## CHAMBER URGED TO PRESS FOR HOURLY SERVICE TO VICTORIA

— SPEAKERS OFFER TWO ALTERNATIVES

### Galiano Fire

ALL ISLAND RALLIES TO COMBAT BLAZE

Famous Galiano Bluffs Park, containing one of the last stands of virgin timber on the island, was threatened by forest fire on Sunday afternoon.

The blaze broke out in the community garbage dump, located in a deep ravine on the northern side of the park, and was fought by about 60 men for several hours before it was brought under control.

The prompt response to the call for help by scores of Island summer residents and their guests helped to save the day, according to local fire warden John Menzies. Several of Vancouver's most prominent

businessmen manned the chain saws, hoses and shovels, and worked until dark at the site. A team of local women organized a canteen service and worked along with the fire fighters throughout the night.

By Tuesday night the fire was still burning but wide guards had been bulldozed around the area and only skeleton crews were working on round the clock shifts to make sure the blaze was contained and to watch for spot fires in the surrounding forest.

Assistant Ranger from Salt Spring Island, Buck Dunsmuir, was on the scene Monday morning checking equipment and water supplies.

Shortage of water was the biggest problem at the outset when the Galiano fire truck endeavoured to wet down the tons of cardboard cartons which were burning furiously within minutes after the alarm was turned in. The truck had to draw water for its tank from a small privately owned lake some two miles away. In the meantime the tanks from the MacMillan Bloedel forestry division were pressed into service

It is not expected that the fire can be totally extinguished until autumn rains commence, and in the meantime both Bluffs Park and the community dump have been ordered closed by the Board of Trustees of the Galiano Club. Residents are asked to burn their own paper and put what they can into compost heaps, and flatten and sink tin cans in deep water off shore.

Party of visitors to Salt Spring Island left Ganges to take the 6 p.m. ferry to Swartz Bay. They sailed from Fulford at midnight.

Island visitor held up at Fulford for several hours last year has refused to visit his family here until an adequate service is offered at summer week-ends.

These were two of the reports heard by Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday evening last week.

Special meeting was called to hear a delegation of travellers and commuters who are pressing for a properly efficient service from Fulford to Swartz Bay or a new and improved service between Swartz Bay and another location.

Speaking for the travellers were Miles Acheson and George Heinekey.

Mr. Acheson opened the discussion with a summary of the problems faced by those seeking to travel to Swartz Bay during the summer week-ends. He spoke of the long line-ups of cars and the speculation of catching the ferry.

The delegate also recalled problems which had faced the ferry company when other routes were instituted and the manner in which they had been overcome.

Mr. Acheson observed that for many years the islands had been faced with a serious transportation problem. He agreed warmly that the service had never been better, with the exception of the bottleneck at Fulford and Swartz Bay.

President of the Chamber, Les Ramsey, asked whether he was asking for the re-routing of the ferry by way of Isabella Point or whether he was asking for a second ship on the run. Mr. Acheson explained that the method used to eliminate the present shortcomings was none of his affair. He was asking the Chamber to negotiate an improvement with the ferry authority. The Chamber would have to decide its own course and recommendations it might elect to make, he added.

Present ferry situation, concluded Mr. Acheson, is losing islanders, money, and friends.

Proposal to relocate the wharf at Isabella Point is no new suggestion, explained Mr. Heinekey. He had been engaged in a survey of the road and wharf area in 1958, he told the Chamber.

"We had some discussion with Gavin Mouat," he recalled, "but by the time anything could be done the ferry had changed hands."

Mr. Heinekey added that the original proposal to change the location of the wharf had called for an Isabella Point route above the level of the present road. The terrain was

## High Cost Of Fishing ★ ★ ★ Wharf Fees Doubled

High cost of fishing has taken a hike. Owners of boats normally tied up at Ganges federal wharves have been informed that the rate of one cent per foot per day has been increased to two cents.

Hike took effect August 1. There is no charge for tying up at the federal wharf in Ganges.

Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce learned of the increase at a special meeting on Wednesday evening last week.

