## VILLAGE VOTE \*\*\* FRIDAY

Controversy over the incorporation of Ganges community as a village municipality will come to head on Friday when property owners will go to the polls to settle the matter.

Referendum will invite rate-payers to state whether or not they are in favor of forming a village municipality.

Municipality will cover the area from Ganges Hill, south of Cranberry Road, to the Lower Ganges Road at the government building. Running from the sea on the east, the area covers all the built-up residential section of the community as well as the commercial area.

Poll will open at 8 a.m. in the board room of Mahon Hall and it will close at 8 p.m., an hour later than the school referendum poll closes.

Only property owners will be entitled to vote. Neither tenant electors nor resident-electors will be permitted a vote on this occasion.

Returning officer is Maurice Atkins.

Voters' list has been posted in the Ganges Post Office, Mahon Hall and at Driftwood. There are nearly 400 names on the list. Vote is the preliminary to

## Pioneer Village

The warm gratitude of the community will be the Lions Club's reward for their work. The residents of the new village and the people of Salt Spring Island will all remember the Lions for this service to the community.

The Salt Spring Island Lions Club will long stand as an example to all Lions Clubs and all other service clubs, anywhere, in its unstinting service to the community it serves with distinction.

## Three Votes Again

### ★ SCHOOL DISTRICT ★

Polls will open at 8 a.m. on Friday throughout the Gulf Islands, when three school building referenda will be presented for the second time in half a year.

Three votes call for the expenditure of a quarter-million dollars on three new classrooms and an industrial education room at the Gulf Islands secondary school in Ganges; augmented facilities at the dormitory on Ganges Hill and a teacherage at Pender.

The three votes were presented last fall, when they failed to

gain the support of the voters.

Trustees of Gulf Islands School District are convinced that the experience of last fall will bring many voters to rally to the support of the by-laws.

Polls will close at 7 p.m. In Ganges the closing time may cause some confusion, with the village vote ending an hour later. Returning Officer is Mrs. Jean Voden.

Information on the referenda will be available throughout the day from the School Board office at Ganges, 537-5612.

## Speaker Calls For Clean Beach Off Village Shore

— AT GANGES MEETING

There is a stinking, squalid mess on the beaches and on the flats at Ganges and every resident and every landowner should be concerned.

C.H. Horel, chairman of the village incorporation committee at Ganges pulled no punches when he was asked for his reasons for supporting a sewer system here.

Mr. Horel was a member of a panel discussing incorporation in the Mahon Hall on Friday evening.

Panelists were Tom Moore, of the department of municipal affairs, who spoke of the advantages to the community deriving from local government. Local government provides a local medium for the resolution of local problems, he told the audience of about 40 persons.

A local government possesses regulatory powers not otherwise found nearer than Victoria and to a degree impossible by any other means.

In conclusion, Mr. Moore noted that of areas currently seeking incorporation, Ganges would be medium in size.

Laurie Benham, of the Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health, reviewed the past years and moves towards sewers. Question was thoroughly investigated about seven years ago, he noted. At that time the enquiry

reached the point of making a preliminary feasibility report. It was then visualized as a local improvement area project, said the speaker.

Nothing came of it. About two years ago the matter was raised again. A survey was made, when two men were engaged for a week or so. Obvious area of need is along the main street, he observed.

Problems of sewage in the Ganges area are beyond solution on the basis of individual parcels, said Mr. Benham. He had already reported on the problems facing the community.

"It behooved us to point out to residents that the trouble does exist," he observed. "I think everyone realizes the ramifications of sewer problems."

## TWO ARE LEAVING FOR NORTH COUNTRY AFTER TAKING COURSE IN CHICAGO

Two Ganges students are on their way up north.

They are Bruce Johnson and Sandy Hamer. Both young men have just returned from a five-week course in heavy equipment handling and maintenance.

The course proved quite an experience for the two. They made their way to Seattle and flew from there to Chicago. For five weeks they attended the Greer Institute of Technology and then returned home by air.

During the course of their training, they met young men from many lands and they fended for themselves in the large urban area of Chicago.

Setting out, the two young men joined the United Airlines 12-21 Club. As members of the airline club they bought their passages for half fare, with no reservations. Under the terms of the club, they were guaranteed passage within 24 hours. At Chicago, on the way back, they were waiting for a plane for 21 hours, just scraping in under

the deadline. The club is open only to persons between the ages of 12 and 21.

