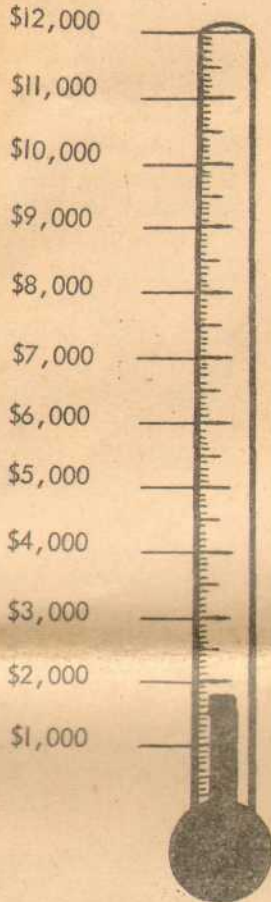

**ART YOUNG SPEAKS ON
SANSUM BRIDGE PLAN**

Art Young, local garage and filling station operator, and long time promoter of a bridge over Sansum Narrows to connect the island with Vancouver Island recently interviewed the Reeve and councillors of Cowichan. He was given an interested hearing and the meeting resulted in strong support for the plan.

Reeve Morton of North Cowichan municipality, has been quoted as saying that the time has come when the plan to connect the two districts should be given serious consideration.

Mr. Young has made a long term study of such a scheme and says that a bridge of about 1600 feet in length would be all that is necessary, together with a 2-1/2 mile approach from the base of Lee's Hill. A further 1-1/2 mile link would be needed on the Sansum point side to link up with existing roads there and finally connect with the island highway between Victoria and Duncan.

**GANGES RESIDENTS MOVE ON
SEWER QUESTION**

Action towards a sewage district was taken by a good representative group of Ganges residents and merchants at a public meeting held in Mahon Hall last Friday evening. The meeting appointed a committee to investigate and procure a feasibility survey as to costs and design of a system to serve the immediate Ganges Village.

The meeting also recommended that a secondary survey be made of a possible larger sewage area encompassing that general drainage area emptying into Ganges Harbour. This would include residents and new construction at the head of the harbour as far as the Lady Minto Hospital and up Ganges Hill in the other direction, possibly as far as the Cranberry Road.

C. Horel outlined the problem and reviewed the initial preparation that had brought about the meeting, then turned the meeting over to the resource people from the Greater Victoria Health Department and the Water Rights Branch of the Provincial Government.

Mr. Horel said that an initial engineering study would cost about \$1000 and preliminary studies of the cost at this point indicated an individual user assessment of about \$5 per month. He said the feasibility study done by competent engineers would be paid for by a \$25 pledge put up by individuals. If the sewage plan goes through to completion, this cost would be absorbed into the total cost of the project. He stated that the objective of the meeting was to decide on the initial feasibility study so that further information would be available to residents on which to base their decision whether or not to go ahead with the plan.

Dr. J. Whitbread, Medical Director of the Greater Victoria Health Board cited the history of the sewage problem in the Ganges area stating the problem here was equally as serious as any in the Victoria or Sa-

nich areas and that these areas had either put in a sewage system or were going ahead to do so. He stated the current map of Ganges area has at the present time at least 30/40 points of serious contamination on it due to faulty sewage disposal. This was abnormally high.

He stated that an alternative to the sewage system would be for the health department to require that all septic tanks be brought up to minimum standards, at the expense of the individual residents. This would cost more than the sewage system.

Mr. Benham, another Health Department representative stated that the time had long past when something must be done to correct this contamination if only from a health point of view. He said the diseases attributable to this hazard may not be killers but they can cause serious havoc. He said, "co-operative correction is cheapest while individual correction is by far the most expensive".

Mr. Kerr, Water Comptrollers Office, stated that there were three parts to a sewage system such as was being contemplated. One was a system of collection by gravity lines, the treatment of the raw sewage in a suitable treatment plant and the provision of a sewage outfall far enough out in the harbour to eliminate any possible further contamination. He stated the whole project could be partially financed through the use of Government loans that were available for such projects. Use of N.H.A. provisions which could provide up to

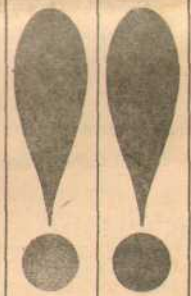

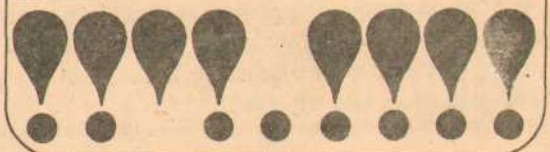

Art Young provided the punch line to last Friday's meeting in stating that, "We've got sewage by the tail on a down-hill pull!"

We made a trip on it last Saturday and Sunday evenings and were impressed with the careful technique required to bring this big vessel into a Small Dock. IN THE HOUSE

The long awaited second reading of the Bill to retire George E.P. Jones came up on Tuesday evening. This debate had started two weeks earlier but was adjourned at dinner time, and the Government never got around to bringing it back. In the meantime, the NDP, M.L.A.'s had time to discuss it further in caucus and to arrive at a course of action.

The essence of our discussion was that if the government refused to give us any reason for firing Mr. Jones, then we could not vote intelligently either for or against the principle of the Bill. Those of our members who spoke during the debate constantly urged upon the government that we should be given background information. We should know why Mr. Jones is being retired and we owed him an opportunity to present his defence.

In my opinion, it was not Mr. Jones who was on trial in our consideration of this Bill, but rather the Legislature itself. As Chairman of the Purchasing Commission, Mr. Jones can only be fired by the Legislature and if we are to take our responsibilities seriously we cannot consider such a Bill without being given background information.

As we discussed this matter in caucus, we came to the conclusion that if the Government persisted in its determination to give us no information, then we could not vote either for or against the principle of the Bill in second reading. As long as we are in the House, we have no option but to vote when a division is called. The conclusion we reached then, was that our Leader would announce that we could not vote on such a Bill, and we would proceed to file out of the House until this matter had been settled.

There will be some further discussion on this bill, section by section, in committee stage, and we will take part in this and there will also be the final formal third reading of the Bill.

human rights of the individual and leaves the man's name, in spite of the acquittal in court, under a cloud of doubt and suspicion.

This is benevolent dictatorship with even some real doubt about the benevolence.

Legislation is still being introduced, but a great deal of important legislation was presented to us weeks ago and we have been discussing it intermittently ever since.

Last Thursday night the Premier announced that on the Friday we would discuss public Bills, and would then go on to Estimates of the Minister of Municipal Affairs. We had two sessions each on Monday and Tuesday and all devoted to Bills. Some of the most controversial Bills that have been presented to us so far are those concerned with Medical Grants, Parks, the Jones Case and the Provincial Bank. The Medical Grants Bill has been through Committee stage and is, in effect, completed, the other three named have been through second reading, which is the general debate on principle, so that they too, are well on the way to completion.

I think the readers of this column might be interested in hearing more about several of the Bills that we have discussed, and I intend to write at least a few columns after the House has prorogued. If readers of this column have any questions or comments, or have any topics that they would like me to deal with, I would be very happy to hear from them.
