LOCAL PARENT \$400,000 SCHOOL CHARGES WIDE REFERENDUM GAP IN SCHOOL IN PREPARATION STANDARDS

A charge that two separate levels of education exist in British Columbia high schools was made by a Salt Spring parent at a meeting of the Gulf Islands school trustees.

Mrs. J. H. Harkema complained that her daughter, a grade 10 student at Ganges school, with year-long marks averaging better than 80 per cent was unable to write mathematics or English in a private school entrance examination.

"Grade 10 maths she was expected to write were simply not taught here," charged Mrs. Harkema. "It was the same with English. There appear to be different standards."

"Why is this so," she asked, "if British Columbia schools all follow the same program?"

Mrs. Harkema said she had discussed this matter with several teachers and found there are two separate levels of education.

"The private school level appears to follow a wider area," she said. Mrs. Harkema questioned the number of grade 12 students from the local school who are successful in gaining college entrance in the first attempt.

Replying to a trustee's suggestion that private schools and colleges are selective in

A new school referendum to total some \$433,000 is to be presented to rate-payers as soon as the necessary approval is received from the Department of Education, it was learned at last week's school board meeting.

The new expenditure is to cover the cost of new buildings and additions to present facilities:

--completion of the classrooms deleted from the original plans for the new school, including the Industrial Arts Section.

--A Gulf Islands Dormitory to cost some \$220,000.

--A teacherage for Pender Island to cost approximately \$11,000.

The referendum is to be presented in three separate questions so that rate-payers can either approve all, some, or none of these items.

Mr. Evans has accepted an appointment as School Superintendent with the Department of Education. He leaves to take up his new duties early next month but as yet has not been assigned to a specific area.

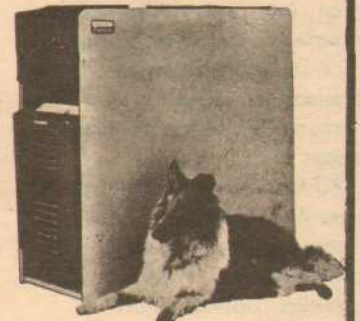

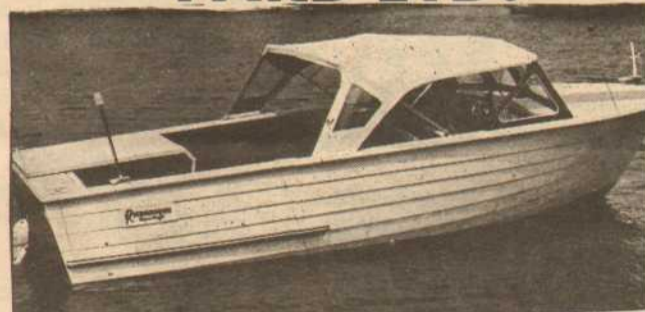

REFERENDA PRACTISE UNDER REVIEW

School Trustees are considering the question of the efficiency or otherwise of submitting referenda to rate payers for approval of capital expenditures for school buildings and equipment. It is reported that a resolution is being submitted to the Trustees Convention to have the practise discontinued as in some other provinces.

In eight other provinces the practise is to submit such requests for authority to spend tax monies to a central board of review. This board investigates the request and either issues such authority or refuses it, as the arguments suggest.

This procedure is recommended since it bypasses the time lapse and extra expense involved in conducting a referenda.



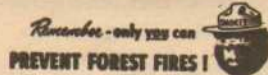
