SEWAGE REPORT SAYS PROJECT FEASIBLE

**GANGES RESIDENTS
RECEIVE SEWAGE STUDY**

A relatively small crowd attended the public meeting of Ganges residents and business houses to hear the results of the engineer's feasibility study of a sewage system for Ganges last Friday night in the Legion Hall.

Dr. J. Whitbread, Medical Health Officer, Victoria, and Mr. L. Benham of the Health Department were present along with Mr. Allan Kerr, Engineer in charge of the study. These gentlemen answered questions and commented on the necessity for a sewage system in Ganges.

The Engineer's report stated that a sewage system for Ganges was feasible although considerable rock-

work would be necessary and this would push costs of installation up considerably.

The scale of costs worked out by the engineer placed the total cost at approximately \$167,000 with annual tax rate per user at between 24 and 120 dollars per year plus a monthly service charge of from 5/7 dollars. The committee reported they had reviewed these figures and they had been revised downward to an annual tax rate of 20 to 80 dollars and a service charge of from 4/7 dollars per month.

It was further reported that diversion of the drainage water in a ditch along Rainbow Road would not be practical as it would require \$20,000 for a storm sewer

into the harbour.

The area under consideration would include the village from Drake Road on Ganges Hill through to the Hospital Road.

No one at the meeting disagreed with the need for a sewage system but there were some half dozen very vocal objectors on the grounds of the high costs involved.

The Health Department indicated that should a sewage system not go through it might be necessary for the department to take action to have faulty individual installations corrected. This, they said, could cost the individual resident more than the sewage costs per house-

The Ladies Auxiliary to the Legion Annual Breakfast served about 400 people last Sunday morning according to Mrs. H. Emerslund, Convener.

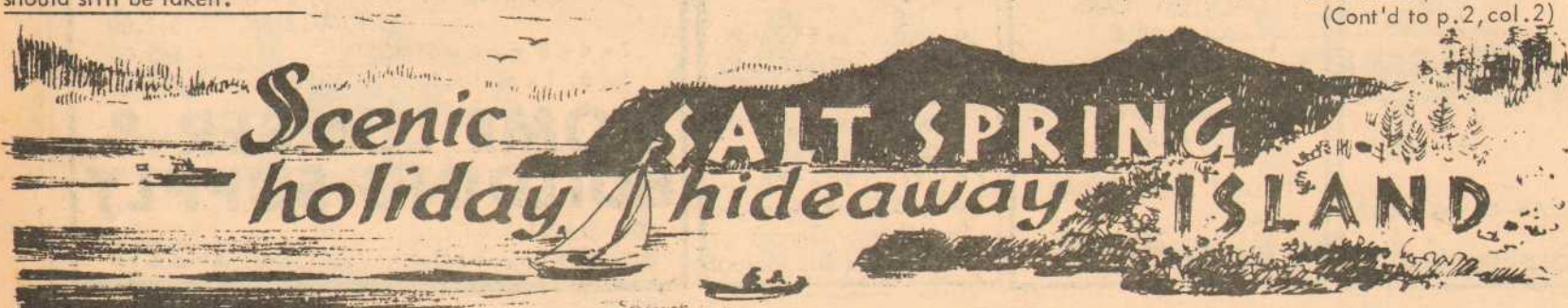
This was a record attendance to the event but everything went off smoothly with the assistance of Auxiliary members.

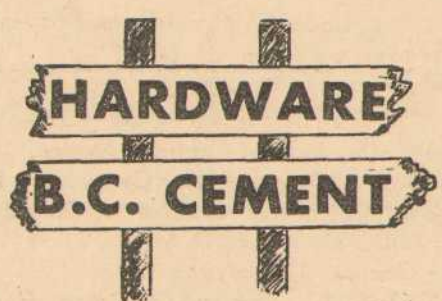
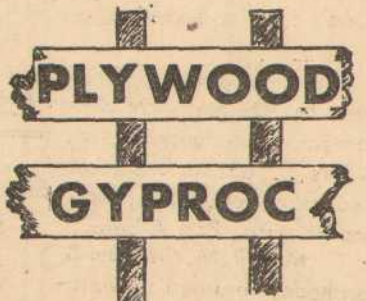

