POWER FAILURE PROVES COSTLY FOR OPERATORS

Power failure on Thursday afternoon, which left all the islands, including Vancouver Island without power, had a few islanders running quickly for help.

Hardest hit were the resorts, whose water pumps were working hardest. Number of pumps lost their motors from the sharp reduction in voltage.

Other electrical equipment also failed.

Reduction in power resulted from dependance on Vancouver Island supplies when the mainland service went out.

ADULT IS 23

How old is an adult? Gulf Islands School District define him as 23 years of age or older.

Question arose when trustees were last week debating the new provision of high school classes for adults.

School district plans the admission of adults to certain classes in an effort to encourage those who left school without graduating to return for the final grades.

It was agreed that for the terms of the proposal an adult will be a person over the age of 23.

Donald Hartwig reported that he had attended a teachers' conference at UBC this summer to learn that the proposal of the district trustees is very much in keeping with similar projects elsewhere in the province.

Problem facing adult students is the irregularity of schedules. The school day follows a six-day week and the English class on Monday this week may be on Tuesday next.

TO REMAIN TWO

NO AMALGAMATION

Trustees of the Gulf Islands School District expressed sharp regret that the Salt Spring Island library had rejected any plans for the merger of the public library and the school library in the community.

"It is too bad they don't see the great advantage to the community of having the total resources available," commented J. M. Campbell.

The combination of public library and school library could put all the facilities on the island in the hands of all the islanders, he observed.

The community was acting in a very parochial manner, he added. It was particularly unfortunate, he added, because some members of the board had anticipated that the proposal would be considered in this light.

The discussion followed on the heels of a trustee discussion on the importance of library service to the schools and to the younger students.

Marshall Sharp suggested that the Salt Spring Library is fearful that the school district is seeking to take their library.

"They would cheerfully take over the school library" he told his colleagues.

The proposal would take nothing from the community library, protested Mr. Campbell, but would offer far better facilities. The two would share the same roof, staff and facilities.

The community library is a way of life to many on Salt Spring Island, remarked L. J. Armstrong, and any change "would be over their dead bodies".

This was not the end of the matter, suggested Mr. Campbell. "Anything that is good cannot be stopped," he observed, "It will come."

SHEEP DOG TRIALS

Nanaimo dog trainer was first as Salt Spring Island's Bill Evans, with King, came in second at the first official sheep dog trials to be staged on the island for more than 30 years.

Mr. Evans thought back to 1936, but the judge, Bob Sibbald of Matsqui, went back two more years and plumped for 34 years ago.

There were eight entries from Salt Spring Island, Vancouver Island and the mainland.

Top man was Don Beaton, of Nanaimo, with 36 points in seven minutes. Mr. Evans made 34 points in 12 minutes.

W. Gould, of Nanaimo took third place.

Shaw's field at Fulford was crowded with watchers as the trials went on.

Wild mountain sheep were provided by Ted Akerman. An entrant in the contest, himself, Mr Akerman gained no benefit from using his own animals. Within minutes his own four sheep had been driven through the fence and were milling about the crowd. He rounded them up and ushered them into a corral without further competing.

Another victim of baulky sheep was Miss Heather Parkes, of Duncan.

From the start her chances were blasted. The sheep split up and her dog was confused, as one animal hid himself while another backed up to the fence and refused to move despite the efforts of the sheepdog to drive him off.

Bill Evans had one baulky animal and twice he had three sheep in the pen, losing them as the fourth was coerced into entering.

The trials were only part of the day's events.

WHAT COMES FIRST?

What is the primary need in educational research?

When trustees of Gulf Islands School District were asked this question they came up with a number of answers last week.

Proposals were an investigation into a more equitable means of meeting the costs of education: investigation of effective methods of assessing teachers and pupils; the investigation of free discipline schools ready in operation in some communities.

Final proposal concerns a province-wide aspect of some schools. . . why do so many Indian students drop out in grade eight?

Trustees reflected that many Indian students start late. They are slower in the primary grades for a lack of experience of many aspects of learning. They catch up until the end of the elementary school and then fall back.

The trustees were replying to an invitation from the Educational Research Institute of B.C. to submit proposals for the institute's consideration.

