## AT MAYNE ISLAND

### OYSTERMEN UNDER FIRE

Operation of two commercial fish boats anchored offshore at Bennett Bay over the Easter week end has stirred Mayne Islanders to protest.

From around 10 am until 5 pm on Saturday, March 28, four crew members gathered hundreds of buckets and sacks of oysters. Residents of the island protested that only one gallon of shucked oysters per person is the limit allowed by the department of fisheries.

When the islanders questioned the crew about the amount they were taking they said the oysters were for their own consumption.

Shortly before leaving at 5 pm they lit a fire on the dry driftwood near the bank and left it burning.

Two residents living nearby put the fire out before it spread to adjacent homes.

The Ganges detachment of the RCMP told islanders that they could do nothing about

commercial fish boats but would report it to the Fisheries office which was closed until after Easter.

### Hospital Faces Jolt

Services at provincial hospitals, including Lady Minto Gulf

Islands Hospital are threatened by Health Minister Loffmark's refusal to meet pay increases, warns Lady Minto Hospital Chairman Doug Cavaye.

Members of the hospital Board are fearful that services will be sharply reduced unless the minister relaxes his ban on pay increases.

The hospitals are operated out of revenues from the B.C. Hospital Insurance Service. The health minister has refused to pay wage increases and hospitals are left without guidance, DRIFTWOOD was told.

Staff cuts will be necessary if the government stands by its decision, said Mr. Cavaye. If staff is reduced services must be curtailed.

Hospital boards and administrations all over the province are up in arms at the government's stand.

One board member at Ganges attributes it to the cost of hydro projects. All provincial monies are tied up in dams, she suggested, and this pattern is merely to protect the provincial investments.

The fact that the provincial government earlier ratified a pay hike for all members is a sore point with many hospital workers.

Members of the Legislature have voted themselves a 25% increase in pay, said a hospital spokesman, but they will not countenance even a five per cent increase for others.

The long-drawn out pattern of hospital financing leaves the hospital authorities here in a state of confusion.

This year's budget has already been prepared and presented to the government for approval. It will now sit in the government offices until August, when it will be returned. Refusal or acceptance will be in the final written approval. Until that time the board will be paid at the same rate as last year despite increased staff and higher pay rates.

Even hospital construction is at a standstill as the government withholds authority to proceed.

## FIRE IN GANGES

### Family of Eight Homeless

Family of eight was left homeless on Friday afternoon when fire caused extensive damage to the Albert Kaye home on Ganges Hill.

Fire was reported while Mrs. Kaye was in Ganges and the house was empty. Volunteer firemen were on the scene while smoke from the building could be seen from the village centre at Ganges.

Despite their efforts, firemen were unable to hold damage below an estimated \$5,000.

Furnishings and fittings were damaged by fire and water and the house was too far damaged to repair. No insurance was carried.

Family moved in with Mr. Kaye's mother and by the beginning of this week Mr. Kaye had started on the construction of a new home.

Service clubs, churches and individuals were prompt with offers of help for the burned out family. Mrs. Kaye was almost speechless in her gratitude for help.

"It just couldn't happen anywhere else but Salt Spring Island," she told DRIFTWOOD.

Fire was attributed to a wood-burning heater in the living room.

## ISLANDS PLANNING

### QUESTIONNAIRES DISTRIBUTED

How should the Outer Gulf Islands develop? Should they become suburban areas, with residents who commute daily to Victoria, Vancouver, Tsawassen and Sidney? Or should they remain primarily retirement and recreational communities?

What about fire protection, garbage disposal, water supply, sewage treatment? Should the islands have high-rise apartments? oil wells? heavy industry?

All residents and owners of property on North and South

Pender, Mayne, Galiano and Saturna Islands now have a chance to answer these questions and help formulate a long-term plan for their islands. More than 2,500 questionnaires have been distributed by the Capital Regional District, which recently extended its planning jurisdiction to include the Gulf Islands.

Results of the questionnaires will be tabulated within the next few weeks by volunteers on each island. These findings then will be turned over to planning experts in Victoria for incorporation into the long-term plan.

Meanwhile, all new small-lot subdivision on the islands has been stopped by a provincial government ruling which prohibits approval of any lot containing less than 10 acres.

