## FIRE CHIEF RETIRES AFTER NINE YEARS

### BANQUET PAYS TRIBUTE TO DONAGHY

Volunteer firemen merit every respect the community can offer them, stated retiring fire district chairman D. C. Goodman in saying farewell to retiring fire chief Fred Donaghy.

"Fred has done a wonderful thing for Salt Spring Island," said Goody before making a presentation to the fire chief for nine years.

The former chairman of the district was followed closely by Denis Andrews, who made a further presentation on behalf of the firemen.

"It is the firemen who really know the responsibilities and the demands of the job," he observed.

The firemen and the fire trustees were responsible for the send-off for Fred Donaghy.

Dinner in the Legion Hall was followed by a dance to a Victoria orchestra.

Mr. Donaghy told his listeners that the past nine years have been long years.

"They were long because of the anxiety always there," he recalled. "You never knew when the phone was going to ring and the last time that phone rang for me my hands were shaking just as much as they were nine years ago."

The former chief paid tribute to the wives of the volunteer firemen.

"The firemen's wives have done a great job when a fireman has had to nip out," he recalled.

His comments fell on sympathetic ears as he was met with applause.

It takes more than one man to run a fire department and the chief is only as good as his firemen, he continued.

"I have sworn at you, patted you on the back, I can honestly say that in nine years there

has not been one order given that wasn't carried out to the best of that fireman's ability."

If the firemen give the new chief and the present acting chief the same support he has enjoyed for nine years the public has nothing to worry about, he added.

Speeches were brief and the formality was kept to a minimum.

Denis Andrews spoke in commendation of Rita Dodd and Jacquie Hagan who had prepared the dinner.

### CORONER'S ENQUIRY

Two men have been drowned this season around the Islands.

On Monday, May 5, the body of Walter James Edgell, 82, was recovered from Ganges Harbour.

Mr. Edgell had lived for a number of years on McPhillips Avenue.

On April 19, Bertil William Grunberg lost his life when he fell from the rear of an eight-foot flat-bottomed boat on Magic Lake at North Pender Island.

At the subsequent enquiry Coroner Miles Acheson placed the cause of death as asphyxiation due to accidental drowning.

It was stated at the enquiry, that Grunberg, 6211 Sumas Avenue, North Burnaby, was fishing from his boat. It is assumed that the boat swung over when he moved his weight and that he was struck by the small vessel as he fell.

Funeral for Mr. Edgell was held on Tuesday.

# Death of Bill McDermott

Man who spent a lifetime in each of three provinces died at Royal Jubilee Hospital, Victoria on Friday, May 2. He was

William N. McDermott, Salt Spring Island farmer since 1938. Mr. McDermott was 85 years of age.

Mr. McDermott was born in Ontario of a United Empire Loyalist family. He lived in the eastern province until after his marriage, 62 years ago. In 1907, after his marriage in Beeton, Ont., he and Mrs. McDermott moved to Alberta, where they pioneered at Lacombe. They continued to farm in Lacombe for 30 years before coming to the coast. In 1938 they moved to Salt Spring Island and never looked back.

Mr. McDermott had been in poor health for a long time.

Two years ago, on the occasion of his 60th wedding anniversary, he rose from his sick bed for the celebrations.

In Alberta, Mr. McDermott was an active member of the Elks' Lodge.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Edith, at home; a son, William Walter, Holberg, B.C. six daughters, Mrs. N. (Beth) Degnen, Ganges; Mrs. A. (Hazel) Lidskog, Ladysmith; Mrs. W. (Marion) Marks, Port Alberni; Mrs. M. (Doll) Kerham, Vancouver; Mrs. G. (Jean) McAfee, North Vancouver; Mrs. P. (Peggy) Patterson, Vancouver; 12 grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; and three sisters, Ann, Ethel and Edith, of Beeton, Ont.

Funeral services were observed on Monday, May 5, in Ganges United Church with Rev. Fred Anderson officiating. Goodman Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

## DANDELIONS YELLOW? OF COURSE NOT! THEY ARE GREEN AND DELICIOUS AND NOW

Dandelion greens are at their best now — tender and quick-grown under apple or other orchard trees.

Pick them up with not too much stalk and look only for the soft ones that grow amongst all the grass and in shady corners — then cook them in a large saucepan and after boiling for a few minutes, pour off first water and salt to taste, put fresh water on and boil until they look done — doesn't take very long.

Then strain and cut across and enjoy a delicious green with your meal — the slightly bitter taste gives snap to the flavour and you know you are eating good husky health-giving greens the kind one needs in the early spring.