INTEREST WANES AS THREE APPEAR IN GANGES COURT

Second Ganges case of assault by hair-cutting was less keenly followed on Friday.

Previous Friday had seen an unprecedented crowd in the Ganges police court. Last Friday's attendance figures were down as Brian Percy Beech and Mervin Douglas Walde appeared for the second time and Gilbert Moise Marcotte for the first.

Beech and Walde had already been convicted of the assault on May 31 on David William McClean when they had been accompanied by John Lawrence Quesnel and had waylaid the long-haired Ganges man and cut his hair in his car.

Quesnel had been fined and the other two were awaiting sentence.

Marcotte was out of the case by the time Crown's case was presented. Magistrate D.G. Ashby agreed with the defence motion that he had at no time been a party to the assault.

Beech and Walde were given a suspended sentence in respect of the McClean incident and placed on their own recognizances of \$250 to be of good behavior. They were also fined \$75 each in respect of the later incident.

Second charge arose from the June 1 hair-cutting project at the Lepage Road cabin of Colin Knight, when Knight, 19, Anthony Richards, 17, Brent Hartley, 18, and Tom Charbonneau 17, were partially shorn of their hair.

Defence, jointly offered by Henry Castillon and Jakob de-Villiers, suggested that the incident was a joke enjoyed by all concerned or that the victims had given consent inasmuch as



they had not formally protested. Magistrate Ashby did not agree.

"There was never any suggestion that these lads were invited to contribute their beautiful locks," he observed, "and that's against the law!"

Beech and Walde, he added, had not committed a serious crime, but they went out "with hellery in their hearts."

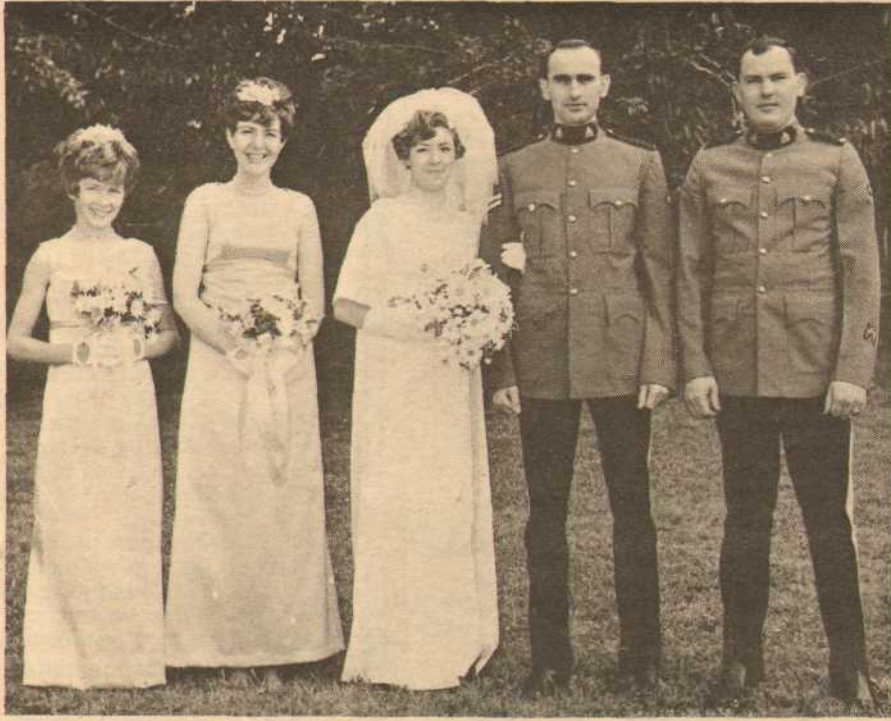

Practice of the Gulf Islands School District trustees of holding summer meetings on the outer islands failed to bring large and interested crowds of spectators.

Trustees arrived from Spring Island by Mike Stacey's water taxi. Also waterborne were L.J. Armstrong from Pender, Mrs. James Ross, from Mayne Island and J.M. Campbell, who came from Saturna.

Only firm, dry feet at the meeting were those of Donald New.