To make certain that regional district officials keep in touch with views of island residents, the five-member Outer Gulf Islands Advisory Planning Commission has been established.

Director is Miss Joan Purchase, who represents the islands on the Capital Regional District Board. Members, who will serve a two-year term, are: Ralph M. Sketch, Pender Island; John Rainsford, Mayne Island;

## OPEN SEASON IN SEPTEMBER OR NOT SO OPEN HERE?

Hunting seasons on Vancouver Island, of which the Gulf Islands are part, have been announced by the provincial government.

Deer, bucks only, will be fair game on September 5, announces B.C. Fish and Wildlife Branch. The announcement adds that the season will be open for rifle hunters. No reference is made to any other kind of shooting. Rifles are prohibited on the Gulf Islands and no further information is offered.

Season for black bear opens the same date, with an additional open season from April 1 to May 31, this year. Bull elk may be taken October 3 and blue and ruffed grouse will head for the pot on August 29.

Case was adjourned without plea for a week in order to permit him to choose counsel.

Courtroom was filled almost to capacity as a number of similar cases were considered.

Harry Simon appeared on remand for trafficking in lysergic acid. He had been unsuccessful in gaining release on bail a week earlier. After a sharp exchange between counsel, he was represented by Howard Luke.

Remanded for plea and election until the end of May are Bruce Johnson, trafficking and possession; Harry Simon, trafficking; Ronald Masters, trafficking. John Aschenbrenner is also charged with a drug offense, possession for the purpose of trafficking and was remanded last week.

Charges follow a crackdown recently by RCMP officers over the southern Vancouver Island area.

### BULLDOZED FLAT

Editor, Driftwood,  
At the Capt. Drummond Children's Park in Fulford... How could it happen? What will happen there yet?  
I experienced my first disappointment there when one day I found truckloads of dirt-fill dumped over an area, which my family and I used to know and enjoy in its natural charm. Very little grooming and hardly any disturbing of its natural turf would have been necessary.  
But now! It is really disheartening to see what the bulldozer has wrought. Most of the area of Drummond Park looks as if it was being prepared to take a four-lane highway - levelled flat... Where there was an interestingly varied shoreline, which could have been enhanced by some wood and rock (or concrete) retaining structures, where needed only - a "neat", uniformly sterile bank like that of an artificial causeway offends my eye... I could go on and on. No use crying over spilt milk! Is it any use asking how it could happen -- over the opposition and pleas of people, who even in the last stages of the work in process were given assurances that at least the last remaining stretch of natural high water line would be kept to "natural development"? No! The bulldozer had to have its full run, right to the property line!  
Who did what? When? On the strength of what authority? Were any records or minutes kept on the deliberations of meetings or committee discussions? Could the people who

acted so quickly and energetically with their equipment help my memory in this respect?  
Sure, all the work so far has been done with the best intentions and freely donated. But what a gift! To have left the site alone would in my opinion have been better.  
The Provincial Government's Parks Branch plan can serve as a starting point for development of a final one. It is too preliminary and open to all kinds of interpretations to be used as a working drawing. Let us achieve a common approach and policy first, then act!

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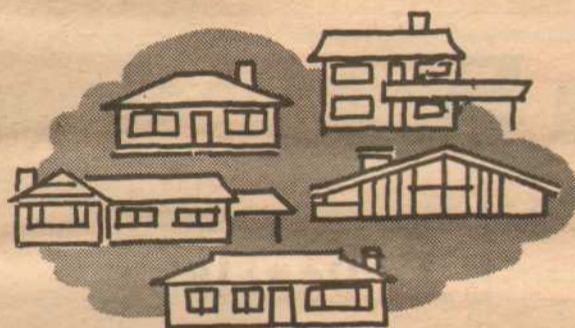

On a huge table twelve feet by six and made of slabs of wood five inches thick, two other cooks were rolling out a game pie. I estimated it as measuring three feet across. In this rude way, unchanged since the time of Henry VIII, the unhappy Oxford students are fed. I could not help contrasting it with the cosy little boarding houses on Cottage Grove Avenue

where I used to eat when I was a student at Chicago, or the charming little basement dining rooms of the students' boarding houses in Toronto."

