**VANCOUVER MAN SERIOUSLY INJURED IN UPSET CAR**



The car above was almost a total wreck as a result of the upset into St. Mary's Lake Saturday evening.

Paul Miller, 18, Vancouver is in serious condition in a Vancouver Hospital the result of a car accident beside St. Mary's Lake, Saturday evening about 6.30 pm.

The car, a small import, driven by Robert Byng-Hall also of Vancouver failed to make the sharp right turn near the north end of the lake while travelling north. The vehicle ground into the shoulder on the left hand side, turned upside down, and came to rest with the front end submerged in the lake. A concrete block pump house was demolished as the vehicle struck it prior to resting in the lake.

Mr. R. Stacey living nearby heard the crash and

rushed down to give assistance. Police and ambulance were called and Dr. Jarman attended the injured at the scene.

Mr. Stacey assisted the driver, Mr. Byng-Hall from the machine, but was advised not to move the other more seriously injured youth. Mr. Byng-Hall was taken to the Bryan home nearby and both men were subsequently removed to the local hospital by ambulance.

Mr. Byng-Hall was released Sunday while his companion was transferred by ambulance to a Vancouver Hospital via the Queen of the Islands morning trip. It is reported he suffered a concussion and pneumonia.

**ELDERLY RESIDENT  
SUCCUMBS BY  
ASPHYXIATION**

A 67 year old resident of Salt Spring Island, living in a cabin on Rainbow Road died suddenly about 4 a.m. Sunday morning being the victim of suffocation.

The man was found under his bed in his cabin on Rainbow Road by members of the Fire Department. The cabin was filled with smoke the result of a smoldering mattress on the bed.

It is believed he either fell from his bed or crawled under it in an attempt to escape the fumes. His small faithful terrier also died with his master.

Dr. Jarman attended and pronounced the man dead at the scene. His name is being withheld pending notification of his relatives.

**IN MAGISTRATE'S COURT**

Lawrence McFadden of Pender Island was charged with carelessness in the use of firearms in a manner to cause possible harm to persons and property. Mr. McFadden was apparently target practising in the bay when a bullet went through the window of a nearby residence and lodged in a door. No one was injured as the house was temporarily vacant at the time. Other complaints of this nature had been made. Mr. McFadden at first pleaded not guilty but later changed this to Guilty.

He stated this was the first complaint about his use of firearms. He was experienced in use of firearms both as a hunter and in the Army. He stated he did not shoot towards the house but believed the bullet could have ricocheted. He had paid for damages to the house.

The Magistrate M. F. Peiler levied a fine of \$25 or 4 days in gaol. The fine was paid and the rifle was confiscated to the Crown.

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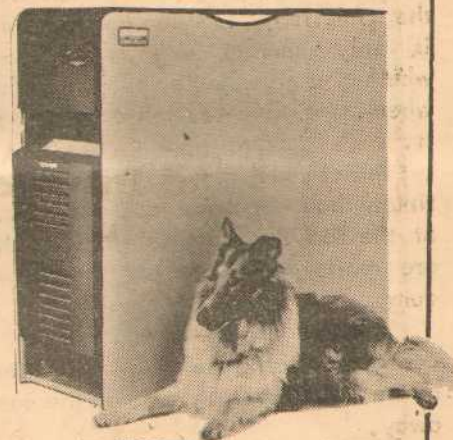

We are informed charges can be laid and are being considered, should the nefarious practise continue.

ted to bring in a report on redistribution. Although I have not seen the details as yet, the commission has recommended that most of the Islands part of my riding will be transferred to a new riding. On the basis of the results of the last provincial election this would make my position more secure by 500 votes. However I have always enjoyed campaigning on the Islands and meeting the people there. Although the majority of them don't support me politically I will certainly miss campaigning there. Just one more word on redistribution. Although the commission's report has been introduced there is still no Bill before the legislature. This Bill when it arrives could be radically different from the commission's recommendations.

