An honorary member of the Haidas, Mrs. Griessel told about the very complicated living and social conditions of the tribe.

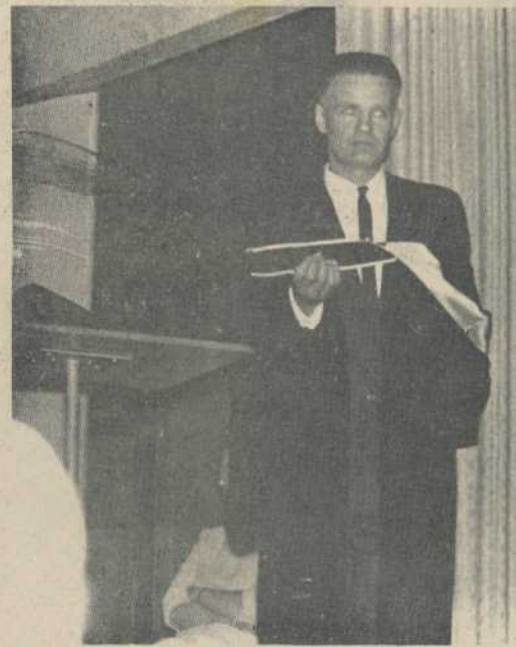
"Among the Haidas" was the theme of her subject and it was extremely interesting. She is a past president of the Caledonian W.A. and was introduced by the Rector before the lecture.

The pictures in colour showed the rugged country and some lovely views of sunset on the waters and also interesting pictures of the Haidas and their children.

Sponsored by St. Mary's Choir, who collected about \$26 for their Choir books the evening was a great success and a hearty vote of thanks go to all who attended and to Mrs. Griessel for her outstanding talk.

One thing she mentioned which had a direct connection with our Coast, was the fact that the Haidas used to be collectors of slaves "Most likely taken from the Coast Indian Tribes" said the Speaker. It is well known in history that the Haidas used to raid the Coast Indians and sometimes succeeded in taking back slaves. Not so very long ago up to the 1860's the Prince Rupert Indians used to some in their great war canoes, as did the Bella Bellas, and other far away tribes. At that time Salt Spring Island was just getting settled as the first pioneers came in.

Refreshments were served by members of St. Marys Choir after the talk.

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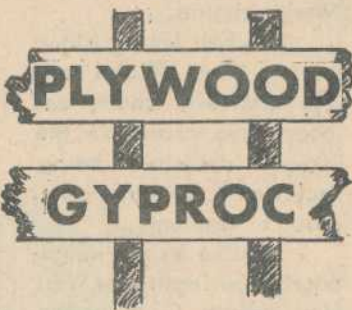

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Editorial



We note in a recent issue of one of Vancouver Island's Dailies an argument for lower ferry fares between Tsawwassen and Swartz Bay. This paper goes on record as supporting this necessary and sensible move.

It makes good sense that ferry fares on this link between the mainland, lower mainland and the rest of B.C. should be made more economical for residents of all areas of the province.

It is not fair that people of the province who normally travel and do their business between points on the mainland have recently had the tolls removed from all bridges and ferries in that part of the province, while citizens of the Island still have to pay high tolls to get back and forth to the mainland.

It is also true that Mr. Bennett, our Minister of Finance in order to abolish tolls on bridges and ferries on the mainland, had to write off the remaining capital cost of these conveniences. The same thing could be done with capital costs of the Ferry system without too much pain. Certainly not for the regular visitor from these islands to Vancouver and other interior points. After all he has been paying the same high tariff to travel to the mainland since away back in the days of the CPR boats..and they delivered you to downtown centres.

Certainly the ferry system wouldn't suffer since it is well and truly established and healthily in the black as witness the numbers of new ferries being added to the fleet each year. While this situation is proudly acclaimed, by this government as proof of the wisdom with which they get things done for the lucky B.C. citizen, a small voice should also add that these same ferries have been piling up surpluses ever since they began operations, thus adding yet another valuable source of income for the coffers in Victoria.

We are not asking for removal of the tolls but only for a more equitable break in moving about the province with greater ease. We agree further with the article referred to earlier that a tariff of \$3 for car, and \$1.50 per passenger would appear to be a most welcome move to those on these islands who find it necessary to travel to the mainland frequently. However we should like to add a plea for a special rate on return trips. We have never been able to understand why you cannot buy a reduced return ticket on the ferries as in the case with all other transportation systems.

We note the new ferry terminal at Swartz Bay is nearing completion. We must say the utter confusion of the, last few months seems to be clearing up and the new facility is beginning to take on a look of smart efficiency. All the better to handle the certain increased business that would accrue for more reasonable ferry tolls.

How about it Mr. Premier? Would this not add to your image of our Dynamic Society?

"KLAATHEM" or The Springs of Salt Spring Island

Many of us are familiar with the soft-spoken place names used by the Indians of this Coast. They generally used a name descriptive of the location, and this Island was no exception.

Years before the first settlers came, some tribes who frequented the Northern half where the salt springs are scattered, called the Island - KLAATHEM - meaning Salt (The pronunciation of this name varies slightly among the different tribes.)

The early settlers too, adopted these springs in naming their Island Salt Spring Island. However the British Admiralty who were charting and naming the Islands and waterways officially named it Admiral Island, after Rear Admiral Baynes who, in his flagship, H.M.S. Ganges, commanded the only British Naval Station on the Pacific Coast at Esquimalt.

