### GOVERNMENT SHARE OF SCHOOL COSTS ONLY 9.71%

School District No. 64 (Gulf Islands) has received approval of its 1964 budget from the Dept. of Education. The total is \$297,652, which is an increase over 1963 of roughly \$29,000. This increase is made up of \$13,700 in teachers' salaries, and \$5,600 in increases and additions to the non-teaching staff. The balance of the increase in the 1964 budget, namely \$10,000, consists of additional maintenance, equipment, administration and other expenses. The increase in pupil enrollment over 1963 is 8.76%, the assessment has gone up 11.5% and the mill rate is 21.38, or 1.75 over 1963, although the provincial average mill rate is 23.41.

As a result of the additional homeowners grant of \$15, there will be no appreciable increase in taxes for those owning property with an assessed value up to the \$10,000 range.

The Queen of the Islands will be out of service for 2 weeks starting April 27 for annual re-fitting. On Thursday May 7 she will be back on regular 3 round trips daily. Meanwhile, the 7 a.m. boat from Swartz Bay will call at Village Bay at 7:55 and the 9 a.m. from Swartz will call at Sturdies Bay at 10:05 a.m. both for Tsawwassen. Similar service will be instituted from the Tsawwassen terminal in the evening when the 7 p.m. from Tsawwassen calls at Village Bay at 8:10 p.m. and the 9 p.m. from Tsawwassen calls at Sturdies Bay at 9:55 p.m. both for Swartz Bay.

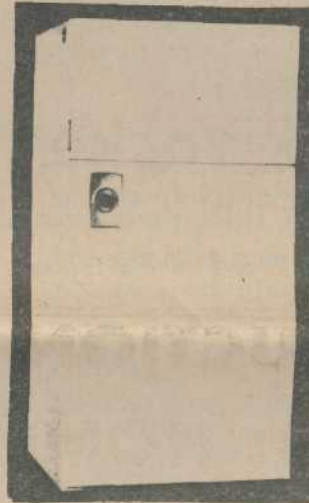

We reprint this editorial in view of the current unprecedented activity in the Toronto Exchange.

## Toronto stock racket

Once again rackets are underway on the Toronto Stock Exchange.

Companies with very small material assets and many without assets of any kind are changing hands at valuations of hundreds of thousands of dollars because they have listings on the Toronto Stock Exchange.

The formula of the promoters is to buy control of one of these companies and then acquire some kind of mining prospect.

It is then that the "boiler shop" operators go to work.

Hundreds of thousands of shares have been traded in a matter of days—frequently the equivalent of more than the entire capitalization of the company.

Some of these shares that have been acquired by the promoters at 4c or 5c per share, in a short time frequently are traded at 500 to 1,000% more than the price they were acquired by the promoters.

The Toronto Stock Exchange does not appear concerned as long as they have members who are interested in this type of business.

The Ontario Securities Commission should put a stop to these practices and insist upon a complete overhaul of the Toronto Stock Exchange methods. In the meantime investors should be wary of buying any of these high volume trading stocks no matter what glowing reports are broadcast.

The promoters are not inexperienced in selling such wares.

In fairness, we should say that the executive officers of the Toronto Stock Exchange are more gullible than dishonest.

The president is an ex-army officer who has, as far as can be ascertained, no qualifications whatsoever for the position he holds. Most of his assistants appear to be within the same category.

**WHO'S WHO AMONGST THE FLOWER BOXES**

There is quite a story behind the flower boxes of Salt Spring Island. It all started at Fulford some 12 years ago, in 1953, the year after Mr. and Mrs. A.E. Roddis came to live in their pretty little home in the corner above the docks. Mrs. Roddis at that time lamented the drab and unglamorous surroundings down by the wharf, and she suggested putting up flower boxes along the docks.

Mrs. G. Maude, who is a go-getter and likes to get things done, took up the suggestion and with a little co-operation and a lot of action among the enthusiastic residents, things started a-popping.

Mrs. Mary (Girvin) Gurney, who at that time ran the Coffee Bar, offered several of her old flower boxes to the community. Capt. Maude stepped in and made an extra box and so project Flower Box was launched.

The boxes were set up along the dock-side and that spring the first Salt Spring Island Flower Boxes brought surprise and beauty to greet those who came and went, and stayed.

The idea grew along with the plants, and each season, flowers brightened the way-side. But boxes do not last forever and new ones were needed. Now, for some years, the little Christophers had been the clean-up gang around Fulford, supervised by the same beauty minded ladies. When their club disbanded, there was a little cash left over. This was collected for the specific purpose of beautifying or tidying the district. So it bought lumber for new boxes. L. Cruickshank of Vesuvius Bay brought nail and hammer and put the boxes together. And last year, owing to working men and a few 'rams' from parking cars, one box had to be replaced. C. Horel sent down the lumber needed, (compliments of the Chamber of Commerce, thank you kindly) and Bob Patterson set the box up, and filled it with good earth from his chicken yard. Bob had done this ever since the boxes made

their first debut in '53, and has been, and still is, the chief supplier of elbow grease when labour is needed. He has the deep gratitude of the ladies who in turn supply the beauty in more ways than one. Mrs. Roddis has been generous with loads of compost and plants: other plants were donated but most are purchased. So the beauty treatment of Fulford goes on. A community is only as good as the people make it, and those people of Fulford are doing their tidy bit.

They have a sort of informally organized pact that the neighbours go two at a time, to keep the plants watered and in good condition. And they end up with a glamour treatment each season when all hands get out with pick and shovel, broom and what-have-you. Then they snip and sweep, rake and hoe, until the docks and highway shine with cleanliness after a final wash down with the fire hoses (Bob Patterson again, with Fred Hollings, usually handling the hoses). But that is a story in itself.

Fulford's flower box idea was catching and our good neighbours in Ganges responded to the spirit of beauty, & many flower boxes sprang up along the waterfront. They were very beautiful, and have been blooming now for two seasons at least. The C of C

is behind the Ganges project and now one wonders if uvius & Long Harbour couldn't respond with a like scheme? A delightful floral welcome to all who travel to the Island! This could well be a

**ORAL POLIO VACCINE**

Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine will be available for the second time, free of charge, to the people of Greater Victoria, during the week of April 27 to May 1. It was first offered in Nov. 1963, when 45,457 people, or 2% of the population, received the vaccine.

It is considered advisable for all individuals to receive a minimum of 3 doses of Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine. It is expected that another offering will be made in the Fall, and annually thereafter.

Students in School districts 61, 62, 63 & 64 for whom consents have been signed will receive the vaccine at school during the week of April 27. If consents were signed for students last Oct. no further consent is needed for the April dose.

The people of Greater Victoria are invited to attend the special clinic starting April 27th, 1964 and are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to protect themselves and their families against poliomyelitis. It is

hoped that a high percentage of the pre-school population and the adult population will take advantage of the administration of this vaccine.
