Protest sounded by a number of merchants and businessmen on Salt Spring Island last week culminated in a vote of confidence in the island planning group at a crowded meeting on Monday evening.

The meeting learned that the island's Advisory Planning Commission had already acted on protests heard and that the offending interim zoning plan was already held in abeyance.

The protest brought out probably more people than had ever gathered in the history of Fulford Hall. The seats and benches were filled and the remainder of the hall, upstairs and down was packed with islanders.

Pace was set by an experienced municipal orator Mrs. Beth Wood. In ringing tones she defended commerce and attacked the authors of a plan which would not recognize all current commercial enterprises.

Mrs. Wood was bitterly critical of the regional planners. She termed the Gulf Islands Study "quite a document". Of the controversial by-law, she commented, "I can't hold a copy of the by-law that has sifted through to the island. It is not available to anyone."

The former mayor of New Westminster received applause as she outlined the inequities of a planning by-law which would place some businesses in the non-conforming category.

Mrs. Wood had not been sought out to support protests, she had sought out the protestors, she explained.

The hall rose in an ovation at her conclusion.

Chairman Bob Blundell faced an unruly audience as he sought to maintain order for the next two hours. At one point he asked members of the audience "to withhold their insults."

First half of the evening was devoted to a motion by George Lampier that the Community Planning Board had acted with "calculated incompetence".

The stage was set for a highly emotional exchange. Questions were asked with indignation and the heat was on.

Reg. Taylor, of Scott Point Marina, asked whether Mrs.

Wood had any personal experience of the problems facing non-conforming businesses. She cited the case of a New Westminster restriction.

Spencer Marr asked Director Marc Homes to explain to the meeting the two resolutions approved by the Advisory Planning Commission on Friday.

The commission asked the planning committee to re-study how zoning may be instituted on Salt Spring Island, stated Mr. Holmes. It also asked the Capital Regional District to take no further action on Salt Spring Island zoning, he continued.

"I have been advised that the matter was taken from the agenda," he told the meeting.

"I announced this on Friday to various people," said the director, "and word should have got out. There was no attempt to drive the little man out of business."

Joe Nickerson charged that the effective meeting for the by-law was supposed to be July 9 and that it had been advanced to this week for its first reading.

First readings would have been given the zoning by-law on Wednesday, replied Mr. Holmes, and then there would have been a public hearing for all islanders to attend.

Mr. Nickerson explained that he was among the delegates to visit Victoria on Friday. "We saw the Premier, the minister of municipal affairs and the executive director of the Capital Regional District, he reported.

"The director said he could do nothing about it," concluded the speaker, "When we got home, we found it was all off."

What was the purpose of the meeting if the by-law was quashed, asked a member of the audience.

"Calculated incompetence," shouted Mr. Lampier.

Few questioners were familiar with the municipal act under which the offending by-law was prepared. Gaps and inaccuracies were frequent.

Gavin Reynolds stated that the planning committee was a

FAREWELL

Some fifty people, officers and men of the Sechart Queen's "B" watch, engineer officers and wives, gathered last Saturday night in the Crest Restaurant for a surprise farewell dinner in honor of Len Johnston, now retired as first officer of the Gulf Islands-Vancouver ferry.

When the restaurant doors opened, Len and wife Dorothy could hardly believe what they had run into. Captain Donald Fraser and the assembled company soon put them at ease. This was a striking tribute to a seafaring man who had retired twice -- the first time as master of the liner, Empress of Canada, and commodore of the Canadian Pacific Atlantic fleet.

He had come out of that retirement -- "I was going round the bend doing nothing" -- to take a job as second mate of the Queen of the Islands. His senior officer: Don Fraser, who had served under him as a young cadet in the Princess Kathleen when she was a troopship during the war years in the Mediterranean.

Captain Leonard Hamilton Johnston, OBE, a native of Victoria, was the second Canadian ever to command a flagship of Canadian Pacific Steamships on the Atlantic service. He had a long and distinguished career with that company, including one of the sea sagas of World War II. First officer of Empress of Asia when she was bombed and set on fire at the fall of Singapore, he took a small ship loaded with evacuees out of the doomed city, and under heavy Japanese shelling set sail for Sumatra. Eventually he navigated a river boat with a shipload of passengers through enemy waters to the sanctuary of Australia.