Then, as now, the residents had a determined loyalty about "their Island" and refused to accept the Navy's choice.

So Salt Spring Island became the official name and gradually charts and maps were changed - the Navy's decision being "scuttled" by this small group of residents.

Unlike its two neighbouring Springs (to the West Hot Springs Cove on the West Coast of Vancouver Island; and to the East, Harrison Hot Springs in the Fraser Valley), the Springs

of this Island are cold and of a different mineral content.

The mineral analysis of these Springs by a qualified Lab, was broken down into parts per million of both suspended matter and dissolved solids. These minerals were originally absorbed by the water as it was forced through the Earth's Crust of rock, gases, and soil.

A complete mineral content of these Springs and some of their common uses follow -

Silica - known as Diatomaceous Earth, used in Industry to filter oils and fats, and to make polishing powders (a bed of this white powdery Earth is located on the same property)

Iron Oxide - produces the reddish brown colouring found in the surface clay and pebbles of these Springs

Alumina - or Aluminium, when taken internally, neutralizes acid in the stomach

Calcium Oxide - an important builder in the human body for bones and teeth, and for co-agulation of the blood.

Magnesium Oxide - in medicine, an antacid

Sulphates (SO3) - have all characteristic odour, taken internally have a possible laxative effect.

Chloride (Cl) - This has by far the greatest percentage over all the minerals in the Analysis.

The Alkali content (Sodium and Potassium) makes up about half of the total of dissolved solids.

The percentage of Sodium Chloride (Salt) is very high, making these Springs

many times saltier than the sea. They are in no way connected with the sea, but are forced up from deep within the Earth's Crust.

These Springs are scattered throughout the Northern part of the Island, appearing here and there in privately owned field or bush land.

In size they run anywhere from a few feet in area, up to the largest one covering some 90' by 100' in an irregular shape, of bare reddish brown clay and pebbles underlaid with a light yellow clay, here outcroppings of flat porous rock called Bog-Iron are also in evidence. Nothing grows on the majority of this, although grasses and a colourful pink flower called "Sea Blush" flourish right to the edge. Also there is a peculiar dwarf swamp grass nearby which is covered with salt crystals as the summer sun evaporates its moisture. These salt crystals also cover most of the bare ground and gather under fallen branches during the hot summer, giving off a dazzling white sheen in the sunlight.

In the small pools, and in the wet areas where new springs frequently break through the seepage, occasional air or gas bubbles can be seen breaking to the surface; and while there is no large flow of water like one would normally associate with springs, there is always a constant seepage, even in the driest summer. The occasional earthquake has also been known to increase these air or gas bubbles

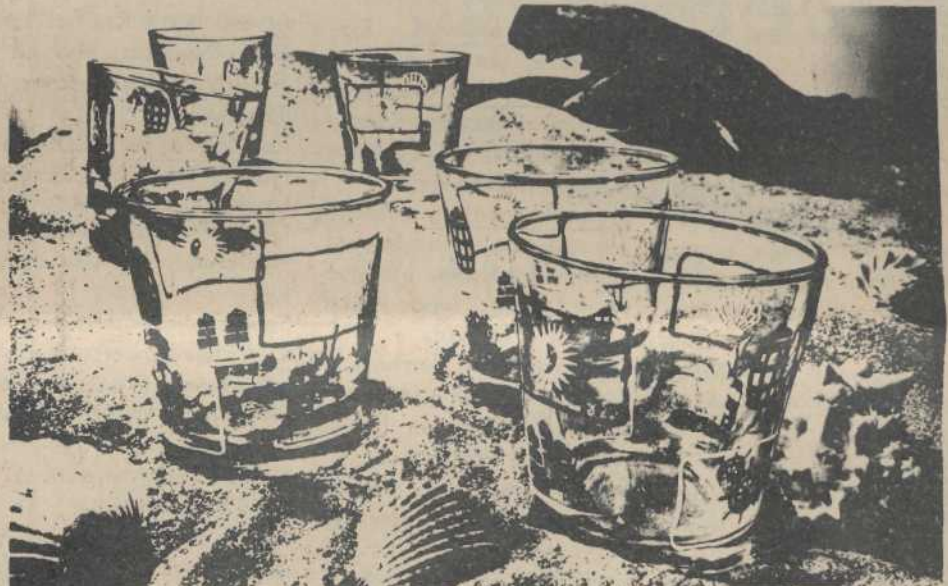

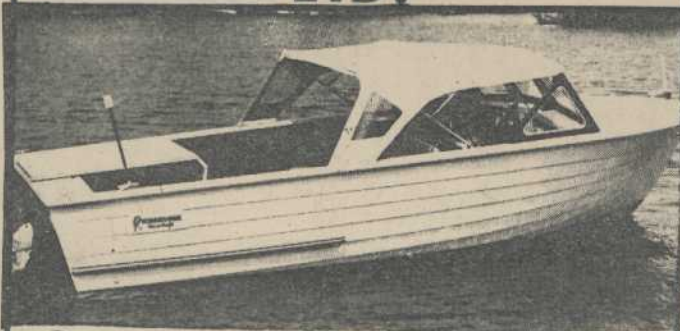
