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NEW RIDINGS NEED REPRESENTATION-SOCRED. SNAP ELECTION-NDP 'FAT CAT GOVT-LIBERALS

TISDALLE SAYS: ELECTION NECESSARY TO GIVE NEW CONSTITUENCIES IMMEDIATE REPRESENTATION.

John Tisdalle, Social Credit Nominee for Saanich and the Islands, says it is most important that the new redistribution bill be implemented right away rather than wait for another legislative session under the old boundaries. He said he pressed for this in the last House.

Asked to comment on the present election being a "snap election", he stated that the opposition had claimed the present government was a failure and yet had practically begged the Premier not to call an election at this time. He said the NDP was the first party to register candidates before the election was called.

In answer to a question about his popularity in his own party, he stated that he had always gone along with government policy and that he felt that his duty as a backbencher was to try and influence government policy by bringing pressure to bear on the cabinet to effect certain changes.

He said some of the changes he wanted to see the government undertake were measures to improve the lot of the handicapped. Specifically he mentioned hospital measures and the mentally handicapped. He says that the government is now desirous to implement some social legislation now that the economic side of things were well taken care of.

He said most of his time will be spent in finding out the needs and desires of islanders in the next few days prior to the election. He plans to visit Ganges on September 8th, where he will be pleased to answer any questions. He stated he hopes to come to Ganges by helicopter. Asked whether he was emulating Mr. Gaglardi, he said one of his social credit friends was responsible for his transportation here.

EDWIN HAW N.D.P. CANDIDATE FOR THIS RIDING

Edwin Haw, an official of the I.W.A. and a former labor organizer was nominated last week to represent the NDP in the current election campaign in Saanich and the Islands.

Mr. Haw came to Vancouver Island in 1935 and has resided here ever since. He has been a candidate for the Saanich Municipal Council and an active member of the N.D.P. for some years.

Mr. Haw was interviewed by DRIFTWOOD this week. He too regrets the present election being called as he says the Government has the necessary members to enact the promises now being made by the Premier. He states the Premier has taken advantage of the present boom and takes the credit for creating it. He says Bennett is a smooth politician adept at fooling most of the people most of the time.

Mr. Haw states his candidacy will be based on the following points:

- a government operated and sponsored auto insurance plan. Plans at present by private companies are costing the public millions of dollars too much.
- lowering of the fares on the government ferry system and the improvement of the arterial highway from Swartz Bay to Victoria.
- Government operated chronic care hospitals for the aged and infirm so that families need no longer be milked by certain private hospitals.
- The nationalization of B.C. telephones and making this a public utility to provide better service and more economical rates.
- taxation on farm land should not have to shoulder the present heavy education costs and higher education should be the responsibility of the provincial government. He wants to see greater cooperation between Federal and Provincial government in the matter of education costs.

Mr. Haw stated he would be willing to meet the other candidates in public debate if a mutually suitable date could be arranged. He stated that all candidates would need to be present if it was to be effective.

"FAT CAT" GOVERNMENT MUST GO, SAYS CAMPBELL

J.M. Campbell, Saturna, Liberal nominee in the current election says the present government is a fat cat government that has been in power so long they are unable to see their errors in judgment. They have become too self-important as, for example, Mr. Gaglardi's jet fleet.

Mr. Campbell says this election is a snap election to draw attention from the economic storms on the horizon. It would appear the Premier is concerned about the future economic climate in the province as witness the complete stoppage on work on the Provincial Museum and the slow down on school construction. The Liberal nominee says this government's two big financial ventures in Hydro power have created an inflationary trend that has become difficult to control. The Premier wants to consolidate his position before he is forced to deal with the results of the trend.

Mr. Campbell feels these islands need a strong representation in Victoria. They have been used to this in the past with strong representation from Mr. Stupich and Mr. Westwood before that. He does not feel Mr. Tisdalle can give this kind of representation to the islands, since he does not appear to enjoy the confidence of his own party. Mr. Campbell says he is an Islander who knows island people and their needs. He can give strong representation in Victoria.

Mr. Campbell, in a telephone interview last evening with DRIFTWOOD, stated he hoped the local Chamber of Commerce would sponsor an all-candidate meeting where the issues could be debated by all candidates in person. He stated he would be delighted to meet Mr. Tisdalle on any platform anywhere.

Mr. Tisdalle was contacted for his comment and he stated he could not accept as his time was entirely spoken for. He said he had no time to go into meetings with other candidates when personal attention is required to get to know the islands and their people.

CABIN CRUISER RUNS OUT OF GAS AT MIDNITE.

This week a cabin cruiser ran out of gas about 11:30 P.M. near Beddis Point and a boat from Ganges was dispatched to assist.