The Johnstons will make their home in Vancouver. The question is now -- will he really swallow the anchor?

Doug called to the bar tender... the train was licensed... and asked him to turn the heat up. Heat's off for the summer, sorry was the reply.

He enjoyed his trip. He forecast the British election and remarked that he found considerable dissatisfaction with government, particularly with the prospects of the European Common Market. Many English people, and he emphasized he was speaking with the ordinary working man in the most part, are fearful of a further increase in meat prices. The common market centres on Belgium and beef in Belgium is more expensive than beef in Britain, he found. And that was their beef.

ably didn't notice. I did. Else we would be mourning a moron!

Driving past the Gorge on Sunday it was like home from home. That same familiar fecal odor as you drive along the island highway... close your eyes and it could be Ganges.

Last week I marked the 10th birthday of the BC Ferries. I came over from Crofton on Wednesday and caught the backwash of the paint spray. When I reached Ganges I found that part of the car was speckled white. FIRE HAZARD

PROTEST

It was an evening of disappointment. There were 400 people at Fulford to enjoy an evening of protest. Protest at a zoning pattern which would leave some commercial operations in a rural zone. But the protest had already been heard and the confounding legislation had already been arrested.

It was an evening of futility. Discussing the futile threat of a dead plan, many in the audience took refuge in hysteria and abuse.

It was an evening of hysteria. And although the sponsors of the meeting were fully aware that the proposed zoning by-law had been withdrawn by the Salt Spring Advisory Planning Commission this was only announced after questioning from the floor.

It was not an honest meeting. It was wild and riotous and enjoyable and hysterical and futile and disappointing.

It was particularly disappointing. It was disappointing to have a capable speaker and legislator like Mrs. Be'n Wood address herself to the emotions of the audience and ignore the intelligence. It was disappointing to hear a school trustee engage in an unpleasant public dispute with a community planner. It was disappointing because it marked the end of communication by intellect and the introduction of communication by mob hysteria. It was disappointing above all things because the entire dispute could have been settled quietly and effectively if the disputants had wished to approach it in that manner.

This meeting is no way to conduct public affairs and many of the participants are, or should be, well aware of the fact.

The meeting concluded by looking at incorporation. If this kind of meeting is destined to administer such a municipality we are obviously too immature to engage in self-rule.

This was a colossal insult to the capable chairman as well as the intelligence of most present.

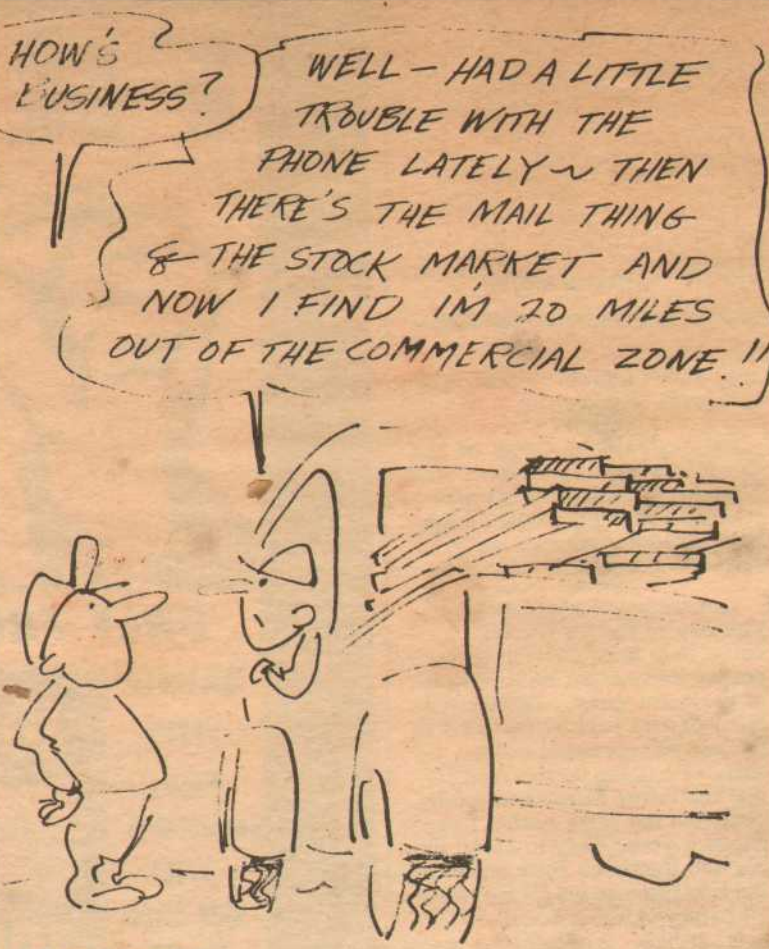
Most seemed to know what they didn't want, some knew what was needed but few proposed anything that resembled a plan of constructive action.

