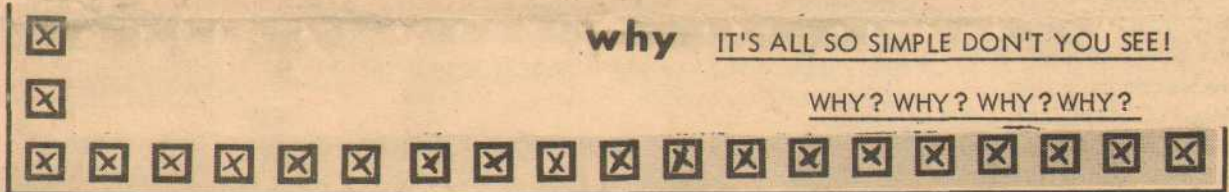

The weather, according to one of our long-ago teachers, is a thing you need not bother to mention because nobody cares about it anyway. Contrary to that opinion, it seems that the weather man, Mr. H.J. Carlin, almost always manages to surprise us with his monthly report.

This time he says that October had 3.38 inches of rainfall, which is better than average in spite of all that lovely sunshine we enjoyed during the month.

High temperature was 67 degrees on October 6th, low 43 degrees on October 19th. Maximum mean temperatures 59.6, minimum mean 50.5 degrees.

1964 October had a high of 73 degrees and a low of 34 degrees with less precipitation.

SOUTH SALTSRING DISTRICT TO ORGANIZE  
OPPOSITION TO FERRY MOVE

An organization, as yet un-named, will be formed in South Saltspring area in the next few weeks to try to force some clarification on the plan to move the ferry terminal from Fulford Harbour to Isabella Point.

The organization is to press for an intensive study of the question from all sides in order that an intelligent decision can be made on the need or otherwise for such a move.

The group is at present completely opposed to the move but assured Driftwood that they could be persuaded if the facts show that the move is necessary and economically feasible. Until such facts are available they will use every means to prevent action on the proposal at this time.

The new organization to be formed in a meeting presently scheduled for next week, will be a permanent group who will be interested and active in all projects and plans affecting the south area of the island.

Besides the present ferry question, plans are in hand to support and assist the Fulford Hall Committee, Fulford Harbour Athletic Committee and to develop lands at the south end of the harbour as a Public Park.

Asked why another organization is to be formed on the island to act in areas similar to the Chamber of Commerce the organizers said that the present state of the ferry question shows that the south needs representation on these plans. They feel they must demonstrate that the Chamber

of Commerce does not speak for all the island.

Among those on the organizing committee are Mr. A. E. Roddis, Mr. R. Patterson and Mr. Norman Shaw.

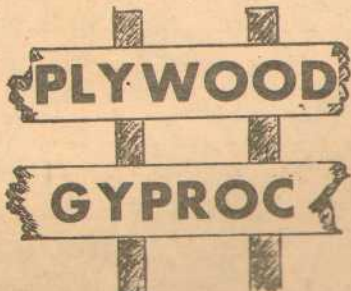

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### EDITORIAL

#### MORE ON ELECTIONS.....

Our front page feature this week is our way of protesting the more and more obvious fact that this present federal general election is neither necessary nor can it really decide anything. It was only called because Mr. Pearson feels he would like to have more yes men behind him on the government side. This motivation is open to real question since parliamentary experts claim that an election, called for this reason alone, is illegal and unconstitutional.

Five elections in eight years is a record in itself that bears some questioning and investigation. Mr. Pearson has raised a storm of protest at his recent remark (that was tape-recorded) and that was later heatedly denied, that if he didn't get his way he would call yet another sixth election next year.

It is time the electorate put an end to this kind of merry-go-round. It is the electorates turn to speak next Monday.

The tragedy is that there is so little in the way of alternatives to this kind of thinking. How can the average voter choose something better?

One way it seems to us is for Mr. Voter to change some of his own patterns of thinking. Just for example, one phenomena we have noticed in "covering" this campaign is the curious way in which audiences coming out to hear candidates speak, are almost entirely different.

One group comes out to hear Mr. Cameron and with few exceptions, one can guess what they will do at the polls. Another almost entirely different group turns out to hear Mr. Wilkinson. Why does it appear to be taboo, or at least highly strange and inappropriate for a Social Creditor to be seen at a Liberal meeting, or a P.C. to attend the NDP rally?