Greer Institute runs constant courses in the handling of heavy equipment and government in many parts of the world send students to learn the use of equipment there.

Bruce and Sandy were among Canadians, Americans, civilian and soldiers, Brazilians, Indians, and Arabs. There are about 150 students at the institute, explained Bruce, but only 18 were on their particular course.

They were given a week on the maintenance of trucks, loaders and bulldozers. Then, for four weeks, they operated the machines.

Why did they go? Sandy explained that the Canadian government-sponsored courses are open only to older students. Rather than wait the necessary years to enrol in a free course, they paid the way to

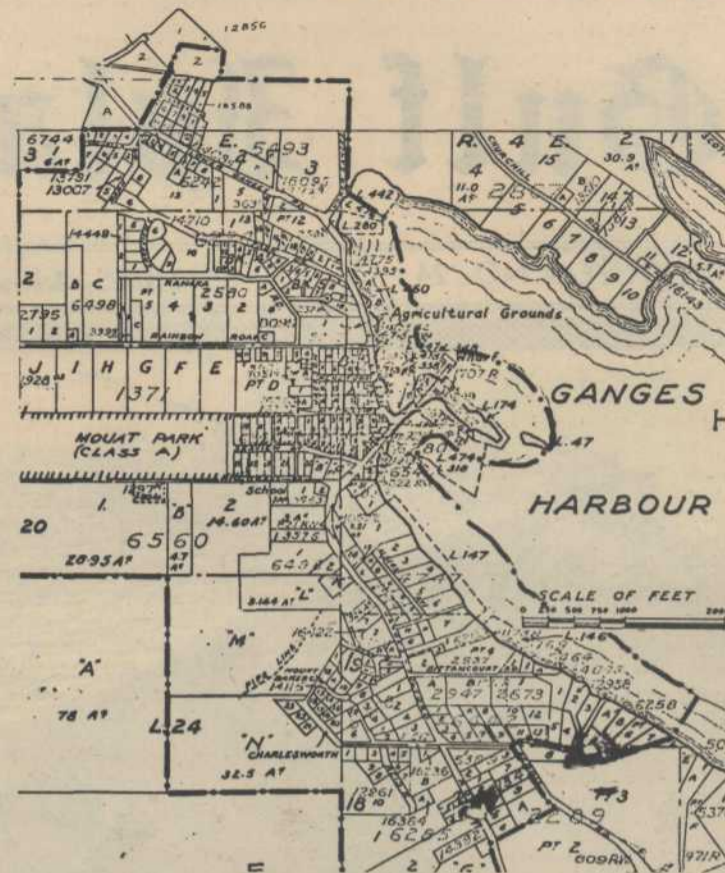

## BRIDGE QUIZ

BY ALICE HAMMETT

Answers to last week's quiz:  
(a) 3 Spades. Revaluing hand as dummy it is now worth 18 points. This is not forcing but shows size of hand and partner should proceed to four with 8 or more points. To bid 2 spades would be showing a minimum hand with a maximum of 16 points.

(b) 2 No-trump. Bookwise the bid would be 3 Diamonds showing a five-card rebiddable diamond suit and 18 points. If the contract is going to be in No-trump it is better played by the opener than have the opener's hand as dummy. Get in the no-trump bid before partner who might bid 3 No-trump over a 3-Diamond bid.

(c) 4 No-trump. Blackwood, asking for aces. This is a perfect hand for the "Key Blackwood" bid but as this is a beginner's basic course this type of bid will be taken up later.

(d) 4 Hearts. Opener's hand is minimum. Without length in the bid suit, hand cannot be promoted. Partner may bid further but knows opener's hand contains no extra values.

### Pre-emptive bids:

These are made on freak hands containing length in one suit and less than a ten-point count. Just because one has six or more cards in a suit it does not constitute a pre-empt. One of the advantages of pre-empting is to take up bidding space of the opponents who may have a game contract but are unable to enter the bidding at a high level. Vulnerability is important. One is often doubled but should not go down more than 500 points. Never pre-empt with an opening bid in one's hand. With majors always pre-empt to the limit. With minors a pre-empt of three might wind up with 3 no-trump. A person opening 3 Spades (Vulnerable) is promising 7 tricks

played in spades. Using the Rule of 2 and 3 a non-vulnerable bid of 3 Spades would promise 6 tricks played in that suit. Never change the suit when partner pre-empts. Opener gambles on two tricks when vulnerable and three tricks when not vulnerable so it is easy for partner to figure whether to proceed to game. Opener does not want trump support as opener should have at least six cards in bid suit and preferably more.

