SALT SPRING ISLAND TAKES TO THE ROAD ON SATURDAY

Walk-Walk-Walkathon



Saturday is the day of the boots. On Saturday Salt Spring Islanders and visitors from far afield will take part in the Lions annual Walkathon. Marchers will march for money for Lions projects.

The Walkathon has been one of the most popular events in the Salt Spring calendar. Sponsors hope to see it stay that way.

Each walker is sponsored by a business firm or individual who undertakes to pay a minimum amount per mile walked.

This year's route is shorter than either of the past years. It extends for four miles out of Ganges and four miles back. Walkers will head out to Long Harbour, turn off to Welbury Point and walk back. Both ways will cover Scott Road and for the first time the mass of walkers will meet the hasty winners going the other way.

Walk will set off from the Centennial Park in Ganges, along Robinson Road to Scott Road and thence to Ganges.

DAY OF THE BOOTS

Lions will man the control points along the route. There will be a patrolling car to keep walkers up and at it and Lions not engaged in checking will be expected to walk, warned the organizer this year, Larry Cruickshank.

Major commitment faced by the Lions Club is the contribution to Drummond Centennial Park at Fulford. Walkathon will be one of the means of raising the money.

Marchers also stand to gain. There are prizes for the out-and-out winner as well as winners in various classes.

Big opening of the walk will

take place in Ganges at 1 p.m. on Saturday, when walkers in walking rig as well as walkers in a variety of costumes will set off from the park.

OYSTERS OFF TO U.S.A.

The Gulf Islands Joint Council beat the problem of transportation of delegates, all right, they held a meeting right on the ferryboat!! With the permission of the Ferry Authority, they arranged to meet on the "Mayne Queen", on the evening sailing around the Gulf Islands, to Swartz Bay and back again, and it worked well, as far as transport was concerned, only it was a little difficult to hear voices in a large gathering in the lower lounge, which was given over to the meeting.

Chairman Vern Roddick, of South Pender, gave warm thanks to Ferry officials for allowing the group to have the meeting on the ferry, and a full agenda was dealt with, delegates coming from Pender, Mayne, Saturna, and Galiano.

New by-laws and the constitution were discussed, and copies will be sent to all councils for final reading, to bring back to the next meeting.

Mr. Roddick told the meeting that Miss Joan Purchase, Outer Islands representative for the Capital Region Board, would join at Swartz Bay, and he said, "we should listen closely to what is said to us by them, as it could be to our advantage". Members from the Board have recently visited all of the Gulf Islands.

Oyster picking in Whalers Bay on Galiano Island came in for much discussion. This is the fourth complaint of several people in a fast boat coming over from the United States, stopping at this Bay, and gathering many sacks of oysters. This usually happens on a Saturday evening, when it is difficult to catch them.

Annual meeting of Joint Council will be held in May, when the chairman will be elected.

The clinic is sponsored by the Salt Spring Island branch of the Royal Canadian Legion. Members will not only take part in the clinic, but they will also be canvassing other islanders to contribute.

Clinic will be open afternoon and evening and all islanders in good health from 18 to 60 are eligible to donate blood. Those of 17 years of age may donate blood with parental permission.

A Sunrise Service loses its point if held indoors, so if it happens to rain on Sunday morning, this event will be cancelled.

MOVES AGAIN

Victoria Flying Services announce that their Vancouver terminal has been moved back to the Bayshore Inn, the original docking site.

For a short time VFS aircraft were tying up at the foot of Granville Street, but problems arose that were unforeseen and a quick change was necessary so there would be no disruption in service to and from the Gulf Islands.

The Victoria terminal remains in the Inner Harbour close to the Empress Hotel, and flight times are not affected.

These will be in effect until summer schedules are announced later.

At present there is a twice-daily service between Victoria-Gulf Islands-Vancouver and return, except Sundays, when there is one afternoon flight in both directions.

ABOUT TWO MONTHS' WORK

PAVING JOB UNDER WAY

Big paving job is looming on Salt Spring Island. The road reconstruction started last fall will be well under way at the beginning of next week. Railway cars are drawn up in the harbour at Ganges and the plant is warming up at Fulford.

Heavy trucks from the mainland are travelling up and down the island as gravel and fill are hauled in readiness for the blacktopping.

