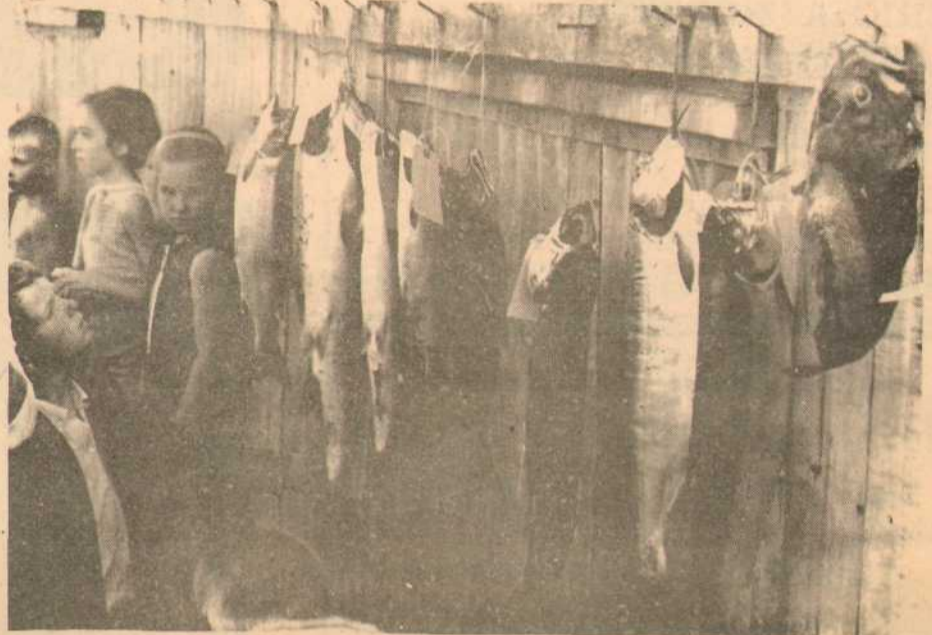
LOCAL BUSINESS MAN RETIRES AFTER 35 YEARS

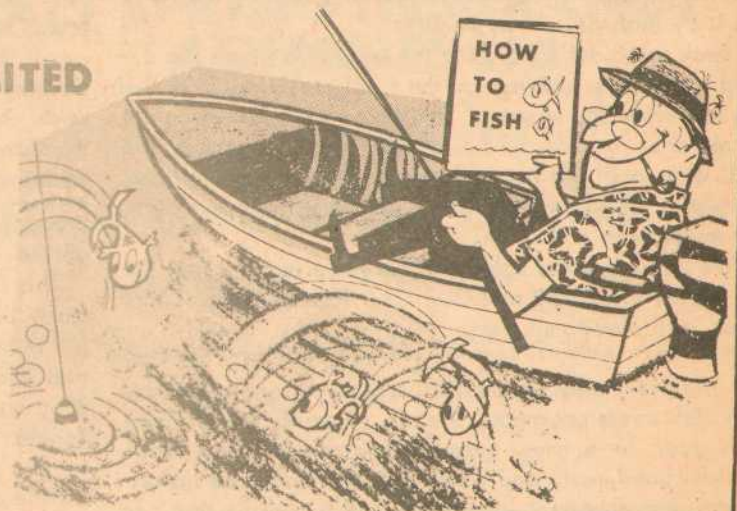

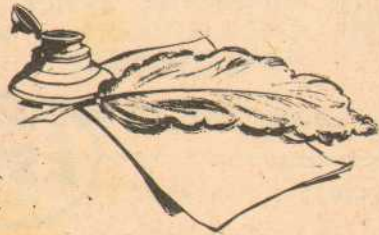

Back to Mouat's Store for the weigh-in where the excited crowd was waiting for the final tallying up of weights to decide the winners. Small boys were crowding out the big ones to see the fish as they were hung along the wall. The catch did not look too impressive but the good fellowship among the sportsmen kept spirits up and Derby Day ended with a flourish.

We still are not a fisherman but have learned that the Salt Spring Island Rod and Gun Club Salmon Derby is lots of fun with or without fish.

end. One, a yacht "Gitane" went aground and was badly holed. It was rescued by the Coastguard Cutter, "Racer".

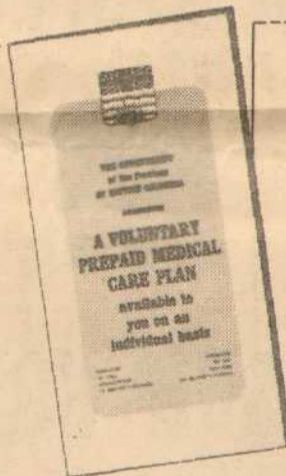
