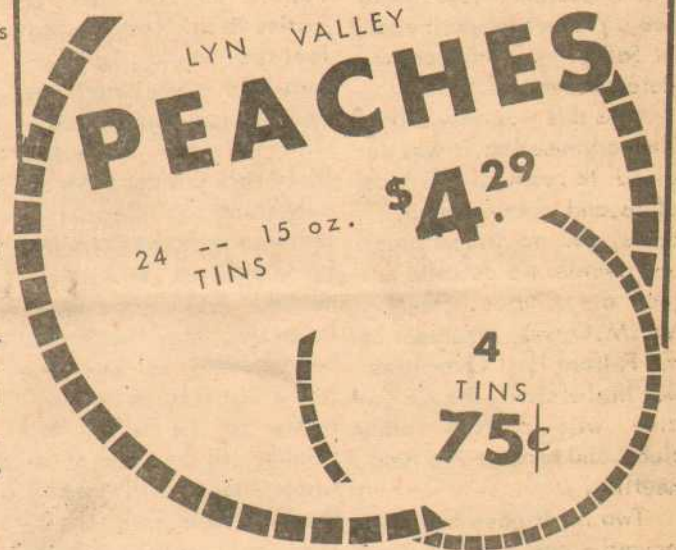
