## BAND CONCERT



It was the weather and the band and the crowds and the choice of music. It was all these things that contributed to a pleasing concert at Centennial Park on Sunday afternoon.

Delta Community Band came for the players' annual picnic. For the second year in a row the band came to Salt Spring Island to enjoy a day out and to entertain passengers aboard the Sechelt Queen, with a band concert in the park sandwiched in the middle.

Band was sponsored by the Salt Spring Island Lions Club, whose members arranged trans-

portation to and from the ferry terminal at Long Harbour.

Approximately 150 players, families and friends came in on the noon boat. Approximately the same number left on the 4:30 boat. Approximately half would have been delighted to have stayed.

Band is formed from residents of the Delta area, south of Vancouver. Musicians range from school students to pensioners. They all enjoy music.

Conductor is Robert Herriott, who presented a trumpet solo during the afternoon while Alec Ronnie, assistant director, took the baton.

## FLIGHTS DOUBLED

### New Beaver On Run

Victoria Flying Services are now operating seven flights daily each way between the Gulf Islands and Vancouver, and four flights daily between the islands and Victoria.

The expanded summer schedule is the result of steadily increasing traffic to and from the islands, and made possible by the entry into service of another 6-passenger DeHaviland "Beaver" aircraft.

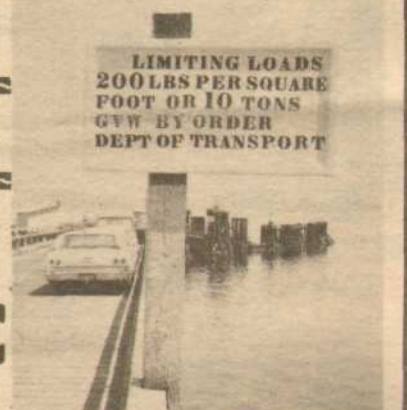
The plane has been given the name "City of Vancouver" and joins a sister ship, "City of Victoria" and smaller Cessna aircraft in carrying the load to and from Salt Spring, Galiano, Mayne, Pender and Saturna. Of the seven daily Vancouver flights, three are exclusively Vancouver-Gulf Islands, with the turn-around point at Ganges.

Reservations are required for all flights. They depart daily from Ganges (government aircraft float) at 8:30, 10 and 11 am, and at 1, 2, 4:30 and 6 pm. Return flights leave Vancouver (Bayshore Inn) at 8, 10 and 11 am, 12 noon, and 3, 4 and 5:30 pm.

For Victoria, flights depart from Ganges at 8:30 and 11:30 am, and 4:30 and 6 pm. Flight leave Victoria (Inner harbour) at 8 and 9:30 am, and 1:30 and 5:30 pm.

## No Heavy Trucks

## TRAFFIC RESTRICTED



Heavy trucks will not be able to travel to Salt Spring Island by the Vesuvius Crofton ferry within the foreseeable future. The present wharf is not only inadequate to handle the weight, but there is no indication that either federal or provincial government is prepared to take any action, DRIFTWOOD was told this week.

Two weeks ago the Crofton ferry wharf was condemned by the department of transport for vehicles exceeding 10 tons gross weight. It had never been designed for a greater weight, reported a department official. The wharf was rebuilt by the federal government in 1958. Although it was then being used by the ferry under an agreement with the provincial government no effort was made to bring it up to a standard whereby it could handle all ferry traffic.

Two weeks ago the Crofton ferry wharf was condemned by the department of transport for vehicles exceeding 10 tons gross weight. It had never been designed for a greater weight, reported a department official. The wharf was rebuilt by the federal government in 1958. Although it was then being used by ferry under an agreement with the provincial government no effort was made to bring it up to standard whereby it could handle all ferry traffic.

The wharf was not subsequently supervised and it was only within the last few weeks that the department was notified that vehicles of unlimited weight were regularly passing over the wharf.

The present restriction was published and heavy vehicles must use other means of reaching Salt Spring Island.

