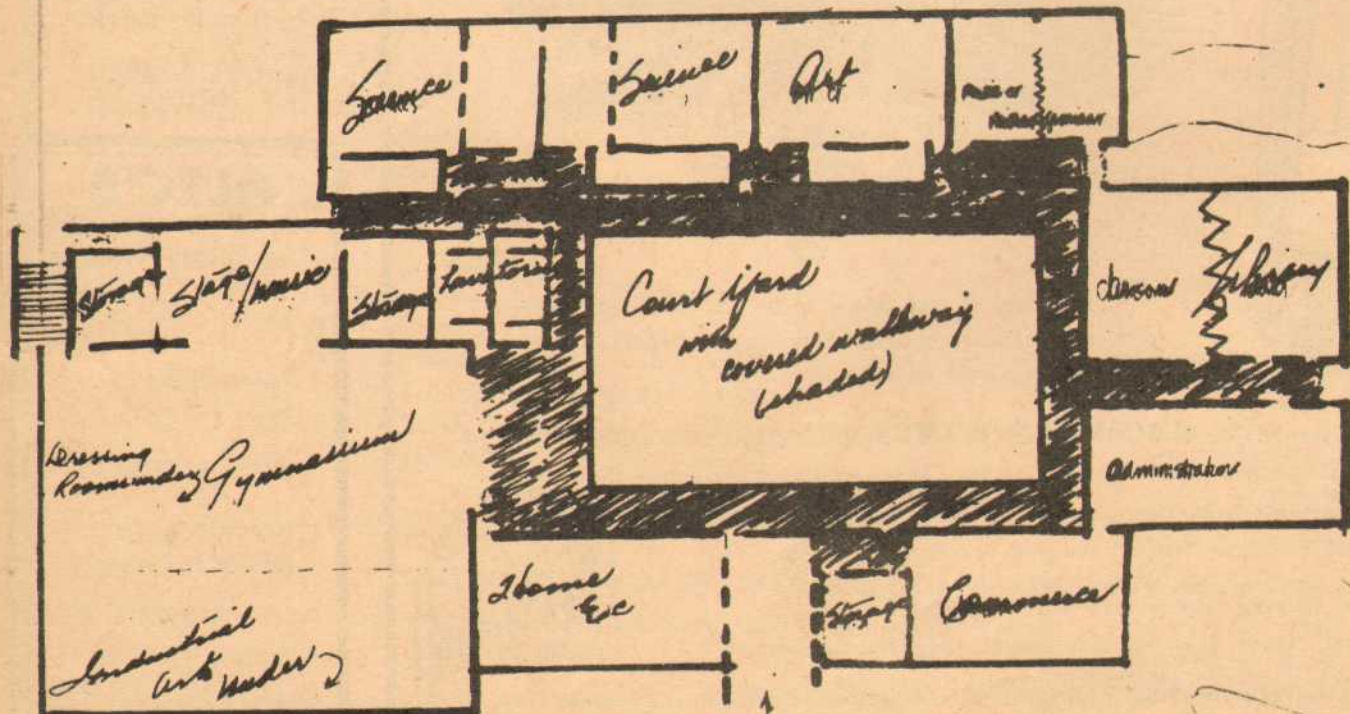
ed by the local Sea Cadet Corps and the Girl Guides.

SCHOOL BOARD STUDIES
WORKING DRAWINGS
OF NEW SCHOOL

Heralding the final drawings of the new Gulf Islands Secondary School were several schematic drawings of the new building exhibited at the regular board meeting last week.

While a basic plan emerges, there were several schemes submitted, all embodying a new departure in school design, an inner courtyard surrounded by a walkway covered over at the roof.

The attached drawing was taken from one of these designs. This is not the final plan but one similar to this appeared to be favoured by (Cont'd. to P. 2, Col. 1)

the board. It embodies this basic design with the various rooms built somewhat separately around a covered

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walkway surrounding the courtyard which is to be landscaped using an existing arbutus tree in the centre at the height of the site.

Classrooms for sciences, art, academic commerce, home economics and industrial arts lie around a perimeter of a rectangle with the library and administra-

tion areas at one end and a gymnasium - auditorium at the other.

A provision for a separate library and plenty of storage space has been included. The library is to have a folding partition that can be closed off for use as an extra classroom. The stage area of the large gymnasium is also designed to be used as a classroom when required.

Dressing rooms for gym classes and drama productions, as well as the Industrial Arts section will be located under the gymnasium on a basement level.

Extra storage areas front each classroom on the

Salt Spring Island border of the covered walkway. The covered walkway is shown in the above drawing shaded over surrounding the courtyard.

R. W. Siddall, Architect for the new school attended the meeting to explain and interpret the drawings to the board.

Considerable discussion was held on the advisability or otherwise of students having to pay fees for their final government examinations. Reports of the various committees were heard.

The Building and Grounds committee reported that the recent painting contract had now been completed satisfactorily and

A request that the new teacherage at Galiano be proceeded with was approved and referred to the Committee for action.

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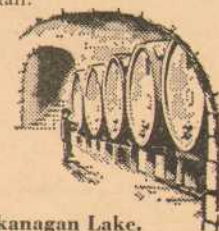

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EDITORIAL

A Centennial project for Salt Spring Island was approved last week when our local committee submitted their plan to the Chamber of Commerce meeting. The Park Project for the boat basin located in Ganges Harbour was chosen as an effort which is a fitting recognition of our nation's hundredth birthday.

This decision did not come about without a great deal of hard work and grinding negotiations by the Committee. As you will recall, early last summer you were asked by the Committee to submit ideas and suggestions for a Centennial Project. All these suggestions and plans and ideas were given to the Committee who have since that time, spent many hours studying the possibilities of each, within the scope of our possible funds and significance to the community in the years to come. Yes, these chaps even hiked over most of the area mentioned in order that they may have first hand knowledge of each idea for a project. They also investigated the possibilities of your ideas from point of view of feasibility of acquiring property and completing the project in time for the Centennial celebration.

In the almost 100 years Canada has been a nation, so much has happened, so many things have changed, we wonder if that group of men who planned Confederation could possibly have visualized, even in their most enthusiastic dreams, what has come of their work.

Many of us, whose fathers and grandfathers settled this harsh and wild new country during the last century, know from family tales, at least, just what it meant to struggle against tremendous odds to eke a living and carve a farm and home from the land.

We forget, in our present day comfort, that just over 60 years ago settlers were being wooed to western Canada as that great unifying rail line was pushed out from the older more settled Upper and Lower Canada. We forget that these people, our immediate forefathers, were the very ones who, within a hundred years built a strong virile and prosperous country over thousands of miles of wild land.

Our hundredth birthday is a milestone in our short history that should be marked with some reverence for these great ancestors of ours and marked also with some dignified and useful project so that the generations who follow us and benefit from our Centennial commemorative project, will perhaps stop once in awhile to think of the many people who have made it possible for them to live in comfort in a beautiful land, where they have good possibilities to receive fair reward for whatever effort they may wish to make.

We would like to thank the Centennial Committee for Salt Spring Island for the work they are doing. They have chosen a project. Some of us will agree with their decision and some of us will not. But has any one of us studied all the possible projects with the care and attention that the Committee did? The project is one that conforms to the requirements of both the senior levels of government for Centennial and it is one that cannot fail to beautify and add to the enjoyment of both visitors and residents alike on the Island.

The decision has been made. Now let's all get behind it and make the Centennial Celebration on Salt Spring Island one that will be a fitting recognition of Canada's first hundred years.

Isn't it a shame that we won't be able to look forward to the celebration of Canada's two hundredth birthday?
