Fulford will be the capital of Salt Spring Island on Saturday.

Annual Fulford Day parade featuring the May Queen will take place on Saturday afternoon, early.

Parade of cars and floats will lead the May Queen, Nicola Toynbee and her princesses, Fiona Seward and Patricia Deas, to the park opposite Fulford Hall. There, they will be crowned by last year's queen, Carol Moulton, now Mrs. Allnut.

The afternoon will then be open to sports events and the midway.

For the remainder of the week donations for the Fulford Queen contest will be accepted at Harbour Grocery, in Ganges, Patterson's Store at Fulford or Driftwood.

In past years the queen has been selected by the sale of tickets. Each contestant would sell as many tickets as possible in her name. Top seller became queen.

This year the pattern was changed. A committee of participating organizations earlier in the year decided to have the queen selected by her fellow students at Gulf Islands Secondary School. The cost of fitting out the queen and providing a royal entertainment must now be met from donations to the contest.

Schedule of the day's events starts off at 12.30 pm, with the assembly of decorated floats, in the forecourt of the Fulford Drive-in.

At 1 pm the parade will move off to head to the scene of events, Shaw's Field, opposite the Fulford Hall.

HOSPITAL MEETING

Hospital meetings have already started among the islands

First trip was on Wednesday and the hospital board was out on the high seas again on Thursday.

Salt Spring Island is the last island to be visited. Hospital meeting will take place here on Friday evening in Mahon Hall.

Election of board members and the presentation of the annual report are the main business of the annual meetings. This year has brought a special resolution to transfer the cloak of authority from the Gulf Islands Hospital District to the Regional Hospital District.

ISLANDS SCHOOL MILL RATE DOWN

Taxes are down! School taxes in Gulf Islands School District have dropped about three mills this year.

Mill rate is down by 3.2. Last year the rate was 30.45; this year it has been set at 27.25. Average throughout the province is 31.72.

Assessments in the district have risen to \$20,699,768, bringing the level down when a levy is needed. Budget amounts to \$621,997.

The Gulf Islands remain one of the highest taxed school districts in British Columbia, with only 6.6% being met by the province. Ratepayers of the district are taxed to meet the remaining 93.4%.

Government grant has slowly been reduced during past years. Trustees of the district have bitterly cited the decreasing provincial help as the substance of government economies. In 1960 government grant represented 52.4% of the costs. It has steadily fallen since that time. Highest assistance offered during the past nine years was less than one-tenth of the budget.

Number of children attending

islands schools has increased from 484 in 1960 to 690 in 1969.

Development among the islands has paralleled the growth of school population. In 1950 the net taxable value of the district was \$2,781,870. By 1960 it had quadrupled to \$8,559,999. This year it is almost three times that figure at \$20,699,768.

Mill rate in 1950 was 9.64. By 1960 it had risen to 15.15, to be double that level last year.

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A SECOND ROUTE

Provincial government has rarely been in a more generous mood. Galiano Chamber of Commerce was promised blacktop by Mr. John Tisdalle when he spoke at its annual meeting.

Galiano residents were outspoken when they faced the mud which followed a winter of greater severity than in living memory. They will welcome the blacktop. The winter of cold brought muddy roads and the spring has brought dust.

It was the people of Mayne who last year complained of excessive dust. With the government in expansive mood, it is difficult to understand how Galiano could bid farewell to such conditions, leaving Mayne yet dusty.

On Salt Spring Island a new surfacing has been promised for the road from ferry to ferry. The islanders are duly grateful.

Still unpromised are the goodies for Pender, North and South, and Saturna. We can't wait.

In the meantime, while the government is gazing at us with warm affection we would suggest that on Salt Spring Island there is no alternative road between Fulford and Ganges.

The road into Ganges is a bottleneck and provision should be made for a parallel access to the community. This will become increasingly significant as time passes.

It would be welcome even if it were not a blacktopped highway.

TANK PROBLEMS
Editor, Driftwood,

For years I have been promising myself not to write any more letters to the editor, but then Dr. Whitbread or someone else who should know better says something that just has to be answered. This time it is the statement that the Brentwood area is not suitable for septic tanks.

While in Victoria I had the opportunity to look into the alleged septic tank problem in Brentwood. In every case of complaint that I checked the trouble was faulty installation, not anything peculiar or mysterious about Brentwood soil.

I found a whole hillside in Brentwood where the builders of the houses had actually cut across the drainage system, thus trapping the surface and ground water in the area behind the houses where the septic tank disposal fields were installed. Naturally these systems failed. It is inviting failure in a septic tank system to pipe large quantities of water into it. There were also installations where disposal fields

were not being used, the septic tank effluent being simply piped to the roadside ditch. And there were many examples of the common installation error of laying the pipes in the disposal field with a down grade so that most of the field is bypassed by the effluent which simply runs down to the low point in the system where, being under pressure, it bubbles up through the grass. When the mayor quotes a three out of five rate of failure he should also give the reasons.

