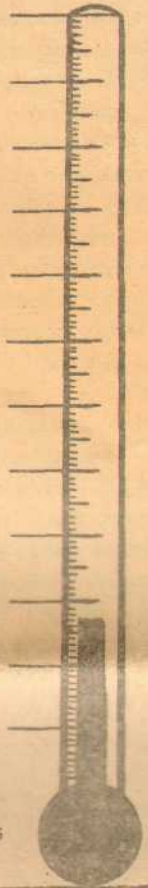

SCHOOL BOARD AND PARENTS HEAR VIEWS

ON SEX EDUCATION

Dr. G.P. Evans, Assistant Medical Health Officer, Greater Victoria Board of Health, spoke to a good turnout of parents and school officials last Thursday evening in Mahon Hall. Dr. Evans has been lecturing on Sex Education to high school students in the Victoria schools on the request of parents. He was here to present his approach and methods to the local authorities with a view to the possibilities of similar activity in the local school.

Dr. Evans feels along with many others that the matter of sex education is primarily a parental responsibility. He said his approach is basically to assist parents in doing a better job. The classes held in the Victoria Schools are held with the written permission of parents outside of the regular school hours.

Dr. Evans presented a brief outline of the material covered in three lectures which have been given to high school students. The first session is devoted to an introduction to the topic, covering the background evolution of the species to reproduction by sex. In this section is a discussion of the reason for families bringing children from dependency to independence, protecting, shielding and educating.

The second lecture has to do with the actual explanation of the anatomy (structure) and physiology (operation of the sexual organs). What is involved in conception and sex activity, the way the baby grows and develops during pregnancy and what is involved in the birth of a child.

The third lecture takes the form of a discussion of the social significance and conventions surrounding male-female relationships. What is involved and the reasons for a social and moral code which surrounds this phase of human behaviour.

The meeting wound up with a lively discussion of

the above approach with some parents very much in favour of having the course put on locally and some feeling that the matter should be left strictly to the home. The opinion that such a course should only be given by a qualified physician was suggested while some felt that qualified school counselors might be appropriate to conduct such a course.

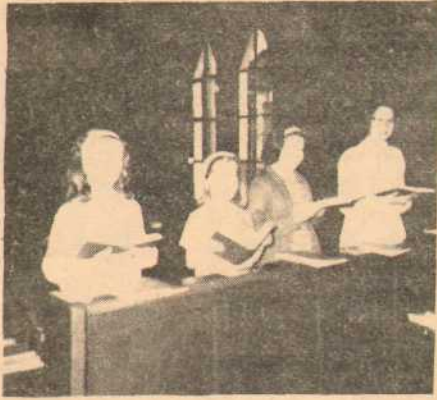

EASTERS

Little Angels? Maybe! But these are some of the Junior Choir practising for the Easter hymns to be sung on Easter Sunday service at St. Mary's Anglican Church in Fulford.

It was just 71 years ago that this Church was built, and its founder was a man who made history wherever he set his feet, from Ontario to the Coast -- The Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, well known to the pioneers and his descendents, some of whom live on Saltspring Island and Vancouver Island.

And this Easter Week, St. Mary's Church stands with the rest of the pioneer Churches on Saltspring, a land mark and monument not only to the pioneer clergy, but to the people who helped to build and carry the burden of the diocese through all these years.

Times have changes, the Church has been modernized, the Clergy's views have changed and advances with the times, and only history hasn't changed. That rem-

ains with the Church, and in memory's book somewhere are written the names of the past missionaries, who have left the community a history to be proud of.

And in a Church, one doesn't expect anything spectacular to happen. People come and go, get Baptized, married and buried. It is a place of peace and quiet, where one can commune with God and forget the materialistic world for a spell, and listen to the Junior Choirsinging the Easter Hymns.

The most excitingly unexpected episode, which is now a part of the Church history, was the wee mouse that dropped into see the Bishop a few years back - that was the closest the Church ever came to a stampe de la femme.

The Rev. Mr. Wilson wrote much of the history of the Island which would certainly have been lost otherwise. In 1894 he estimated the population at 450 of various nationalities. 160 English Canadians, 501 Scottish, 20 Irish, 22 Port-

uguese, 13 Swedes, 4 Germans, 2 Norwegians, 34 Americans, 90 mixed Indians, 40 colored people, 6 Sandwich Islanders, one cannibal, 10 Japanese, 1 Egyptian, 2 Greeks, and 1 Patagonian. (Old Bill Homier, called Kanaka Bill, was considered a Cannibal from the Sandwich Islands)

Today there are 2500 people on Saltspring, coming and going, and NO cannibals!

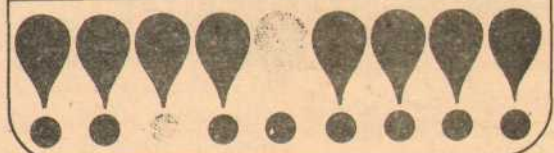
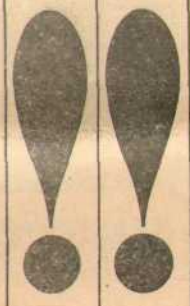

At this time all that existed of the cabin were four walls and a roof. A fire was built in the centre of the earth floor this night, and the sailors having sawn several blocks from a tree some distance from the cabin formed a relay, throwing the blocks as far as they could from one to another in true sailor fashion. One of the thrown blocks struck Jo at the cabin door. He was almost instantly killed.