Mrs. Connie Kelly, living on Rourke Road reported they heard people yelling for help off their property. They tried to contact local RCMP but were unsuccessful. Captain Best was notified and a boat was sent out with Cliff Hatch and Marshall Sharp aboard. By the time they reached the boat, Len Kelly had got to the crippled craft in his small outboard and had managed to get the occupants some gas after which they were able to get under way again. It is reported there were five people including some children aboard.

Mrs. Kelly reported her son Pat, 13, rescued a sail boat recently by taking his father's boat for the first time by himself and towing the disabled craft into Ganges.

ANOTHER CENTENNIAL CANOE RACE

This week another canoe race with the same teams competing started off from Montreal to New York as a preliminary to the National Centennial next year.

The interesting part of this story is a call received from Mr. Geo. Sargenia, Vesuvius who is a ham operator and who had just received a report on the first lap by radio direct from the site of Expo the first stop of the race.

Ham radio operators are keeping the various provinces informed of results from a sending station on board an accompanying yacht. The report received by Mr. Sargenia was directed to Vancouver and stated the results of the first lap saw Manitoba still winning the laps with B.C. a close second. The canoes were to leave Expo site for Sorrel, Que. on their next stop last Tuesday and thence on to New York.

VESUVIUS RESIDENT DIES.

William Mackie of Vesuvius Bay died August 21st 1966 at the age of 84 years.

Mr. Mackie was born at Westminster, England, June 4th, 1882. He was educated at Royal Caledonian Schools (an orphanage). He was a Scots Guardsman from 1901 to 1906 and later served with the Canadian Navy from 1917 to 1919. In 1933 he joined the staff at Essondale where he was an attendant and supervisor until 1937. He also served on the Council for the District of Coquitlam for a short time.

He moved to Salt Spring in January 1941 and during his time here became a good friend to many islanders. Mr. Mackie is survived by one brother and two sisters.

Funeral services will be held Thursday morning, August 25th at 11 a.m. in Ganges United Church. Padre E.W. MacQuarrie will officiate. Goodman's Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements. Flowers are gratefully declined.

