NONAGENARIAN CELEBRATES 93 YEARS.



Mrs. Ethel Wilson, long time resident of Salt Spring Island celebrated her 93rd birthday on June 30th with a family get-together.

Mrs. Wilson was born Ethel Crowe and came to Salt Spring from London, Eng. in October, 1908. She came to visit her aunt and uncle, Col. and Mrs. B.V. Layard who lived at Rainbow Beach, and stayed a lifetime.

With her arrival, Mr. & Mrs. Layard journeyed to

Victoria to meet her. On the return trip by steamer from Victoria, the boat was delayed three days with engine trouble. They arrived at Vesuvius late at night, too late to navigate the two miles or so to Rainbow Beach just south of Vesuvius. So they stayed overnight at the Vesuvius Hotel, at that time known as Bittancourt's.

The next morning they found a rather decrepit row-boat that had two oars of dif-

LONG HARBOUR PARK PLANS STALLED

Plans and aspirations for the long heralded Long Harbour Park received a rude jolt this week with the news that it won't be completed this year.

The Honorable W. Kiernan, Minister of Recreation and Conservation stated in a telephone interview with Driftwood that plans call for extensive renovation of the site requiring some time to complete. Mr. Kiernan stated he planned to visit the site on Wednesday to see what could be done to temporarily relieve the critical need for some kind of accommodation facilities at Long Harbour for island visitors this year. He stated he is anxious to at least have the site cleaned up and tables and benches installed as a temporary measure.

According to Mr. Kiernan, his department plans to undertake a major job of bulldozing, levelling and terracing at the site, as well as construction of a retaining wall along the bank of Well-ferent lengths & zig-zagged their way to "Riverdale" as Rainbow Beach was then known.

Col. Crofton also reports that he phoned Victoria yesterday to lodge a complaint about the conditions at Mout and Maxwell Parks. It was reported that no wood was available, no garbage had been collected and that the sites were in generally untidy condition. As a result the Department has re-appointed Mr. Jack Netterfield as Parks Supervisor to remedy the situation.

EDITORIAL

... OF HORSELESS CARRIAGES

It seems to us decidedly unfair that people unfortunate enough to have a serious car accident necessarily must be charged with some traffic infraction in order that insurance coverage comes into force. We understand this is the case in our province, whether or not the person involved is guilty. Apparently, according to this regulation, there is no such thing as an "accident", pure and simple, where circumstances show that no one can properly be blamed.

We suppose the only reason for such unfairness is the fact that insurance companies do not like to lose money. If no one is to blame in an accident then they (the insurance company) cannot claim for damages paid out to satisfy insurance requirements.

Last week such an accident happened on North End Road where the only apparent fault was not the people involved, but the road itself. There are many such hazards on our island where to drive a car at all is a fault. Blind corners, too narrow curves where it is impossible for two ordinary sized cars to pass abreast. In this particular spot, (we drove over it after the accident) there is actually no way to safely negotiate this stretch without the use of a flagman out in front to warn of any on-coming vehicle.

Must we Islanders, who pay road and gasoline tax the same as other citizens, be relegated in our driving to the days when it was legally required that a flagman with a lantern precede the "horseless carriage" down the public highway to warn horses, cows and people of its awful approach?

During the summer months, more and more people are visiting our island - people who are not used to horse and buggy roads thus increasing the hazards both to residents and visitors alike.

We understand that the offending stump which was largely responsible for the tragic accident last week is in process of removal. (The wheels grind exceedingly slow).

DRIFTWOOD would like to hear about other island road hazards of this kind, of which we are sure there are many, in order that we can promote action on a more reasonable road maintenance program. Let's hear from your end of the road!

DRIFTWOOD has just learned that Mr. Frank Valdez, one of the principals in last week's accident on North End Road has in fact been charged by RCMP here with a traffic infraction therewith.

He is charged under Section 146-A of the Motor Ve-

hicle Act which states he was driving on the left hand side of the road. This road at the point of the accident is too narrow for a double lane. To get around the blind corner, it is impossible to avoid being on the wrong side without driving into the stump to the right of the road.

SYMPHONY PLUS

A concert of unusual importance was held in the Queen Elizabeth Theatre, Vancouver, on June 22. It heralded the opening of a campaign by citizens of vision and imagination to accumulate a fund of \$450,000, to put the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra on a sound financial basis within the next three years and ultimately to place B.C. well and truly on the international musical map. The concert was sponsored by the 'Vancouver Sun', with the co-operation of the Recording Industries Trust Fund, the Musicians Union Local 145 & the Vancouver Symphony Society. The concert was free to 2800 people in the theatre and was relayed to an overflow audience outside and on closed TV circuits.


On the initiative of Mr. Stuart Keate, publisher of the 'Sun', a handsome contribution of \$12,000 has already been made towards this goal and a member of the orchestra, working privately, has collected a further \$1000. Team work of this description cannot go wrong and it is certain the target will be reached. The use of the Queen E. was donated by the City of Vancouver.

Some of the old-timer concert-goers in the audience remembered with nostalgia the promenade concerts given by the late Sir Henry Wood, in the old Queens Hall, London, England and their continuance in the same glorious tradition in the Albert Hall, Kensington. It was comforting to find an identical atmosphere reproduced in Vancouver, reminiscent of the Queens Hall or any other of the famous concert halls of Europe. There was the same genuine enjoyment by the audience. It is probable some of the listeners would be incapable of rendering a recognisable version of the 'Colonel Bogey' march with the aid of a tooth comb and

tissue paper but this is a feature of symphony, it is neither essential to be highbrow nor to be a professional musician to appreciate the performance of the brilliant orchestra rehearsed and inspired by Mr. Meredith Davies, the resident musical director and conductor.

The guest conductor was Mr. Otto Werner-Mueller, of the Victoria Symphony Orchestra and Dean of the Faculty of Music, Victoria University a lanky giant of six feet five of musical genius. His sensitive but spirited interpretation of 'The Moldau' by Smetana would have born comparison with any of the world known Czech orchestras. The audience was quick to show appreciation. In fact, at the conclusion of the concert Mr. Werner Mueller received no less than seven curtain calls. In addition to winning the last ounce of effort from the orchestra, he won his audience completely, the hall-mark of the great conductor.

WHAT'S COOKING ON SALT SPRING?

by Elsie Worthington

Among the many recipes for that good old standby - Spanish rice - that have been tried out in my kitchen, the following is the most favoured: **SPANISH RICE:** Fry 3/4 cup uncooked rice in 4 tablesp. cooking oil or bacon fat over medium heat, stirring frequently, until lightly browned. Add 2 small to medium onions, chopped, and fry 5 minutes longer. Into 1/2 cup water stir 1 teas. worcester sauce, 1 teas. sugar and 1/2 teas. salt. Add this mixture and one 20 oz. can tomato juice to the rice. Blend well; cover and simmer gently for 30 minutes or until rice is tender; stirring occasionally. Serve with bacon or sausages. Makes six servings.