At the same meeting the Chamber heard a report from Col. M.F. Peiler of the visit of the Department of Transport Regional Director, Dr. T.G. How. Dr. How had discussed problems connected with the wharf. He had asked for com-

plaints and recommendations.

Col. Peiler, in turn, asked for improved facilities, toilets and black top. Col. Peiler was primarily concerned with improved facilities. Dr. How was primarily interested in greater revenues. Dr. How has gained his increased revenues. Col. Peiler has gained no improvement in facilities.

The Ganges spokesman for the Chamber explained that he had learned that Ganges is among the comparatively few federal wharves at which a charge is made for mooring.

Speaking for St. Mary's Church last Sunday, the whole service conducted by these gentlemen, was inspiring.

Sir Philip, who gave the address from the pulpit, had found his theme from his recent visit to Turkey and more especially to the crypt where St. Paul had preached some 2,000 years ago.

Believed to be the last home of the Virgin Mary, Sir Philip, deeply interested, had studied his subject, taking his text from the Epistle of St. Paul, he wove the past events into the present day crisis and held the attention of the large congregation to the last word--which came too soon for many.

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### LET US MAKE PLANS NOW!

Interests of the various Gulf Islands have frequently conflicted with each other for many years in terms of ferry services. There was a time, before the B.C. Ferry Authority introduced a vastly new and augmented service, when each island tended to press for its own individual needs. Later, the islanders grouped together to ask for improved transportation. Finally, the ferry authority accepted responsibility for the islands services and islanders never looked back.

Where residents were once pleading for a daily ferry connection they now enjoy a service several times a day. Few islanders are faced with a service inferior to that which they once anxiously sought.

The service is efficient, clean and very pleasant. Every island resident knows this.

In face of this gratifying record of ferry accomplishment there are many residents who contend that islanders should not be critical of any aspect of ferry service. Yet, it would be as illogical to assume that there is no room for improvement as to offer a broad criticism of the service we enjoy today.

Interests of two Salt Spring Island groups appear to be at conflict.

A number of island residents, including the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce, have asked for an improvement in the service between Fulford and Swartz Bay. The drivers who are stranded at Fulford and await the next ferry, two hours later, are rarely gratified by the opportunity to enjoy the scenery.

The Fulford community is one of the few on the coast which has resisted attempts to take the ferry service away. The people of Fulford Harbour have pressed to retain the service and have offered various proposals for improving the service without moving away from Fulford.

It has been pointed out that the occasional delay in boarding a ferry at Fulford is not sufficiently consistent a problem to merit augmenting the service. It has been suggested that replacement of the ship now in use or the changing of locale would be costly and out of proportion to the benefits offered.

If we look to the future there are certain very obvious conclusions.

The present occasional frustration during summer week-ends is unlikely to diminish of its own accord. It is the first warning of future problems. Each year will bring new burdens of transportation until the ferry service will be totally incapable of handling the Fulford week-end traffic.

When the Chamber of Commerce last year proposed that the terminal be moved from Fulford to Isabella Point, the people of Fulford were vigorous in their protests. The community gains a considerable revenue from the ferry service, it was felt and its withdrawal would be a blow from which Fulford might never recover.

The Chamber pressed for a change. The community pressed for retention of the present status of the small port.

The situation came to a standstill. Little has been done or said about it. Each faction has developed the philosophy of closing its eyes. As long as we don't look, the ferry service will be happily adequate. And as long as we don't look the port will serve adequately.

This situation may continue indefinitely. It may continue until such time as a change is unavoidable. And at that time the island will have no recommendation to offer to the ferry authority because its eyes will be dazzled by unexpected light of reality.

The Chamber was asked last week by two delegates to press for an improved service. Many travellers may well agree that this is not yet the time to make such changes. They must also agree that this is the time to very carefully prepare for the inevitable changes of the future.

A committee has been appointed of members of the Chamber and members of the South Salt Spring Island Association to examine the picture. There has not yet appeared any useful report from the committee.

The question should be not "What to do?" but, rather, "When to do it?"