At the side of roads throughout Salt Spring Island there are markers for the paving equipment.

First job is to complete the paving from Ganges to Fulford, where it was left off last fall, explained Roads Foreman Hector Gerow. The paving will then start a second time as a second

layer is spread on the roads. This will provide 4 1/2 inches of compressed blacktop.

In the meantime highways crews have been busy south of the golf course, where the hump at Baker Road has been cut back

and levelled.

Paving job will take about six weeks to two months to complete. It has been undertaken by the department of highways to repair the ravages of a record winter of 1968-9, when roads were shattered by frost.

DISCUSSION HERE SET FOR APRIL 10

Preventive Dentistry Clinic has been suggested on Salt Spring Island.

At a meeting on March 4, the Parent Education Committee agreed to undertake a survey of those parents who might be interested in participation in such a clinic. Dr. J. L. M. Whitbread, Medical Officer of Health for the Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health, has been approached for further information.

In the meantime, the committee would appreciate calls from parents of children aged 4 to grade 4, who feel they might like to participate in such a program of dental care. They may contact Mrs. J. Stewart at 537-2145 or Mrs. Tim O'Donnell at 537-5795 with a view to ascertaining how many children might be involved.

As soon as all the necessary data is collected, it is the intention of the committee to ask the parents to meet to organize a clinic.

The committee has scheduled the next program for April 10 in the form of a panel discussion on narcotics education, comprising a panel of local and off-island guest speakers. Determined to avoid the acoustical problems which are so much a part of the auditorium, the committee has arranged for this discussion to be held in one of the High School classrooms.

PROTECTION

Georgia Marine Park may yet prove a reality as islanders, mainlanders and the federal ministers contemplate the declaration of coastal waters such a park.

What does it portend?

To the sponsors the establishment of a marine park here would restrict such enterprises as oil drilling or otherwise threatening the natural fauna of the seas. It would almost certainly represent another barrier against befouling of the sea bed by any industry. There is already legislation in existence which would provide for controls on such activity, islanders have often been told, but it has yet been called into effect.

A series of letters from Air Marshal Sir Philip Livingston at Maple Bay, urges all islanders and other interested residents to communicate with Fisheries Minister Jack Davis to take action in pressing the government for the necessary legislation.

Sir Philip sees the provincial government as "power-hungry" and eager to turn the province into a profitable satellite for the United States.

What is needed, asserts the former Salt Spring doctor is the guaranteed preservation of the natural beauty of this province in a manner that is certain to provide easily accessible open spaces with streams and lakes and woods, that will never become the financial plaything of the speculator, either Canadian or foreign.

It is unarguable. Our forefathers would have gaped in astonishment at the need to call for preservation of the basic things of living. It is little credit to our legislators that the people of the province must resort to these measures to protect themselves against unwise or unscrupulous administrators.

If this represents a means of protecting our environment, then let us all write to the minister of fisheries in Ottawa with a copy to the provincial government in Victoria.

DONATE BLOOD

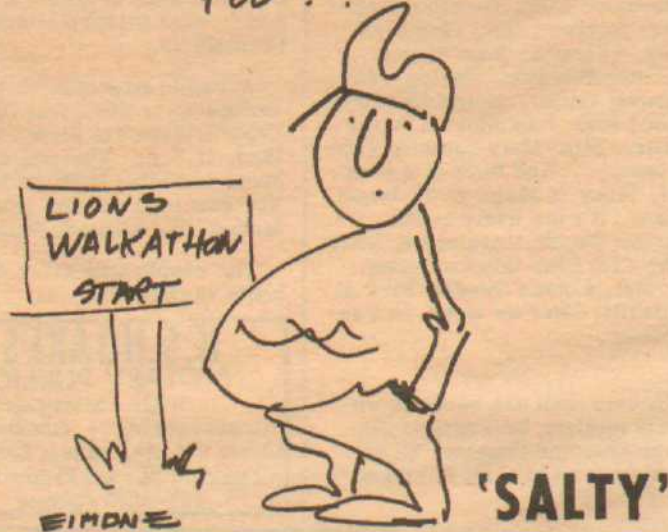
Editor, Driftwood,
The Medical Staff and Board of Management of the Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital have been very concerned regarding blood for transfusion at this hospital. We are advised that it was not a practical proposition to have a Blood Bank in the hospital which is stocked at all times from the Red Cross Transfusion Service in Vancouver, since with the volume of blood which we use, particularly for emergency situations, there would be an unacceptable high number of unused units. Therefore, it was decided that we would attempt to re-activate our donor list to a suitable number, which would take care of all our requirements for emergency situations at the times when transport is not available

between Victoria and Salt Spring Island.

The Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service was contacted and arrangements made with them to have a Blood Donor Clinic at the Legion Hall, on Thursday, April 2nd, sponsored and organized by the Royal Canadian Legion, Salt Spring Island Branch #92, whose members wholeheartedly endorsed the sponsoring of the project and we anticipate a successful clinic. The hospital wish the Clinic to be a success so we urge all that can - "Be a Blood Donor".

At the Salt Spring Garden Club meeting of March 18 final arrangements were made for the Spring Flower Display and Tea to be held April 11 in United Church Hall.

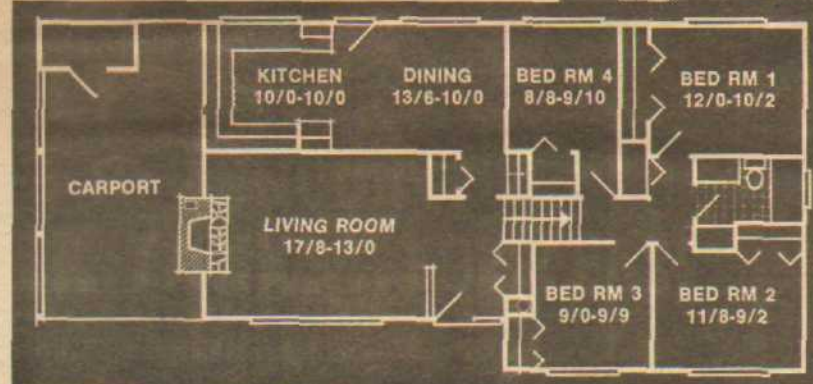
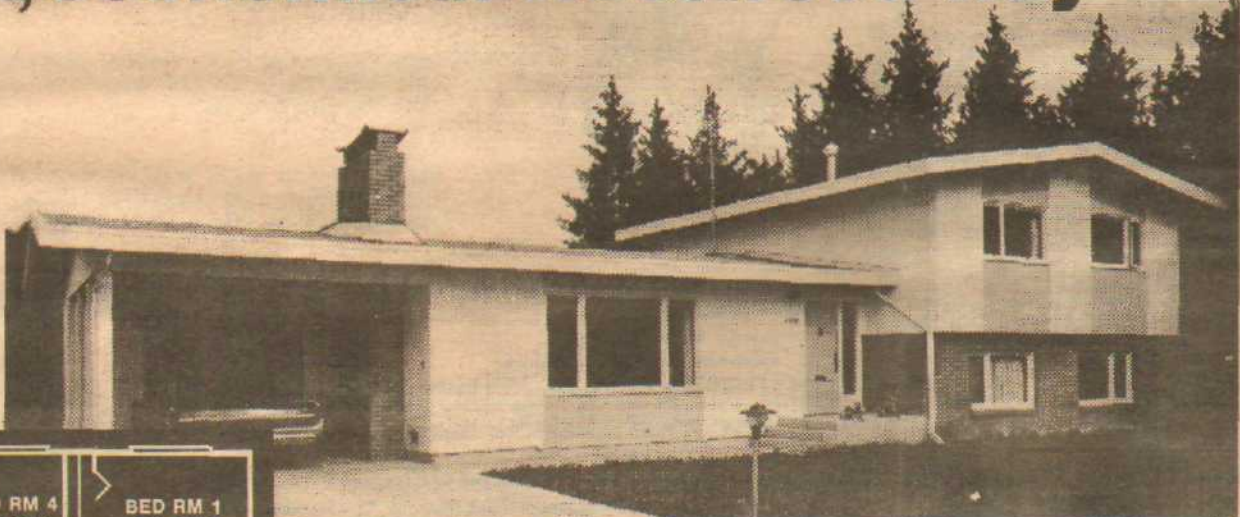