RESCUE

A dramatic rescue operation was undertaken on the 70' sheer cliff at the Seward's residence at Booth Bay last Sunday. A small welsh terrier, Ripple, owned by the McCalman's holidaying at Fernwood from Stettler, Alberta, was playing with the Seward's chesapeake, when suddenly he slipped halfway down the cliff of crumbling shale to rest against a narrow ledge of soil and arbutus twigs.

A master plan was organized by Denis Seward & Peter McCalman to rescue the stranded animal, but an effort to climb down failed owing to the shale sloping away at the slightest touch. However, Ian McCalman, Peter's brother, newly arrived from Washington, D.C. on a pleasure (?) tour, managed to clamber up from the foot of the cliff to within a yard of the dog. A rope was lowered from the top, which secured the humans position but there were anxious mo-

ments before a second rope could be found to rescue the dog.

A kit bag was let down bringing with it a cascade of small rocks. This excited Ripple so much that he jumped at Ian who was only just able to calm him and retain his own precarious position on the sheer face. The attempt to insert the dog into the sack failed, and this made it necessary to heave the sack up and to lower the rope back again with a towel attached to it, for a sling

These movement were each accompanied by their own showers of rock. It took about 20 minutes to strap the worried dog into the towel, and to secure the sling to his collar.

All this while Mrs. McCalman, the owner of this valuable pedigree dog had been pacing the top of the cliff, but the moment that she had been awaiting for an hour had arrived. She gently pulled in on the rope and the dog managed to paw his way up the cliff to safety. He was unhurt but shocked. It was only another 10 minutes before the rescuer was able to reach the top of the cliff and in so doing he completely kicked away the ledge that had saved the dog's life, so delicate had the operation been.

And the sun set in a blaze of colour behind the hills that had so nearly seen tragedy.

