ISLAND WALKATHON

Walkers will compete for prizes, pleasure and the prestige of walking to benefit the community.

First proposal sounded locally was that of John Stepaniuk, who told DRIFTWOOD that he believes the practice of local projects is now exhausted.

"Let's see something for all the people of the province this time," he urged.

TO FILL AREA IN GANGES

Mouat's Trading Company Ltd. is at the present time advertising plans to take over foreshore near the store and to fill it in for car parking and other purposes.

The area of foreshore is close to an acre altogether.

It is the area between the store and the Bank of Montreal and Lower Ganges Road from the fire hall to just north of the Ganges Crest.

The area will be served by a new road not yet designated, running from Lower Ganges Road to the area behind the bank.

Plans have not yet been compiled for the final development of the store facilities around the point, but majority of the area concerned will probably be used for car parking purposes, reports R.M. Toynebee, of Mouat's.

Dominion Day, will be observed by various community festivities. Majority of stores will be closed as will government and local administrative offices.

Complaints of the sloppy handling of wood chips at Crofton Mill have been referred to the minister of lands and forests.

Recreation Minister Kenneth Kiernan informed Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce last week that complaints of water pollution had been dealt with in that manner.

ROADS WORK

Road from Fulford to Vesuvius is to be reconstructed.

Earlier promise by John Tisdalle, MLA for Saanich and the Islands, was borne out this week with the announcement from the Premier's office that an allocation of \$200,000 has been approved for the purpose.

The money will be spent on bringing the highway up to standard after the severe beating it suffered during the winter.

The 20th event will be geared to a crowd of hundreds of hungry lamb-lovers and a variety of entertainments will be offered to accompany the meal.

Visitors come by sea and air, by launch and chartered boat. A few come by foot. It's their island.

PARK FLAGS GONE AGAIN

Flags were stolen from Centennial Park during Sunday night.

On Monday morning there were no flags at the park and the halyards had been ripped away from the flagpoles.

Damage was also done to the hoses in the park.

Since the park was established two years ago it has been impossible to keep flags intact.

They have been removed about five times in two years.

On Monday Col. Peter Bingham was disconsolate. President of the Salt Spring Island branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, he was mourning the loss of the flags from the cenotaph.

"It is so meaningless," he said.

And once again the flag-staffs at Ganges were bare.

Flags destroyed at the weekend were purchased by public subscription last year.

Don't Fix Wharf — Move it!

Consideration should be given to the possibility of moving Fulford wharf before any repair work or replacement is contemplated.

In a letter to Highways Minister W.A. Black this week president of Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce Gavin Reynolds has urged a delay in allocating funds to Fulford wharf.

"This chamber feels that funds earmarked for the above program would be better used towards the construction of a new terminal at Isabella Point, said his letter.

"It appears that the useful life of Fulford terminal is limited," he concluded.

MINISTER HAS MORE GOODIES

PARK OFFER

There were more goodies in Recreation Minister Kenneth Kiernan's bag recently than he mentioned.

The minister came out to Salt Spring Island for dinner recently and took a close look at various parks on the island.

Mr. Kiernan had been reported difficult to get for several weeks.

When he came he brought various offers of help.

In a letter to the Chamber of Commerce last week he offered a five-point program of help for island parks and playgrounds.

Provincial parks branch will improve the safety fencing at

the lookout point in Maxwell Park; will improve the road to the park by blasting rock protrusions at critical points and filling in the low spots with gravel.

Departmental support will be given to an application for a water lot reserve at Fulford to protect the new Drummond Park.

The department "will consider limited clearing at the look-out point provision of hiking trails and car parking facilities" in the Stewart Road park area.

Finally, the minister confirmed his earlier promise to contribute towards the cost of toilets at Centennial Park.

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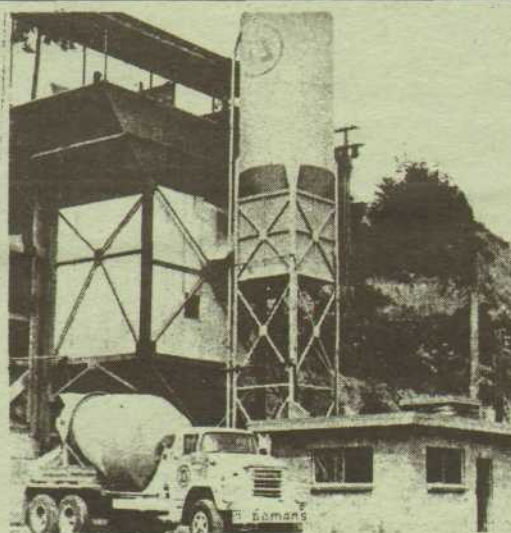
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ISLAND ROADS

Things are looking up.