By way of explaining this we can say this is one way to avoid being further confused by the feeble proposals put forward by some of the candidates we have heard requesting support.

### Wooing The 'Undecideds'

Canada's voters watched and waited this week, as leaders of the national parties hopped from Montreal to Vancouver in a flurry of campaign-closing rallies in the big cities.

The last week of electioneering, always considered vital in Canadian campaigns, was aimed at the "undecided" voter whose final choice would tip the scales either way next Monday.

According to opinion polls, the Liberals continue to hold a clear edge over the Conservatives on a national basis. If past performance is any indication, the undecided voters will again split about the same way as those who have already made up their minds.

This could give the Liberals up to 45 per cent. of the vote, spelling a shattering defeat for Conservative leader John Diefenbaker.

But if Liberal strength is top-heavy in one province — such as Quebec — the outcome of the election in ridings throughout the rest of the country could present quite a different picture from the national samplings of the opinion polls.

The strongest single issue the Liberals have going for them — majority government — surfaced in the closing days of the campaign, catching even Mr. Diefenbaker in its tide.

After making his third visit of the campaign to Quebec last week, the former Tory prime minister predicted he would be back in office after Nov. 8. But the best he could hope for, he said, was a minority administration — he didn't expect to get a majority.

Prime Minister Pearson, in contrast, built up the majority government theme to give it equal prominence to the need for national unity. Only a federal government with a majority in the House of Commons, he said, could keep the country united while dealing fairly with the provinces.

Despite many signs of voter apathy, such as 200,000 fewer registered voters than 1963, it was still anybody's guess how

many would turn up at the polls. Many voters talked of staying home in protest, which could amount to a virtual voter's strike if a large segment of the electorate took this course.

Mr. Diefenbaker has worked the morality in government issue for all it is worth. Some observers feel he has overworked it, and that so many unproven charges have been made that the tactic has back-fired on the Conservatives.

The Tory attack on Mr. Pearson has been so slashing that the Conservative party's own platform — which contains many enticing planks — has been shoved aside. Tory promises of a \$100 per month old age pension, and deduction of municipal taxes up to \$500 from taxable income have strong appeal to many voters, but they didn't get many headlines.

As the returns begin to come in Monday night, it is unlikely that a trend will emerge until the Quebec ridings start reporting. The seats to watch are ones now held by Real Caouette's Creditistes. If they can hang on, Liberal hopes for a majority will be blunted before many ballots are even counted.

The Toronto returns will give a clue to the success of the NDP among big city voters. In rural Ontario, the Conservatives hope to recapture many Liberal seats and if they do so they will also be able to hold the West. But if the Liberals can keep the Tories in check in Ontario, they'll have won their majority.

On the basis of my checks across the country, there appears to me to be a trend toward a clear majority for the Liberals. Barring any dramatic new developments in the campaign, I look for Mr. Pearson to return to Ottawa with at least 148 of the 265 House of Commons seats. The balance should be split up something like 87 for the Tories, 22 for the NDP and eight for the Secreds and Creditistes. This will give Mr. Pearson the majority he says he needs to govern the country.

