Mrs. Mildred Seymour presented the \$100 B. C. Teacher Federation scholarship to Miss Rosemary Brigden.

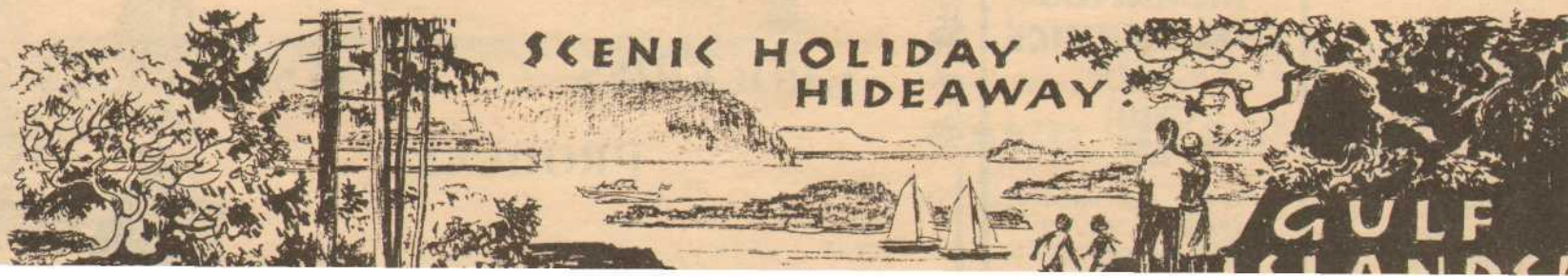

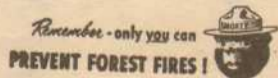

PAST GULF ISLAND RESIDENT DIES AT QUALICUM BEACH

A private Memorial Service was held in Victoria recently for Laurence Williams, who died at Qualicum Beach Sunday, June 19, at the age of 66.

Larry Williams was well-known among the Gulf Islands and Sidney. He made his home at Harbour House, Ganges, for a number of years before moving to Qualicum.

He was a great traveller as well as an artist and author. Mr. Williams was the only Canadian aboard the Portuguese ship "Santa Maria" when it was pirated in 1961.

Larry Williams served in the R.C.A.F. for the duration of both wars. He was a member of H.M.C.S. Naden and also a member of the Royal Victoria Yacht Club.

He is survived by a sister Mrs. Janie Lipscomb of Haney, B. C. and a brother, Manson in California.

He was predeceased by his wife in 1957.

WHERE DID THE SUN GO?

Howard Carlin, official weather observer, reports only 6 sunny days in June this year and only 3 days when the temperature went above 70 degrees. 24 days of overcast and rain!!

High temperature for the month of June was 80 degrees on the 5th and the low was 42 degrees on the 3rd.

Precipitation totalled 1.28 inches.

Last year June provided only 2 days of rain with a high of 84 degrees and a low of 30 degrees.

COOK MARINATED BEEF

WE hope you're still interested in some cook-out recipes, because that's what we've got on the fire today.

Clip these suggestions and consult them when you are preparing your shopping lists. If you have the ingredients on hand and the kabobs ready to go on the fire, you won't have any "emergency" when the crowd drops in during the next big holiday weekend.

MARINATED BEEF KABOBS

- 2 tbsp. instant minced onion
 - 1 tsp. celery salt
 - 1 tsp. chili powder
 - 1 tsp. sugar
 - 1 tsp. cayenne
 - ¼ tsp. ground ginger
 - ¼ c. cider vinegar
 - 2 c. tomato juice
 - 1½ lb. lean shoulder steak or top round
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 2 tsp. cracked black pepper
- Combine first 8 ingredients; bring to boiling point. Lower heat and simmer 5 min. Cut beef into 1-in. cubes. Rub salt and cracked pepper into beef; add meat to marinade and let stand 4-5 hrs. or, better still, overnight.

String on skewers; cook over slow charcoal fire until browned and grilled to desired doneness. Baste, using marinade as barbecue sauce, as often as meat appears dry.

Serve between hot frankfurter buns. Recipe serves 6.

From a friend, we cajoled a barbecue sauce recipe that is marvelous for old favorite, barbecued chicken. It is enough for 1 broiler-fryer.

CHICKEN BARBECUE SAUCE

- 1 garlic clove
- ½ c. corn oil
- ¼ c. vinegar
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. each dry mustard and Worcestershire sauce
- Dash cayenne
- Few drops Tabasco sauce

Slice garlic clove into a bowl. Add rest of ingredients. Stir until well blended. Pour carefully over chicken pieces in shallow dish.

Marinate chicken for 1 to 2 hrs. at least. You get about ¼ cup sauce.

MINTED ORANGE JUICE

- 1½ c. mint jelly
 - 1 tbsp. grated orange rind
 - ½ tsp. steak sauce
- Melt jelly over low flame, stirring until smooth. Mix in rind and steak sauce. Makes 1½ c. of sauce that is wonderful over grilled lamb steak.

SAVORY BARBECUE SAUCE

- 1 bottled (4½ oz.) steak sauce
- 2 c. water
- ½ tsp. black pepper
- 2 tsp. salt
- ¼ c. brown sugar
- 1 c. cider vinegar
- Juice of 4 lemons
- 4 tbsp. butter

Mix all ingredients; simmer 5-10 min. Makes one quart sauce that is perfect for beef, chicken or pork.