And when you eat them you can give a prayer of thankfulness to the late G.E. Akerman, Papa to Bob Akerman, Molly Carlin, Dorothy Harris, Tillie McTighe and Jim Akerman.

Mr. Akerman planted the

dandelion because he wanted the islanders to be able to find early spring greens. They can, with little effort.

So gardeners, don't grumble next time that pesky dandelion grows in your vegetable patch — it has many uses — its roots make coffee (sort of) and dye — a rich yellow — its golden flowers make delicious wine, the seed heads are dandy for telling the time — one blow, two blows, three blows, four — ask any little child.

Ever since 1897, children have been telling the time that way on Salt Spring Island. Birds like the seeds also — but it certainly is a stubborn, persistent ornery weed and is more cursed than blessed — Oh, well — one can't win every time, I like the dent-de-lion anyway so try the greens and you may feel better, fast. And you can get it for nothing, just a little back bending, it's a good fresh air job so what can YOU lose?

## DID YOU KNOW?

Do you know Fred Donaghy?

You ought to know him, you know. You know he was the fire chief on Salt Spring Island for nine years? If you didn't know you won't know, because he quit last month. Nine years of looking after your house was too much of a good thing.

Did you know he looked after your house? You should.

Have you ever stopped to think about the volunteer fire department on the island...or any of the islands? Have you ever stopped to think?

Fred Donaghy has retired. He's had enough. He didn't resign in resentment or in high dudgeon. He quit because the work is too onerous for him. He can no longer afford the nervous strain of waiting for the phone to ring to inform him your house is on fire.

They gave the fire chief a big send-off. There was a presentation from the Fire District in gratitude for the work he had done. There was a presentation from the volunteer firemen in token of the long years during which he had dished out the orders and the firemen had scrupulously carried them out.

Did you make any recognition of his service? We didn't hear your name mentioned.

Every day that he was on the island: every hour of every day for nine years and about six months, Fire Chief Fred Donaghy was on call. Night or day, winter and summer, he was ready to jump into his car and drive hell-for-leather for your house if you had a fire. He and about 20 other firemen were all set and ready. Always.

Why did Fred Donaghy do this? Why do any of the firemen do it? Not for money...they are paid a piddling amount for the time they put in on a job, and they'll never get rich on it in a hundred years.

They do n't do it for insurance: the extent of compensation they can get for injury, or death, on the job is geared to the Workmen's Compensation Bond tables.

Every member of the fire brigade does it as a service to the community. The community is well served. But let us not say too much about it, nobody else ever does!

Col. Crofton will direct the campaign, by mail here. The general canvass, in other parts of the Vancouver Island area, opened on May 1.

Campaign director here will accept donations from any residential area.

The Objective for the Red Shield Appeal in the Greater Victoria area this year is \$78,700. This is the amount needed to maintain The Salvation Army's Social Services work for another year. In 1968 the Army expended \$553,870 in carrying out its work in the lower Vancouver Island Area.

Capt. Tilley reports that his organization is meeting greater demands in both service and institutional fields. The Salvation Army provides the only service for transient and homeless men in Victoria and is carrying on an extensive and unparalleled work in alcoholic rehabilitation. In addition nearly 200 elderly citizens live under the Salvation Army roof at either the Matson Lodge or the Sunset Lodge. The unwed mother, the prisoner and the family in need of counselling, or other assistance is readily cared for regardless of colour, race or creed.