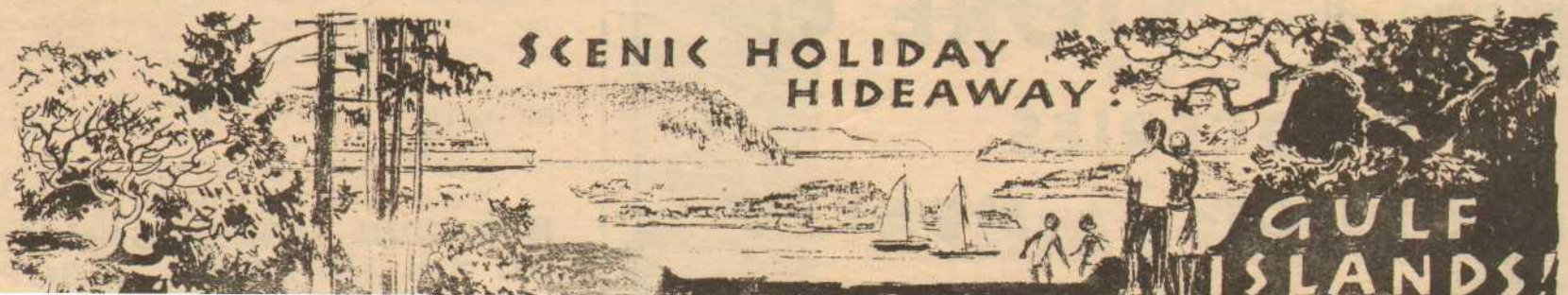

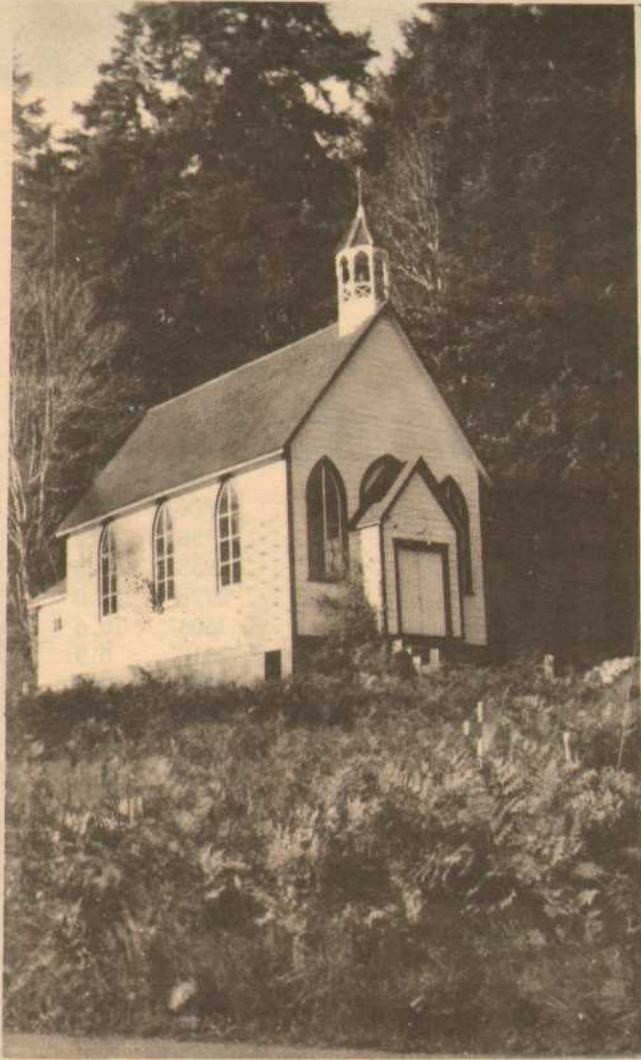

BITS N' PIECES

This week we have a letter from Mr. J.P. Lamb, who severely criticizes our local Lions Club and their Pioneer Village enterprise on the grounds of exorbitant rentals.

The Lions need no defence from us - but it seems that information of the regulations governing these projects has not been entirely understood. Mr. Lamb seems to be under the impression that the local club sponsors are responsible for the rental rates. This is not so as it has been stated on a number of occasions the rates are set, in the last analysis, by Central Mortgage and Housing, the Federal Housing agency that makes such projects possible. This regulation is a wise one since it is done precisely to avoid any suggestion of unfair practices as is made in this instance. This agency would not allow the project to proceed unless the rates were in line with current costs. Further the local sponsors are not allowed to change these rates once they are established without the consent of the C.M.H.A.

It seems to us that Mr. Lamb, while he may be honestly under a misapprehension, has done the men behind this worthwhile project a dis-service by implying that their motives are not all they seem.

It is our firm opinion that our local Lions have no other purpose in their efforts but the welfare of their fellows and the improvement of their community.

We repeat the Lions need no defence from us as no other local organization enjoys higher regard for good works well done.

By Golly that new chunk of asphalt on the main street is a handsome bit of hard surface. One would think there might be an election at hand. And we see work being rushed on Beddis Road at last. Mr. Morris must have received some fast decisions.

Speaking of elections, we wonder just what the present state of the suggested new ferry terminal at Isabella Point is at the moment. Little or nothing has been heard of such in recent weeks. We are somewhat chagrined at the local Chamber of Commerce, whose professed project this is, and who seem to be getting nowhere fast on the matter.

More on elections . . . We see where the local school board are to combine the annual board elections with the presentation of the latest referenda on school facilities sometime this fall. New school facilities to wit . . .

- one new dormitory for outer islands students to cost in excess of \$200,000.

- new classrooms that were deleted from the original plans of the new school just completed and already too small.

- one teacherage for Pender Island to cost in excess of \$15,000.

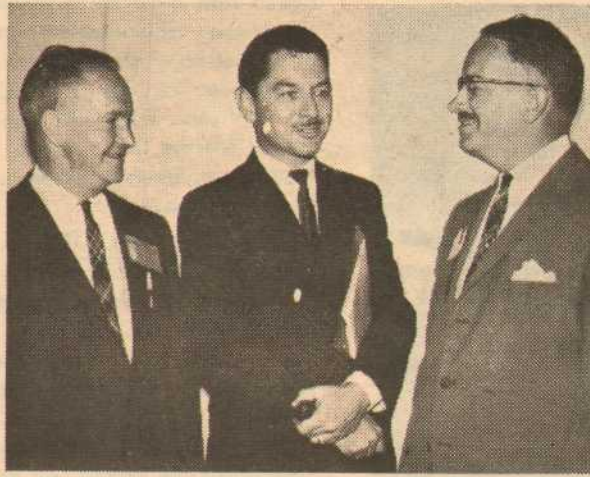
In the past this paper has been in favour of school projects designed to raise the quality of instruction in our Islands. However, in this instance we cannot go along with this latest - at least not in every case. We have some objections to all but will vote for one out of the three.

In the first instance we cannot see that there is anything very much the matter with present facilities for housing outer islands students in the present dormitory. We know it is no palace, but it is clean, well run and meets all the basic requirements for boarding students for five days a week in reasonable comfort and with good food. We can't see why several hundred thousand dollars must be spent on a new unit in this day of skyrocketing building costs.