We seem to have fallen into an area of thinking today where one needs only to deal in generalities, make allegations that are neither true nor yet false and render opinions that are not motivated by a fair assessment of any given situation. The criteria for acceptance seems to be, rather than one is talking about a popular issue and under this heading one can

employ such unfair advantage as ignoring good and honest intent in the interests of being heard.

I refer very specifically to your article by Bea Hamilton last week in which she created the impression that all subdividers fall into the category of "Criminal Devastators".

Until one becomes actively involved in land development, all the considerations cannot be appreciated, but in the final analysis the breakdown sounds something like this: View and natural effect are the prime considerations and depending upon location, one will override the other in order of importance. During the course of talking to prospective buyers, it immediately becomes apparent that the buyer would initially like a maximum of both. Being in the main a reasonable minded individual, he is quick to notice that he cannot have both because he would be taking them at the expense of his future neighbors. The "Hedge of Privacy" which he covets becomes the very barrier which denies his neighbor in the house behind from enjoying a view as well. The thornier portion of the problem manifests itself when one asks the prospective buyer in the front whether he would be willing to pay the additional price of devaluation of the lot behind because his is an obstruction to a view. In all cases the answer is "no", so that it is absolutely necessary for the developer involved to settle this matter by achieving what he considers to be the best balance between these two aspects, view and natural state. Believe it or not the developers of Salt Spring Island try to do this.

In actual practice we find here that for every individual who laments the development, there are nine others who express pleasure in what they see here on Salt Spring Island. Please give us credit for this.

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SHOW WHAT CHURCH DOES

About 25 people attended the regular meeting of the United Church Women. This meeting was different, for men were invited, and some men attended.

It was different too in that a filmstrip, not business, filled a large part of the evening. The strip and accompanying comment showed some of the work being done by the United Church in Canada. The film pointed

out that all Christians want to help others, but not all can do so as individuals. An "instrument" is often needed and the Church Board of Missions can be this instrument. With the help of people, doing for them the good things that they would like to have done, the church reaches out to lonely individuals in outposts on the coasts, in cities, on the prairies, in farm or factory, in the far north -- wherever they may live.

The "Thomas Crosby", the well-equipped, especially designed mission boat that is both church and hospital to people in lighthouses and fishing villages, and that brings the love of man and God to many a lonely soul; the tiny airplane that carries help and friendship quickly to remote spots along the B. C. coast; the ministers greeting new, would-be Canadians as they first step ashore on Canadian soil; churches where Greek or Hungarian or one of half-a-dozen other languages makes the person who does not yet feel

at home in English or French come for worship and friendship; the native-Korean minister who leads an English-speaking congregation of many nationalities; hospitals in out-lying spots manned by United Church doctors and nurses; schools where special need is met; welfare work such as is done at First United Church in Vancouver where people who are handicapped find tasks that they can do (and be paid for doing) in preparing used articles for sale in Thrift Shops or for gifts to the needy; all this and much more was pictured. The commentary stressed that no building or airplane or hospital or school can accomplish much without the help of the worker who brings love and understanding.

The Devotional Period, led by Mrs. John Paton, had as a theme, "Belonging". As part of the period Mrs. Paton read "A New Creed":

Man is not alone, he lives in God's world. We believe in God: who has created and is creating, who has come in the true man, Jesus, to reconcile and make new, who works in us and others by his Spirit. We trust him. He calls us to be his Church: to celebrate his presence, to love and serve others, to seek justice and resist evil, to proclaim Jesus crucified and risen, our judge and our hope. In life, in death, in life beyond death, God is with us. We are not alone. Thanks be to God.

A very important item of business was the report of the Home Makers' Meeting of May 12, in which Mrs. L. G. Ramsey was happy to be able to say that the turn-out was good; Mrs. Cruikshank's remarks were most interesting and to-the-point; and Miss Adams spoke in such an inspirational manner that all were impressed.

function of the chamber of commerce and that no reports had been made.