## THEIR HANDS ARE TIED

There was a time, and not so far distant, when the country resident was identified in the large cities as a hick the moment he showed his face. The rural dweller looked different from the city man. He dressed differently and he was different.

The countryman was down to earth and unaffected. His urban counterpart was sophisticated and unreal. The mode of life was partly responsible, but the mode of education offered in the two communities had obtained for so long that the average rural dweller faced the strict limits of the little red school house while his city cousin enjoyed the broad range of a large urban school.

The past several decades have been particularly significant in the change which has come about in school and education. British Columbian schools have been brought into the common fold. The consolidation of school districts, so vigorously fought in many quarters 20 years ago, has brought high schools into the range of every student in the province. This was not always the case. This equalization of the system was introduced to ensure that every student in British Columbia would be able to attend school from grade one to grade 12 and that each would enjoy approximately the same opportunities.

Within the limitations imposed by any centralized system of learning the provincial program has proved effective. There is no reason why any student on the Gulf Islands today should be outclassed in his studies by the student at one of the large secondary schools in Victoria or Vancouver.

Except for one small feature.

If the local authority, the school district, fails to provide adequate provision for the student, then the program is jeopardized and the student is out of luck. If the local authority does not provide space for the student to learn, then the standard falls. If the student is from a rural area, he becomes, in later life, identifiable as a hick from the sticks, where the schools failed to meet the challenge of commerce and industry. The local board can only provide this accommodation if the ratepayers will co-operate.

On Friday ratepayers throughout the Gulf Islands will go to the polls to settle on facilities in the Gulf Islands School District. They will be asked, in the case of one referendum, to approve three new classrooms and an industrial education room.

And let us realize now, before the election comes around, that a vote against the referendum is not a condemnation of the school board, or the department of education, or the provincial government. It is a condemnation of our own children.

Is that what we want?

## LET US HAVE BOTH!

Proponent of incorporation of the Ganges community as a village was brutally frank when he spoke on Friday evening. Replying to an enquiry regarding his concern for the village, he replied that he was interested because of the stinking, squalid mess on the beaches.

More power to Mr. Charles Horel for his blunt reply! There is no value to the community in skirting around the obvious. The beaches around the projected village



are a disgrace. We all know that. On Friday the community will be invited to approve the incorporation of the area as the first step towards installing sewers.

It is only the first step. The referendum on Friday has no bearing on the sewer program except that incorporation sets up a local council which can then proceed with a closer examination of the sewage problems and bring a recommendation to the people of the village.

Friday's vote is sought to give the first green light. After a successful village incorporation vote, the council would be elected and the members would be required to proceed with the sewer project.

Can we afford sewers? Can we afford to go much longer without them?

It has been suggested that the people of the village will be unable to meet the cost. We all shudder at the cost of sickness, but we still fight to recover. If filth brings disease and death, then we are faced with much the same choice.

Coldly and unemotionally, the community needs sewers as it needs air to breathe. A village municipality is the short cut to sewers.

Let us have both on Friday, when we support this referendum by-law!

## VILLAGE MEETING (From Page One)

The clearly sensible and only possible way of correcting the situation is by means of a sewer system, he concluded.  
Alan Kerr, consulting engineer was the man who prepared initial plans for a sewer system in Ganges.

Ganges lends itself to a sewer system because it all drains into a saucer, he explained. All it then requires is a pump to get it out to deep water.

System envisaged would consist of a collection tank and a comminutor, or grinder. The sewage would then be chlorinated and carried out to sea.

Jack Graham is municipal engineer for Esquimalt and spoke of the problems of sewage and drainage from the municipal standpoint. Sewer system was installed in Esquimalt 14 years ago, he recalled. Next year it will all be paid for.

Bill Chappell, village clerk of Lake Cowichan recalled that 23 years ago that community incorporated as a village. It had at that time 350 acres and 660 people. The problems at Lake Cowichan were more and greater explained the village clerk, but they were surmounted. There were at that time, no lights, no paved roads and no provincial works depot in the vicinity to help out with roads.

For 14 years the village operated with a rented accommodation for its staff. In 1958 it erected a municipal hall.