This high figure surprises me. It doesn't seem reasonable in view of the successful experience with septic tanks in other places. Some public health authorities require people to install septic tanks in order to protect the beaches and watercourses. When properly installed (a very easy and economical procedure) septic tanks are infinitely superior to piping the sewage to the sea. Clay subsoil is actually an advantage because it protects ground water from contamination. The high failure rate reported in-



EXPLAINS SCOPE

RECREATION

Salt Spring Islanders learned something of the function and the scope of the recreation commission last week.

The Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission had as a visitor and speaker at their last monthly meeting, Gordon Pynn, provincial recreation consultant, Victoria.

The meeting was devoted primarily to a question and answer period with Mr. Pynn explaining the function of a Recreation Commission in a rural area such as this one. He was pleased to note that the Commission was assisting in such activities as the roller hockey, softball, little league baseball, summer swimming instruction and many other activities for young and old alike.

In reply to many questions raised regarding the recreation complex presently being studied by the Lions, Mr. Pynn felt that such facilities should be considered an investment in the community rather than a commercial venture.

Some people present had reservations about the operational costs of such a complex

and eventual deficits — it was felt that a committee member from the Lions should be invited to the next meeting to explain their plans to date.

The Recreation Commission will sponsor a float in the forthcoming May Day parade. This suggestion was made by Miss Harkema representing a student recreational group recently organized to acquaint themselves with community activities. The young people will portray the various activities available on the Island.

Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce finally came to terms with the minister of highways last week.

He explained that Galiano Island now has a huge stockpile of crushed rock, and all in readiness for this work to begin.

Mr. Morris said that the past winter had been the worst for many years, and the frost was driven into the ground for two feet, something quite unheard of in this part of the country, and consequently, islanders were all unprepared for it.

The guest speakers were then all thanked by Arthur Platt.

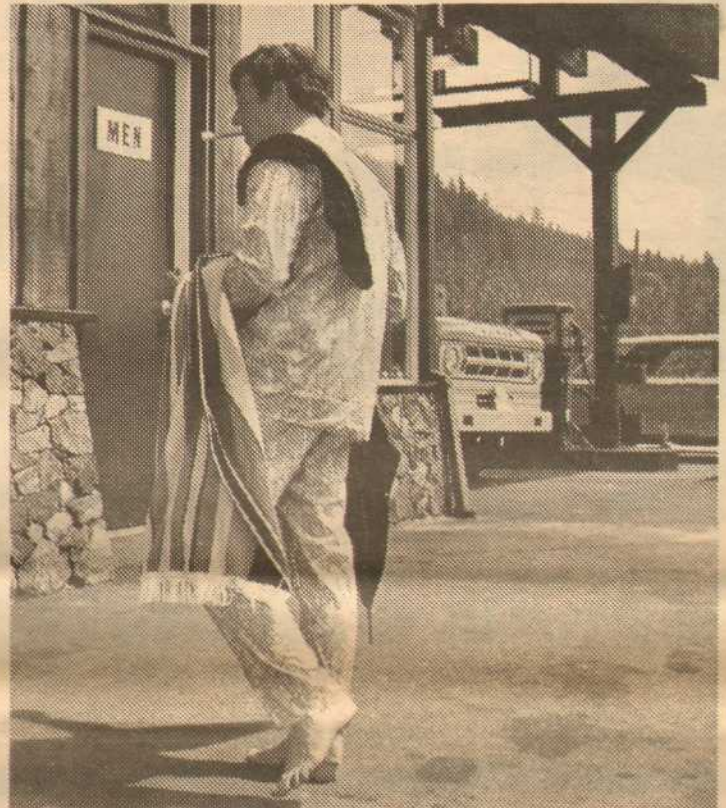

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
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ST. MARY'S AND 75 YEARS

Refit, which cost close to half a million dollars has come up with a new sense of space and warmth.

Where once were narrow, dark passages with worn and curling linoleum are now open, light decks with tables and chairs set on a deep carpet.

The dining room is bigger and the addition of a coffee

bar has provided double the space for the hungry.

Although the refurbishing has been largely confined to the lounge area its effect on the ship is impressive.

The passenger enters the upper decks from the car deck. The stairway is narrower because it is now insulated. Stair treads are rubber and afford a good grip without hostile corners.

There is a mile or so of heavy carpet throughout the passenger decks. The green floor covering bears a patented dogwood design. Chairs and tables are all new and modern in design.

Biggest change evident to the passenger is the sparkling kitchen. It is only months since the island travellers were moving heaven and earth to urge the ferry authority to offer a more pleasing breakfast in place of the day-long hamburger. Now they have two choices.

Dining room serves hamburgers and bacon and eggs and other similar meals. The passenger who is prepared to settle for coffee and pie goes to the coffee bar, where coffee as well as soft drinks are offered on a self-serve system.

There are other improvements. The funnel has been moved and redesigned to avoid the return of smoke and fumes on to the passenger deck. New generator is of little significance to passenger unless the power fails.

Island travellers are delighted with their refurbished ship.