Personally I was more interested in two other matters referred to in the Speech from the Throne. Readers of this column may recall that I forecast a provincial surplus of \$68 million dollars at the end of the 1965 fiscal year. When the figures were finally released I was very close to the mark. Surplus in the financial year we are now in will be accumulating at a rate in excess of \$5 million per month. The question comes up as to whether the opposition should fight for reductions in taxation or increases in government services. Personally I feel that the emphasis should be on the latter.

About one month ago I predicted that the Premier would recommend spending some of this surplus on increased expenditures in education (Cont'd. to P. 8, Col. 3)

If the sun is shining and he sees his shadow, he decides there'll be six weeks more of winter. So he tucks himself in again for some more sleep. At least, that's the story . . . .

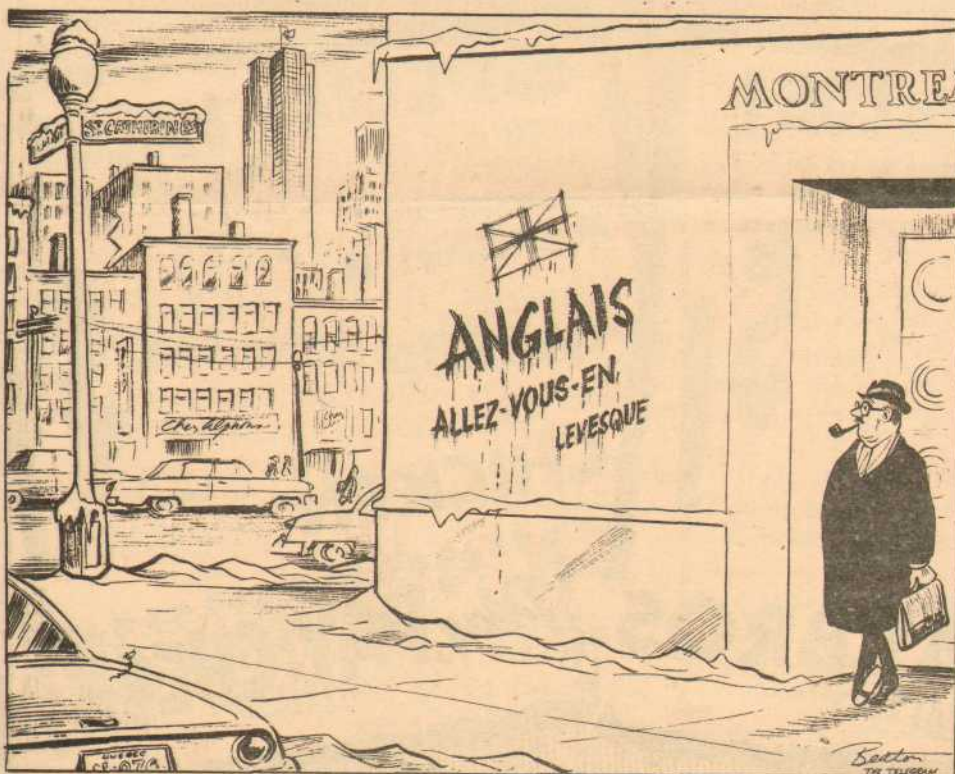

**SENIOR HOCKEY NEWS**

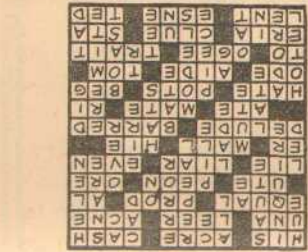

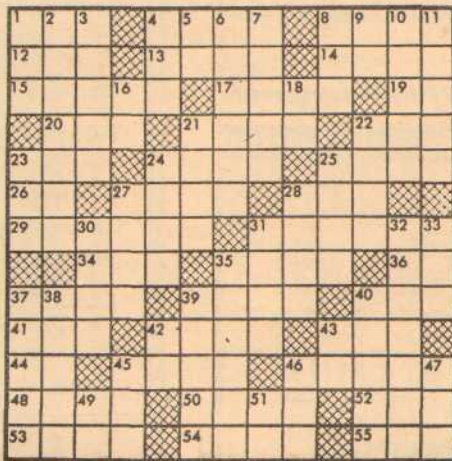

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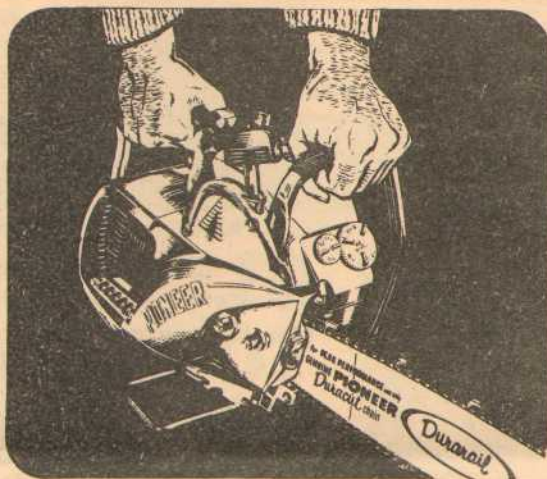

There is much talk these days about the need for vast sums to be spent on higher education, and the Federal Government has recognized this by increasing its grant to the provinces for university training. However the real financial load falls upon the property owners who find their taxes going up year by year to pay for education up to the university level. The speech from the Throne in one short sentence tells us that we will be asked to approve a substantial increase in expenditures for education. It is my hope that this will mean a new approach to the system of government grants to local school boards, and that the increases forecast in the speech from the Throne will be large enough to enable a reduction in property taxes for school purposes.

One further item that I hope the Premier will spend some of his surplus on is improvement in the B.C. Medical Plan. While it is not the sort of medicare that our party has been fighting for, it does make it possible for many people to have medical coverage who could not afford the higher premiums charged by private insurance plans, or who were poor medical risks and as such not acceptable by the private companies. The plan attracted many of our