One of our main concerns in this matter of the alarming increase in school costs in recent years is the present so-called necessity to provide facilities that rival the best hotels and air-conditioned office units.

We can just hear the standard reply to this criticism, "But, wouldn't you demand the best obtainable for the education of our young people?" The answer of course, is yes, provided (a) that the provision of such facilities guaranteed this result and (b) that we can afford it in view of both senior governments continuing refusal to share educational costs more equitably.

We are going along with the new teacherage for Pender because this appears to be a needed addition, although we can't go along with the price tag. This paper has already suggested that the shell of the two bedroom house built by the students last year and now up for sale might have been adapted for use on Pender. With some first class finishing and equipping, we see no reason why it wouldn't be entirely adequate for the purpose. That purpose in the past seems to be to provide a ten-month home for teachers who rarely stay more than one term in these locales. Why, we don't know.

As is well known hereabouts the Gulf Islands Lions Club is developing the Pioneer Village senior citizen housing project at Ganges. But how?

As the construction is nearing completion, action is being taken in the matter of renting. It is said the Government decides the financial status of occupants and rentals charged. The amount quoted for double units being \$55 per month and singles \$45 per month. To many people the latter rate seems exorbitant for shelter, water, use of electric stove, fridge and a few other fixtures. If this is the best the powers that be can do for senior citizens (with subsidized housing) they should leave the job to private enterprise for comfortable accommodation can easily be found at a very much lower price.

Perhaps it is time the Government agency concerned checked up and reported on this organization. The people of this district who donated \$18,000.00 towards the project are surely entitled to that.

Dear Editor:

Recent news items indicate that our School Board is preparing a new referendum for submission this fall and some mention has been made of in-

corporating into the referendum an item for a new dormitory to cost \$220,000. The other two items reported are for a teacherage on Pender Island and an extension on the Ganges School for Industrial Arts.

I am sure many of us will be happy to vote for the teacherage to ensure that high calibre teachers can be induced to remain on the islands, and of course, the Industrial Arts extension is a necessity, which we would hope will be passed.

However, the \$220,000 dormitory on any account appears illogical, and certainly acts to reduce the chance of passage of any worthwhile items included with it on the referendum.

I do not think there is anyone on any of the Gulf Islands who would wish to see any of our youngsters domiciled in a dormitory where they were ill-housed, ill-fed, or ill-cared for, however, there are limits to the amount of luxury necessary, and any cursory comparison of the existing leased dormitory with the average home on our islands will show that the youngsters boarded in the old Hospital under lease are much better and warmer housed, and at least as well cared for, as in the average home on these islands.

The last figure quoted for the number of students in the dormitory was 27. This indicates that the projected dormitory will cost nearly \$10,000 per student, which is an approximate cost per unit of a

quite luxurious apartment meant for two or more people each in the newer apartments. In other words, the figures quoted should provide each youngster with a one bedroom apartment, bath, living room and kitchenette complete with fridge, stove and garberator. I might add that fully completed and furnished motel units are a good bit less.

Which does make one wonder just what kind of quarters are being provided with the funds reported.

A check on interest payable together with maintenance costs is also rather interesting. The \$220,000 will cost the taxpayers close to 6% of \$12,000 per year. Close to \$10,000 per year will go into custodian work, maintenance, and landscaping, not being carried out now. These items will total over \$20,000 per year before one gets to the losses on the present operation.

One would think that the School Board would be well advised to look at the three alternatives: 1. Continuing the existing reasonable lease. 2. Purchase of the old Hospital building. 3. Inauguration of a very safe, comfortable, high speed Water Taxi service to transport these youngsters daily from their homes. Admittedly this would be expensive, probably entailing the charter of a radar and radio-equipped craft, but the very large expenditures suggested indicate that every avenue should be thoroughly explored.

If your car radiator overheats, here is the advice given by the B.C. Automobile Association.

1. Don't Turn off the engine if the temperature gauge starts to rise or the warning light indicates overheating.

2. Instead, if stuck in a long line of waiting cars, shift to neutral and race the engine moderately for 30 seconds at two-minute intervals.

3. If the radiator continues to overheat, drive the car off the road, turn off the engine, raise the hood and wait until the temperature gauge registers well below boiling or warning light goes off.

4. Then remove the radiator cap slowly using a towel or thick rag to protect your hand. Check the water level. If it is low, restart the engine and add cool or warm water with the engine running. Never add cold water to a hot radiator.

5. If the boil-over occurs again, have the car checked at the nearest service station.

"Your best protection, however, is to have your car's radiator and cooling system put in good working order before the summer season begins."