Biggest sufferer is the concrete truck. In the past ready-mixed concrete has been brought over from Duncan area. The trip is a short one and there is a ferry every hour, permitting a minimum delay on the island.

Change will boost the cost of concrete by at least a quarter, DRIFTWOOD was told, and deliveries will be more restricted.

Frustrated user of the wharf told DRIFTWOOD that it is not the supplier who is seriously suffering, it is the islander.

"If you want an adequate wharf," he said, "get on to your MLA or Member of Parliament and tell him how you feel and what should be done," he urged.

Crofton wharf has been restricted, with ferry traffic using one side only after reports of sinking up to eight inches were current.

### SHEEP DOG TRIALS

Commencing at 10 a.m., there will be a ram show of all breeds. Mr. Wm. Gould of Nanaimo, vice-president of the B.C. Purebred Sheep Breeders' Association will judge the ram show

and will speak on the different breeds and cross-breeding.

At 10:30 a.m., Dr. S.N. Wood, a veterinarian who is now living on Salt Spring Island will speak on tagging, the value of keeping records and culling. Dr. Wood is from Williams Lake and was formerly with the Federal Department of Agriculture at U.B.C.

Two classes in the lamb competition will be held at 11 a.m. and judged by Mr. Bill Savage of Ladner. Mr. Savage is president of the B.C. Purebred Sheep

## NOW IS THE HOUR

The campaign is open. Already the voices of the provincial politicians are hoarse as they shout their wares to a largely apathetic electorate.

And in the meantime one of the lifelines to Salt Spring Island is severed.

Who cares?

The contractor cares. The new home builder cares. Many islanders care.

No heavy traffic is permitted to use the Crofton wharf. Vehicles exceeding two tons gross weight are prohibited because the structure was built by the federal government with a maximum load factor of 20,000 pounds.

Heavy trucks cannot board the ferry. Nor leave it, at Crofton. The whole thing could collapse.

But who cares?

The federal government shrugs its shoulders. The wharf does everything the federal government wants of it. The provincial government explains that it is a federal problem and that it cannot work on a federal property.

Island users of the wharf in their capacity of federal voters are fighting their alter ego of provincial voter. It is nonsense!

Now is the hour to do something. Now is the time when each and every politician is keenly aware of the sore flesh under a chafing pressure.

Mr. Tisdalle knows of the problems. He knows we can no longer bring in island supplies to Vesuvius. Has he done anything? Has he said anything? Come on, John! Now is the hour!

Is it the plan of the two governments to leave us to our fate? A pox on both their houses! Where can we go to gain relief?

## Memorial Service

The Church of St. Margaret of Scotland was filled to overflowing on Sunday, July 20, for a memorial service for the late Irving Sinclair.

Mr. Sinclair died in San Francisco in February of this year, and members of his family were present for this lovely memorial, which was given by the Rev. H. Dunster, of Victoria.

Mr. Sinclair was Galiano's own beloved son, he was born at Mayne Island, and came to Galiano with his parents at the age of two. He spent much of his younger life on the Island, and

## REQUIREMENTS FOR PLEASURE CRAFT

under the Small Vessel Regulations  
(Recommended on rowboats and canoes,  
mandatory on power and sailing craft).

NOTE: "Approved" means approved by the Department of Transport.

### Not Over 18 Feet in Length

1. One approved small vessel lifejacket or lifesaving cushion for each person on board.
2. Two oars and rowlocks or two paddles.
3. One bailer or one manual pump.
4. If equipped with an inboard motor, permanently fixed or built-in fuel tanks or a cooking or heating appliance that burns liquid or gaseous fuel, one class BI fire extinguisher.

### Over 18 Feet But Not Over 26 Feet in Length

1. One approved small vessel lifejacket for each person on board.
2. Two oars and rowlocks, two paddles or one anchor with not less than 50 feet of cable, rope or chain.
3. One bailer or one manual pump.
4. If the vessel is power-driven or is equipped with a cooking or heating appliance that burns liquid or gaseous fuel, one class BI Fire Extinguisher.