senior citizens in particular because they are not members of medical plans through their employment. However older people especially often run into very high drug bills, and medical coverage without drug provision does not begin to meet their needs. Members of our group hope that the promised amendments to the Medical Grants Act will include provision of prescription drugs, and we will do our utmost to urge this policy upon the government.

**SPECIAL COMMEMORATIVE MEDALS TO HONOUR B.C. PIONEERS.**

The Canadian Confederation Centennial Committee of British Columbia has designed and prepared for presentation to Canadian pioneers by local Centennial Committees a special commemorative medallion. The medallion will come complete with ribbon and clasp.

The obverse shows the scene when Alexander MacKenzie, the first explorer from Canada by land, reached the Pacific on July 22nd 1793. The reverse is lettered "British Columbia Honours Canadian Pioneers", with the 1967 Centennial designs.

The medallion will be silver finish with the ribbon muted navy blue to signify our role today as Canada's Pacific maritime province.

It is necessary that the pioneers so to be honoured be registered with the Provincial Centennial Committee, who now have the necessary application forms. These applications will have to be all in by October 15,

For the purpose of this award, a pioneer shall be any person who was either born in Canada or a resident of Canada prior to January 1st 1892. It is not necessary that such a person shall have

had continuous residence in Canada since that date but must be a resident of British Columbia now.

It is expected that the local Centennial Committee will arrange for an appropriate function during 1967 at which these medallions will be presented.

If you qualify, or know of any other person who does, please send in the names and telephone numbers to the Salt Spring Island Centennial Committee, Provincial Government

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Building, Ganges, B.C. The Committee will arrange to have the necessary application forms completed for your signature. Some means of validating birth date will be required, such as birth certificate, baptism certificate, family Bible entry. This should not be too difficult, as applicants will probably already have furnished this information in connection with old age pensions.