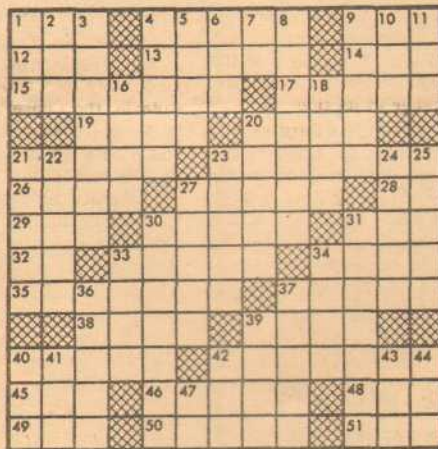

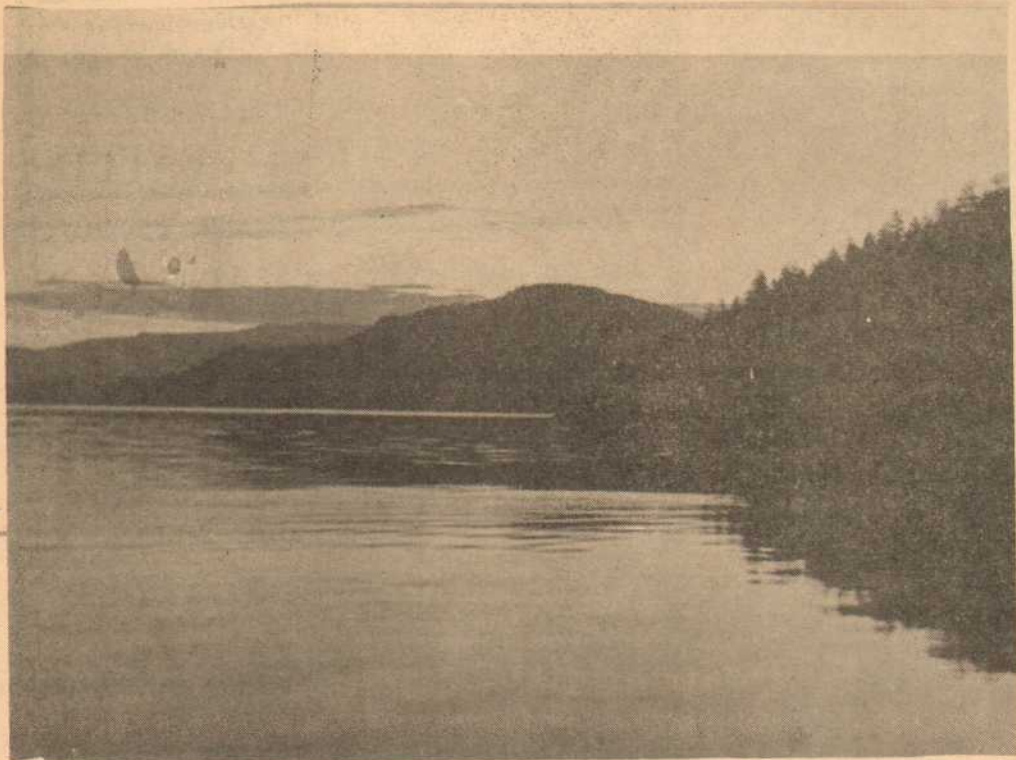

AUTHOR CAPTIVATES AUDIENCE WITH TALK ON NORTH

In pictorial travel scenes, the author of *Far Pastures*, *Dangerous River* and *The Buffalo Head*, R.M. Patterson, guest of honor at St. George's Hall in Ganges on Friday, took a crowded room full of people on a very pleasant journey North.

Introduced by Miss Doris Anderson, President of St. Mary's Guild at Fulford, sponsors of the affair, Mr. Patterson went right into his pictures and followed them with interesting stories of his trip back to the great Nahanni River in the North West Territories. Up the Alaska Road to Fort Nelson and then on down Fort Nelson River into the Liard to Nahanni Butte, three men in two canoes. They went on to Nahanni Falls, cached the light canoe in Deadmen's Valley on the way, and from then on Mr. Patterson showed pictures of the 4000 ft. mountains and the Twisted Mountain (I think he said that was 500') and a weird twisted thing it is.

He told about the Splits in the Nahanni where the most dangerous whirl pools and rapids exist... and the Falls Canyon with its spray flying where the author narrowly escaped entering these Falls in 1927 while "drifting carelessly in my canoe."

He would certainly have been "all washed up" if he had. They camped in Deadmen's Valley.

The Falls of the Nahanni are the largest in the NWT about 500 ft. in length and 40 ft drop to the lip of the first plunge and here the author showed a picture of a rainbow stretched across, taken at great risk when he hung by his "toenails" over the precipice and snapped the picture, which was worth it.

You can read all about it in his book "Far Pastures" and you will really get a good laugh on page 88 of that. - 85 to 88, in chapter 7, I should say, and that chapter is about the Sikanni

Chief River. Chapter 15 tells of the Nahanni.

Mr. A. E. Roddis thanked the speaker for his talk and pictures and everyone ended up by having a cup of coffee and a bun, supplied by members of the Guild.

They took in about \$50 which will help the Guild funds.

Tonight is the Film Club meeting on "Canada's New Frontier". The next meeting November 18th will feature five films on British Columbia. Watch next week for a complete listing.