"Everybody is happy to pay \$5 a month for cablevision," he observed, "It is reasonable to be asked to pay the same for sewers"

C.H. Horel, man who has carried most of the load in past months, reviewed the investigation made by his committee and the reasons for choosing incorporation in preference to a local improvement district.

Moderator was Les Ramsey, Ganges druggist and president of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce.

John Sturdy wanted an explanation of the scope and function of the Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health. Mr. Benham explained at some length.

A.A. Wolfe-Milner asked whether the regulation of septic tanks was specifically laid down in the Health Act.

There is a clause which provides that no one may create or permit to escape a pollution replied Mr. Benham and this is the only term under which control can be exerted.

In regulated areas and municipalities there are specific terms under which this problem can be controlled, but they do not apply in unorganized territory.

Mrs. G. Monk wanted to know how a business firm voted. She was told by Mr. Horel that a corporation has one vote and must name an agent. Would the company dictate the manner in which the agent voted or would it be left to him, she pursued. This would be a matter for the corporation concerned, suggested Mr. Horel.

He added that corporations in the village area should note that an agent must be named for both village vote and school referendum. One nomination will not cover both votes, he cautioned.

Mr. Sturdy then asked Mr. Horel whether he was a resident of the village area. Mr. Horel replied that he was not.

"What are your interests then?" pressed Mr. Sturdy.

"My interest," replied Mr. Horel, "is that which every resident and every landowner should have. There is a stinking squalid mess on the beaches and on the flats. Furthermore, every improvement we can bring

Mr. Emerslund repeated Mr. Sturdy's question to Mr. Horel. "You absolutely deny that you have any other motive?" pursued Mr. Emerslund. He denied it categorically.

Mr. Wolfe-Milner spoke again. He is a property owner, but not a resident, he explained.

"I have ulterior motives," said Mr. Wolfe-Milner. "I think every citizen who uses Ganges has a right to expect us to do something about it. If we wait for three years the cost will go up."

In reply to a question from Mr. Sturdy, Mr. Benham explained that in a village municipality the property owner would have to connect to a sewer, but in unorganized territory where no board of health has a local function, there would be no compulsion.

He also noted that where there was hardship in the Saanich municipal area, greater flexibility in connecting up was approved by the council.

After some debate on the areas to be served and left out, Mr. Sturdy offered a summary.

"We should realize," he suggested, "that we are not voting on sewers on Friday, but on incorporation. We will have an amateur village bounded on both sides by unorganized territory. I am all for sewerage, but I believe the cost is beyond us. Not for a village... can never be a village. We will only go broke and when we do the provincial government will turn around and make all Salt Spring Island a district municipality. The people of Southey Point and Vesuvius Bay will pay for our troubles."

John McManus stated that he was taking a very different view. "I am looking to a bright fut-

ure and I can see this place growing and growing," he asserted.

Mr. McManus also spoke sharply of a correspondent in last week's Driftwood.

"One newcomer wrote to Driftwood," noted Mr. McManus, "and asked for a public meeting. I don't see him here tonight. He was just assuming a lot of things and blowing off steam."