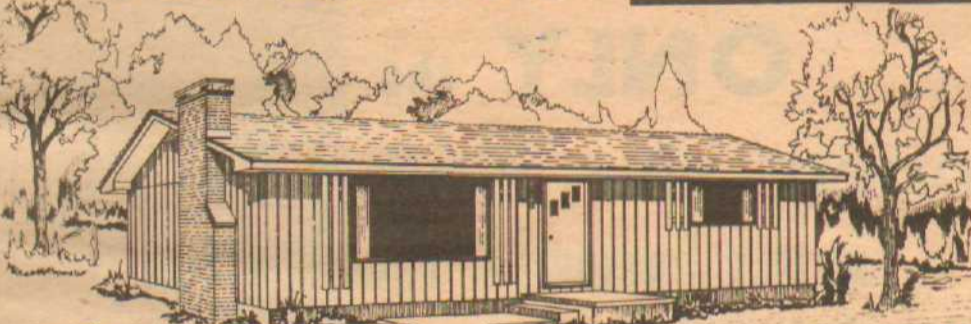

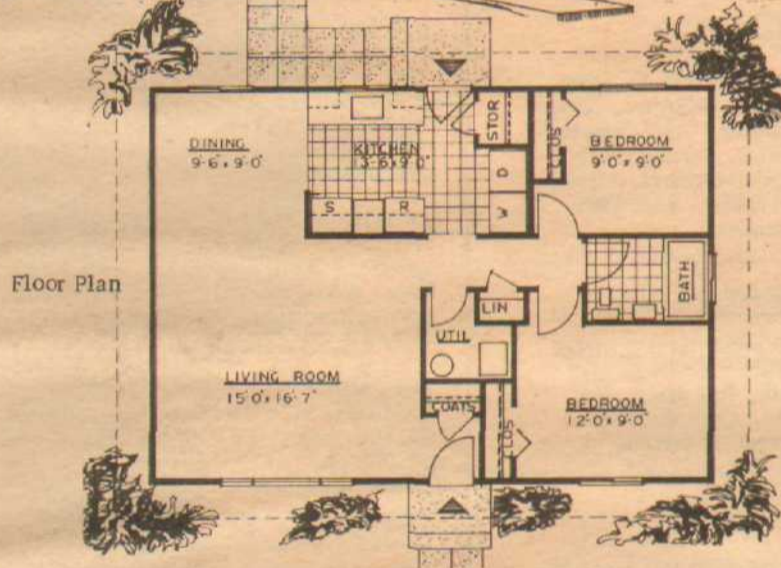

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

MEETING AT MAYNE

BY ELSIE BROWN

Members of the Mayne Island Agricultural Society received valuable information when Mr. and Mrs. P. G. James lectured on dahlia and gladioli culture at the hall on Saturday afternoon.

Mr. James demonstrated the technique of separating dahlia clumps into single tubers each containing one eye thus giving stronger plants and better flowers.

Planting should be done in April in our climate. Any ordinary well-drained soil is suitable enriched with fertilizer. One valuable tip which we might try was the utilization of newspaper shaped into a large ball, saturated with water enriched by good soluble fertilizer and placed below the planting hole will store moisture at the roots. Mulching with a good conditioner over the soil surface helps to eliminate evaporation of this conserving moisture.

Plant tubers six inches deep from 1 1/2 to 4 feet apart. When they come up remove the premature buds and thin out growth to one or two stout stalks.

For tall growing plants strong stakes should be driven, one to each plant before the plants are set. The stems should be tied to the stakes to prevent storm damage.

Mr. James continued his talk on the growing of gladioli. The corms are planted as soon as danger from frost is past, set four to five inches deep and spaced about six inches apart. During dry periods the soil should always be kept fairly moist. In exposed locations staking will be needed to prevent wind damage.

Mrs. James spoke on classifi-

cation for garden and competition purposes. Classes in show schedule must conform to types, sizes and color of kind of flower. Fresh clean flowers, no faded petals, freedom from malformed florets, long erect stem holding flower at 45 degree angle without support and show at least six inches of stem above container.

Defects which lose points are: not conforming to class, hard or green centres, dull or muddy color, not true to variety, and stem short or bent.

Flowers are judged on color, substance form, size (according to variety), stem and foliage and condition.

Question and answer period followed and a social time was enjoyed when tea and refreshments were served. Chairman of the flower show committee, Mrs. Marjorie Haggart was assisted by Mrs. Grace Evans.