Mr. Menzies enquired of the policy regarding grade eight. Is grade eight to be offered on the outer islands or will students be required to attend this year's grade at Salt Spring Island School, he enquired.

There is no firm policy, Mr. Campbell explained.

If the school principal and the parents are in agreement the student may be invited to take grade eight on Salt Spring, he explained. Some children at grade eight readily adapt to dormitory life and others don't, he explained.

FINE FOLLOWS SPECTACULAR CRASH AND FIRE IN FULFORD VALLEY WHEN CAR OVERTURNED

Sequel to a spectacular car crash at Fulford on July 14 was the appearance on Friday of Henning Satermo, Ganges, in Ganges magistrate's court.

Satermo pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention.

It was explained that the 1957 model Chevrolet was coming over of a left-hand curve on Fulford-Ganges Road in the Fulford Valley, when it skidded off the road and went into the ditch.

Skid marks showed that the vehicle skidded into the ditch with the bottom of the car dragging. It slid for 104 feet in the ditch and then struck a crossing over the culvert.

The crossing caused the car to rise in the air and turn end-over-end two and a half times before coming to rest on its roof. Distance between leaving the road and coming to rest, stated Const. Wayne Dew, was 190 feet.

The car then burst into flames and was gutted.

The three occupants of the car were helped out by Roger Hughes, outside whose farm the

accident occurred.

Miss Marylee Sawyer suffered lacerations, abrasions and shock. Fred Hall was treated for lacerations to the cheek and lower back, while the driver, Henning Satermo, suffered a broken collar bone, lacerations, fracture and shock, from which he is still recovering.

The skid marks showed evidence of excessive speed, continued the constable. The driver had been most co-operative, he added.

Satermo declined to speak in his own defence. The incident occurred as the constable had detailed it, he told the court.

Formerly engaged as a logger Satermo was now contemplating joining the Royal Canadian Air Force.

He was lucky a charge of dangerous driving had not been laid, stated Magistrate M.F. Peiler, observing that the accident had occasioned damage of \$2,000 and two passengers had been hurt while in his care.

Fine of \$60 was imposed and a three-month suspension of his driver's license.

Correlation of the two services could bring a wider range of reference books instead of such a duplication.

Today, reading is facing a decline. More people than ever before are now able to read. More than ever before are now abandoning the pursuit. Any effort by the community that might contribute to increased literacy should be eagerly grasped.

We would urge the library committee on Salt Spring Island to satisfy itself beyond doubt that the proposal would not benefit the community.

It was a community band coming to a community concert and both enjoyed the meeting.