"We wanted to know the facts," explained Bram Oudshoorn, "and we are beginning to realize that we are being governed from Victoria. It is time to take affairs into our own hands."

Henry Schubart, planning consultant of the Salt Spring Island committee and a professional community planner, asked for five minutes to explain the background.

He recalled the original planning meeting called by the chamber of commerce and of the delegates then named to a planning committee. That committee had come up with the questionnaire which most islanders would recall.

"Where do we go from here?" he asked. "We must write a by-law that will protect and still be consistent with island life."

Mr. Nickerson expressed heated indignation at one of the paragraphs in the Gulf Islands Study asking for close integration with the United States San Juan Islands.

"Mr Schubart failed to mention it," he commented.

"I am amazed at the amount of ignorance shown by some speakers here tonight," observed T. E. Harcus.

It devolved into a rapid series of questions and answers.

Mr. Taylor attacked the planning questionnaire and its summary. He charged Mr. Schubart with having written the Regional District's Gulf Islands Study. Mr. Schubart explained that he was not the author. Mrs. Wood insisted he was. Mr. Marr asked for an explanation of the term, unanimous. It appeared to be employed when there were abstainers, he commented. John Tisdalle defended this pattern of counting votes. Mr. Lampier shouted for an end to debate. Mr. Oudshoorn would offer information; Mr. Lampier called for a presentation of his motion condemning the planning committee.

The backbiting slowed down when Robert Holloman summarized the progress.

"Many people came here tonight to indict the planning committee," he said, "I don't think many people on the committee give a good damn about remaining on it. The people who are raising this fuss are simply not honest. Let's get about our business and cut this child's play out."

He was warmly applauded. John Tisdalle agreed.

"You've got a steering committee who are a lot wiser than they were before," he observed.

Mr. Tisdalle added an aside that Mr. Lampier had closed the debate 20 times already.

He appealed for a balanced examination of the problems of planning and by-laws.

Mr. Lampier was invited to speak. "It is the man at the head we are after, pointing to the name Schubart on a chart."

His motion was presented and defeated. The meeting expressed confidence in the planner and the planning committee.

After a scrutiny of the powers and functions of the Capital Regional District, Mr. Oudshoorn proposed that the planning committee increase its terms of reference and investigate the feasibility of an island municipality. His proposal was warmly supported.

Many were already leaving the hall before the meeting adjourned.

ISLANDERS CAN DO IT!

Editor, Driftwood, To all islanders, a reminder. These islands have been farmed and developed since 1850 by islanders. Islanders developed the ferry system, which was a good example and a good starting point for the present BC Ferries. Islanders started and developed their present school district, starting over 100 years ago and becoming in time one of the top-rated school districts in the province. They developed

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their present hospital district from 60 years of the first Lady Minto into the present first-class Gulf Islands Hospital District we have today.

Many other improvements came about through the energy and foresight of those people attracted to the islands such as local and even extensive water systems, roads, docks and above all, a common community spirit still much in evidence despite the early demise of the first municipality of Salt Spring Island due to the effects of the First World War. The development has been gentle and orderly and has in no way been startling when the pressures of the great disorderly expansion of our nearby urban and suburban areas are considered.

Remember these were all done long before many of our surrounding municipalities had achieved their kind of progress.

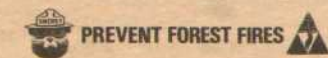
This shows that Gulf Islanders are able to handle their own planning and/or zoning and all ways have been. The powers were always there whether inherent in our provincial departments of health and highways or within the charters of our several improvement districts.

Also true but not evidently of common knowledge is the fact that developers of property on Salt Spring Island and most developers of property on Galiano, Mayne and Penders have, for the past five years placed covenants in the form of building schedules on their properties and already on most new parts of the islands properties are restricted to residential with no new businesses allowed; only one home, with guest cottage permitted and other regulations against despoiling the land with half-finished shacks or making unsightly graveyards for old cars.

And these are the facts and I believe a compliment to the foresighted and energetic islanders.

I feel strongly that islanders must form themselves into whatever type of local government is most appropriate for the area to protect themselves from the all-pervasive, all-powerful bureaucracy now being formed, called the Capital Regional District and its appellant committees. Surely we have the same fortitude the original islanders displayed!