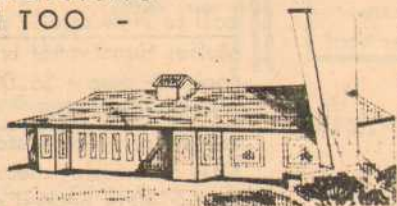

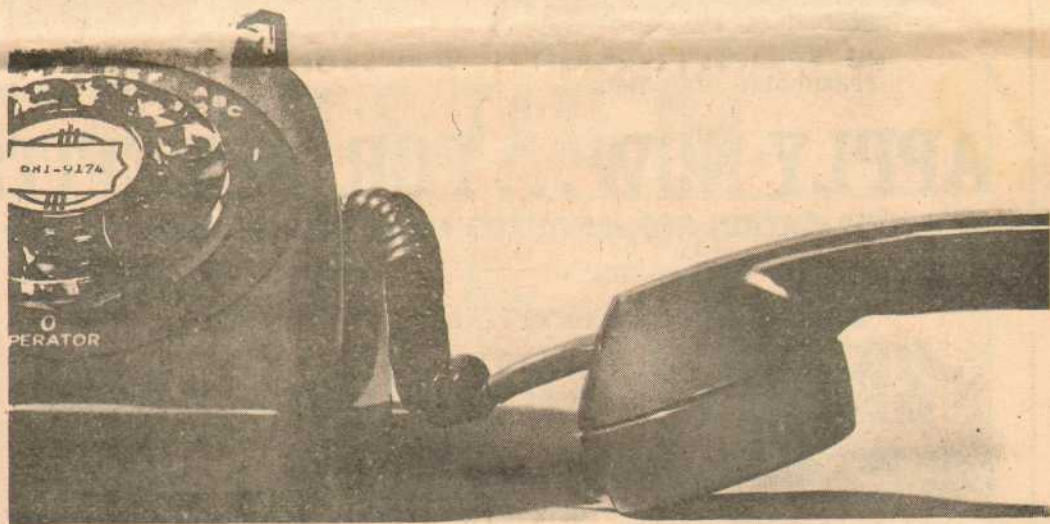

LOFTY PEAKS

Mt. Tuam will never be the same again! This mountain at the South end of Salt Spring Island is now one of a chain of important VOR - Visual Omni Range - which stretches across Canada. Mountains considered to be suitable locations for this important high-flying air traffic installation, are spaced at intervals far north at the Sandspit, into Alaska the Queen Charlottes, Comox, Port Hardy & Mt. Tuam. These peaks have now become the communications centre through which are beamed the TV Programmes, long distance telephone calls, and all the traffic which goes into telephone communications.

provides the pilot with the necessary information.

This new system is superior to the old head-phone signal device as the information is conveyed by an indicating meter, and with a high degree of accuracy. 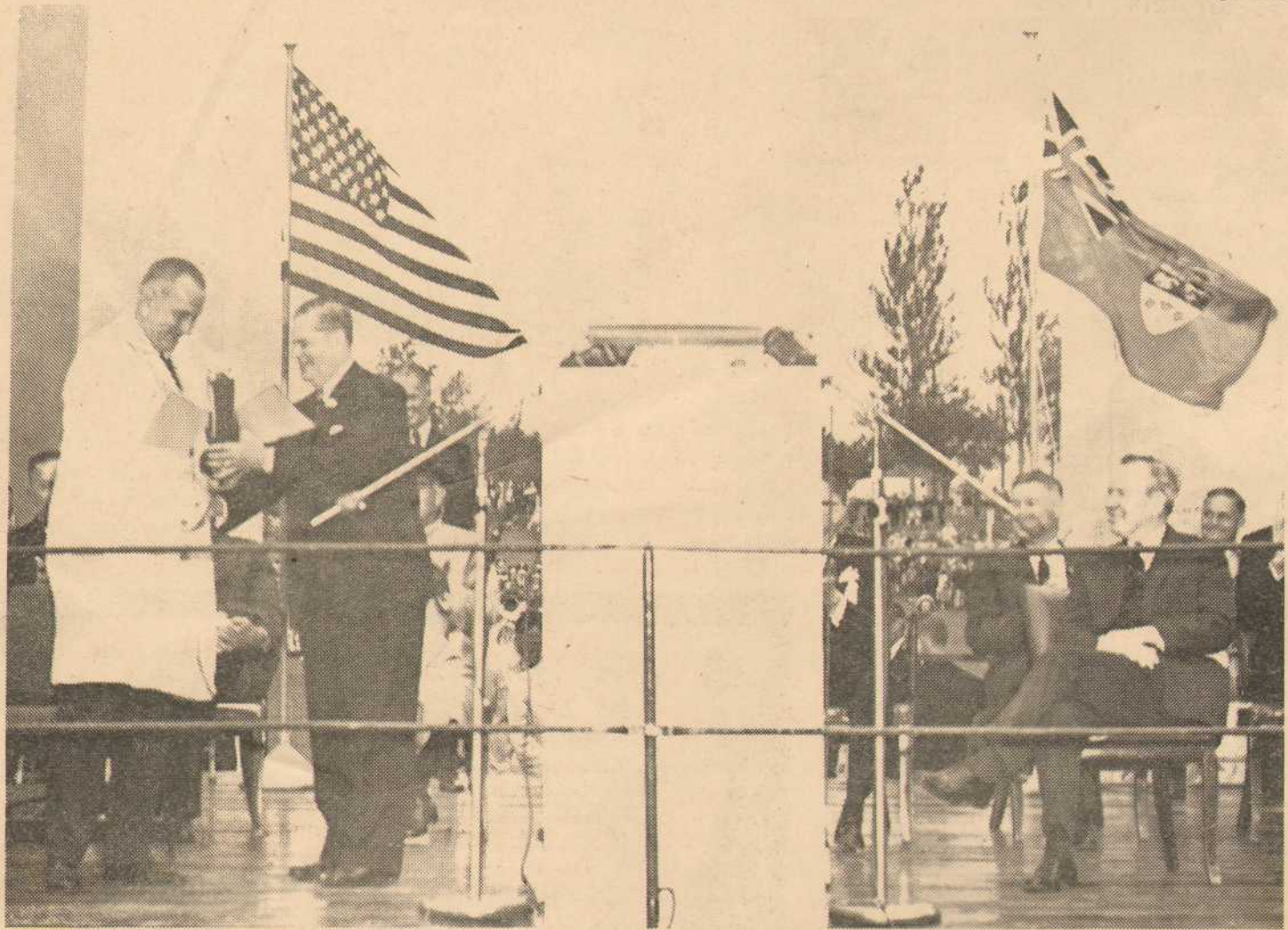