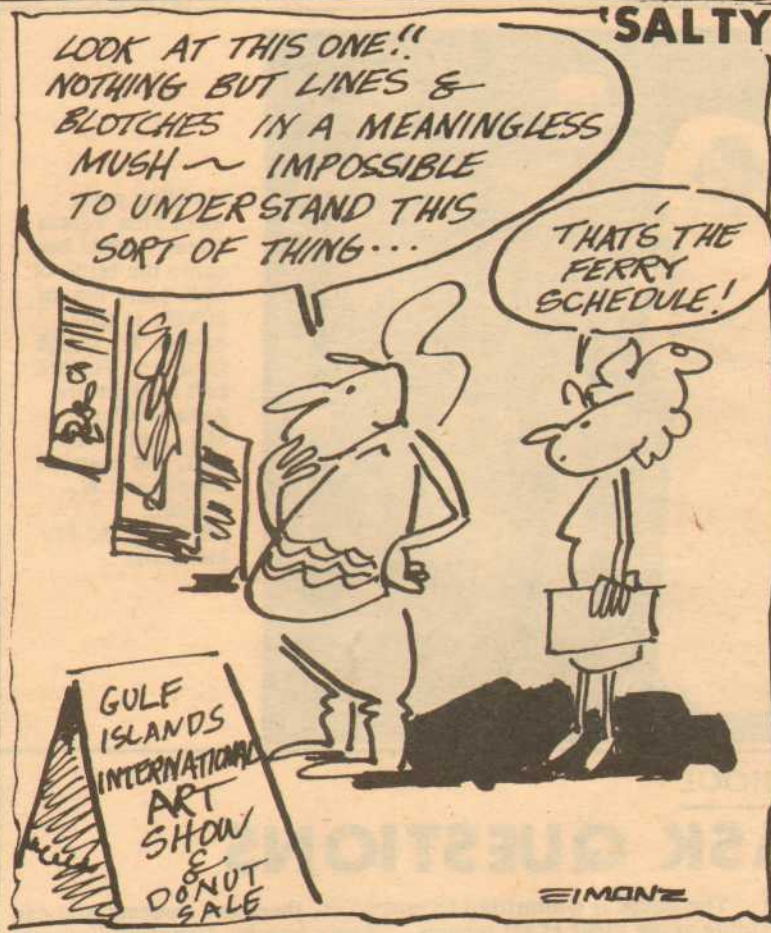

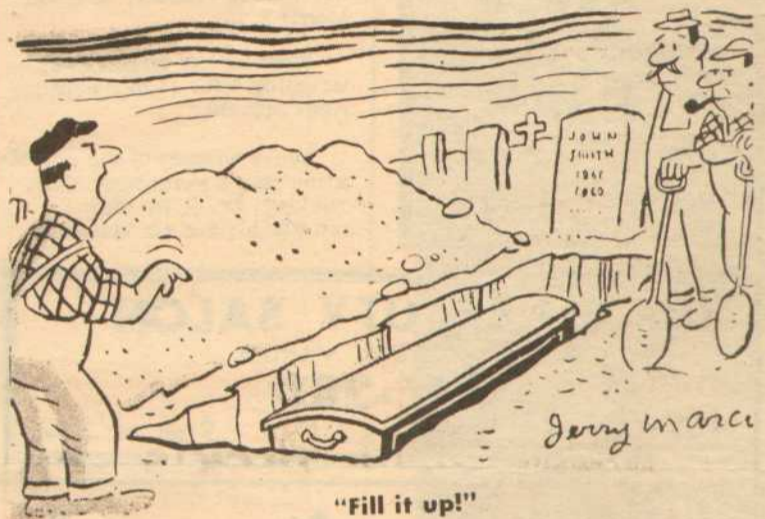

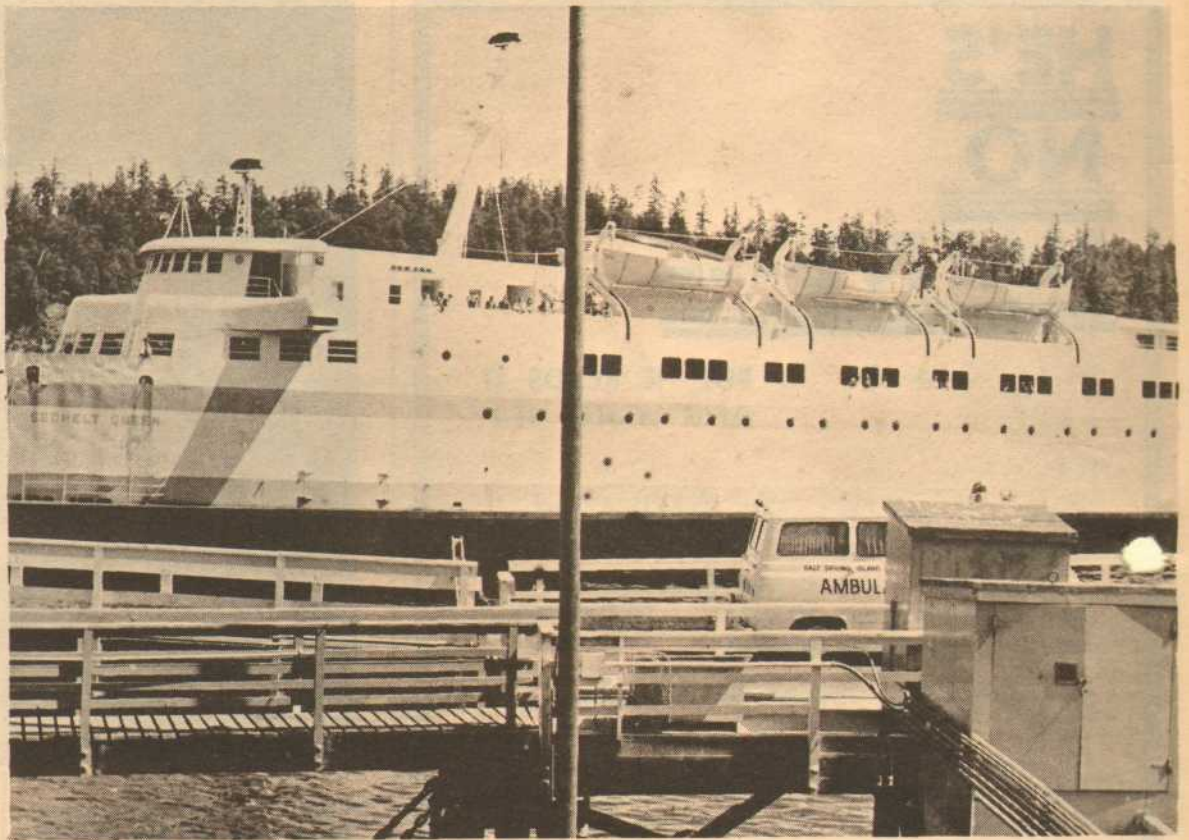
Salt Spring Island road was temporarily a private one at the week end.