Provincial government has announced plans to spend nearly a quarter-million dollars on Salt Spring Island roads.

The expenditure is planned in order to fully repair the ravages of a particularly bitter winter. The road from Fulford to Vesuvius will be the target.

In the announcement from Victoria purpose of the allocation is described as the "Improvement of highway". Mr. John Tisdalle had earlier referred to the allocation as a measure to repair the winter damage.

In the meantime two voices of Salt Spring Islanders had been raised in directly opposite directions. The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce had asked for some straightening and widening of the road up the island to accommodate the increasing flow of traffic. South Salt Spring Island Association had requested that no work be done on island roads on the grounds that they are adequate.

The allocation is probably somewhere in between the two. There is no suggestion that the road will end up as a freeway. Neither would the allocation provide for it. The department of highways has accepted that the road is in poor condition and is providing the remedy.

We don't want high-speed highways. But we do want our roads kept up to handle the island traffic, And this allocation seems to be the answer.

MILL NOT TO BLAME
Editor, Driftwood,

May I comment upon Mr. Frattinger's letter in Driftwood last week.

There has been the complaints of chips and industrial wastes from the pulp mill, recently.

In the days when I fished commercially and supplied fish retail to island customers, I noticed that during the spring and summer, there is a time when both the freshet in the Fraser River and prevailing northerly winds cause the waters in this region to carry a lot of sediment. This happens every year for varying periods of time and cannot be entirely blamed on the pulp mill.

This does not entirely relieve the industry from the responsibility of keeping up to date and installing up to date methods to minimize the amount of toxic material which are discharged out into the channel.

Each pulp mill contributes and sustains a large part of the economy in its location and creates jobs and opportunities for many so it should be easy to see why industry should be

encouraged when this is possible.

At the same time it should be everyone's concern that in a flourishing industry such as this, there is no hardship for adequate measures to be taken periodically to improve the purity of surrounding waters.

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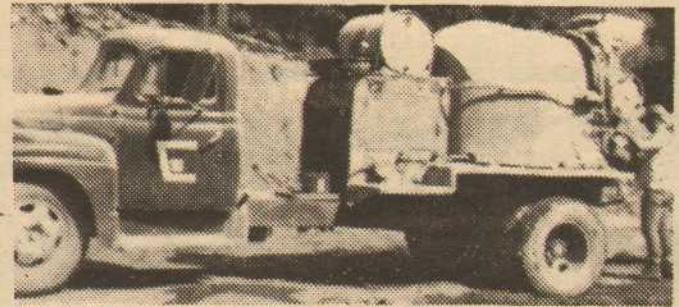
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HE MOVED

The two long-term members cut a specially decorated anniversary cake and distributed it.