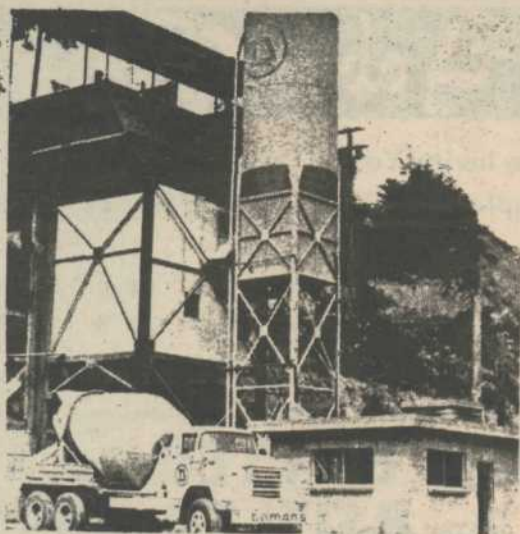

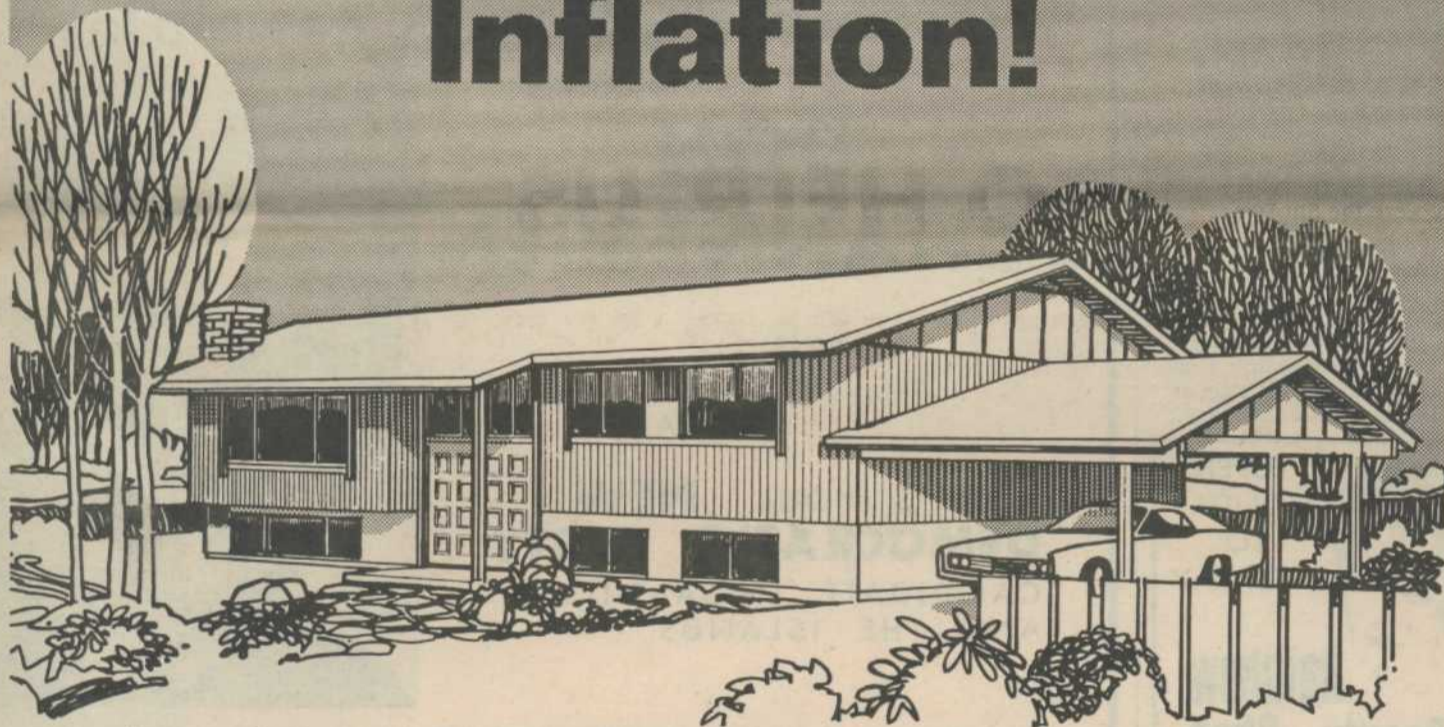

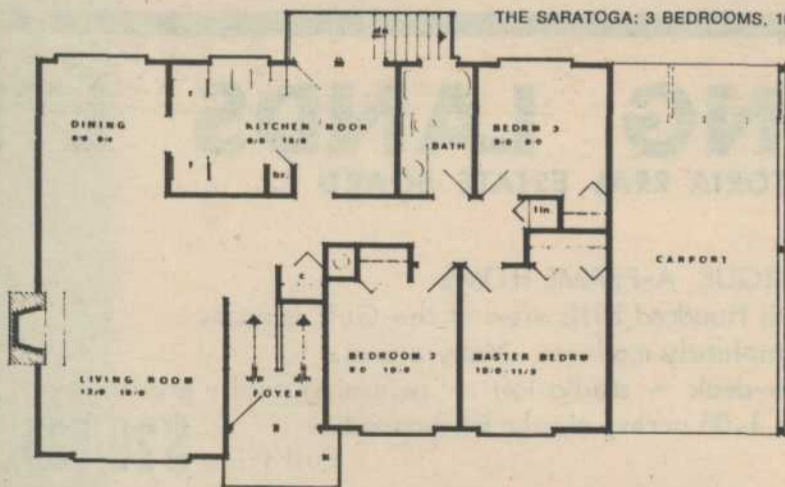