On Monday morning department of highways crews turned up to remove the signs from the road.

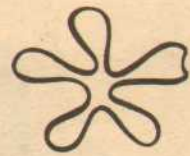
Sechelt Queen towers over the wharf installation at Long Harbour. The former Black Ball ship can be clearly seen here as her distinctive curves identify her.

BEEKEEPERS GATHER AT MAYNE ISLAND TO ENJOY FIRST FIELD DAY AMONG GULF ISLANDS EVER

The first Beekeepers' Field Day to be held on Mayne Island took place Saturday, August 3 at George Payne's Apiary situated on Miners Bay overlooking Active Pass, reputed to be "the busiest Marine Highway in the world."

A large number of beekeepers from both Vancouver and Victoria were on hand, arriving from the mainland by The Queen of the Islands and the Mayne Queen from Vancouver Island. Guests enjoyed a luncheon in the form of a Basket Picnic outdoors - a lovely day, not too hot. A large table was laden with good food of which Mr. Payne's honey was the piece de resistance.

Mr. Payne gave a very comprehensive and instructive lecture on beekeeping in general and explained the use of beekeeping equipment which is readily available from Bee Supply Houses. He gave a most lucid explanation of a new system of wintering colonies in small nuclei, so grouped that each adds warmth to the other, thus enabling a greater number of colonies to be brought through the winter with a minimum feeding of honey.

Much interest was shown in Mr. Payne's specialty which is Queen Raising. He plans to develop a true strain of the Anatolian bee. These bees were found in Turkey and successfully brought to Canada by importing bees and larvae in a special belt worn around a man's waist.

Experiments carried on by Guelph University found that the Turkish Anatolian bee has much better qualities for Canada than the bees now known here. They found it much thriftier and conserves food during the off season periods. It makes a better and more compact brood nest and expands rapidly at the proper time.

My husband, Jesse Brown, has had one colony of Anatolian bees the past year and found that it wintered well and expanded very fast in the early Spring and was strong for the honey flow. When the flow waned they got rid of the drones and reduced their expansion very quickly. They produced more honey than either the Caucasian or Italian colonies.

95 PER CENT SUCCEED THIS YEAR

Twenty-one out of 23 Gulf Island Secondary School students passed or were recommended in all government examinations written at the end of the past school term.

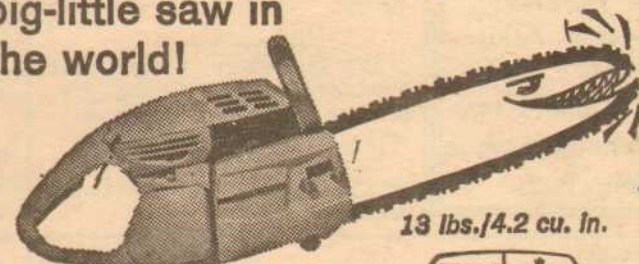