### Over 26 Feet But Not Over 40 Feet in Length

1. One approved small vessel lifejacket for each person on board.
2. One approved lifebuoy 30 inches, 24 inches or 20 inches in diameter.

4. One bailer and one manual or power-driven bilge pump.
5. Twelve pyrotechnic distress signals in a watertight container, of which not more than six may be daylight smoke signals.
6. One anchor with not less than 50 feet of cable, rope or chain.
7. If the vessel is power-driven or is equipped with a cooking or heating appliance that burns liquid or gaseous fuel, one class BI fire extinguisher.
8. Sufficient lights and sound signalling apparatus to permit the vessel to be operated in compliance with Part VI of Small Vessel Regulations.

### Over 40 Feet But Not Over 65 Feet in Length

1. One approved standard lifejacket or one approved small vessel life jacket for each person on board.
2. One approved 30 inch lifebuoy or two approved 24 inch diameter lifebuoys.
3. One buoyant heaving line of not less than 50 feet in length.
4. Twelve pyrotechnic distress signals in a watertight container, of which not more than six may be daylight smoke signals.
5. One anchor with not less than 50 feet of cable, rope or chain.
6. Two fire buckets.
7. One manual or power-driven pump located outside the machinery space with one fire hose and nozzle whereby a jet of water can be directed into any part of the vessel.

9. If the vessel is power-driven or is equipped with a cooking or heating appliance that burns liquid or gaseous fuel, one class BII fire extinguisher.
10. Sufficient lights and sound signalling apparatus to permit the vessel to be operated in compliance with Part VI of Small Vessel Regulations.