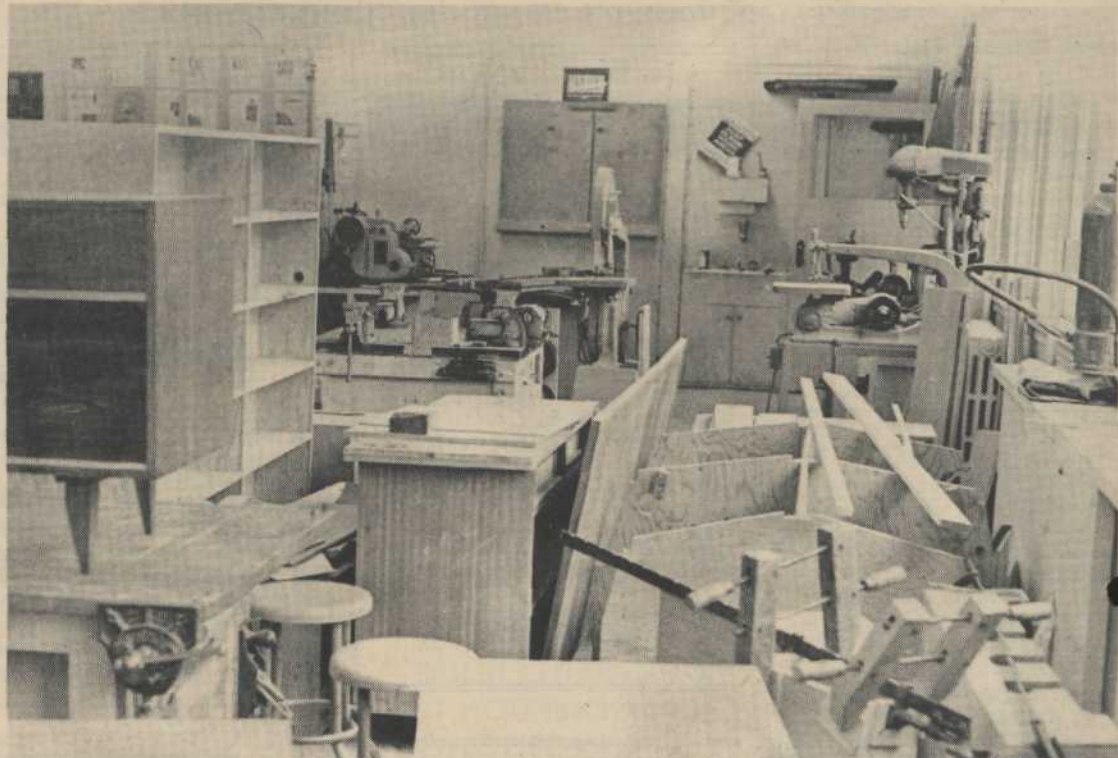
Sports Day for the Outer Islands was held on Galiano this year, Friday, June 2. It was a perfect day and thoroughly enjoyed by both students and teachers.

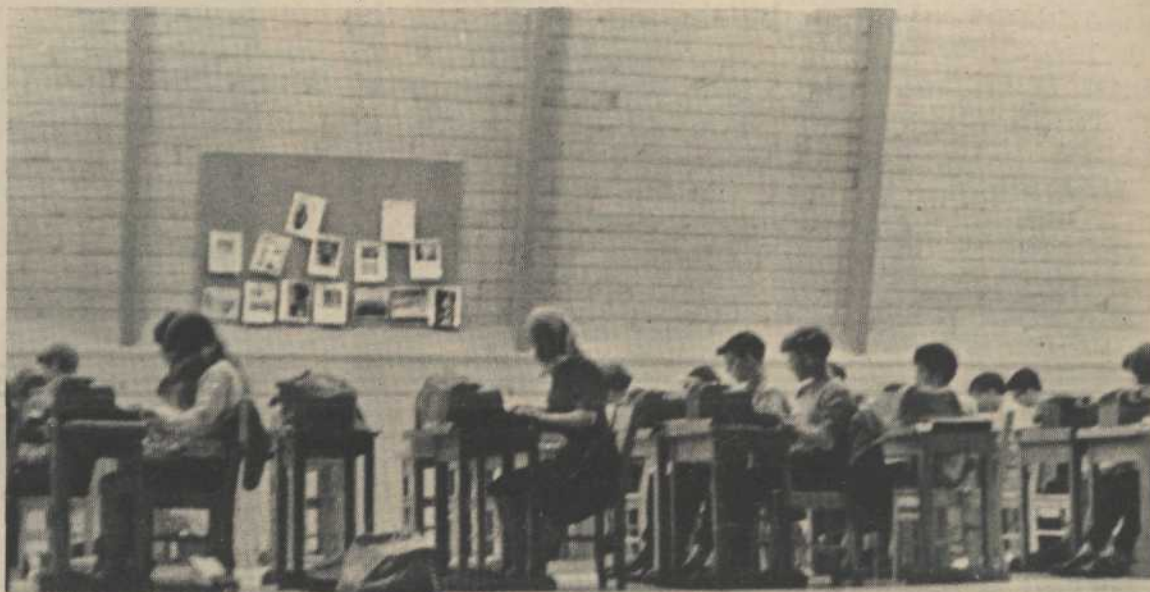

# PIONEER VILLAGE OPENS ON FRIDAY

Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia will formally open the Pioneer Village in Ganges at 2:30 on Friday afternoon.

It will represent the formal conclusion of the biggest project so far undertaken by Salt Spring Island Lions Club.

Ceremonies will commence at the village, on Lower Ganges Road, at 2:15 p.m. Various distinguished guests of the Lions will be invited to speak before the ribbon is cut by Gen. Pearkes.