All of the party felt so badly over the loss of their pet, that they returned over Beddis Mountain to the ship and had the carpenter make a cross of teak and carve the inscription. Then back over the trail they went with the cross and erected it over Jo's grave.

This same cross is on private property, and the various owners down through the years are to be commended for it's continued preservation.

Many historical points of interest on this Island are privately owned; and while a written history of them should be kept, and their owners have a duty in their preservation, yet it is unfortunate that once the public

is allowed access to private property they abuse the owner's privacy.

Perhaps one day a branch of the Native Sons or Native Daughters of B.C. could be formed, to assist in preserving or acquiring local historic sites as they become available.

NAVAL MASCOT "JO" KILLED 75 YEARS AGO

Among the many interesting landmarks on Salt Spring Island, linking us with the past of the Royal Navy once stationed in this area, is that of a small grave on property near Cusheon Lake.

On this grave is a cross made of teakwood inscribed "Jo, Dog of H.M.S. Acorn April 16th, 1890."

This seventy fifth anniversary seems a fitting time to keep alive the memory of one of several historic sites which should continue to be preserved for all time on this island.

The following account of the accident to this ships mascot was given years ago by a Mr. Robertson, owner of the property, who was living on the Island at the time the cross was erected.

During the 80's and 90's

Esquimalt Naval Station was the only manned base of Gt. Britain on the Western Pacific Coast; and the ship Acorn stationed there, used Ganges Harbour for a target practice area. The officers and men naturally got acquainted with the Island residents, and with the Beddis family in particular.

Hearing of the splendid fishing at Cusheon Lake just over Beddis Mountain, they were frequent visitors to the spot.

In 1886 a cabin had been built at the lake by the Tolson brothers, who lived there until about 1888. Shortly, after all of the doors, windows, flooring and ceiling were removed by someone, leaving but a shell of the cabin. In this state it was used by many fishing parties including the officers and men of H.M.S. Acorn.

We now come to Jo and his death on April 16th 1890. He was a Skye Terrier

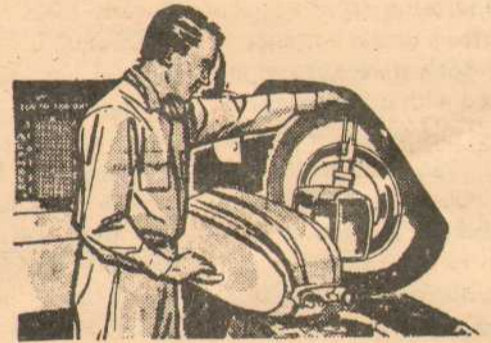

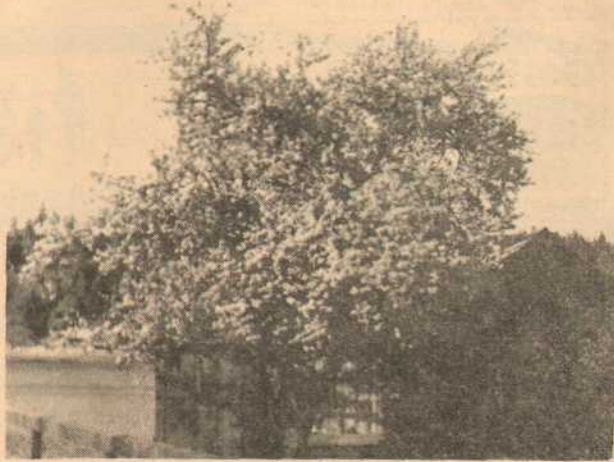

LIONS CLUB**

Letters of gratitude and detailed reports on distributions of food and sewing equipment to hundreds of neediest families in two provinces of Colombia, South America, are being shared by the Salt Spring Island Lions Club, which helped in the success of the 1964 CARE project sponsored by Lions District 19.

With Lions Clubs of Colombia serving as emissaries for District 19, 7454 CARE Food Crusade packages went to more than 1500 families, and 36 needle trade kits and 10 sewing machines are aiding training programs for youth and the elderly.

The International project was one of the most auspicious Lions-to-Lions relief programs conducted by the service organization throughout the U.S. and Canada. Lions International is one of

26 member agencies of the overseas relief agency.

Colombian Lions devoted months of effort to the distribution, working with CARE's American representatives to check relief lists, visit the poorest of housing areas, getting many families to health centers, some of the professional members giving inoculations and other health services. Colombians also decided on supplying families with 2-1/2 months rations so that the bread-winners could concentrate on getting jobs, "without the daily specter of hunger."

The recipient areas were chosen because of extensive need due to mass displacement of thousands of persons who fled from rural homes when bandits terrorized many villages. Untrained, most have less than subsistence living stan-

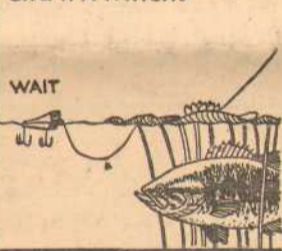

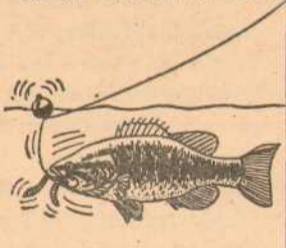