Let us examine the picture carefully and come up with an answer that is of some value to the ferry authority in their long-term consideration of local needs. Once we have the answer, then we can press for its early or later implementation.

The longer we do nothing, the quicker someone else is going to do something that is undesirable to both factions.

must contain a prepared re-bid in case partner changes the suit, which is forcing for one round. There are responses which are forcing to game but these will be dealt with at a later date. The re-bid is the important bid and shows size and shape of opener's hand. Never put yourself in a position where a rebid will embarrass you. A single raise or 1 no-trump response do not call for a forced re-bid.

With 13 points, including distribution, a player may open if the hand contains 2 quick tricks and a re-bid (This applies to first and second players). With 14 points a player must open the bidding otherwise the partner is deceived and a game contract may be missed. Some players think it is smart to fool the opponents. This should not be done at the expense of partner and shows very poor form.

What to bid:- Any 6-card or longer suit is biddable and rebiddable - even if containing no honours. Any 5-card suit is biddable but only rebiddable if containing two honour cards. By rebiddable one means a suit that may be repeated without support from partner. A 4-card suit is biddable if containing 4 h.c. points in the majors and may be shaded a little in the minors. Unless supported by partner do not re-bid a 4-card suit. Open the bidding with the longest suit. If there are two suits with the same length, say 5-card suits, bid the higher-ranking one first, not necessarily the stronger. Bidding is done by position and not by strength. This allows for the prepared re-bid and gives partner an opportunity to make a preference without raising the bidding. For example: opener bids 1 Spade partner responds 1-no-trump which the opener does not care for and bids 2 Hearts. The responder may leave the bid at 2 Hearts or bid 2 Spades, showing a preference without raising the bidding. With a minimum hand and having 5 Clubs and 5 Spades the exception is to bid the lower ranking suit and then bidding the Spades twice, if the auction permits enough space. With more than a minimum hand, 17 or more points, the hand may be opened with the Spade and the Clubs shown at the three level. In opening with a 4-card suit look for the singleton or doubleton and open with the first biddable suit below.

Now for the most abused bid in bridge - the short Club. This is a bid of convenience to take care of the prepared re-bid. It

should not be used indiscriminately as an asking bid. Many inexperienced players use the bid as an asking bid. Not knowing what opening bid to make or not being sure of themselves, they bid 1 Club hoping partner will come to the rescue. This sort of bidding should be discouraged. On the other hand the 1 Club opener has an altogether different meaning which varies with the system being used of which the partnership must be aware. As Goren is being used as a basis to work on in this series the 1 Club bid, if short, should be used as above, i.e. a bid of convenience. One will come across players who will not open 4-card majors in which case the short Club or Diamond is used. Again partnership must have an understanding.

What is the opening bid on the following hands:- This is as far as the beginner can go but the complete auction will be shown with the answers and play of the hands should be practiced, even if all hands are exposed. This gives the beginner a chance to become familiar with card combinations and the play of prepared hands which are not too difficult and not over their heads. Go slowly and take one phase of the bidding at a time and master it. Eventually the bidding will take shape and once one knows why certain bids are made and the message they convey it will simply be a matter of getting as much play as possible. It is up to the individual to learn how to play the cards. This cannot be learned out of a book but practice and more practice is what is required.

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

easy and the road provision of no great cost, he explained. Mr. Ramsey explained that there is a committee consisting of members of the Chamber of Commerce and representative of the South Salt Spring Island Association, at present investigating the ferry transportation problems.

The South Salt Spring Island Association is a society representing that area south of Cusheon Lake. It has taken a firm stand against any proposal to move the ferry terminal from Fulford. The Association avers that the ferry represents an important part of the community's economy and should not be changed.

Mr. Ramsey also reported that there had been unsubstantiated rumors that the Pender Queen could be refitted with engines to give an increase in maximum cruising speed whereby she could maintain an hourly service.

Mr. Acheson wondered whether the responsibility lay with the islanders to make any recommendation at all. He suggested that the islanders should explain their problems and have the provincial ferry authority decide the means of correcting them.