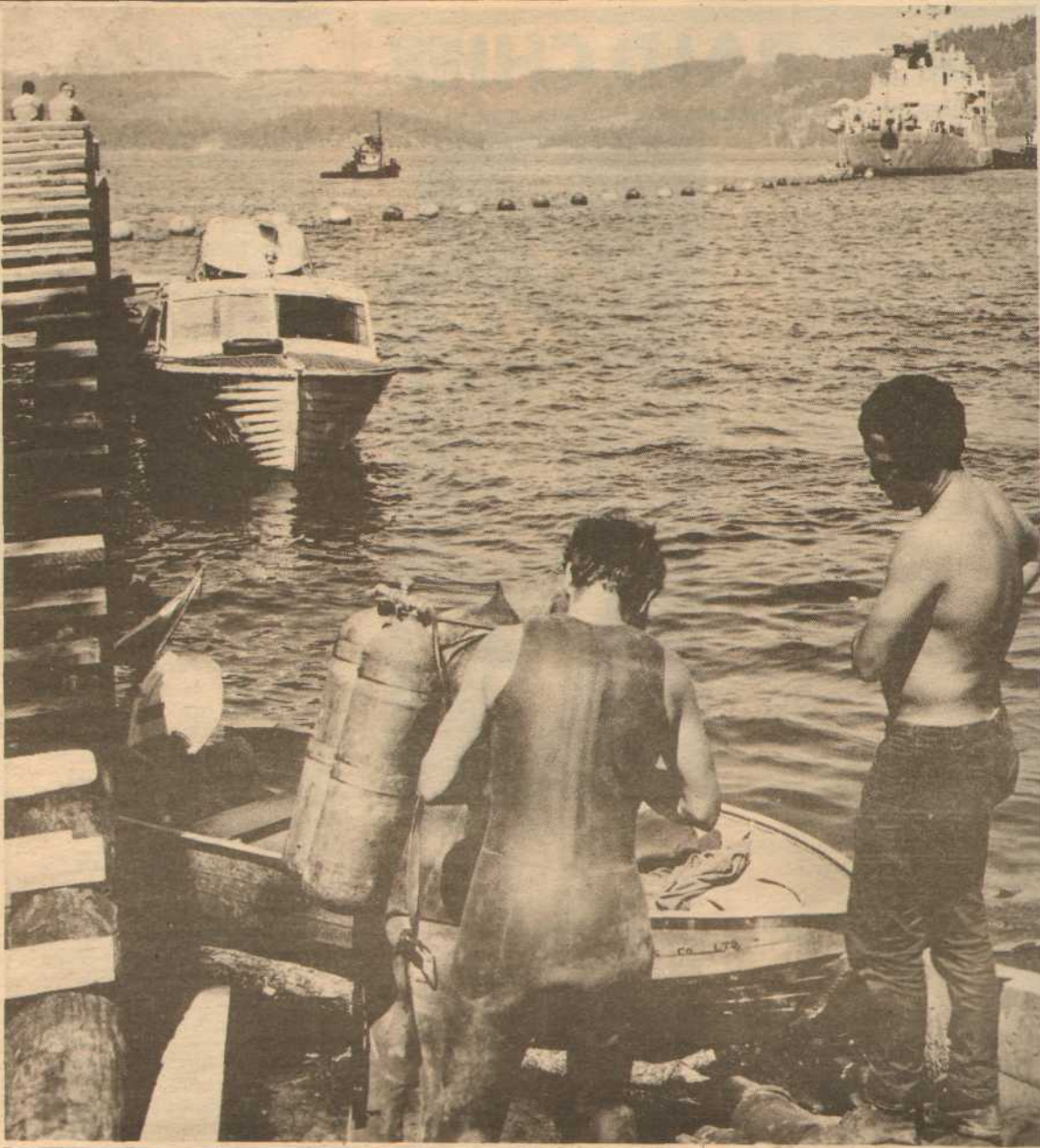

In May, Kelowna floats on lilacs. They foam all over town and spill into the countryside; and by the rotted log foundations of a pioneer cabin stands Walt Whitman's "lilac-bush tall-growing with heartshaped leaves of rich green". This May, Kelowna floated on air — lilac-scented — having been chosen as host for the Dominion Drama Festival, the smallest town to be so honored. Since 1933, when Ottawa held the first Festival, it had come to Victoria twice, Vancouver once. And, but for Dave Chapman, strong-arming and sweet-talking, Kelowna would not have had its \$150,000, 900-seat community theatre, built in 1962, which Festival

Mr. Smith was latterly in Langford, Fire Chief of the Langford Volunteer Fire Department, he was also a full-time member of the fire department at the dockyard. He was following a familiar pattern. The appointment enables a man to help his own community by working at a project with which he is thoroughly familiar.

ing quite a bit of agony.

Michael Irwin, stage director was loaded to the DDF by SFU where he is Technical Director of Theatre. His mother, Mary Vickery Irwin, chairman, Kelowna Little Theatre and in charge of DDF Wardrobe and Properties, was for years a summer visitor at Port Wash. His father, Ron Irwin, as a student worked for Stan Harris on Moresby; and often stayed with the Beaver Point Ruckles. And Michael's great-grandfather Edwards, until 1923 was postmaster and storekeeper at Fulford.

Pierre Lefevre was pleased with the part youth has played in the festival. Some of it seemed "loud and mindless, but this is what's going on today and has to be faced."

Between sips in the Capri bar he said "I am very interested in the choice of plays. I know some people are a bit frightened at being confronted with this new type of play. It is not necessary to have conventional plays. I think it is important that people should see what is going on in other places."

Dorothy Somerset thinks "it is a form of evolution and/or revolution." Lefevre agreed with her that people must not disapprove of something they have not seen before. It is a form of fear of the unfamiliar.

Dr. Somerset, who is always turned-on, says "I am thrilled to make a firsthand confrontation with this new mood. On the basis of what I have seen, I think the talented young French Canadian actors, authors and directors, are making the most important and exciting contribution to the overall drama, in Canada.