One or two units will be open for inspection on this occasion and tea will be served at the conclusion of the afternoon's ceremony.

The project was launched in October, 1964, by the Island service club.

A Pioneer Village Society was incorporated under the Societies Act, to consist of members of the club only, to receive, manage and disburse the large sums of money involved.

The program, developed by the architect in cooperation with the society, provides 18 single-occupancy units and four double.

The former consist of an attractive bed-sittingroom, with fully equipped kitchenette and with a well-found bathroom. The double units have, in addition, a separate bedroom.

## HOSPITAL SERVICE

Survey of hospital needs among the Gulf Islands is already getting under way. Two representatives of a Toronto hospital consultant firm were in Ganges on Wednesday last week making their first call among the islands.

Dr. Peter Hart and Garth Pierce were here, accompanied by Reeve J.B. Cumming of North Saanich.

The two Torontonians represent Agnew, Peckham and Associates Ltd., who have been chosen to carry out the survey of all hospital needs in the Greater Victoria area.

The survey will make recommendations in respect of every type of hospital care, including a suitable location for a replacement for Rest Haven Hospital.

Although the Gulf Islands have not yet formally come into any regional district, the survey will show the needs and trends of islanders in connection with hospital care. It will consider all facilities, active treatment, rehabilitation, convalescent,

chronic care, boarding homes and home treatment and care, outpatient services, mental health and personnel training.

Sponsored by the capital region of Greater Victoria the survey will be primarily concerned with the islands as a function of the Greater Victoria Region.

Survey will also consider the district served by all the hospitals, the population and population growth trends. Pattern of hospital services and treatment will be examined by the Toronto team.

Comparisons between characteristics of local hospitals will be made and the physical plants capabilities and likely developments as well as staffs and potential services will be analyzed.

The team will probably consider acute hospital needs of the district first, and make its interim report to cover the present shortcomings of the district in terms of active hospital care. It is hoped that this aspect of the enquiry will be ready by November.

Cost of the survey, to be borne by the Regional District, will be \$40,000.

Original plans of the district called for a survey of the Vancouver Island area of Saanich Peninsula and the Victoria conurbations. With the extension

There are no stairs; ease in  
household cleaning is secured  
by the materials used; there is  
a communal laundry with auto-  
matic equipment; mail is deli-  
vered at the gate.

The buildings, each contain-  
ing two suites, are supported on  
concrete slabs and foundation  
walls with roofs of cedar shakes  
over artistically exposed rafters.

Galvanized chains at the roof  
corners serve to conduct rain-

Gulf Islands Branch 84 commemorated Legion Week with a Church Parade on Sunday, June 11 at Saturna Island.

Quite a number of branch members, including one veteran of the South African Campaign were on parade and a fair number of the residents of Saturna were present in the church.

The service was conducted by the Rev. John Dangerfield, MBE, one of the branch padres, and a veteran of the Second War. The church had been beautifully decorated for the occasion.

Fifty years ago, the Canadian Army, operating for the first time as a unit, had just won a resounding victory at Vimy Ridge the battle that is fittingly and correctly claimed as the one that made us a nation.

Gone for ever was the Bosch OP on the ridge that had made life so uncomfortable for over two years in the area of Souchez Ecurie, the Labyrinth and Arras.

This was the line where the "Old Contemptible" had dug in, and stayed, despite everything, after the battle of the Aisne, at the end of the long retreat from Mons.

Troops were building up for that bloody and desperate Third Battle of Ypres, which was to start on July 31 and finally fizzle out in late October.

Twenty-five years ago the Second Canadian Division had made its gallant, but futile... or so it seemed... raid on Dieppe. To many of us, these are not historical events... they are living memories.

The attack on Europe was still a year away, but the training schemes in preparation were taking us hither and yon over southern England.

This week has been designated as Legion Week.

Many who may read these lines are far too young to remember "Goodbye, Dolly Grey", "Tipperary" or "There'll Always be an England". They may have heard that their fathers, grandfathers, perhaps great-grandfathers, had marched away to foreign fields to these tunes.

In this Legion Week we ask you to remember all who laid down their lives on Flanders' Fields, in Italy and other places. We ask you also to think of those who returned, battle-scarred, to spend a life more or less in pain. We ask you to think, in the words that we use at all Legion meetings:

"At the going down of the sun,  
And in the morning,  
We Will Remember Them."