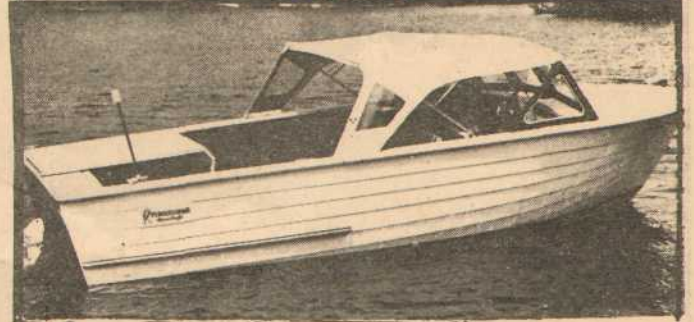
FORMER SALT SPRING ISLANDER MARRIED IN VICTORIA

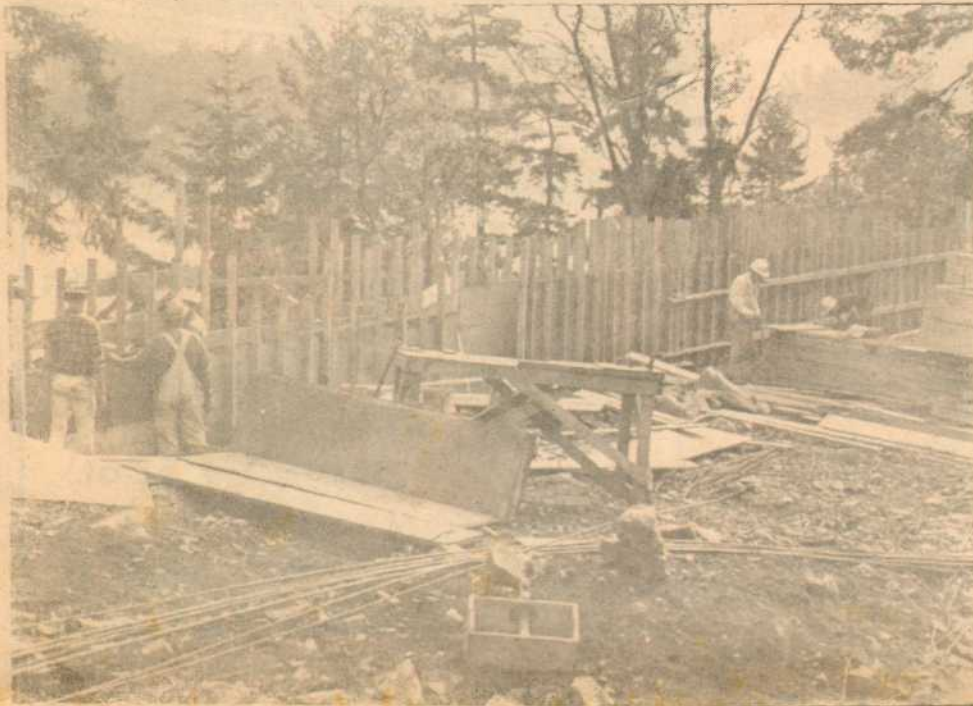