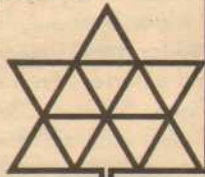

Centennial Report



1867 | 1967 by JOHN W. FISHER CENTENNIAL COMMISSIONER



Every community big enough to have a weekly newspaper has one or more industrial or commercial plants.

With flags, special decorations and a spruce-up program these plants can go a long way to help give the town a gay atmosphere for the 1967 celebrations.

Such companies are going much beyond a plant beautification program. Take, for example, the Black Diamond Cheese Company at Belleville, Ontario. It has plans for lawn beautification, an in-plant museum, an auditorium and a big community parade.

David Helliwell, editor of a national business magazine called Plant Administration published a special eight-page Centennial feature in his May issue on what

factory management can do for 1967. There are many things that can be done without much expense. Helliwell and his editors suggest a clean-up war on ugliness and an in-plant project.

From a cross-Canada mail survey of 1,000 factories Plant Administration found management in general to be slow in planning to celebrate Canada's 100th birthday.

In an editorial which wraps up the situation, David Helliwell writes: "What's needed now is action, not talk. If communities across the country are celebrating Centennial (and most are), industrial plants will look pretty silly not joining in the fun and games.

"And you know that's not likely to happen. Community

pressure is very strong. You can almost see the pressure groups being ushered into the president's office at the eleventh hour. Why wait for a last-minute mishmash? Wouldn't it be better to take the initiative, decide now what you're going to do? That way you'll have much more control over plans and costs.

"What to do? There are dozens of ways... While it's fine to buy a new flagpole or flower bed, a project that gets employees into the act is obviously much better. They'll feel more a part of the celebrations if they're involved.

"For example, if you decide on a miniature golf course, don't just buy one. Donate the land for \$1 a year, let the employees construct the course and run it.

"The main point is to stop procrastinating. Time's running short. 1967 is only seven months away."

Well, my thanks go out to Plant Administration editors for their clarion call. Their comments are representative of a new spirit I've noticed in recent weeks. Other editors and other Canadians are becoming more enthusiastic about 1967. The apathy and the negative attitudes are disappearing. Even the critics are sounding positive and constructive these days.

The spirit of 1967 is growing fast.

FRANK HECK

The recent passing of Frank Heck severs the last link between Mayne Island and the last century, and is the end of a family that helped to pioneer the island.

Frank's father, Jake, came to the island in the seventies of the last century, and from the primaeval forest carved the very extensive farm on which Frank was born, and was the last survivor of the six Heck children.

In his younger days, Frank in addition to working on the family farm, also worked in the state of Washington, but chiefly went to sea, largely with the sealing fleets in the North.

In 1914 Frank went overseas with the CEF, returning home with a damaged leg, which prevented him from doing too much active work. A few years ago he moved to Ganges, and shortly before his death retired to St. Mary's-Priory in Victoria. He was laid to rest in Ganges.

To all who knew him, Frank will be remembered as a very quiet, unassuming man, and a very engaging conversationalist, particularly on the events and features of his younger life, and the lore of Mayne Island. He was a lover of animals, and quite an expert in the ordinary veterinary work that can be done on a farm. He it was who also introduced Mayne Island to the automobile, bringing here the first car, a Ford about the year 1920, much to the disgust of all the local horses, who were quite numerous in those days.

His passing is deeply regretted by all who knew him.

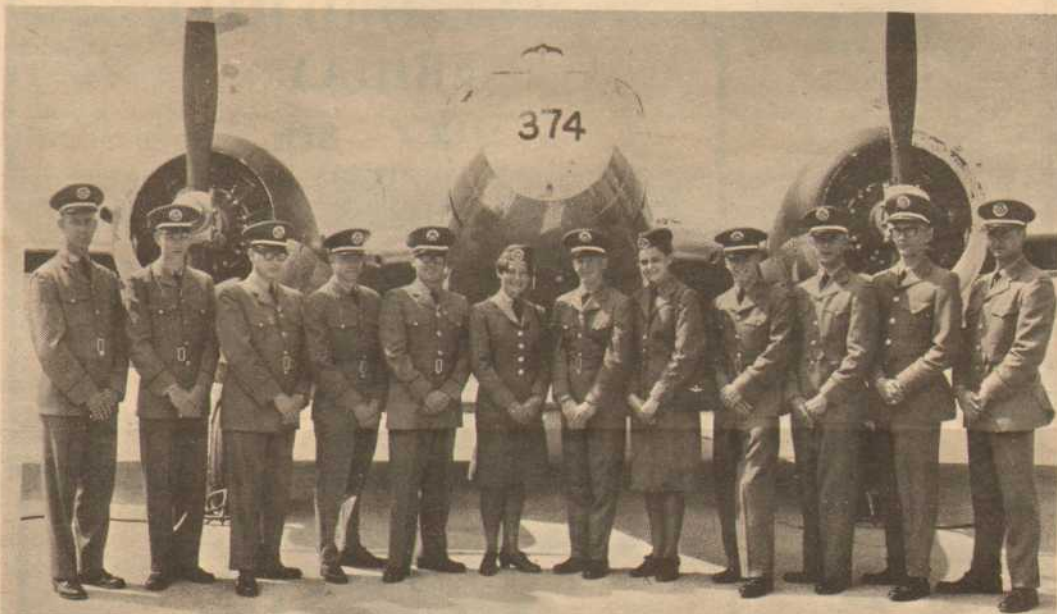