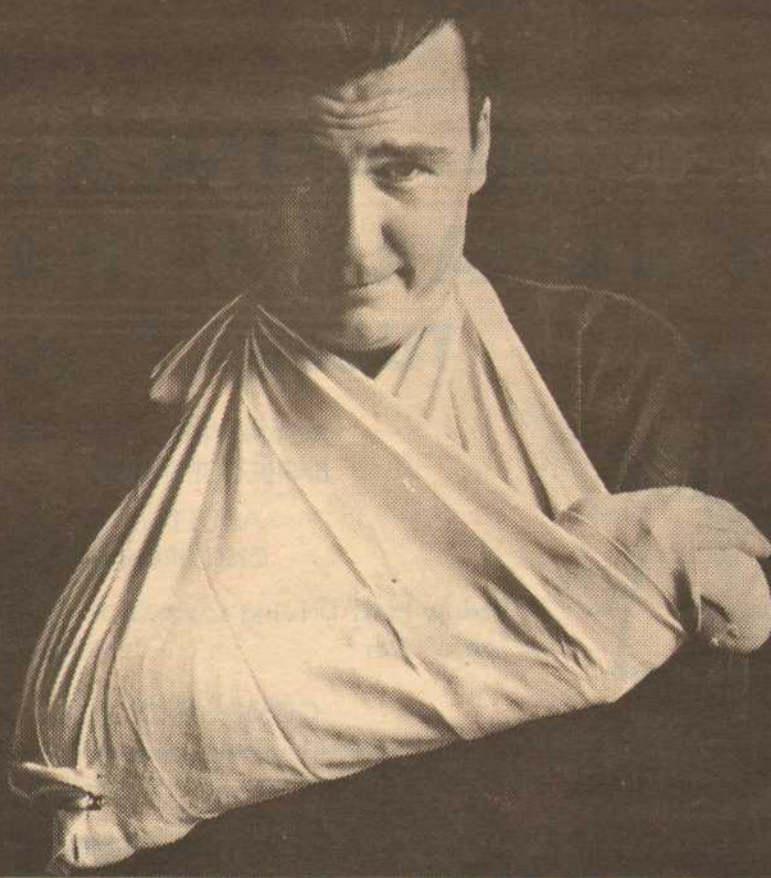

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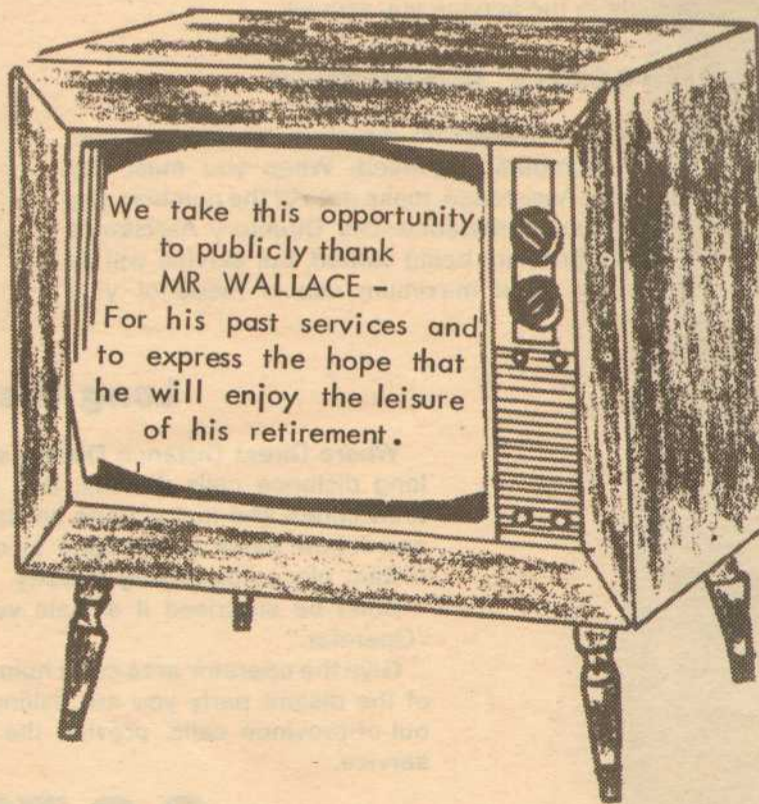

Local Service

Most of the Company's business offices will remain open, but with limited staff. HELICOPTER BUILDS TOWERS

The air is thick with cable-laying helicopters. Even the ferries are full of cable-stringing crews these days. New power line from the mainland to Vancouver Island has brought a large group of workers and equipment of every kind to the islands. The new towers have sprung up across Galiano and are now in the final stages of construction on Salt Spring Island.

The islands are even bi-lingual by this time.

Crews of workers employed by the French contractors have already been on Salt Spring Island for several weeks preparing the shore cable entries for the coming submarine cable between Parker Island and Salt Spring Island and Vancouver Island.

The young French workers spoke almost no English when they arrived. They have fitted very happily into the community and their first experience of life on the Pacific coast has been a pleasant one.

A cable-laying ship from France is due to arrive in British Columbia July 4 to continue the work on B.C. Hydro's high-voltage direct current interconnection between the Lower Main-



land and Vancouver Island. The 4,500-ton vessel, Marcel Bayard, is 387 feet long and 51 feet wide and has a draft of 21 feet, 6 inches. It will be in British Columbia for about three weeks for the Hydro job.

When it is placed in service this fall, the new link will have increased the Vancouver Island power supply by more than 50

per cent in two years.

Contractors have used helicopters to assemble towers on Salt Spring Island across Mount Erskine. Stringing of conductor is in progress and will continue through the summer.

Nearly 19 miles of the intertie route lie under water, between Tsawwassen and Galiano Island and between Parker and Salt Spring Islands. The Marcel Bayard will place three direct current cables in these portions of the route.

Two of the cables will constitute the submarine sections of the new DC circuit and the third will be a spare.

The remaining 23 miles of the

route will be spanned by conventional overhead wires.

Installation of cable landing terminals to connect the under-

water and overhead portions of the 260,000-volt line is well underway and expected to be completed by mid-July.