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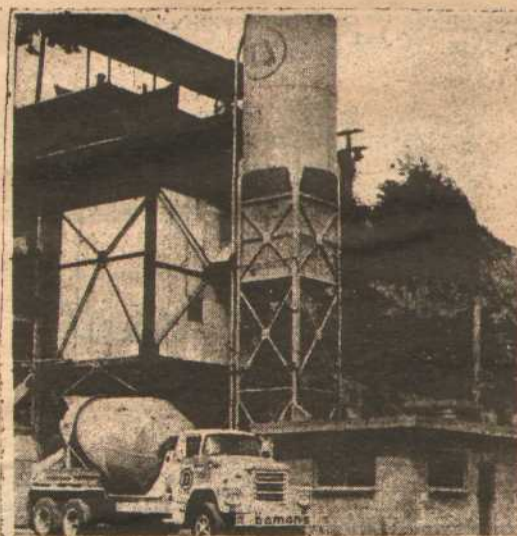

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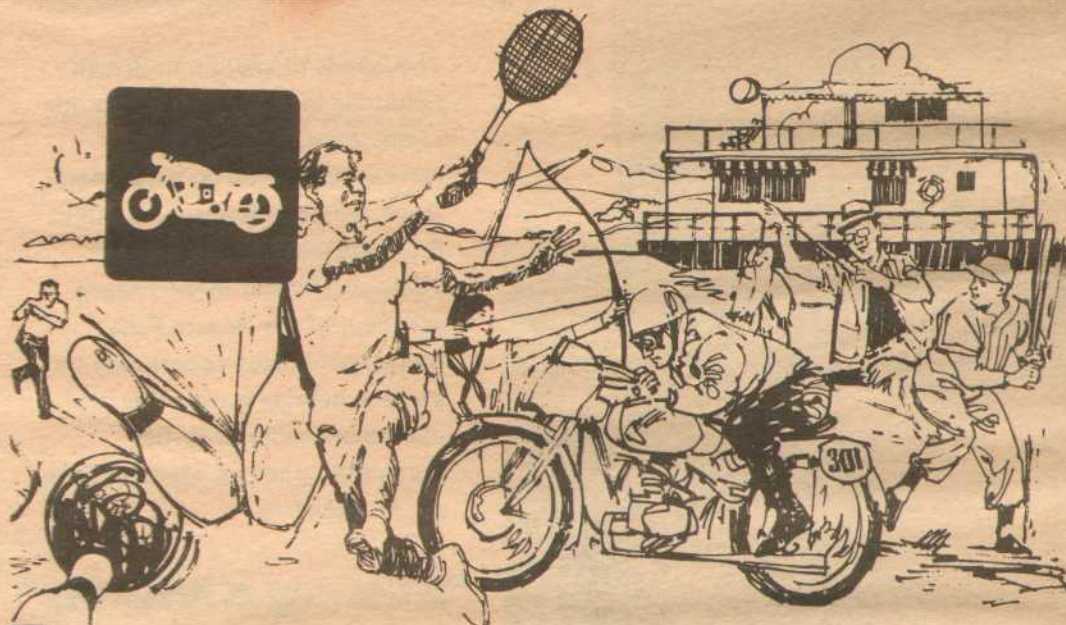

# IT WAS NOT NO. 2

Second blood clinic, my foot!  
Indignant Ganges reader this week brought printed evidence of blood clinics from far back, when the response on Salt Spring Island was impressive. In 1948 the Women's Auxiliary to the Salt Spring Island branch of the Canadian Legion sponsored a blood clinic at Ganges. Response was sufficient to bring the clinic back the following two years.

In 1949 there were 135 active patients in the second blood clinic. Dr. J. Nelson was the doctor in charge and expressed his appreciation. It was estimated by the Legion ladies that the donors represented about seven per cent of the roughly 1,900 residents of the Island. Mrs. J.B. Acland was president of the auxiliary at that time. In 1950 the clinic was planned for April and Mrs. Peter Turner was in charge of the preparations. The reference to earlier clinics followed the report in DRIFTWOOD last week that this year's blood donor clinic was the second in the island's history.

Other officers of the auxiliary taking part in the earlier clinics were Mrs. W.A. Brown, Mrs. F.O. Mills, Mrs. J.M. Bryant, Mrs. W.K. Wickens and Mrs. George Lowe.
